### ASS'N CITES REVENUE LOSS, HIGHER COSTS

**Reduction in All Classes Would Take Effect July 1**

CHICAGO, April 29 (AP)—The association of American railroads adopted today a resolution under the railway labor act to serve notice of a 15 per cent reduction which will become effective July 1 for all classes of labor.

The cut would represent savings of \$250,000,000 annually to member roads, the association said.

The association stated that the cut was necessary because of the loss of revenue and the increases in operating costs.

**OPPOSITION CARRIED TO WHITE HOUSE**

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—The opposition of railroad labor to the proposed wage cut was carried to the White House today by George Harrison, head of the railway labor executives association.

He said that "disappointed railroaders would undertake to launch a movement to cut wages and dry up purchasing power."

### Formation of New Party Announced By LaFollette

MADISON, Wis., April 29 (AP)—Governor Philip LaFollette's lieutenants disclosed today that Iowa and California were his immediate objectives in the organization of the new progressive party outside of Wisconsin. At Washington, the party was seen as a threatening schism to the political forces that helped to elect Roosevelt.

MADISON, Wis., April 29 (AP)—Gov. Philip F. LaFollette of Wisconsin announced to the nation last night formation of a new political party—the National Progressives of America—dedicated to a philosophy of preserving the "right of a free people to work, and by their work add to the wealth of the country."

The Wisconsin governor, son of fiery late "Old Bob" LaFollette who failed in a campaign for the presidency on an independent ticket in 1924, told a mass meeting of liberals that the democratic and republican parties never can unite on a fundamental program to restore economic equilibrium and that the time had come for an entirely new movement to go forward.

The decision to create a new party, which he said had been joined by liberals the country over, was announced in these dramatic words:

"A beginning has been made, here and now, not in 1944, not in 1940, but now, in 1938.

"The National Progressives of America are now organized. State by state we shall build as rapidly as firm foundation can be laid. Definitely and irrevocably we are

**SEEKS BILL AS SPUR TO JOBS**

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 29 (Sp.)—The house rules committee, ignoring President Roosevelt's insistence on the enactment of the wage-hour legislation this session, refused today to send the revised bill to the house. The bill was regarded as virtually killed.

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—Representative Wood, democrat, Missouri, told the house rules committee today that the initial minimum wage of 25 cents per hour in the revised wage-hour bill would put 2,000,000 persons to work.

Chairman O'Connor said that the committee would not complete consideration of the legislation this morning as originally planned.

**Brief Reprieve Granted Him to End at Midnight**

HUNTSVILLE, April 29 (AP)—A 20-hour reprieve granted to John Vaughn, who twice within eight days escaped the electric chair, was half gone today. His attorneys planned further legal steps to stop his execution.

At San Antonio, attorney William Hogan said if injunction papers issued by District Judge Fountain Kirby at Groesbeck yesterday did not arrive, he would file duplications with Judge W. W. McCrory. Kirby's injunction, restraining officials from executing the killer until sanity hearings were held, was returnable at San Antonio.

Governor Allred last night granted a brief reprieve and reiterated today his opinion that the court order was void, and said that he had not decided whether Vaughn would be electrocuted after midnight as scheduled.

Judge Kirby at Groesbeck said that so far as he knew, no effort was made today to send the papers to San Antonio.

Vaughn, convicted of killing a policeman, A. A. Edwards, first escaped the chair a week ago when the generator failed.

**Sino-Japanese War Halts Jap Weavers**

NANKING, China, April 29 (AP)—Weaving of the famous Nanking tapestries is another ancient Chinese home industry which has ceased to exist since the Sino-Japanese war started.

The war, however, is not entirely to blame. The industry, because of competition, with machine-made products, was fast facing extinction before hostilities started last year. The Japanese invasion hastened the process.

**British, French Statesmen Forge New Entente**

LONDON, April 29 (AP)—Premiers of Great Britain and France today concluded a two-day conference in which they forged a mighty entente designed to keep peace in Europe.

They agreed to pool their countries' vast armed strength in the world's greatest defensive alliance. It was announced that the purpose of the general agreement was to defend their common democracy and to seek "peaceful, just solution of problems" of Europe.

### FDR REQUESTS SECURITY ACT IMPROVEMENT

**Liberalization of Old Age Benefits Are Suggested**

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—President Roosevelt asked the social security board today to study the methods of improving the social security act to include the liberalization and extension of old age benefit system.

The president told the press conference he had written A. J. Altmeyer of the board, asking that the revised program be prepared for action in the next session of congress.

President Roosevelt said that he requested the board to consider the question of commencing old age benefit payments earlier than January 1, 1942, as now provided. He also asked a study of larger benefits for widows, children, and for those retiring within the next few years under the pension plan.

### May 15 Final Date For AAA Signing

EASTLAND, April 29 (Sp.)—  
 May 15 will be the final date for  
 farmers and ranchers to sign in the  
 1938 AAA farm and range pro-  
 grams according to information  
 received by County Agent Cook  
 from the state AAA office.  
 Farmers who signed a work  
 sheet in 1937 or have signed a  
 work sheet since January 1, can  
 receive AAA payments for 1938  
 if they comply with the terms of  
 the program, on their individual  
 farms. If they did not sign a  
 work sheet in 1937 or have not  
 signed a work sheet since January  
 1, 1938, they will not be eligible  
 for a payment in the 1938 AAA  
 Farm program, even if they comply  
 with the provisions of the pro-  
 gram.  
 Ranchers who have signed an  
 "Application for Determination  
 of Grazing Capacity" in the 1938  
 Range Program can execute one  
 or more of the 14 recognized  
 range conservation practices and  
 earn a payment in the 1938 Range  
 Program. Those who have not or  
 do not sign such an application by  
 May 15th, 1938, cannot earn a  
 1938 range conservation prac-  
 tices in 1938.  
 Farmers or ranchers who wish  
 to sign for 1938 should call at  
 the county agent's office at East-  
 land not later than May 15th.

**Senator Lee Against Cotton Regulations**

WASHINGTON, April 29 (P)— Senator Lee (D-Okla.) started a move in congress Thursday to modify the cotton acreage allotment system in the new farm act, warning the senate that both cotton and corn growers in several states were protesting federal allotment regulations.

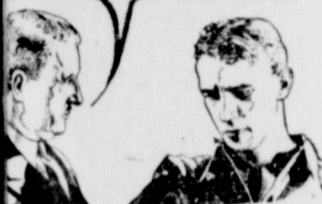

### May 15 Final Date For AAA Signing

EASTLAND, April 29 (Sp.)—May 15 will be the final date for farmers and ranchers to sign in the 1938 AAA farm and range programs according to information received by County Agent Cook from the state AAA office.

Farmers who signed a work sheet in 1937 or have signed a work sheet since January 1, can receive AAA payments for 1938 if they comply with the terms of the program, on their individual farms. If they did not sign a work sheet in 1937 or have not signed a work sheet since January 1, 1938, they will not be eligible for a payment in the 1938 AAA Farm program, even if they comply with the provisions of the program.

Ranchers who have signed an "Application for Determination of Grazing Capacity" in the 1938 Range Program can execute one or more of the 14 recognized range conservation practices and earn a payment in the 1938 Range Program. Those who have not or do not sign such an application by May 15th, 1938, cannot earn a 1938 range conservation practices in 1938.

Farmers or ranchers who wish to sign for 1938 should call at the county agent's office at Eastland not later than May 15th.

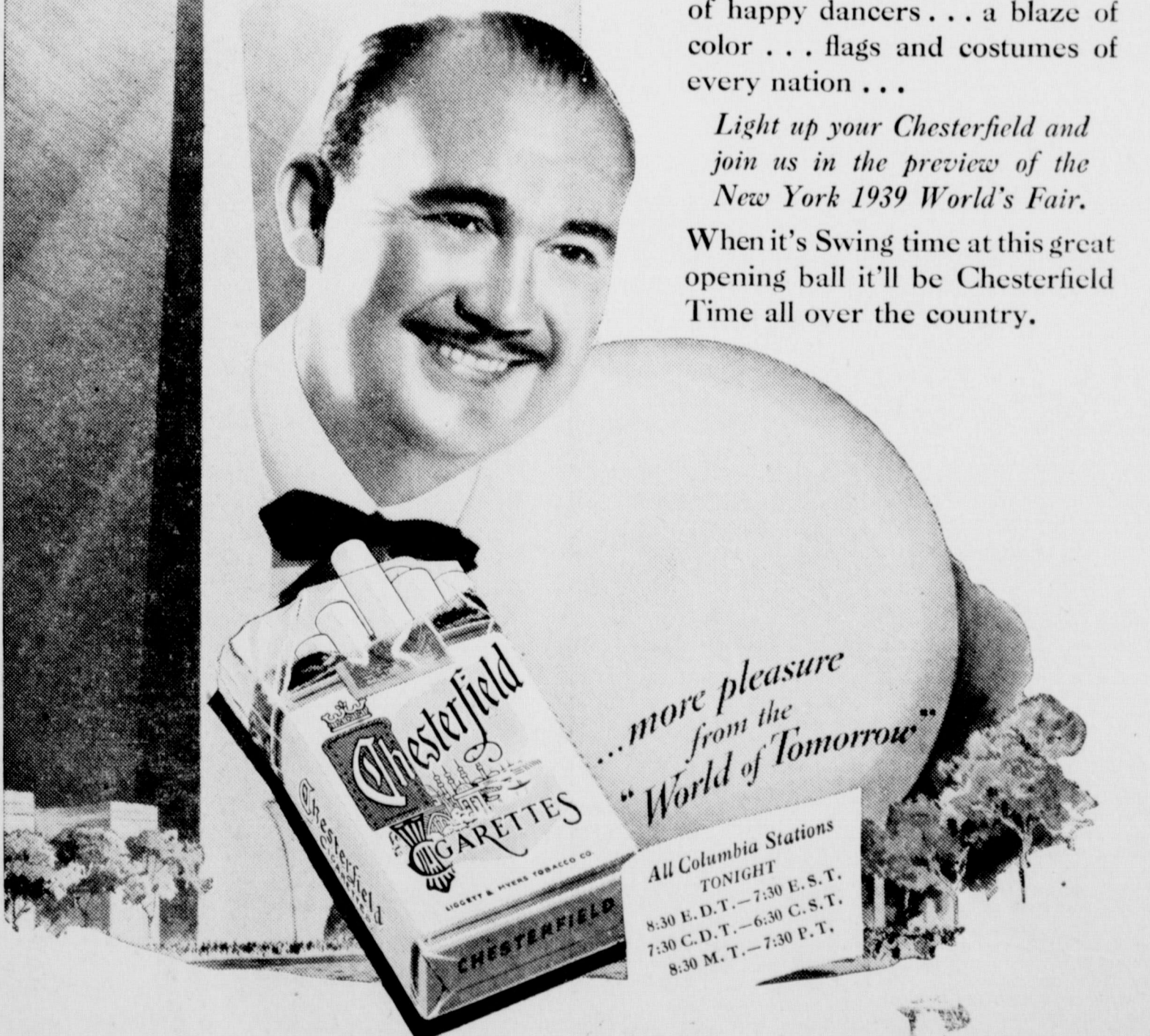

### Fingerprint Expert Impresses Grand Jury

CHICAGO, April 29 (AP)—For the fifth consecutive month, traffic fatalities in the United States showed a decline in March.

The National Safety council announced Wednesday that March deaths totaled 2,180, compared with 2,790 for the same month last year. This represented a 22 per cent decrease, the sharpest in any month since the unbroken decline began last November after five years of steadily mounting fatalities.
