MEXICO SEVERS RELATIONS WITH BRITAIN

Japanese Capture Vital Chinese Lunghai Railway

FIRST TROOPS Declaration Of War SUPPORTED BY **200 AIRPLANES**

Believed That The Canton - Hankow Line Will Be Next

SHANGHAI, May 14 (AP) -Japanese army communique said Saturday that the vital Lunghai railway, objective of Japan's central China campaign, was cut east of Tangshan. Mobile troops reaching the line blew up a bridge. The region was thereby disrupted.

Traffic over the railway, running east and west through the heart of central China's rich agricultural area, had been blocked shortly before by aerial bombardment, disruping transportation of war supplies to China's huge army defending the region.

It was his boast that his party and the people of his state have shown how to get things done. National judgment of the expanded progressive program may revolve around this point.

The progressive record in Wis consin, sometimes under other names, goes back nearly 40 years For that period the La Follette dynasty, father and sons, has been represented in high public office.

An Early Independent

Old Bob La Follette started i before the turn of the century by defying local bosses of the republican party. He was elected, agains their wishes, as district attorney then sent to congress.
