Texas Lumber Industry Down For April

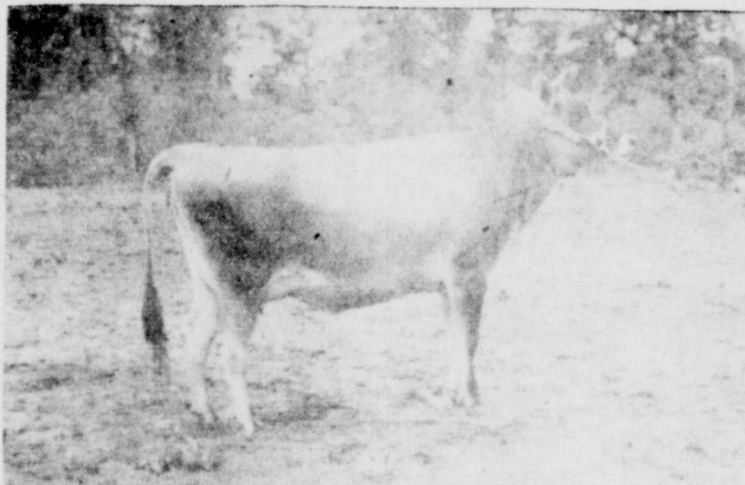
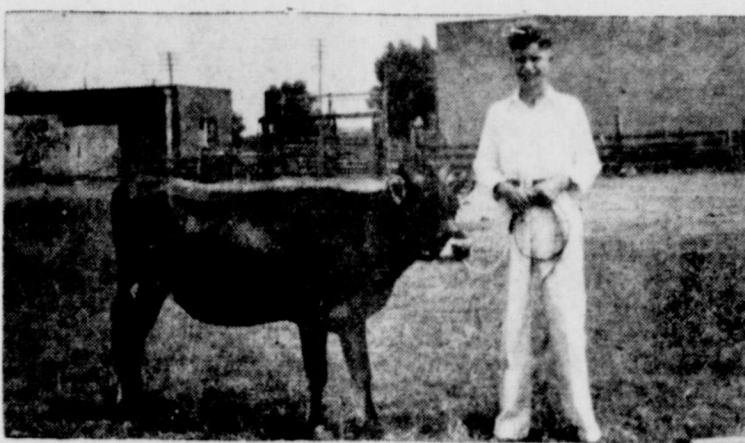
AUSTIN, May 14 (Sp.)—The lumber industry continued its quite unfavorable trend during April, according to the University of Texas bureau of business research. Reports from the Southern Pine association show average weekly production during April of 261,258 board feet per unit, a decline of 6 per cent from the preceding month and a drop of 23.9 per cent from the corresponding month last year. Average weekly shipments per unit, 244,970 board feet, were down 13.1 per cent and 22.6 per cent per unit respectively.

Average unfilled orders per unit on April 30 totaled 516,271 board feet, down 10.5 per cent from the end of March and 34.2 per cent from April 30 last year.

Cats Are No Good For Research Work

OXFORD, Eng., May 14 (AP)—Dr. A. E. Barclay, of the Nuffield Institute of Medical Research, has a unique reason for disliking cats. "Since I began my recent experiments on lung diseases," he explained to a meeting of the tuberculosis association, "my affection for cats—especially the black ones—has considerably lessened. "Cats are no good for scientific research, because each gives different results from the others."

Texas Charters Issued In April 11.9 Per Cent Up

AUSTIN, May 14 (Sp.)—There was a substantial increase in the number of new corporations chartered in Texas during April both in comparison with the preceding month and the corresponding month last year, the University of Texas bureau of business research has reported.

Computations from the records of the secretary of state show a total of 160 new charters granted during April, an increase of 11.9 per cent over the preceding month and a gain of 13.5 per cent over the like month last year. Capitalization of the new corporations, \$1,829,000, was, however, 9.9 per cent under March and 17.8 per cent below April last year.

Groups showing gains over April last year were manufacturing, merchandising, oil, and transportation.

Allred Will Greet Contest Bands By Letter

ABILENE, May 14 (Sp.)—The high school band members, their directors, sponsors and others who will be visiting in Abilene next Thursday, Friday and Saturday will be welcomed to the city by Governor Allred, State Superintendent of Education L. A. Woods and State Supervisor of Music Nell Parmley.

Unfortunately, the trio will not be able to attend the event in person, but all three have written letters of welcome. These letters are to be published in the official program for the school music festival.

The entry lists were closed Thursday with a total of 43 bands and more than 290 solo and ensemble groups representing more than 100 towns of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. Last night the housing committee and Mrs. C. C. Stuart were busy engaged in making assignments of the students to the rooms which Abilene citizens offered for use during the three day period.

"We needed 1,500 rooms and we received 1,800," said Mrs. Stuart. Probably the extra 300 rooms will not be required, but we are happy to have them if we do need them. Every home to which students are assigned will be notified of the assignment before the bands arrive. They will know who they are to have, where they are from and how long they will stay. The assignments are expected to be completed tomorrow.

Texas Lumber Industry Down For April

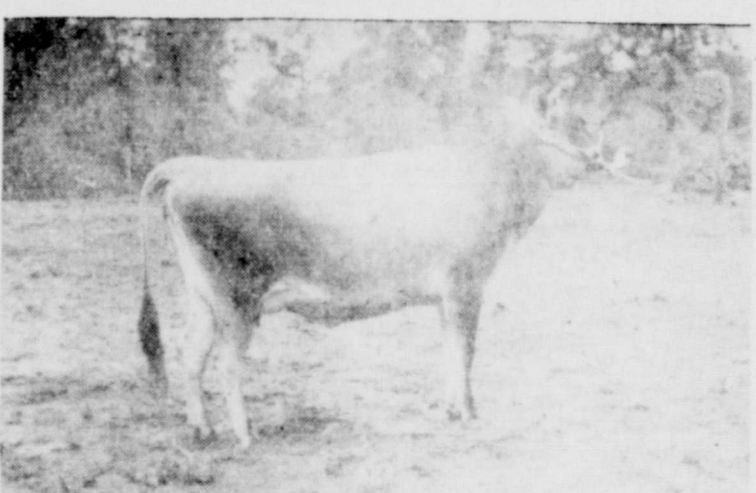
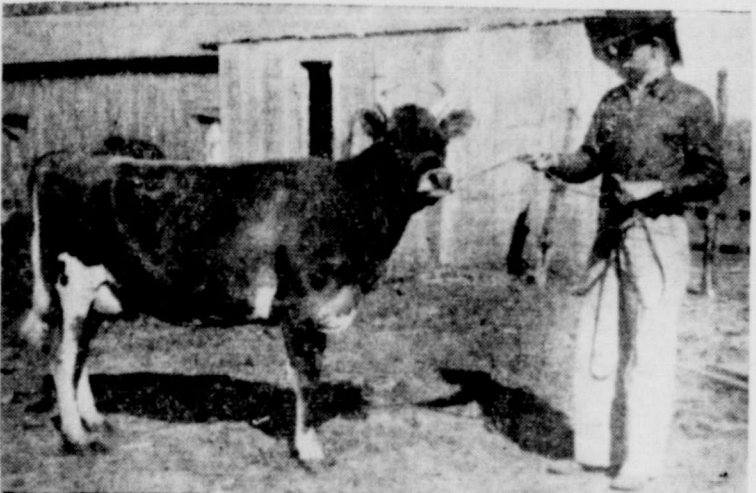
AUSTIN, May 14 (Sp.)—The lumber industry continued its quite unfavorable trend during April, according to the University of Texas bureau of business research. Reports from the Southern Pine association show average weekly production during April of 261,258 board feet per unit, a decline of 6 per cent from the preceding month and a drop of 23.9 per cent from the corresponding month last year. Average weekly shipments per unit, 244,970 board feet, were down 13.1 per cent and 22.6 per cent per unit respectively.

Average unfilled orders per unit on April 30 totaled 516,271 board feet, down 10.5 per cent from the end of March and 34.2 per cent from April 30 last year.

Cats Are No Good For Research Work

OXFORD, Eng., May 14 (AP)—Dr. A. E. Barclay, of the Nuffield Institute of Medical Research, has a unique reason for disliking cats. "Since I began my recent experiments on lung diseases," he explained to a meeting of the tuberculosis association, "my affection for cats—especially the black ones—has considerably lessened. "Cats are no good for scientific research, because each gives different results from the others."

Texas Charters Issued In April 11.9 Per Cent Up

AUSTIN, May 14 (Sp.)—There was a substantial increase in the number of new corporations chartered in Texas during April both in comparison with the preceding month and the corresponding month last year, the University of Texas bureau of business research has reported.

Computations from the records of the secretary of state show a total of 160 new charters granted during April, an increase of 11.9 per cent over the preceding month and a gain of 13.5 per cent over the like month last year. Capitalization of the new corporations, \$1,889,000, was, however, 9.3 per cent under March and 17.8 per cent below April last year.

Groups showing gains over April last year were manufacturing, merchandising, oil, and transportation.

The entry lists were closed Thursday with a total of 43 bands and more than 200 solo and ensemble groups representing more than 100 towns of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.
