766 Apply For Mattresses In Callahan County

Applications for mattresses through the Surplus Cotton Mattress program demonstration through the Federal Surplus Commodities program was closed Saturday, June 15 in Callahan County. A total of 766 applications were taken and up to date 675 have been approved. Mattress demonstration centers are being opened each week day, Enterprise, Zion Hill, Oplin, Cottonwood, Atwell, Midway, Clyde and Eula will be in full swing this week. The first 5 listed have worked up from 1 to 2 bales and we have processed closed to 75 mattresses in two weeks run.

The centers are run in this manner. The first day Miss Clara Brown, home demonstration agent gives the mattress processing demonstration, then another mattress is made that day to practice what was shown to the group. The weight of a bale of cotton is taken and divided by 50 to see how many mattresses can be made. That number of families are notified they come and make up the bale of cotton. When the last mattress is made the mattresses are approved and taken home. Then another group is notified and another bale is made up and so on. Groups cannot hurry the processing for standard mattresses must be made before they can be approved. Each center is in charge of a committee of home demonstration women and two local men. There are at the present time around 50 club women giving their time to this program and are not receiving pay what so ever and many of them are not eligible for a mattress.

In the state of Texas up to June 20, 119,073 applications had been filed in 203 counties and 95,368 already been certified.

Training In Recreational Leadership

For the fourth consecutive summer forty boys and forty girls on National Youth Administration Projects throughout the State will be given training in recreation leadership through an NYA Resident Center sponsored by the Southwest Texas State Teachers College in San Marcos July - though August 24, according to J. C. Kellam State NYA Administrator.

During their stay in San Marcos, the youth will work seven ty-four hours each month and will receive a sum sufficient to reimburse the College for food, lodging, and medical attention, and will have about \$12 a month each left for their personal usage.

Under the supervision of College officials of the Physical Education Department these 80 boys and girls will learn the fundamentals of recreational leadership during the time they spend in training classes, and they will be given experience by actual participation leadership during their working hours when they will assist in the supervision of San Marcos recreational programs. All recreational facilities at the Southwest Texas State Teachers College will be available for them.

In the selection of youth to receive this work experience and training NYA District Directors will consider those interested in the field of recreational leadership who have completed at least two years of high school work.

"In offering training in recreational leadership to 80 young people over the State it is our purpose," the State Youth Administrator pointed out. "to give them an opportunity to learn how to play and how to initiate recreational programs so that when they return home, they can give valuable assistance in the operation of local recreational programs."

A. B. Martin Died At Amarillo

Albert B. Martin former resident of Callahan county where he spent his boyhood days on his fathers farm near Admiral, died at Amarillo Friday following an illness of several months.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Central Presbyterian Church at Amarillo with the Rev. R. Thompson officiating.

Mr. Martin who was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Martin pioneer residents of Callahan county was a well known veteran West Texas barrister and jurist who served on three high state tribunals.

Mr. Martin, 61, retired a year ago from the State Supreme Court Commission because of ill health. He died Friday night after a week of serious illness.

A native of Senatobia, Miss., Mr. Martin moved to West Texas as a child and attended school at Buffalo Gap and Cottonwood before going to the University of Indiana for his law training.

He taught school at the age of 16, and was elected county attorney of Coleman County when he was 21. Mr. Martin was a resident of Tullia from 1906 until 1914, and later lived and practiced law at Plainview.

Mr. Martin was at one time a member of the Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin, and from 1932 until 1937 was a member of the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals at Amarillo. He was appointed to the State Supreme Court Commission in 1937.

Judge Martin is survived by his wife and one son Terry Martin of Amarillo, two brothers, A. P. Martin of Amarillo, Walter Martin, former county treasurer of Callahan county, now living in Oregon and an only sister, Mrs. S. D. Hill, of Baird.

AUSTIN—All of the fantastic schemes for raising millions to pay old age pensions and other gimme-crut benefits in Tex. which have been thought up by the numerous crop of candidates for every office from Governor to constable are apparently so much love's labor lost.

The war situation, in addition to making the voters show less than no interest at all in the revenue-raising platforms, has already made it pretty certain that there will not be any new millions of state revenue raised by the next legislature.

The reason is that the Congress working nights and Sundays in Washington, has worked out a Federal tax program, to pay for the defense of the nation, that is going to take the hide off tax payers-big and little in large

patches. Its final details will not be known for several weeks yet, but it is already a cinch that incomes of \$800 up for single persons, \$2000 up for married folks, are going to be taxed plenty; Federal gasoline, amusement, liquor and other "nuisance" levies are going up by leaps and bounds; and doubtless many new taxes will be laid before the bill is sent to the President.

CALL FOR ECONOMY

That means dreams of pensions for everybody which the State politicians have nourished so feelingly are "out". The new Legislature will be largely new members—with only 97 of the present 150 standing for re-election in the House—and regardless of campaign promises, Federal taxes are going to be so high that large new State taxes are not even going to get serious consideration. Natural resources, chief target of the promises appear now to be the poorest prospect for new money, because oil is what is meant "natural resources" and the war, with Europe markets shut off completely, already has put the Texas oil industry in a hot spot, with shut-downs of a month or more of all fields being proposed as the only method of preventing a flood of overproduction which nobody can use.

About the only hope the taxpayers has for the next few years is to go to work on state and local officials—particularly the latter—and demand some efficiency and some reductions in the cost of local and state government. It has got to go even further that that the people of Texas are going to have to do away with some costly services rendered by the Government that they have enjoyed, and which they no longer can afford, in order to shoulder the burden of necessary Federal defense taxation. The Germans for years lived on a bare subsistence diet, did without many things regarded as absolutely essential in other countries, and built up the world's most powerful war machine with the proceeds of their savings—which were forced down their throats. The people of Texas and the rest of the United States have but one hope of protecting themselves against that war machine—to deny themselves, colonarily and not at the order of a dictator, many things they thought they had to have. There is going to be less money available for politicians to build up state and local political machines, fewer government jobs, less money for pensions, less money probably for schools, less money for relief. A lot of folks who have learned to look to the Government for a living are going to have the alternative of

going to work, or starving to death. Very few of them will starve.

THOMPSON MAKING PROGRESS

If anybody is interested, the Governor's race is still attracting but little attention. Ernest Thompson, with an admirable war record as a machine-gunner in the last war, has launched a vigorous campaign, and is showing support he had two years ago is still solidly behind him, despite the dillydallying tactics he showed in entering, withdrawing, and then reentering the race. Thompson, rapping O'Daniel's lack of a war record in a sizzling speech has won much new support. The folks once more ar paying some attention to soldiers, war records ability to get a job done under stress, and other genuine factors in a gubernatorial race, and less attention to hilly-billy bands, bull fiddles, and asthmatic tenors. If Thompson can muster enough votes to get into a runoff with O'Daniel, and the war situation remales as critical as it is today for another five weeks, this reporter predicts Texas will have a new Governor next January—one who can instill some confidence into a people who are jittery over Texas' mistake in electing a vaudeville clown to govern six million people in a war crisis.



Congressman Garrett Issues Statement

Congressman Clyde L. Garrett issued the following statement today answering the many questions which have been asked the past few weeks.

All mails are bringing me daily such statements as these:

"Please support the President's proposal to rush aid to the Allies.

"Your constituents do not feel that Congress should adjourn during this international crisis.

"We believe that you should remain in Washington.

"Will you return to the District to make campaign for reelection?"

"Your friends will look after your interest here, you look after ours there.

"Some of your opponents are already campaigning but there has been no 'MUD-SLINGING.'

In view of the above, let me say to my constituents that we are making every effort to speedily assist the Allies, by furnishing them with supplies and materials.

Real National Defense, in my judgment, contemplates defense from within as well as from without. We have already appropriated \$5,000,000,000 for our Army, Navy and Air Corps. More will be necessary, but our Army and Navy will be helpless in an emergency if enemy aliens and un-American activities are not curbed.

I feel that we are taking such action in Congress as will completely destroy this so called "fifth column."

It is my deep conviction that Congress should remain in session during these crucial times. This feeling is shared by the overwhelming majority of the Members of Congress.

The matter of maintaining our own national integrity, the peace, dignity and security of our nation is far more important to me and to my constituents than my political fortunes. Therefore, it is not my intention to return to the District to make a campaign while Congress remains in session, unless I should return for a very brief time, and I shall not return at all if there is any likelihood of matters of grave importance being considered by Congress, but I shall leave the matter of my reelection with the intelligent voters of my District, who are thoroughly capable of determining whether I can serve them better, under present conditions, than could a new man in Congress.

I appreciate the consideration which my splendid opponents have shown me in my absence. It is most gratifying to know that they have placed their campaign on a high plane. Some of them have gone so far as to issue statements that they will not begin to campaign until Congress adjourns, until I have had time to return to the District, etc. Certainly, in

this time of great national emergency, all candidates should run on their own merits. Truly during these troublesome times, no personalities or "MUD SLINGING" should be indulged in.

The fine people of our District are entitled to such consideration in selecting one to serve them in the United States Congress at a time when the destiny of our nation is at stake.

The World moves onward and outward, events unexpected and strikingly alarming arrest our attention each day and the horizon is everything but inspiring. To be informed and abreast of the times today, is no security whatever for undreamed of incidents on the morrow. We learn some things today and have to learn altogether different and contrary facts tomorrow.

We just returned from Baltimore where we attended the sessions of the Southern Baptist Convention. We spent one day in Washington D. C. It will also be remembered that England and her colonies, referred to as the Young Lions (doubtless including the U. S.) would stand alone in this mighty world conflict which would mark the end of the Gentile age. It was also pointed out that this World Dictator, described in Prophecy would subdue ten kingdoms and set up a Federation of Kingdoms. It is only a matter of simple arithmetic to count the kingdoms that have fallen to Hitler. Thus far the record reads that the following Kingdoms have been subdued by Hitler: Austria, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Norway, Denmark, Holland, Belgium, France, Luxembourg. Perhaps Italy could already be said to have fallen to him though not by Military Conquest. However, his rulership already extends to the

ten kingdoms. Now what next? Only the Scriptures will give the answer. The scene of Battle will move to Palestine, Turkey and the Near East, IF this is the federation referred to by the Prophets. We have no desire to become sensational nor would we be an agent of anybodys war propaganda but as an ordinary preacher and student of the Scriptures, we cannot pass present world conditions by and say, they amount to nothing. Certainly we have no fear of human criticism in preaching to the world just what God said.

We invite you to that service, certainly the entire citizenship of Baird ought to come. We will promise you a message that can safely carry to Eternity with you.
