VIOLENCE UNLEASHED AGAIN IN WAR AREAS

DuPont, Raskob Attempted to Evade Income Tax

TWO MAY OWE \$1,600,000 SAY ATT'YS

Pair Sold Securities to Each Other at Cheap Price After Crash

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—The United States board of tax appeals today found that Pierre S. Du Pont and John D. Raskob had attempted to evade more than a million dollars in income taxes by "paper transactions" securities. The exact amount of additional taxes due in 1929 incomes were to be determined later. Attention of the appeals board was attracted by a report that Du Pont and Raskob had sold about \$4,000,000 in securities to each other at prices far below what they had paid for them. They eventually resold to other investors. The board said, "The design is to complete to be without a demerit."

SPAIN CLAIMS ANGLO-ITALIAN PACT IGNORED

Asserts 6,000 Troops, 300 Aviators Sent to Country

(By Associated Press) The Spanish government gave the non-intervention committee new worries today when she sent a note to the British government charging Premier Mussolini had no intention of carrying out his bargain to withdraw foreign soldiers from Spain. The government asserted Italy sent some 6,000 infantrymen and 300 aviators to Spain since signing the Anglo-Italian friendship agreement April 16. The Italian government announced today that Italian aviators fighting for insurgents had brought down a total of 580 enemy aircraft.

JAP PLANES BOMB CANTON TWICE TODAY

Spanish Rebels Fight On Toward City of Valencia

(By Associated Press) Violence was unleashed again today. Japanese warplanes bombed Canton twice today. Armies continued pounding Kinkiang. Bombs dropped at Wuchang endangered four American mission institutions. Two hundred casualties were reported; none were Americans. Spanish insurgents were reported to have fought their way to high positions in the Espadan mountains. They could see the crossroads at the town of Sagunto, the key to Valencia. They bombed Cartagena, killing 24. The high Moslem holy man, Sheikh Ali Hatib, was shot down in Jerusalem. In northern Ireland disorders took place at Maghera. At Londonderry county, during the observance of the anniversary of the battle of Boyne, three policemen were seriously injured and many suffered minor casualties.

Water Instruction Starts Wednesday

Free Life Saving and swimming classes will start tomorrow at Lake Tanco with Jim Berry and T. A. Smith in charge for the purpose of giving Ciscoans an opportunity to learn to swim or to improve their swimming abilities. The large class completed last week give indications that an even larger number will take part in the new season. The schedule for the classes is as follows: 10:30 to 12 a. m.—Life Saving and water safety; 2 to 3—beginners; 3 to 4—intermediates.

Applications for Loans for 1939 Crop Being Taken

Application for rural rehabilitation loans for the next crop year now being taken, Geo. I. Lane, county supervisor for the Farm Security Administration, announced today. The loan program has been liberalized so that all types of farming may now be included. Present or prospective borrowers are urged to begin immediately making their plans for the next year. Arrangements should be made for financing, though the money may not be needed for several months," Mr. Lane said. "Interest charges will not begin until the money is received by the client. Small grain, fall and winter vegetable or truck crops, and livestock projects must be planned now if the most profitable system of management is to be followed, the supervisor said. Some plans will require machinery, pure-bred sires, other facilities which must be provided through a community or cooperative service loan. Applications for this cooperative type of loan are also being received. Future arrangements which finance program of improvements in farm are being made by FSA wherever possible, Mr. Lane said. Copies of a lease form for improvements are available at the supervisor's office at Eastland, he stated.

Savings Insurance as Economic Assurance

ONE of the elements which offer hope of recovery from today's depressed business conditions is the strength of the banking system as compared with that of 1932.

Quickly indeed we have come to accept the guarantee of bank deposits as a matter of course. And yet the act was passed only in June of 1933, and was not really set operating until the first of the following year.

Yet today more than 50,000,000 bank accounts are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance corporation. And the owners of

those accounts feel safe in regard to them. That builds confidence.

THE first bank to close, whose depositors were protected by the insurance law, folded up in the fall of 1935. Since then more than 350,000 deposits in 200-odd banks have received \$117,000,000 from the FDIC.

They lost nothing, and, barring a total collapse of the banking system with a series of closures like that which dotted the period 1920-33, the depositors in more than 13,700 insured banks are not likely to lose anything, either.

THIS strong banking situation is not entirely, of course, the product of the insurance plan. It should be remembered that half of the banks in the country went bust in the period just preceding the 1932-33 depression, and that, generally speaking, it was the stronger banks that survived.

Stricter rules for chartering new banks have been put in force, with consequently greater chances of success for those that do begin business. The capital structure of the existing banks has also been materially strengthened through federal action.

The deposit insurance corporation thus far has operated on a sound basis, and is actually money ahead, building up its resources, despite the money paid out in the 200 failures.

As long as there are 50,000,000 savings accounts whose owners feel quite secure in their possession, there lies beneath recessions and depressions something which ought to make, and in the present instance seems to be making, a cushion off which we "bounce" once bottom is hit.

New Vaccine checks Spreading of Fever

CHEYENNE, Wyo., July 12 (AP)—A new vaccine to prevent Rocky mountain spotted fever from developing in persons bitten by wood ticks "undoubtedly is a major factor" in a reduction this year in the number of cases of fever in Wyoming, Dr. G. M. Anderson, state health officer, reports.

So far this year only 20 Wyoming cases have been noticed, compared with 83 in 1935; 47 in 1936 and 61 in 1937. The worst of the tick fever season usually is over by July although last year cases were reported as late as August. The vaccine was developed by the United States public health service's laboratory at Hamilton, Mont., and is used widely in the west where the fever is prevalent.
