Red Cross Campaign Begin Tuesday

The Red Cross annual Roll Call will get under way at 9 o'clock this morning when a force of 30 solicitors, under the leadership of Mr. M. H. Applewhite, county home service chairman and campaign chairman, begins a canvass that will be completed Wednesday afternoon.

The first stages of the campaign will be designed to cover business houses and similar institutions. This work is to be finished Tuesday.

HOMES BEING ARRANGED FOR GERMAN JEWS

Chamberlain Reveals Plan to Lease Colony Lands

LONDON, Nov. 21 (AP)—Prime Minister Chamberlain today told the house of commons of plans to lease at least 10,000 square miles of British Guiana to provide homes for German Jews seeking a refuge abroad from the Nazi regime's anti-Jewish campaign.

Chamberlain also disclosed that favorable progress had been made for settlement of Jewish refugees in Tanganyika, formerly German East Africa, and other territories in Africa.

Tanganyika is now held by the British under a League of Nations mandate.

NAZI POGROM ABATEMENT

BERLIN, Nov. 21 (AP)—Germany's anti-Semitic drive, which deprived thousands of German Jews of virtually all freedom and reduced tens of thousands to destitution, showed signs of abatement today.

Many Jews face the future not knowing where to turn even to live from day to day. They estimate that 60,000 Jewish men have been sent to jail and concentration camps, leaving many families unable to replenish ready cash funds.

But there was at least a temporary end to the wholesale arrests and the recent sharp decline of German exports may prove a momentary life-saver at least for the Jewish export trade.

Statement Is Reported by Accused Youth

Baird officers announced today noon that Floyd Pretz, 20-year-old printer charged with murder in the fatal shooting of his mother, Mrs. E. C. Pretz, 45, in the kitchen of her Baird home Wednesday night, had made a statement in which he admitted the shooting.

The statement was made to Deputy Sheriff C. R. Nordyke and H. S. Parker Sunday about noon, in the presence of a close friend of the accused youth. It was written. Details of the statement were not given and officers declined to reveal the motive ascribed for the shooting.

Examining trial for the youth was to be held this afternoon before Justice of the Peace G. H. Corm at Baird. He was expected to be remanded to jail without bond to await action of the 42nd district grand jury which has been summoned for Tuesday to consider the case.

District Atty's J. R. Black of Abilene and County Atty's F. E. Mitchell of Baird are in charge of the case for the state.

Mrs. Pretz died instantly about 7:30 last Wednesday evening from the effects of a 22 rifle bullet which struck her in the right rear of the head. It was first understood that she had picked up a small rifle to move it when the gun went off accidentally. Later young Pretz, who was in the room at the time, told officers, they said, that he was holding the rifle at the time it accidentally discharged. He was reported to have told investigators that he had picked up the weapon believing it unloaded, and had manipulated the slide action when it discharged.

A Cisco colored man was charged in local justice court with drunken driving after a car which he was attempting to drive yesterday collided with a machine belonging to the Carroll Motor company. Officers said the man had no driver's license. He was endeavoring to make bond this morning.

U. S. Armament Plan Opposed by Peace Groups

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (AP)—Seven peace organizations protested Sunday against the administration's current proposal to create a naval and military establishment for defense of the western hemisphere, calling it hysterical and dangerous.

In a joint statement, the groups said another "Marian invasion" scare had resulted such as that caused by a recent radio drama, but this time the show was being staged by the president.

"It is not as good a job, but it is decidedly more dangerous," the statement added.

The seven organizations are: The National Council for Prevention of War, The Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, The Keep America Out of War Committee, World Peaceways, The Fellowship of Reconciliation, The Youth Committee Against War, The Labor Anti-War Council.

Their statement came a few days after President Roosevelt had told a press conference that defense studies embraced protection for the entire Western Hemisphere, and that the defense plan would be in co-operation with other American republics and Canada. The peace groups said they condemned the policies of Hitler and Mussolini and believed in the firmest possible protection for democracy.

The Baird high school Bears and the Woodson football team will meet on Chesley field at Cisco on Thanksgiving day in a game which will decide the championship of District 11-B. It was announced today by Supt. Matt Williams of the Baird public schools.

Winner of the game will play the winner of the Nocona-Newcastle game in the bi-district. The game here will begin at 2 p. m.

Supt. Woods to Be Desdemona Speaker

EASTLAND, Nov. 21.—L. A. Woods of Austin, state superintendent of public education, is scheduled to make the principal address at dedicatory services Wednesday night marking formal opening of the new Desdemona public school.

The dedication talk is scheduled at 7:30. A banquet to honor visiting officials is planned at 8 o'clock.

Congressman Clyde L. Garrett and County Superintendent C. S. Eldridge of Eastland are others to be present. Officials also are expected from the area and district WPA offices at Eastland and Fort Worth.

The new school replaces one destroyed by fire several months ago. It was built by a WPA project.

---So He Slugged Car in It's "Eye"

FRANKFORT, Ky., Nov. 21 (AP)—When a man with a badly lacerated, bloody right hand came to his office, Dr. Tom Leonard, Frankfort physician, asked several questions to learn whether a police report would be necessary. Shamefacedly, the patient said: "I hate to tell you. My car choked on top of the hill and I got out to crank it. The thing wouldn't start and I got so all-fired mad at it I socked it in the eye. I poked my fist through the headlight."

Court to Review Decision on Sit-Down Strikes

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (AP)—The supreme court agreed today to review a lower court decision that an employer may dismiss workmen who engage in sit-down strikes.

The ruling, by the federal circuit court at Chicago, upheld the Pansteel Metallurgical corporation in discharging workmen who seized two buildings in 1937.

After retaining possession of the buildings for nine days the employees were driven out by police.

GEN. CEDILLO, TWO NEW YORK FLIERS NAMED

Transportation of Airplanes Into Mexico Is Alleged

CORPUS CHRISTI, Nov. 21 (AP)—General Saturnino Cedillo, vanquished rebel leader in Mexico, and five other persons, including two American aviators, were indicted by a federal grand jury today for conspiracy to violate the amended neutrality act of 1937.

The indictment specifically alleged the transportation of two airplanes to Cedillo from the United States during September last year.

Indicted with Cedillo were Cloyd Cleavenger and Howard Frederick Klein, New York aviators; Major Adolpho Pina, personal pilot of General Cedillo; a man known to the grand jury only as "Mansivais," and an unnamed Mexican aviator.

100 Eastland County Teachers to State Meeting



They Have a Hobby — Digging for Gold

HELENA, Mont., Nov. 21 (AP)— Outside of working hours two Helena businessmen, father and son, have become gold miners with their "diggings" inside the city limits.

The two, Dean Kranich, clerk in the federal district court, and his father, George, are sinking a shaft in their backyard. They intend to dig until they strike granite estimated to be 125 feet below the surface.

"It's entirely an elbow grease job to give us exercise," says Dean.

Their theory is that there should be a deposit of gold at bedrock, carried there by seepage through limestone. Gold has been found at other places inside Helena's city limits.

The mistress of ceremonies will be on the spot.

What type of woman makes the best mistress of ceremonies?
Relax Before Starting

A rather large one, says Alma Kitchell, who has been mistress of ceremonies on hundreds of occasions, many of them radio programs.

She says a big woman can command and hold attention more easily than a small one. And she must be gracious, have a good carriage and nice posture.

Miss Kitchell has several pointers for her:

She should relax completely before the program begins. If she's seated at a banquet table she can pretend she's dropped her handkerchief. Then she can bend over slowly and pick it up. That will break the tension at the center of the nerves—just below the waistline in back.

When she stands to start the ball rolling she may tap her water glass to get attention. Then she should slowly count to ten (to herself), breathe deeply three or four times.

Frame Of Silence

When the mistress of ceremonies starts to speak she may pretend she's talking to two or three friends to achieve the friendly, informal attitude most successful mistresses of ceremonies have.

What about seating arrangements and the order of the program?

The mistress of ceremonies sits in the middle, the guest of honor

at her right. Others at the table are placed in accordance with their importance.

Exceptions to that rule are made, of course. A close friend of the guest of honor, for example, may be placed beside her.

The least important speakers come first, the most important last so that the program will work up to a climax.

It is the "rankest discourtesy," says Miss Kitchell, to let the program begin before the meal is over.

Gambia, the Real "Bush" Country of Africa

SMALLEST and northernmost of the British West African dependencies is Gambia. It consists of a stretch of land on both sides of the treacherous, meandering Lower Gambia. The colony, with its protectorate dependent upon it, has an area of approximately 4900 square miles, and nearly every foot represents the real "bush" country of the travel books and adventure yarns.

For away from the river and the swamps, the country is hilly, densely lush. There is nearly every conceivable variety of fern, the mangrove tree, mahogany and rosewood, the rubber vine, and oil palm. The animals include manatees, lions, a few elephants, leopards, many species of antelope, monkeys, bush cow and wild boar. In the Gambia and tributaries the hippopotami and crocodiles abound.

So the country is not conducive to white habitation, and for that matter there is very little of it. The people are almost entirely of Negroid race. Some four-fifths of the natives are Mohammedans. The European residents are traders, officials and missionaries.

Bathurst is the capital, only town of any size, with a population over 10,000, including a few score foreigners. It is built on St. Mary's island. Navy Puts Toy Ship Afloat to Find Top Speed

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—Little boats that look like toys are playing the first important role in the development of Uncle Sam's bigger and better fleet.

These boats are tiny models of the super-dreadnaughts, the speedy cruisers and the giant airplane carriers which are to be built under the billion dollar naval expansion program.

Naval engineers at Washington's historic navy yard are making scientific tests of the water "behavior" of these models in order to determine the performance possibilities of various types of warship hulls, particularly their frictional and wave-making resistance.

The under-water bodies of the model boats are exact small-scale representations of the proposed hulls for war vessels, their resistance to propulsion being relatively identical with the resistance of the big ships.

Show Power Needed

The amount of pull required to move the little boats through the water at different speeds is recorded by special instruments. With these measurements, the engineers can determine how much engine power a battleship with a similar hull will need to travel at various desired speeds.

The tests, engineers say, have proved to be 99 per cent accurate as indicators of actual performance. So, no naval vessel of consequence is constructed without tests at the experimental basin.

A 40-ton carriage, a sort of traveling crane which runs from one end to the other and tows a ship model at any speed desired up to 15 knots, has a dynamometer which registers the amount of pull required to propel the model at various speeds.

Some models are fitted with small motors. Propeller performance is studied with a view to de-

velocity the maximum in ship-driving efficiency.

Speed Increases Resistance

Friction between the skin of a ship and the water is the cause of nearly all the resistance to propulsion at low speeds. The waves made by a ship traveling at low speeds set up practically no resistance but when the speed is increased the resistance increases rapidly. For example, the Levitan had no wave-making resistance at 8 knots but at 28 knots that resistance was 85 per cent.

In testing projected battleship hulls, naval engineers try out 20 or more different shaped bows, usually several years ahead of actual designing. Some models now being tested may not be incorporated in ship design for 10 years.

Meanwhile, a new \$3,500,000 model testing station for the navy is being built at Cardanock, Md., a few miles up the Potomac from

Just A Small Drop

Model boat testing is only a small drop in the big bucket of naval planning. Building a 35,000-ton, \$70,000,000 battleship, crammed with intricate machinery and bearing ponderous turrets and gigantic guns, calls for 70 separate preliminary design studies and requires from four to six years time.

A drafting force of some 500 men is necessary to develop and issue about 5,000 plans on detail designs. In addition, 5,000 more plans are developed by agencies outside the building yard.

"Start chicks too late; start with poor quality chicks; brood in filthy, poorly ventilated quarters; quit feeding mash after first few weeks; raise pullets on disease and parasite infested ground; allow pullets to become infested with worms; house birds in uncomfortable quarters; fail to control lice and mites; feed a ration of white corn and ice water in winter; fail to cull more than once a year."
