The forecast of the future, hower, was gloomy.

It pointed out monthly revenue or the past year had fallen short an average of \$85,000 of meeting the state's share of the state-federal assistance payments. The difference has been made up from revolving fund created originally to obtain federal matching. und has dwindled from \$1,095,774 in September, 1937, to \$35,332 o January 1 and the balance will be onsumed in rounding out Jan ary payments.

Adding to difficulties was a state aw stipulating assistance payments must be prorated when reveune is insufficient to pay all grants in full (pensioners receive varying amounts depending upon he degree of need) whereas federal regulations require a flat re-

duction of each grant. The board said it doubted whether it was possible to perfect a prorating system in one month and whether the federal social security board would match state funds on any basis of proration.

Together they establish work in the villages, helping to ouild schools and churches, to improve the economic life of the peoole, to secure medical aid when

necessary. "Moripara is typical of one of hese villages, an out-station of Bilaspur. Parents are so proud of their children who attend the chool that they stand around to listen to them as they recite their essons. A night school is held for the parents, and Sunday school and church services for everyone. When work was started in Moripara, it was notorious as a robber

"Mr. Smiley was a pastor in the United States before he went to India. He attended Peru State Normal, and was graduated from Cotner college and the College of Missions."

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

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
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
