


'Citizen of the Year' to be named at banquet

Dimmitt's Citizen of the Year will be named, the new officers and directors of the chamber board will be installed and Bill Brown will be the featured speaker at the annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet Saturday in the Castro County Expo Building, beginning at 7:30 p.m.

The Citizen of the Year award is presented each year to honor an outstanding Dimmitt citizen who is chosen by a secret committee guided by nominations sent in by Dimmitt residents. Last year's recipient of the award, Bill Behrends, will make the presentation this year.

In between the more than 1,000 appearances he has made, Brown is an insurance executive from Lubbock. He is known for his combination of humor, magic and common sense philosophy. In 1976 he appeared on the network television program "The Gong Show."

Aurelia Schoenenberger enters Precinct 4 race

Aurelia Schoenenberger announced this week that she will be a candidate for county commissioner from Precinct 4, subject to the May 6 Democratic Primary.

"My campaign slogan will be 'Two for the Price of One,' because my husband is going to help with the roads," Mrs. Schoenenberger said. "We have seven miles of dirt road any direction we go, so we know about road problems. My husband is willing to work to get the roads in our precinct in shape."

Born and raised at Nazareth, Mrs. Schoenenberger has long been active in the Democratic Party. She has served as precinct chairman of Voters' Precinct 13 since 1972, and was a county delegate to the State Democratic Convention in 1972.

She and her husband, Albert, farm 12 miles northeast of Nazareth. They have three children—Anita Wines, 23, of Stinnett, Albert Marvin, 22, of Vega, and Michael, 21, of Happy.

"I have the time to devote to the job of county commissioner, and an interest in county affairs. I'm going to work for the betterment of my precinct and of the county," Mrs. Schoenenberger said.

She is president of the Arney Community Club, organizer for the Holy Family Catholic Church of Nazareth, a member of the Christian Mo-

tors Fred Annen of A&H Parts and Supply, Al Jackson of Cobbs, Doug Lapins of Amstar and Dr. James Sims, a dentist.

Outgoing president is Walt Hansen, owner of Dimmitt Super Market. Retiring directors are Bob Caddell, Bill Clark and Robert Ryan.

The \$6 per person admission price for the banquet includes a 10-ounce rib-eye steak served by K-Bob's Steakhouse of Dimmitt.

Don Nelson will act as master of ceremonies and dinner music will be provided by Janice Mooney Davis on the piano.

Womack rites slated Friday

Funeral services for Ethel Montgomery Womack, 86, will be held at 3 p.m. Friday in the First United Methodist Church of Dimmitt.

Mrs. Womack, a resident of Castro County almost 60 years, died Wednesday morning in Plains Memorial Hospital.

Born Aug. 22, 1892 at Alma (Ellis County), she moved with her family from Wellington to Castro County in March, 1912.

She married Lester Womack in Lubbock Dec. 23, 1921. He died in March, 1932.

Active in the Methodist Church since 1902, Mrs. Womack served as president of the WSCS, church pianist and as a member of many church committees through the years. She also was a past worthy matron of the Order of the Eastern Star and a charter member of the Dimmitt Garden Club.

She is survived by a son, John L. of Dimmitt; a daughter, Mrs. Harold Stephens of Dimmitt; a brother, W. C. Montgomery of Dimmitt; two sisters, Mrs. Jack R. Cowsett of Dimmitt and Mrs. Ray Koehler of Fort Collins, Colo.; three grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Three firms burglarized

Three Castro County businesses were burglarized Friday night apparently by the same burglar or burglars, according to Castro County Sheriff Granville Martin.

Dimmitt Welding and Electric was the only one of the three that suffered any loss. Twenty dollars was taken, after entrance had been gained by forcing the door with a screwdriver.

A screwdriver was also used to gain entry to Vardell Fuel and the office of Bruegel and Sons Elevators. Nothing was taken at either place.

Slow market forces Goodpasture shutdown

A slow market has forced Goodpasture, Inc., to shut down the fertilizer production of its No. 2 plant here "for an indefinite period," according to Plant Manager Owen K. "Pete" Stewart.

However, the 63 plant workers affected are remaining on the job for maintenance and construction projects, Stewart said.

The No. 1 plant—which produces anhydrous ammonia—is now on a standby basis and will be brought back into production "when economic conditions warrant," Stewart said.

Goodpasture already had shut down its No. 1 plant, which produces ammonia and/or 32-Nitrogen solution, and had placed it on a "turn-around" status for overhaul and maintenance. The Goodpasture complex here had 76 employees before the No. 1 plant was shut down late last year, but 13 became subject to layoff with that curtailment.

"Our shutdown isn't permanent," Stewart said. "We

SO-PD probe demanded

Public reaction to Dimmitt Police Chief Joe Ben Mitchell's resignation last week has led to an investigation into the relations between the police department and the county sheriff's office.

A crowd of 200 or more Friday demanded that city and county commissioners and two local newsmen serve as a committee to investigate the conduct and procedures of the two law enforcement agencies, and call in a private investigator if necessary.

The fact-finding committee is to study complaints of non-cooperation between the two agencies, which share dispatchers, radio equipment and jail facilities.

Mitchell said in resigning last Wednesday, "I do not feel that I can properly represent the city and the men that I am responsible for under the conditions which now exist. It is now impossible to coordinate any investigation or enforcement efforts between the two agencies operating in Dimmitt-Castro County. Hopefully, at the end of the next three years this situation will change . . ."

Mitchell confirmed that he was referring to the remainder of Sheriff Granville Martin's four-year term.

Mitchell was the second Dimmitt police chief to resign in recent months. His predecessor, David Slaughter, also cited lack of cooperation from the sheriff's office as his reason for resigning last June 30.

A former highway patrolman, court reporter and private investigator, Mitchell had been Dimmitt's police chief since Aug. 19.

Mitchell's resignation prompted an editorial from KDHN Radio Friday, calling for the city commission and county commissioners' court

to meet jointly and appoint a citizens' committee to investigate the law enforcement situation here.

In his editorial, KDHN owner-manager Jerry Marvin said that "evidence indicates an existing problem with law enforcement in our community and our county" which "affects the health and welfare of all our citizens," and called for the city and county governing boards to meet jointly and create "an unbiased citizens' committee . . . charged with investigating thoroughly the conduct of the Castro County Sheriff's Office and the Dimmitt Police Dept."

In response to Marvin's editorial, County Judge Weldon Bradley and Mayor Elmer Youts called a public meeting for 4 p.m. Friday. The district courtroom—largest meeting room in the courthouse—was filled to capacity by the time the meeting got underway and more stood in the hallways outside.

In a letter to the city and county governing boards, B. M. and Don Nelson, co-publishers of the News, said the law enforcement situation "is affecting our people's trust in their law enforcement officials," and added that the conflict "could, if left unresolved, have an adverse effect on the safety of our people and the administration of civil and criminal justice in our county."

The newspaper urged an investigation either by an appointed citizens' committee or the current Grand Jury,

concerned, such an investigation should be carried out by a citizens' group rather than by elected officials representing the two governments involved.

The crowd voted heavily in [See SO-PD PROBE, Page 12]

Farmers open doors

Seventy or more Castro County farmers and their wives are still trudging through the snow and pounding on doors in Washington, D.C., this week in their effort to get 100% parity for their products.

And with courtesy and persistence, they're opening a lot of those doors, Bob DuLaney reported from Washington Tuesday night.

"I can't stress too much how hard the Dimmitt people are working," DuLaney said. "They're going out before dawn, attending strategy meetings, going in groups of three to different offices, and they're getting a lot of doors open."

"And the Hart people are going from here to there like a covey of quail," DuLaney said. "They're sticking together, they've got their banker and several of their businessmen with them to back them up, and they're making headway, too."

"The Dimmitt group hasn't run into the Nazareth and Sunnyside delegations yet," DuLaney said. "There are somewhere between 45,000 and 85,000 farmers here, depending on whose estimate you want to believe. But I'm sure all our groups from Castro County are making themselves heard."

Delegates have been study-

ing various bills designed to ease the farm crisis ("None of them do much good, and we're sticking with the American Agriculture bill," DuLaney said), attending meetings large and small, and meeting privately with government officials.

"Jo Beth Shackelford even had quite a session Tuesday morning with (Agriculture) Secretary Bergland's wife," DuLaney reported. "Jo Beth sat in Bergland's chair in the USDA building, and she and Dick laid out a lot of facts for Mrs. Bergland."

He added, "All the wives are helping a lot. You'd be surprised how many of the congressional aides are women."

State Sen. Kent Hance arrived in Washington Tuesday afternoon and set up a Wed-

nesday meeting between the 6,000 Texas delegates and Sen. Lloyd Bentsen.

"We've already met with Bentsen once, but I think he needs some more coaching," DuLaney commented. "Sen. Tower is already co-sponsoring the American Agriculture bill in the Senate."

"Congressman Mahon is working himself to death for us," DuLaney said. "He's opened many a door and has attended many of our meetings himself."

But despite the farmers' efforts, they're meeting resistance.

"We were received openly last week, probably because there were so many of us here," DuLaney said. "I think they thought we'd be gone Monday. But this week we're having a harder time getting in to see anyone."

"We're getting a lot of run-arounds," he added. "We hear a lot of 'We're all for you—it's somebody else's fault.' We've been telling them we'll sure be glad when we find that 'somebody else.' We've found out that a lot of urban congressmen have been voting for us after all, that they go along with the Agriculture Committee's recommendations. We think we're narrowing down the field, and it looks more and more like the trouble is in the USDA."



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Castro County among Texas top 10 in wheat

Castro County was among the top 10 wheat producing counties in Texas in 1977, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said today. With a total harvest of 3,508,400 bushels, Castro County produced 3 percent of the wheat grown in the state, Brown said.

Of the 126,000 acres planted in wheat, Castro County farmers harvested 11,900 acres, and realized a 31.6-bushel per acre average yield, he noted.

The state's winter wheat production for 1977 totaled 117,500,000 bushels. This boosted Texas into the No. 6 spot in the nation in total wheat production, Brown commented.

Pork producers slate symposium

A pork symposium dealing with energy and efficiency in pork facilities will be conducted at West Texas State University's Activities Center Friday for area pork producers, sponsored by the Texas Pork Producers, regional associations of pork producers and WTSU.

Swine breeders are concerned about their facilities and use of fuel, according to Dr. Charles Smallwood, dean of the WTSU School of Agriculture.

The one-day program, planned with the assistance of the swine breeders organization in West Texas, will feature a variety of speakers from across the country.

Building and utilizing waste products will be the topic of the morning session, scheduled for 9 a.m. Dr. Dwaine Bunday, Iowa State University agriculture engineer and swine building specialist, will discuss new developments in building and remodeling.

Marketing and production problems for producers will be the theme of the afternoon session. Dr. Fred Madden of the US Department of Agriculture Inspection Service and Dr. Tom Snodgrass of the Federal Department of Agriculture will speak.

He stated that the low wheat prices which accompanied this near-record production have hurt Texas farmers, particularly in the face of rising production costs. "However, Texas farmers will receive a substantial share of the \$1.2 billion in federal wheat deficiency payments that will be paid out this year," Brown noted. "This should help ease the serious cash-flow problems our farmers have experienced because of the low grain prices."

Electric coop gets REA loan

An REA loan to Swisher Electric Cooperative, which serves an area including part of Castro County, is announced by Congressman George Mahon. The loan is for \$771,000 at 5 percent interest.

Purpose of this loan is to finance service for 382 additional consumers, 92 miles of distribution lines, 7 miles of transmission line and systems improvements.

Based in Tulia, the coop serves parts of Hale and Castro Counties as well as Swisher County.

Here's how city will use its RS funds during year

After public hearings and budget revisions, here's how the City of Dimmitt will use its \$122,249 in federal Revenue Sharing funds through Sept. 30, 1978.

\$57,634 of the total amount was received from Jan. 1 through Sept. 30, 1977, and is already on deposit. The remaining \$64,615 is being received in quarterly allocations from the federal government from Oct. 1, 1977, to Sept. 30, 1978.

The budget is broken into "Current" and "Capital" expenditures. Current expenditures are for ongoing operating expenses of various programs of the city, and Capital expenditures are for major purchases of equipment or property during the fiscal year.

The Revenue Sharing budget breakdown, as explained by City Manager Garnett Holland:

AMBULANCE: \$5,400 current, to pay one-third of the anticipated deficit for public ambulance service during the year. The county and hospital district each pay a matching amount. The money goes into a fund which pays for ambulance upkeep, drivers' salaries of \$125 per month, etc. "This ambulance cost is a bargain," Holland commented. "Other communities are having to pay up to \$12,000 per month. Our drivers and their employers are holding the line for us. They're all part-time drivers who rotate their on-call days, and their employers let them take the time to make ambulance calls. Otherwise, we'd have to hire full-time drivers."

CIVIL DEFENSE: \$2,575 Capital allocation, to be used as needed in case of tornadoes, blizzards, etc., for public safety. The term "Civil Defense" is gradually being replaced by a more accurate designation: "Emergency Preparedness," which includes all local plans for dealing with disasters. The original Civil Defense allocation was \$25,000, but nine-tenths of this money was sliced off and redistributed to other programs, by public demand. "What we wanted to do was start progressing toward

a disaster command post," Holland said, "but we can't do that now, with the budget cut from \$25,000 down to \$2,575. Maybe next year..."

HEALTH: \$5,500 Current allocation. Of this amount, \$1,260 has been "pigeon-holed" for an extra mosquito-spraying this summer if needed; \$240 is to pay the city health officer's salary of \$20 per month during the year; and \$4,000 is for a new "Emergency Health Services for the Indigent" fund.

The \$4,000 Emergency Health Services fund was set up by public demand at the final hearing to serve as a "drawing fund" for poor people who could not afford admission deposits at Plains Memorial Hospital. It is to be used only for emergency service, and anyone who withdraws money from the fund is supposed to repay it so the service can continue. Other aspects of the fund—such as who is to authorize payment, what the maximum withdrawal can be for any individual, etc.—are still to be worked out by the mayor, hospital officials and city commissioners.

INSECTICIDES: \$4,949 Current allocation. This amount is set aside to pay for four aerial applications of mosquito spray over the city during the summer, at a cost of more than \$1,200 per spraying. (The city sprayings also include lakes near the city, the Country Club golf course and lake, and the city sewer plant.) Money for a fifth spraying, if necessary, is set aside in the Health budget.

LIBRARY: \$10,800 Current allocation. This money, along with a matching amount from the county, goes into a library subsidy fund that is administered by the Castro County Library Board. It can be used to underwrite salaries, purchase supplies, or for other current expenses of Rhoads Memorial Library.

MUSEUM: \$2,000 Current, \$2,000 Capital. The current allocation is to pay for utilities at the city-county museum during the coming year. The Capital allocation is for the purchase of permanent museum improvements, as approved by the board of directors of the Castro County Historical Museum Association.

MENTAL HEALTH-MENTAL RETARDATION: \$3,800 Current allocation, to help pay rent, caretaking expenses and utilities for the MH/MR Outreach Center in Dimmitt. This money also goes into a joint city-county fund to make the services of the Central Plains Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center at Plainview available to Castro County residents through a local office.

PARKS: \$6,800 Current, \$22,500 Capital. The \$6,800 is to pay for maintenance of the city park during the year—two maintenance workers at \$50 per month each during the winter and \$75 per month each during the summer, plus money for spraying of trees and shrubs.

With the \$22,500 Capital allocation, the city hopes to build a new park in Northwest Dimmitt so children in that part of the city can go to a public park without having to cross a highway. Also, part of

this Capital allocation is earmarked for resurfacing the tennis courts and adding new picnic tables and benches at the present park.

POLICE: \$7,800 Current, \$5,725 Capital. The \$7,800 is to pay the salary of one of the three radio dispatchers at the sheriff's office, in return for dispatching service and use of the county jail. The \$5,725 Capital allocation is for a new patrol car, which has already been ordered.

SANITATION: \$35,000 Capital allocation to purchase a new one-man garbage truck to service the city's trash boxes. This purchase will give the city two garbage trucks for better scheduling and more frequent trash pick-ups.

SENIOR CITIZENS: \$3,400 Current, \$4,000 Capital. The current allocation is to pay the year's utility bills at the Senior Citizens' Center during the year, and the \$4,000 is to help toward the purchase of a building for the Castro County Senior Citizens, Inc.

"None of this money goes to these projects and organizations in lump sums," Holland explained. "These are budgeted amounts which the city will pay as bills are received and expenses are justified by the various organizations."

THERE are more multiple-earner families than single-earner families in the United States. Married women returning to the labor force is the chief cause.

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City sales tax check is received

A check for \$6,189.75, representing Dimmitt's city sales tax allocation for the month ending Jan. 5, has been mailed to the city, the state comptroller's office reports.

No payments were sent to Nazareth and Hart, since the comptroller's office retains a specified amount, two percent, of the year's total tax plus a small service fee. The period allocation for Hart was \$371.18 and for Nazareth, \$482.09.

Checks received by other cities in this area include \$544.10 to Earth, \$2,401.97 to Frona, \$18,273.98 to Hereford, \$7,075 to Littlefield, \$5,403.82 to Muleshoe, \$1,397.62 to Olton, \$4,547.82 to Tulia.

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View from the Library

Richard Cavendish is not a household name; not unless it is a witch's household. An author with a delight in the occult, he has written several landmark items in the field of occultism. He is the author of "The Black Arts," a standy history of occultism, the series "Man, Myth, and Magic," and an encyclopedia of the supernatural.

We here at Rhoads Memorial Library came across one of his new books which is colorful and very alluring (in an evil sort of way). The book, "The Tarot," is the history of the mysterious gypsy fortune telling cards.

The cards, mostly unknown to us here in America, have enjoyed a revival in recent years. They are a distinct part of the history of the playing cards which we use today.

Our playing cards went through a number of changes.

In early India, where they were supposedly invented, they were round. Later, when the Hungarians brought them to Europe, there were four suits—rods, coins, swords and cups. Each suit had ten cards and a knight, jack, and queen and king. In Germany, later still, the suits were in bells, acorns, swords and hearts. In Italy and Spain they still use the old suits of rods, coins and so forth. The game is called tarroche. In the seventeenth century when playing cards came to England new suits were adopted which we use today. Rods became clubs, coins became hearts and swords became spades.

The tarot pack of cards is like the old European cards except that they have 22 picture cards. These extra cards have been through numerous interpretations through the years. Some say that they go back to the ancient Egyptians while others say they were copied out of classical literature.

There are several different styles of the Tarot deck. The most famous deck was printed in Marseilles, France. There are several modern decks being printed today. Richard Cavendish writes about all of them, includes wonderful illustrations and even a chapter on fortune-telling giving the meaning of each card.

So if you are in the mood for divination, give us a visit.

Bantam championship bout set for Feb. 25

Albert Davila, formerly of Dimmitt, will challenge Carlos Zarate for the World Boxing Club bantamweight championship Feb. 25.

The title bout will be telecast live on ABC's Wide World of Sports from the Forum in Los Angeles.

Davila, who was known as "Twenty" here, lived in Dimmitt until he was about 11 years old, and played in the junior baseball program. He now resides in Pomona, Calif.



[Continued from Page 1] favor of calling in an outside investigator. Asked whether a Grand Jury could conduct the investigation, County-District Attorney Jimmy Davis said the Grand Jury members had the right to decide for themselves whether to take on such a probe, since no charges had been filed.

After voting to expel all law enforcement officers and their wives from the meeting, the crowd debated for an hour on the different types of investigative bodies that might be formed.

Questions were also raised during the meeting on the possibility of a recall action, separation of city and county

facilities and abolition of the police department in favor of a city-county law enforcement agency.

Also, Marvin presented a list of 10 questions "to provide a departure point for an investigation," involving city-county agreements on shared facilities, "backup" support among the various law enforcement agencies, use of prisoners, and the competency and conduct of local law officers.

Finally, the group adopted a motion by Mrs. Tina Rawlings that the city commission and county commissioners' court serve as a joint committee to investigate the problem, and that if they can't solve it, to call in a professional investigator.

The crowd also adopted a motion by Jack Edwards to add Don Nelson and Marvin to the investigation committee "so they could report back to the public on the committee's progress and on questions being raised."

The joint fact-finding committee held its first meeting Monday, and is to start interviewing individual lawmen later this week.

The public is invited to hear the couple sing and share their testimonies at 7:30 p.m. Feb. 1. Refreshments will follow in the fellowship hall.

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
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
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
