COPENHAGAN, Jan. 16 A). - Almost simultaneous protests from Sweden and Norway charging that soviet Russian warplanes had violated their neutrality last night increased the growing tension between Russia and the Scan-

Both Sweden and Norway inructed their ministers in Miscow o protest the alleged violations. These developments followed quickly Russian charges that Vorway and Sweden were acting n an unneutral way by aiding their neighbor, Finland, in her struggle with Russia.

How Finns Won Greatest Victory Over Russians

A 163rd Red division invades Finland by new road from Ukhta and surprises Finns by attack from North.

B 44th Red division invades from South and East, joining 163rd division at Suomussalmi. East, retreat at unexpected appearance of 163rd division from North.

Outnumbered, Finns turn and attack Suomussalmi from the West to split invading furces before they can unite for single offensive.


Under Finn attack, 163rd division retreats to the North.

F 44th division retreats along its own route of invasion. Reinforced by new troops it lays stage for disaster by failure to counter-attack in force.

G Harassed by pursuing Finns, 163rd splits, part fleeing over lake under machine gun and bomb attack by Finns.

H Remnants of 163rd which escaped over lake beseiged at Juntusrante. Finn reinforcements from North arrive, and, with units from Suo-

mussalmi, wipe out entire remaining part of 163rd. The 163rd division disposed of, Finns follow and surround 44th which had failed to attack at a time when it could have saved 163rd. Combined Finnish attack, cold and hunger destroys 44th division.



RED TENSION IS INCREASED

Sweden and Norway Protest Violations of Neutrality

COPENHAGAN, Jan. 16 P). — Almost simultaneous protests from Sweden and Norway charging that soviet Russian warplanes had violated their neutrality last night increased the growing tension between Russia and the Scan-

Both Sweden and Norway intructed their ministers in Miscow to protest the alleged violations. These developments followed quickly Russian charges that Norway and Sweden were acting in an unneutral way by aiding their neighbor, Finland, in her struggle with Russia.

The Swedish protest was based on the reported bombing of the Swedish island of Kallaks, on the western side of the Bay of Bothnia, by nine soviet pianes
