Pointing out that testimony before the house committee on interstate commerce in the hearing on the Cole bill to place the oil business under strict federal control has revealed that production control practices on federal oil lands are far less efficient and tend more toward waste than those in Sields under state regulation, eter Molyneaux, writing in he Texas Weekly of last Saturday contends that the real purpose of the Cole bill has nothing to do with the conservation of the nation's oil resources. It is a step toward collectivism.

Molyneaux' argu m e n t points the serious complex which has involved state and federal governmental relationships during the last few years, a situation in which power is tending more and more toward concentration at Washington to be exercised by a vast bureaucracy Bureaucracy is the cancer which destroys democracy by the simple process of normal processes into unhealthful growths. It is a method of crystalizing and perpetuating power in one spot beyond the effective reach of legislature or people. Bureaus are sorts of back chambers into which governmental forces spend themselves and stagnate while the main stream trickles by, constanty losing power. They are the result of a foolish policy f trying to make governent static in the name of efficiency; trying to solve its changing problems by establishing an inflexible formula.

That circumstance is a ready-made setup for political gentlemen who practice the gentle art of beguiling people into believing that a great evil exs from which they need to protected and that the deral government is the proper agency to provide uch protection. 



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

said, 'imperils democracy as we know it. From the control of production of oil it is but a simple step to control of refining, transportation, and marketing. Partial control of one branch of an industry having been established as a policy leads inevitably to control of the entire industry. Since all basic commodities flow in interstate commerce, control of the petroleum industry would naturally and certainly lead to control of other basic industries for the same reason. If congress does this to oil it will be the entering wedge for those who seek federal control of all industry.' There you have the "political" character of the Cole bill in a sentence. It is part of the program of those who seek federal control of all industry, the economic planners, the collectivists. Governor Phillips might have pointed out also that if congress can be brought to do this thing to an industry with such a record as that of the oil industry, no other basic indus-

try can be considered safe from the collectivists. In other words, if the American people can be brought to believe that Federal bureaucrats can do a better job at administering the production of petroleum than the men, big and little, who have so successfully administered it during the trying period since 1929, what else of this character can they not be brought to believe? Seen in this light (the true light), the Cole bill is revealed to be a matter of vital interest to a great many more people than those engaged in the production of petroleum or than the people of the oil producing states. It is a vital interest to the American people generally."

And that, my friends, is the unvarnished truth. The oil producing states and the oil producers are not the only ones who need to fear the
