PLANES FIGHT SIX MILES OVER ENGLAND

New Weapon Used By Germans as Fighters Carry Bombs

By The Associated Pres. Sixty German and British planes spat gunfire Sunday in an eerie battle just under the aerial ceiling - nearly six miles above the southeast shores of Britain.

It was the nearest approach in history to a battle of the stratosphere and it introduced a fleet new weapon in the hands of Germany's relentlessly warring pilot-soldiers, a bombpearing fighter plane.

Earth-bound watchers, to whom the tangling planes were no more than specks before their squintng eyes, saw five German and two British planes grow larger and larger, finally to come tumb ling to the ground. That, at least was the British air ministry's tally; the Germans listed five British and two German planes shot down Sunday but did not give the

The battle was the high spo of the week-end aerial warfare which saw the Germans operating from bases so near to England's island fortress that they dared to hasten their bombs over abroad single-seater pursuit planes, shortranged out speedy, rather than relying entirely on the more ponderous bomber planes.



Two German ombers were reported shot down Bombardment of harbor facili ties at Swansea and several air-Germans, who said the air fighting had cost Britain five planes in twenty-four hours to two nazi losses.

Successful land action against the British along the Libyan-Egyptian frontier was reported by the Italian high command as well as renewed air attack on the British naval base at Alexandria, Egypt. It said four British armored cars were captured and six others damaged in sharp skirmishing on the North African war front.

Britain, closely watching a new southeastern Europe take shape under the aegis of the Rome-Berlin axis, was said to have drafted a protest to Rumania against its recent anti-British measures. Particularly, it was said, Brit
