

Many Dimmitt residents who are neighbors will find themselves voting in separate precincts in the 1980 elections. following the redrawing of precinct lines Monday in Federal District Court in Amarillo.

The Commissioners' Court and Texas Rural Legal Aid, Inc. reached a compromise agreement on precinct boundaries, and the new precinct lines were approved by Federal Judge Mary Lou Robinson in a pre-trial hearing.

A class-action suit filed in October by TRLA charged that the county's precincts were not balanced in population, and sought to have them redrawn before the May primary election. The new lines were also required not to dilute the voting strength of the Mexican-American population.

Major changes in the precinct boundaries are within the City of Dimmitt, with the portion of the city east of US 385 and parts of northwest Dimmitt added to Precinct 4 to increase its population.

"Corridors" providing access to the courthouse for each precinct give the boundary lines a jigsaw-puzzle appearance, but are necessary so balloting may be held in the courthouse for each precinct.

Outside the city limits, the only change in boundary lines was the inclusion of the South Nazareth voting box area in Precinct 4 with the remainder of the northeast portion of the

The South Nazareth box is bounded on the east by the county line. The south line runs east and west a mile north of FM 928. The west boundary is FM 168, and State 86 is the north

Precinct 1, which includes Hart, remains essentially the same, with the addition of a narrow corridor running through southeast Dimmitt to the courthouse, and the loss of some residential area to Precinct 4.

It is expected that an additional filing period will be provided for commissioners' court candidates in Precincts 1 and 3. Candidates who have already filed will not be required to file

Incumbent Ed Bennett in Precinct 1 is currently unopposed. Commissioner Anna Margaret Moss has filed for re-election in Precinct 3 and is challenged by Robert Benton, Jimmie Howell and Thomas Falcon.

But according to the new precinct lines, Falcon is no longer a resident of Pct. 3 and is no longer eligible to run.

New precinct lines will not affect the "wet-dry" areas of the county, Davis said. The Alcoholic Beverage Board will no grant any new permits outside the area originally voted "wet"

Extra workers will be on hand at all polling places during the primary elections to assist voters in confirming their proper precinct. This will be an additional expense but not nearly as costly as having a separate election for county commissioners,

The suit against Castro County and the Commissioners' Court is one of three filed against Castro County institutions and individuals by Texas Rural Legal Aid Inc., in the past year, and is the first one to be settled. Still pending is a million-dollar lawsuit against Plains Memorial Hospital seeking damages for the death of the infant child of Mr. and Mrs. Isidro Aguinaga, and a civil suit against the Castro County Housing Authority charging "gross mismanagement."

## Keep records straight

When was the last time you couldn't put your hands on an important paper you knew you had carefully put away some place? How much time do you spend trying to straighten out your family business affairs, especially at income tax time?

If you are like most, your papers are scattered all over the house. There are reasons besides income tax preparation to keep a family "system" for records and papers. Will you know where to look for your records if you outlive your spouse?

How do you decide what records are important to keep and what can be thrown away? Where should these records and papers be stored? Even though each family must work out its own system, some general guidelines can be helpful.

A 'Family Record Book' can help set your household in order. The County Extension Office will provide you with information on keeping

Family records such as social security numbers of each family member, birthdates and places, and business interests are listed.

Included in the notebook is a listing of all insurance polpayment icies, premium dates, maturity dates, etc.

want to keep a record of all real estate, purchase dates, payments, and a description of major improvements.

Records of credit cards, savings accounts and checking accounts need to be kept, investment records such as stocks and bonds, also debts outstanding, money owed the

Knowing where important papers are kept is highly beneficial to you and other members of the family. Keep a record of where personal records are kept such as birth certificates, marriage records, wills, passports, death certificates, social security, em-

ployment and health records. Included in the notebook is a form for the household inventory to be used in determining how much insurance coverage is needed.

This 12 page notebook to help you get started on your family record keeping is available to you at no charge. The free information is conducted by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service to serve people of all ages regardless of socio economic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

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

# **UETERAN'S**

By BEDFORD W. SMITH County Service Officer

Following are little known information items in summary from the January issue of the Texas Veteran Affairs Commission Journal:

Veteran Affairs Commission personnel have been providing bedside claim service in all VA medical centers in the State of Texas for many years, as well as for two major military medical centers, Brooke Army at Fort Sam Houston and Lackland Air Force Base.

Some changes in VA dental care programs include outpatient care for veterans of WWI, WWII, Korean Conflict, and Vietnam Period prisoners of war for not less than six months. In addition, veterans whose service-connected disabilities are rated permanently 100% service-connected and in some cases where conditions are aggravated by dental problems are also eligible. Newly discharged veterans have one year to secure routine outpatient dental care.

has set a new deadline for filing discharge review applications by persons who have received other than honorable conditions or undesirable discharges before Jan. 1, 1965. The deadline has been extended from Jan. 1, 1980 to April 1, 1981. We have application forms in our office. This has set aside the 15 year limitation from date of discharge.

Space does not permit listing all changes in the Health Resources and Programs Extension Act of 1979. One, however, authorizing outpatient medical care for WWI and Mexican Border War now is available to these veterans on the same basis as housebound veterans and those in need of aid and attendance. Another change now provides for an epidemiological study by the VA for long-term health effects for those exposed to agent orange, etc.

Another makes a widow who had lost her CHAMPA benefits due to a later marriage to be again eligible if

widowed again. "Some confusion exists as to what to do to apply for retired pay when eligible reservists near age 60," states the VAC Journal. "All that is needed is a letter over the reservist's signature stating that he/she will reach age 60 on a certain date and requesting an application for receipt of retired pay, which should be submitted 60 to 90 days before the 60th birthday." We have the mailing addresses of the various services in our office and can supply them to claimants.


