Grand Champion barrow was exhibited by Danny Godfrey of Hart. The Hampshire sold to Rodey Smith of Hart for \$120 per lb. The barrow weighed 202 lbs.

Hart 4-Her Gary Hart exhibited the Grand Champion lamb which sold to First State Bank, Dimmitt for \$3.20 per lb. The Champion lightweight Southdown weighed 82 lbs.

Reserve Champion calf was exhibited by Darryl McLain of Hart. The 947-lb. calf was purchased by Mrs. G. R. Bennett of Hart at 70 cents per lb.

Hi-Point Grain Co. of Hart bought the Reserve Champion barrow for \$130 lb. Jerry Smith of Hart exhibited the 190 lb. winning Poland China.

Smith also exhibited the Reserve Grand Champion lamb of the Stock Show. Olton Farm Supply purchased the lamb for \$3 per lb.

School Trustee Election Will Be April 3

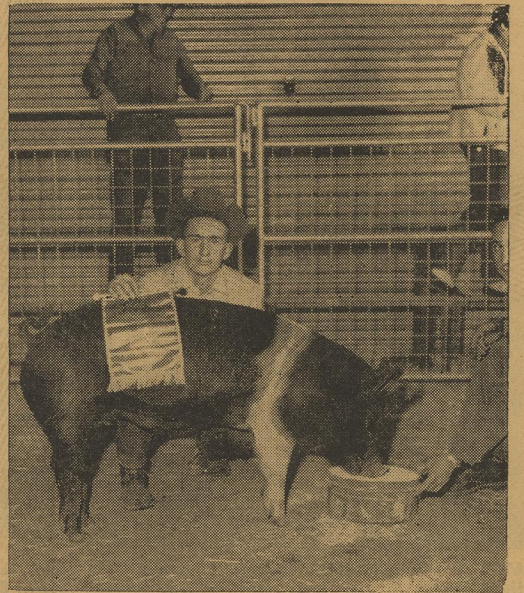

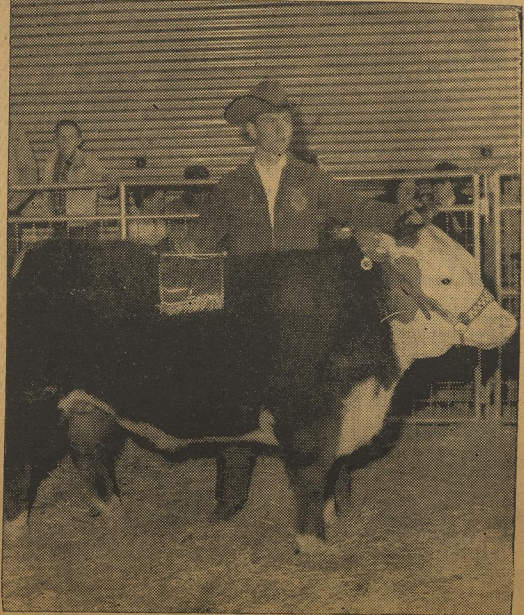
J. G. Davis and Jim Elder whose terms expire are not running for re-election. They have served for nine years on the school board.

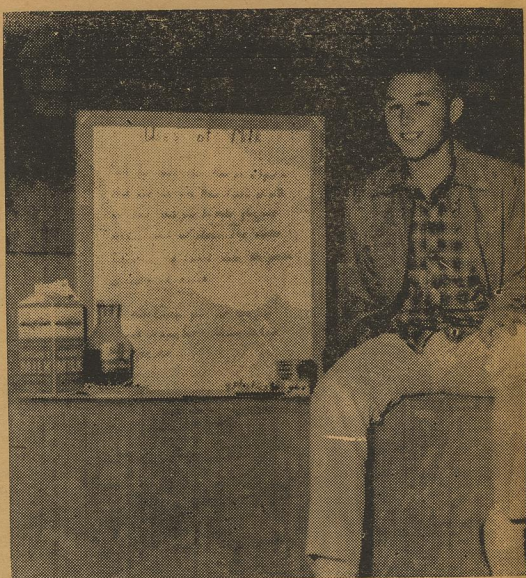

Law Considered As A Vocation

There are approximately 400,000 lawyers in the United States. A large proportion of them practice in the cities and in the heavily populated areas than in the sparsely settled localities. A lawyer, in order to carry on his practice successfully, must do a great deal of research or reading in his own office. As a lawyer, you will have to prepare a brief, examine possible witnesses, and familiarize yourself with all the facts in your case. All these duties will enter a court. Often your case is won or lost in your office. Furthermore, you will make every effort to settle, if possible, your cases out of court. If an adverse decision is handed down by a judge, you may appeal to a higher court. This means further and more extensive work.

Another aspect of the lawyer's work is to act as consultant to his client, guiding and directing him in his business activities. In addition, the lawyer is frequently called upon to render expert assistance in the preparation of various documents such as contracts, wills, deeds, and leases. Special care must be exercised so that each of these documents is drawn up within the meaning of the law and so that the provisions are clear and easy to understand.

There is much specialization in law including such fields as bankruptcy law, criminal law, patent law, tax law, insurance and banking law. Many lawyers specialize in taking on cases for other lawyers, which they try in court.

If you wish to be successful you must possess an abiding interest in law, an ability to handle details, the capacity to think clearly and to express yourself. Before you can be admitted to the bar, you must be a graduate of a recognized law school. Prior to admission to a law school, however, you must have completed at least three years of general college work. Employment opportunities frequently depend on the school attended as well as upon the marks achieved.

In order to practice law in your state, it is often necessary that you work in a law office as a clerk for one or two years. In addition, most states demand that you pass a state examination in order to secure your license. Usually, about twenty per cent of the applicants who take these examinations fail. There are other requirements that you may have to fulfill in order to obtain approval to practice in your state. Most young attorneys work for a few years in established firms. Later on, they can through their previous employers. Earnings for the young lawyer during his first five years are quite low. However, from that point, these earnings may increase so that in normal times the competent lawyer may be assured of a substantial income.

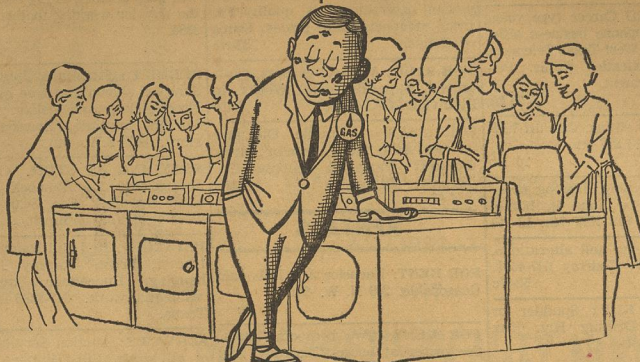

Milady Garden Club Hears Dr. Bill Bennett

Milady Garden Club met Tuesday, March 2 to hear Dr. Bill Bennett speak on fertilizers and soil conditions.

He told the women that soil has three properties, physical, chemical and biological.

The speaker noted, "Physical properties are chiefly organic materials of low and high nitrogen."

"High nitrogen materials are those that consist of compost matter. Low nitrogen consist of materials as wheat stubble and fodder. High nitrogen is quick action and low nitrogen is used for long range action."

Bennett said, "Low nitrogen is often the cause of chlorosis by tying up the nitrogen released in the soil."

"Organic material in the soil is essential for good interchange of air and water," the agronomist continued.

"The chemical property of soil is the soil reaction, pH which is a method of measuring the alkalinity of the soil. 7.0 to 7.8 is the normal scale measurement in our area," declared Dr. Bennett.

"The biological property is the bacteria in the soil," continued the speaker.

He concluded, "Good growth depends on factors of soil, environment, the plant and management of all factors."

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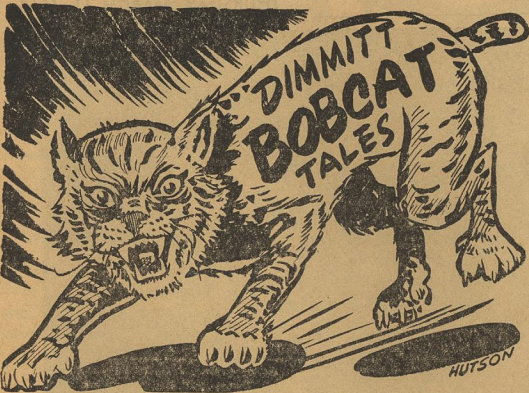
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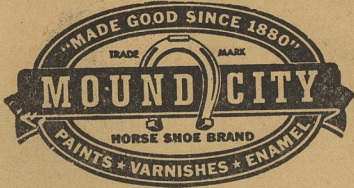
CEEB Exams Given To Senior Class

Front Tire Blowout! What Would You Do?

First, most drivers feel that they would know how to handle a front tire blowout. Second, they feel like it can't or won't happen to them.

Suppose one of your front tires blows out, what would you do?

A blowout on a front tire "steers" the front wheel away from the path of the car's center of mass. The center of mass is the point around which the weights of all parts of the car are in balance. The retarding force of the blowout tire causes the center of mass to swing forward around the blowout wheel, which acts as a pivot. As the center of mass goes forward, the lateral distance between the pivot wheel and the center of mass becomes greater. The greater this distance becomes the more difficulty a driver will have in preventing the car from changing ends.

After the blowout, a driver's first and main job is to steer against the pull in order to keep the center of mass behind the blowout wheel. He must do this quickly and firmly, keeping the car headed in the same general direction. If a left front tire blows out, keep the car on the right side of the road or the lane you are in. If there is no traffic in the immediate area, you should try to steer it onto the shoulder. If a right front tire blows out, the car will be on the shoulder before long. You should try to keep it from going into the barrow ditch.

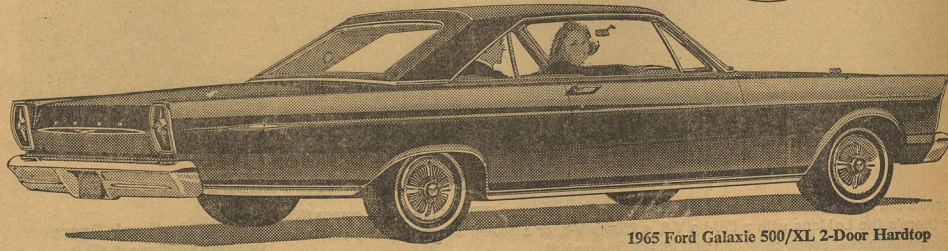

Senator YARBOROUGH'S REPORT

Dear Fellow Texan: Hearings on the Cold War GI Bill (S. 9) are proceeding rapidly toward conclusion, making it possible to report this bill to the Senate the earliest date yet.

In addition to 41 co-sponsors supporting the bill the greatest number in the bill's history - I have received more supporting letters from veterans, teachers, servicemen, and educators than I ever have before. This is the same bill that both the late President John F. Kennedy and the present President, Lyndon B. Johnson, voted for when it passed the Senate in 1959.

The recent increase in the draft quota, as well as the indication that the draft will not be abolished, are among the factors demanding this act of justice. At the present time, only 40 percent of the draft eligible men serve in the armed services, yet they must readjust to civilian life unaided after a sacrifice of 2 to 4 years in their careers.

While our Nation values education enough to defer students from the draft, our government forsakes those veterans who desire the same consideration after service. Although we pledge to every young person that he should have as much education as he needs, this promise is betrayed when applied to veterans who need this opportunity.

We often take pride in our educational accomplishments in this country. We point to our assistance to the top students, and we brag about our aid to those culturally deprived students.

Yet, we fail to mention the great void in the middle. Our veterans plea for the Cold War GI Bill to fill this space and provide a more balanced educational program.

Five million cold war veterans will benefit from this bill, and the Nation will benefit, as it did when the first two GI Bills filled our economy with hundreds of thousands of professional and trained citizens.

The bill actually pays for itself - as the previous GI Bills have already done by the increase in taxes paid by higher earnings of GI Bill-educated veterans.

Critics allege that these veterans have not endured battle conditions, yet the loss of life in Viet Nam, the tense crisis in Berlin, and the peace-keeping hazards in Korea bear witness to the danger confronting every young serviceman.

I am not so inhumane as to think that we should force a person to put his life in jeopardy before he gets a fair chance in life. But, certainly, if a soldier does willingly expose himself to danger by being called upon to defend his country, then he should not be deprived of opportunity when he returns to civilian life.

As an act of justice, fairness, economy, and educational advancement, I will fight for an equal chance for these men until the Cold War GI Bill becomes law.
