County Fair to Be Held Sep. 18-19

Castro County Farmers To Take 3-Day Trip Through Colorado

Farmers and merchants of Castro county have been invited to make a trip through Colorado under the auspices of the American Crystal Sugar Refinery and Chicago-Quincy R. R. Everyone who can is urged to make the trip. Those interested should contact Jack Trimble, secretary of the local Chamber of Commerce, on or before Monday, August 9.

According to Trimble, the trip will take three days and will begin on Sunday morning, August 15 and will arrive in Denver late that night. The purpose of the trip is to acquaint the local farmers with farming conditions in Colorado and their high yield per acre. Farming conditions, pasturing and many other agriculture methods will be seen and discussed.

Each member of the party will bear his own expenses but other arrangements will be taken care of by the sponsors and the local Chamber of Commerce. People making this trip are limited to Castro County residents.

The field trip will start Monday morning, August 16 at 8 o'clock. First stop will be Greeley, Colo., to see and inspect vegetables and crops in general on irrigated farms and green manure crops. Next stop will be at Rocky Ford where the party will go through Crystal Sugar's refinery and will be entertained by the hosts. The trip will then take in Fort Collins and Pueblo where members will see permanent pasture and talk to farmers on how to get increased yields on their agricultural products such as corn and other crops grown in that area. They will return home on Wednesday, August 18.

Every farmer, rancher and merchant in the county is urged to make this trip. Separate cars will furnish transportation.

Federal Wheat Crop Insurance is Sound Business Investment

Federal Crop Insurance on wheat against the production risks which man cannot control is strictly a non-profit program designed to give growers basic protection of their business enterprise at the lowest possible cost, Mr. Horace A. Blagg points out.

Applications for this all-risk protection are now being accepted by the County ACA Committee and the County office.

Every premium paid by a producer, Blagg advises, can be used only to pay a loss suffered by another producer under his insurance contract within the county. Any year in which premiums exceed losses paid, the excess premiums are carried over as a reserve to be used in a year when wheat crop disasters are more general and losses exceed premiums. Accumulation of adequate premium reserves will make possible reductions in premium rates. Expenses of administering the program are carried by the Government as a service to farmers.

The insurance coverage under a 1949 crop insurance policy approximates the average cost of producing the crop in this area. It is protection of the production investment.

Frankly, this is sound business and should be in line with what the majority of producers want crop insurance to do for them—protect their investment. Their crop insurance premium in addition to their operating costs and like other insurance in protection that they want to have when it is needed but which they hope they won't need to collect on. They farm for a bumper crop every year so they want crop insurance for protection, not for collection.

"With crop insurance, wheat producers have an opportunity to build basic protection for their business enterprise which is not otherwise available to them. I think that most of our growers here in the county are good businessmen and I'm sure that the majority of them will join in developing sound crop insurance protection in Castro county.

"All of us who have any extensive experience with producing crops will certainly know that there is no way of telling who will bear the brunt of crop disaster from unavoidable causes in any year or when or how the production efforts in an entire area may be struck down by Mother Nature in the form of weather, insects or disease, hazards which we cannot control."

CITY COMPLETES SEWER EXTENSION

Work was completed this week on a \$10,000 sewer extension in the northwest and east part of Dimmitt. The project is a part of the \$40,000 bond election held recently for sewer and water works extension.

Contract for the sewer work was let to the firm of Jordan and Tubbs of Plainview. Time taken on the project was approximately one month.

The new sewers reaches many of the homes formerly out of reach of the old facilities. To others it gives improved sewer systems.

The water part of the bond election will be held up indefinitely because of the pipe shortage. Soonest delivery at this date is six months away. No contract for the water work has been let.

Band Building Is Under Construction

For the past several weeks, workmen have been engaged in remodeling two of the army barracks on the high school campus into one unit, the main part of which will house the band and chorus department of the Dimmitt schools.

The building, when completed, will have a large rehearsal room in which the whole band or the whole chorus can meet, four smaller rooms which will serve as practice rooms for individuals or small ensembles, an instrument in uniform storage room, and an office for the instructor. The north end of the building will be used as a general storage room.

A drinking fountain will be installed as well as a sink for cleaning instruments. The building will make it comfortable during hot weather.

By the time the reader sees this article, the composition shingle roof will have been completed.

The main rehearsal room will be comfortable seat a band of at least 80 members, or a chorus of more than one hundred singers.

Arrangements for the band beginning the fall term in fine style are progressing well, with the arrival the past week of a bass clarinet, the school owned instruments now include drums, two Sousaphones (basses), an alto clarinet and a French horn as well.

ROAD BOND ELECTION PLANNED FOR PRECINCT 1

A petition is being circulated now in precinct 1, Castro County asking the Commissioners Court to call a \$75,000 bond election for the purpose of providing a farm-to-market road from Hart to Nazareth and also one mile farm-to-market road from Highway 194 beginning at the park south of Dimmitt and going north to the elevators; thus providing the farmers a direct route to the elevators without having to go through the traffic at Dimmitt.

A spokesman for the petitioners declared: "Because of some misinformation and some erroneous statements made before a previous bond election, the petitioners would like for the citizenship of precinct one to know the following facts concerning the 10 year bond issue:

(1) Principal and interest annually approximately \$8,580.

(2) The tax rate would be approximately 45 cents per \$100 on assessed valuation; for example:

(a) ¼ section valued at \$8,000 per acre would be 160 x \$8.00 equal \$1,280. \$1,280 x 45 cents per \$100 equals \$5.76.

(b) On one section the annual tax would be \$5.76 x 4 equals \$23.04 per section."

City Commission Passes New 20 mph Speed Zone Here

Ordinance No. 64 was passed recently changing the speed limit in the business section of town from 30 to 20 miles per hour. The new ruling was passed to allow large trucks passing through enough time before reaching the traffic light at the intersection by the north west corner of the square. Also in view was the necessity of slowing down increased traffic in this section.

Purebred Breed Hog Sale Announced For State Fair

Oct. 20 has been designed as Texas Swine Breeder's day at the 1948 State Fair of Texas, Fred Hale, superintendent of the Fair's Swine Show, has announced.

An auction sale of purebred breeding hogs, sponsored by the Texas Swine Breeder's association is working closely with State Fair officials to make this the most complete swine show ever arranged in the history of the sixty-three-year old exposition.

Dates of the State Fair are Oct. 9-24 with the Swine Show scheduled for Oct. 13-22.

The State Fair will award \$5,218 in premiums in the breeding division, and \$2,150 in the fat barrow division. Various national swine breeders' association have announced special awards for the show. Choice hams will be given daily as prizes in a special identification and weight-guessing contest, Hale said.

State Health Officer Says Typhus Fever Will Increase This Month

AUSTIN — Statistical information compiled by the State Health Department shows a total of 182 cases of typhus fever so far this year. During the week between July 17-24, seven new cases were reported, one-half the seven year median of fourteen during the week of July 24.

The disease reaches its peak in the month of August, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer said.

Over a five year period from 1943 to 1947, typhus fever has been responsible for 273 deaths. The death rate has been reduced from sixty-three in 1943, to thirty in 1948.

"Typhus fever as we know it is transmitted by the fleas of infected rats," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer said. "It can be controlled by the simple expedient of consistently maintaining a program of rat poisoning, rat trapping and rat proofing."

Typhus fever is marked by a severe headache, chills and fever. A reddish mottling appears on the skin, and a hacking cough develops. The headache is the outstanding symptom because of its severity. Illness may last from 5 to 14 days.

The greatest outbreak of typhus fever, or Brill's Disease, was in 1941, when there was a total of 733 reported cases.

The Health Officer added that it was a sad commentary on our position as the most health minded nation on earth if we allow this disease to flourish when the means for its control and eradication is right at hand.

Many Texas Find Merchandise Plentiful

DALLAS — For the first time since pre-war days, buyers from retail furniture stores in Texas are finding a plentiful supply of home furnishing goods at the summer markets now in progress in Chicago and Grand Rapids. According to Bob Lindsey of Berger, president of the Retail Furniture Association of Texas, there is an abundant selection of merchandise in all price ranges.

About 800 furniture executives, buyers and wholesale salesmen from Texas are attending the markets, which extend from July 5 to 17.

With the return of a competitive market new lines are being shown, although the period and modern styles that gained good consumer acceptance during the first half of the year are still prevalent. Badly designed furniture is rapidly becoming extinct, and the luxury of fashion is now available, even in the lowest price brackets.

Another important development of the summer markets is that the furniture industry is fighting a winning battle to keep prices down. Reduced margins, for both manufacturers and retailers, are being maintained in order to insure firm consumer prices.

Garden Specialist Tells How To Keep Flowers Blooming

COLLEGE STATION — Would you like to keep your crape myrtle blooming several weeks longer?

Sadie Hatfield, extension landscape specialist of Texas A & M College, says three things will do the job: cutting the faded blooms plenty of moisture and fertile soil. As soon as the blooms begin to fade, cut them off. If seed are formed they will take food from the plant, which otherwise would go into new blooms.

If you did not fertilize your crape myrtle last year, it may need some now. For a large bush use two or three cups of 5-10-5 commercial fertilizer. Spread it around the plant in a ten by ten

foot square area. Water it right away in a small stream of water soak into the ground several inches deep around the plant. Water it this way every week or ten days, but be sure the plant is well drained.

Dust the crape myrtle with cotton dusting sulphur if you notice mildew forming on the leaves. Too much shade may keep the crape myrtle from blooming as much as it could. Give them lots of sunshine if you want them to bloom out big. Crape myrtle that was fertilized well last winter or early this spring won't need any more right now. But putting a mulch layer around the plant will help it hold moisture in the soil.

Vitex, like crape myrtle, is another plant that makes more than one crop of blooms. If you want blooms for a longer period of time, don't let the seed form. Treat it like the crape myrtle when giving it lots of water and fertilizer. Another name for vi-

tex is, pepper tree, and it is sometimes called lavender tree. Seed are about the size of whole all-spice.

Miss Hatfield adds that zinnias and petunias will prolong their blooming periods if the flowers are cut before the seed are formed.

It doesn't pay to be so busy doing so many things that you forget what you are supposed to be doing.

What To Do When It's

Time For Harvesting

If you are harvesting green beans, especially for quick freezing, County Home Demonstration Agent advises to select only those beans which have very small seed and dark green color. When the seed have begun to develop to a

point in green beans where there are slight bulges in the beans, there is enough wood fiber in the cell to give the canned or frozen food product a low eating quality and poor flavor.

Corn may be another of your crops that is ready for harvesting and canning. If so, here is a point to remember: pick the ears early in the morning, and

get the corn in the can or freezer as quickly as possible. Sweet corn begins to lose its sweetness and quality in a very short while after the ears are taken from the stalk. The same goes for fresh roasting ears on the table. For best taste and quality, harvest the corn at 11 o'clock for a meal at 12 o'clock.

As for tomatoes, Mrs. Seal suggests that they be pulled from the vine as soon as they turn pink. Bring them into the house and put them in a cool, shady place where they will ripen into a deep red color. You will find that the inside of the tomatoes are juicy and mealy instead of fibrous. This is for fresh tomatoes.

Now, if you want tomatoes for canning, pick them pink and let them ripen in the house, or leave them on the vine until they are fully ripe. A little mental arithmetic will give you an estimate on your tomato crop. A bushel of tomatoes will give you about 25 no. 2 cans.

Safety on the Farm Should be Observed During Whole Year

National Farm Safety Week is nearly over. But it isn't too late to straighten out an "accident about to happen." You still have plenty of time to "undo" a hazard on your farm. You have 51 other weeks. But to avoid serious injury or possible death, now is the time to do it.

The National Safety Council has a Safe Farm Test made up of questions about machinery and equipment, buildings and the farmyard, tires, animals, electricity and the farm home. These are only a few of the many things to check on, especially during Farm Safety Week while it is still fresh on your mind.

Six thousand people were killed in farm home accidents last year. Another 43 hundred were killed while working on farm jobs. That means more people were killed around the house than near the machinery and the barns.

What did it? Standing in the bath tub and turning on the light. Or starting fires in wood stoves with kerosene. Or just

falling from a box on top of a chair, or a "throw" rug on a waxed floor. Loaded guns in the house are killers too, especially in the hands of children. Many children have been scalded when they reached up and pulled a pan of boiling water or chocolate syrup down on themselves.

National Farm Safety Week was last week - July 25 through 31. But every farm safety is one of the biggest year-round jobs there is. Every day in the year people are being killed and injured, so it stands to reason that every day people should be on the look out for worn-out or broken equipment, broken ladders, frayed electric wires and loose boards with nails.

Be alert today and be alive tomorrow.

DR. W. C. BANKS CAUTIONS AGAINST ROUND - WORMS

COLLEGE STATION — Pigs that are fed a good ration and still remain unthrifty are likely to have roundworms. Likewise, if you raise a litter of pigs on ground that was formerly occupied by pigs, there is a good chance that the second litter will have round worms.

Dr. W. C. Banks, extension veterinarian of Texas A & M College, says that these worms may be passed right on out through the body and onto the ground. An examination of the pig lot may show presence of these roundworms. They can be identified as being large, thick yellow or pink worms about lead pencil size.

Weaned pigs of any age may be wormed, but the best time to worm pigs is two or three weeks after weaning. Pigs are weaned at around 56 days of age, so when a pig is two and a half

months old, this is a good time to worm them. For best results, move the pigs to a concrete floor, worm them and bring them back to the pen or pasture after three days.

Another method is to worm them in the original pen, and later move them to a different pen, or out to the pasture three days after worming. Moving the pigs helps break the worm's life cycle, and thus reduces the number of worms.

Sodium flouride is the best chemical to use for worming pigs because it is 90 per cent or better effective, the cost is low, it is easy to get, and is not harmful to the pig if given as directed.

Dr. Banks suggests not to worm over six to ten pigs at one time. Directions call for one lb. of sodium flouride mixed thoroughly with 100 pounds of dry feed. And if you don't have that many pigs, mix one level teaspoon with one pound of dry feed for every pig weighing 25-35 lbs. Some of the larger pigs may be given another pound 12 hours after the first dose. If a second worming is required, repeat the treatment in 30 days.

Two wormings will probably be enough unless the pigs are left on ground that is severely infested with roundworms. Important: keep in mind, says Dr. Banks, that Sodium Flouride is a poison, and if it is improperly mixed, or too much is used, the pigs may be poisoned.







LEGAL NOTICE

A JOINT RESOLUTION
 S. J. R. No. 2
 proposing an amendment to Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board for apportioning the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment; providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation by the Governor; and making an appropriation.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 28. The Legislature shall, at its first regular session after the publication of each United States decennial census, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, agreeable to the provisions of Sections 25, 26, and 26-a of this Article. In the event the Legislature shall at any such first regular session following the publication of a United States decennial census, fail to make such apportionment, same shall be done by the Legislative Redistricting Board of Texas, which is hereby created, and shall be composed of five (5) members, as follows: The Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said Board shall assemble in the City of Austin within ninety (90) days after the final adjournment of such regular session. The Board shall, within sixty (60) days after assembling, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, as the failure of action of such Legislature may make necessary. Such apportionment shall be in writing and signed by three (3) or more of the members of the Board duly acknowledged as the act and deed of such Board, and when so executed and filed with the Secretary of State, shall have force and effect of law. Such apportionment shall become effective at the next succeeding statewide general election. The Supreme Court of Texas shall have jurisdiction to compel such Commission to perform its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section by writ of mandamus or other extraordinary writs conformable to the usage of law. The Legislature shall provide necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for other expenses incident to the work of the Board, and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expense during the Board's session in the same manner and amount as they would receive while attending a special session of the Legislature. This amendment shall become effective January 1, 1951."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:
 "For the amendment to Section 28, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board of apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment."
 "Against the amendment to Section 28, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board of apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment."
 Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.
 Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
 Section 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of this state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
 proposing an Amendment to Article IV, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section to be known as Section 3a, so as to provide for succession to the office of Governor in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, or fails to qualify, before taking his oath of office as Governor; and providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation and publication by the Governor.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended, by adding another Section to follow Section 3, and be designated Section 3a, to read as follows:
 "Section 3a. If, at the time the Legislature shall canvass the election returns for the offices of Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the person receiving the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, has died, then the person having the highest number of votes for the office of Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until after the next

general election. It is further provided that in event the person with the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, shall become disabled, or fail to qualify, then the Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until a person has qualified for the office of Governor, or until after the next general election. Any succession to the Governorship not otherwise provided for in this Constitution, may be provided for by law; provided, however, that any person succeeding to the office of Governor shall be qualified as otherwise provided in this Constitution, and shall, during the entire term to which he may succeed, be under all the restrictions and inhibitions imposed in this Constitution by the Governor."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at a General election to be held throughout this State on the date provided by law in the month of November, A. D. 1948, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:






