Harried school board works to settle hail-rain claims

The Dimmitt School Board construction. He will salvage buildings and discussed matched as possible. insurance settlements for roof damages and gymnasium floor damage.

However, the board left the purchase of band uniforms primarily to Band Director Ralph Smith.

The school board met with consultant Frank Wilson of Brasher & Associates to open bids for school roof repairs. Wilson had estimated that complete repairs could cost as much as \$400,000.

Recent repairs to building expansion joints, to the Middle School gymnasium roof, and for reroofing the high school gymnasium cost approximately \$69,000. The lowest bids for every other building owned by the school district - except the new field house and the concession stand, which are metal buildings - totaled \$299,500.

The bids are firm for 30 days, and the school board planned to send a claim to Aetna Life and Casualty Co. for 100% of the reroofing plus architect's fees, painting and internal damages. The board hoped that a settlement would be reached before the end of the 30-day period.

"We have leaks in every building, including the old field house and the press box," Supt. Robert Ryan said. He added that a piano had been damaged when water leaked on it.

The board tentatively set a breakfast meeting for Jan. 6 as the time to finalize an insurance settlement and to award contracts for roof repairs. If a settlement is reached before that date, the meeting will be changed.

Panhandle Steel Building Co. of Amarillo was about 14 days away from completion of the metal roof over the high school gymnasium when it rained Sunday. It leaked and the leakage caused ridges in the gym floor.

"It's a little like walking across a rub-board," Ryan said, adding that the floor will need a lot of work or possibly replacement.

"It has not buckled yet, but it probably will," he said.

Ryan stated that the roofing ettlement will have to be

Thousands of hunters from Deaf Smith and Parmer

State game officials say the pheasant population is good this year, although not as good as it was last year. Temperatures on opening

day Saturday are expected to range from freezing at daybreak to the upper 60's in the afternoon, so hunters will want to start the day with clothing that they can "shuck" later in the day. As of midweek, no precipitation was forecast for the weekend. The Dimmitt Kiwanis Club,

which operates one of the biggest pheasant-hunters' services in the area, has more than 10,000 acres of land reserved for permit-only hunting.

Permits are \$50 each, and entitle the holder to hunt on any of the reserved land throughout the season.

To hunt on any other private land, the hunter must receive permission of the landowner or operator. Many landowners have posted their land or established individual hunting fees. The Kiwanians will kick off

the season with their annual Pheasant Hunters' Breakfast, beginning at 5:30 a.m. Saturday in the County Expo Building. They will serve eggs, sausage, pancakes, toast, milk, fruit juice and coffee for \$3.50 per plate.

The Kiwanis Club also will have its hunting permits on sale during the breakfast. For those buying or already holding a Kiwanis permit, the breakfast is included in the permit price.

A major US company is considering Dimmitt as the site of a new manufacturing plant - apparently an electronics assembly operation - and has asked the Chamber of Commerce to help find out how many workers would be available for such a plant here.

The Chamber of Commerce, which must complete its labor survey before Monday, sent survey forms home this week with school children in Dimmitt, Hart and Nazareth.

If you did not receive a labor survey form through the schools, you may fill out the one printed at the bottom of this page.

Or you may pick up a form at the Chamber of Commerce office or at local food stores.

The survey forms must be returned to the Chamber of Commerce office in the Dimmitt City Hall before 5 p.m. Friday, or deposited over the weekend in the bill-slot at the drive-up window of the Southwestern Public Service Co. office on South Broadway.

Chamber Manager Delores Heller said the company contacted her office "through private channels" and that the firm "is not free to discuss the nature of the plant being considered here, except that it would not be a garment

factory." But Mrs. Heller said the company did indicate that it would employ approximately 50 people here - primarily woman workers - and that it would require a building of approximately 40,000 sq. ft. Among the types of avail-

able jobs listed on the company's labor survey form, 'Bench-type Electronics Assembly" is at the top of the list. Other job openings would be available for sewingmachine operators, quality control inspectors, general maintenance workers and laborers, the form indicates.

She also said the company indicated it would pay wages and fringe benefits that are "at least average for the same type work in this area," and that a profit-sharing plan for employees is also listed as a

Although the company has not made itself known at this stage of its site search, it is described as an 80-year-old US company that is listed on the New York Stock Exchange and did more than \$100 million in business last year.

A labor survey such as the one now being conducted is usually one of the latter stages of a company's search for a new plant site. Before surveying a community's available work force, a company usually will already have approved a community's size, location, tax structure, bonded indebtedness, utilities, transportation facili-The club furnishes each ties and other factors.

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

UETERAN'S SERUICES 647-3123

Improvements in the way the Veterans Administration helps disabled veterans are the "most important since the program was established in 1943" according to Max Cleland, Administrator of Veterans Affiars.

Cleland was referring to recent legislation which gave his agency broad new authority to improve vocational rehabilitation for disabled veterans. The law also increased GI Bill education allowances.

The Congressional action, approved by the President on Oct. 17, 1980, permits VA to go beyond its traditional role of preparing disabled veterans for the job market to helping place them in jobs suited to their individual disabilities.

For those veterans disabled so severely that employment is unfeasible, VA can now provide "independent living" counseling and support. A pilot program to be launched next fiscal year will offer special help for up to 500 severely disabled veterans per year with the goal of helping them live in the community with a reduced level of help from others or independently.

Other program modifications made possible by the 'Veterans Rehabilitation and Education Amendments of 1980" include:

-Veterans eligible for both vocational rehabilitation and the GI Bill may now receive the higher payments of the GI Bill while at the same time receiving many of the services of the vocational rehabilitation

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"While the supply of Texas Christmas trees is still short. more and more of them are coming on the market," points out James W. Chandler of Overton, area forester with the Texas Agricultural Extension Srvice. "Some 30,000 should be ready for market this year."

"There are some 225 Christmas tree growers in Texas at present with about 1,350 acres in production. At 900 to 1,000 trees per acre, that's more than a million trees," he says.

Most trees are being grown in East Texas and are Virginia established in central and western areas with the variety 'Pinus eldarica,'' which is more tempered to drought conditions.

According to the forester, many trees were lost to drought this past summer, even where intensive management was carried out.

"Christmas tree plantations need plenty of care and management," emphasizes Chandler. "Trees usually reach market size in three to five years and may be sold wholesale to civic groups and other retail outlets or on a choose-and-cut basis.'

Texas-grown Christmas trees offer a lot of advantages over those shipped in from the Great Lake States and the Pacific Northwest, says the forester. These advantages are mainly freshness, fragrance and novelty. - Most trees shipped to Texas have to be cut about two months earlier while Texas trees can be cut only a short time before being offered for sale.

"Some five million Christmas trees are sold in Texas each year," Chandler. "This represents more than \$50 million in sales. As Texas production increases, Texas-grown trees will take a larger portion of these sales.'

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

Teresa's topics Do you know your gold?

By TERESA L. CRISWELL County Extension Agent

Only karat gold jewelry is real gold - no matter how bright the glitter - so know what you are doing before buying or selling gold jewelry!

Understanding certain words and other points about gold is a must.

What is a karat? - Karat refers to the percentage of gold in an item.

Always look for the karat stamp. An item marked 24K (24 karats), or 999, is 100 percent pure gold. Each karat represents 1/24 part of pure

The finest gold jewelry is usually 18K (18 parts pure gold and six parts of another metal), since 24K generally is considered too soft to use for

Most domestically produced gold jewelry is 14K (14 parts gold and 10 parts of another metal - or about 58.5 percent pure gold).

No American-made gold jewelry may be stamped with percentages other than karats, according to a Federal Trade Commission regulation.

WHAT IS MEANT BY

'585' OR '750'? - This appears on some European This marking states gold karatage in percentages of 1,000. So, 750 equals 18K

(75% pure gold), and 585 equals 14K (58% pure gold). IS COLOR IMPORTANT? - Color of gold depends on the other metals alloyed with Gold alloyed with copper has a reddish cast. Gold alloyed with nickel or palladium produces the 'white gold' used in setting

diamonds. HOW DO YOU KNOW WHAT'S WHAT? - Understand certain words, so you don't pay "karat gold" prices for gold-plated jewelry.

'Gold filled'' jewelry has a layer - or layers - of gold mechanically bonded to a base metal, such as copper. The gold layer must have a

fineness of at least 10K and must be at least 1/20 the total

The jewelry should be marked "gold filled" or "G.F." and state the karatage of the gold layer - 14 G.F., for example.

'Rolled gold plate' is often used in high-quality costume jewelry.

This type is made like gold-filled, but the gold layer is less than 1/20 the total weight. Markings should indicate the ratio of gold to the metals used - "1/40 12K Rolled Gold Plate."

In "gold electroplate," at least 7 millionths of an inch of gold is electrolytically electroplated to a metal base.


The Bobbies suffered a cold streak, hitting only 23 of their 64 field shots for a 36% accuracy mark - well below their norm.

SMOKE YOUR OWN BIRD] Smoking or curing poultry

at home goes back to a bygone era, but it can still be done without a lot of "backbreaking" work. All that is needed is a curing vat (insulated cooler or ice chest), a small scale, curing ingredients, ice, a smoker and a hypodermic needle. Use the hypodermic needle to inject the bird with curing solution. Then put the bird in the curing vat containing the remainder of the brine for about 48 hours. Allow the bird to drain thoroughly, then place it in a smoker that will hold the temperature between 170-200 degrees F. A turkey is usually done in eight to 12 hours and a chicken in four to six hours.
