John Stork Is Candidate For Commissioner

The news has been authorized to announce the candidacy of John Stork for the office of Commissioner of Precinct 4, Castro county, subject to the action of the Democratic Primaries.

In making his announcement as a candidate for office, Mr. Stork declared that his final decision to make the race for the office of Commissioner was partially the result of requests, by a large number of voters in the precinct, urging him to make the race. He also declared that having served in the office during World War II, meeting the labor and material problems as best he could in order to give the precinct an efficient administration, he had gained knowledge in the operation of the affairs of the county which would be of much benefit under peace time conditions.

He earnestly solicits the consideration and support of every person in the precinct and invites everyone to make a thorough investigation of his record in office.

District Candidate Visits County

Judge Ernest O. Northcutt has been visiting in the County in the presentation of his candidacy for Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals at Amarillo, Texas.

Judge Northcutt was born on a farm in Parker county fifty-six years ago. His father, Elijah Northcutt, settled in Bell county, Texas, in 1853, from Tennessee, and moved to Parker county in 1870.

Becoming interested in law at an early age, Ernest Northcutt worked at night and went to school in the daytime to pay his way through the University of Oklahoma Law School. He graduated in 1919, received his Bachelor of Laws degree, and moved to Amarillo where he entered the private practice of law in 1919.

In the formative years of his practice, Judge Northcutt was associated with C. E. Gustavus, one of the all time great lawyers of the Panhandle. In 1923, Judge Northcutt opened his own office and continued the private practice of law in Amarillo until he was elected Judge of Potter county in 1940.

As a private practitioner, Judge Northcutt tried cases in all courts over the Panhandle of Texas. His trial work carried him into the State and Federal Courts and into all Appellate Courts, both State and Federal. He is entirely familiar with the work and duties of the office of Associate Justice of Civil Appeals. As a practitioner and as a judge, he has tried hundreds of Civil cases.

Judge Northcutt is married and has three children: a girl and a boy in college and a boy in Junior High School. He has been active in civic work for many years, a member of the Baptist church, and president of the West Texas Judges' and Commissioners' Association in 1947. Judge Northcutt is now serving his fourth elective term as County Judge of Potter County, Texas.

Poor Varieties Cut Income of Wheat Farmers

According to R. L. King, Secretary-Treasurer of the Texas Grain and Feed Dealers Association, Texas Wheat Farmers are suffering heavy financial losses through failure to grow high milling quality protein wheat.

Blewett explained that Kansas City and northern markets are discounting Southwest Wheat 12 cents a bushel under prices paid for the grain of Northwestern Kansas and Nebraska.

He declared that, because of the milling qualities it is almost impossible to sell Texas Wheat of the Chiefman, Early Blackhull or Red Chief varieties popular in Texas except through export channels.

Popular and recommended varieties according to R. L. King County Agent are Commanche, Westar, Standard Blackhull, Tenmarg, Triumph Turkey and Wichita. Even though members of the Castro County Certified Seed Growers have 2350 acres under certification the demand for seed this year is very great. Castro County farmers are urged by the county agent to make arrangements for planting seed as early as possible as inquiries have already been received from out of the county for seed. Members of the Association who produce Certified seed will be published at a later date.

In a world filled with so many lurid and disturbing events, it is somehow reassuring to turn to the contemplation of the life of a man like my friend, Wiley Akins. His isn't so much a spectacular career as a record of step-by-step progress because he was ready for each new and enlarging opportunity. He was born on a farm in Hill county in 1903, one of a family of eight boys and five girls. After school he worked in a grocery store; during summers, he plowed, chopped cotton, picked cotton, milked and the other tasks of farm life. After graduating from Bynum school and Hillsboro High, Akins went to work for a wholesale grocery in the office but "part-time" on the road. He showed such an aptitude for selling that soon he was a full-time salesman.

For six years, Akins was territory salesman for one of the largest feed companies in the United States.

After running his own wholesale and retail feed store in Tyler for a year, he sold out to become East Texas sales representative for Burrus Feed Mills. A year later, he was

made the company's sales manager and, in 1935, just a year after that he became general manager.

At that time the company's traveling sales force consisted of only two men. Today, the sales force numbers 30 and the company's products are sold extensively in 12 states and a dozen foreign countries. In addition to the mills in Dallas, McKinney and San Benito, soon Akins will have the thrill of seeing Burrus' new mill, in Fort Worth, open—one of the biggest—and the most modern—feed mills in the world.

Busy and successful business executive, Wiley Akins finds time for the duties of good citizenship. He is on the Baylor University board

of trustees, was chairman of the board of deacons of his church for five years, makes frequent speeches on "the training of youth" through 4-H Clubs and Future Farmers of America and is an honorary member of the FFA, an honor bestowed by the boys themselves in recognition of outstanding service.

LOSS OF BODY SALT IN HOT WEATHER SHOULD BE REPLENISHED REGULARLY

There is little doubt that summer is here. If you don't think so, take a quick look at your thermometer or feel your shirt or blouse—chances are that it will be wet and salty with sweat.

Excessive sweating means the loss of body salt, and Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises the use of salt in drinking water as a means of avoiding heat cramps.

"Salt is a permanent constituent of sweat," says Dr. Cox. "On days when the thermometer goes to 90 degrees or above, as it has recently, the body may lose as much as fifty grams of salt. Laborers, farm-

ers, and even white-collar workers should be especially watchful of heat cramps."

Heat cramps are characterized by pains in the stomach, headaches, and sometimes nausea and vomiting. The danger comes because the loss of the salt may occur without the knowledge of the individual until the deficiency causes cramps or heat fag.

Salt tablets may be purchased commercially. If they are not available, a pinch of table salt will serve the purpose.

"Drinking milk is an excellent method of replacing body salt lost through perspiration," Dr. Cox says, "but alcoholic drinks should be avoided."

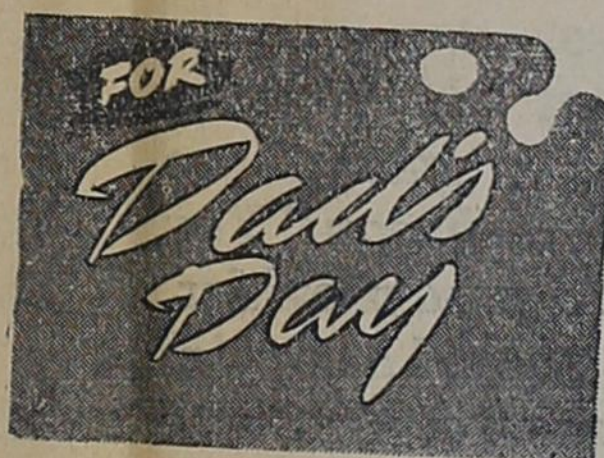

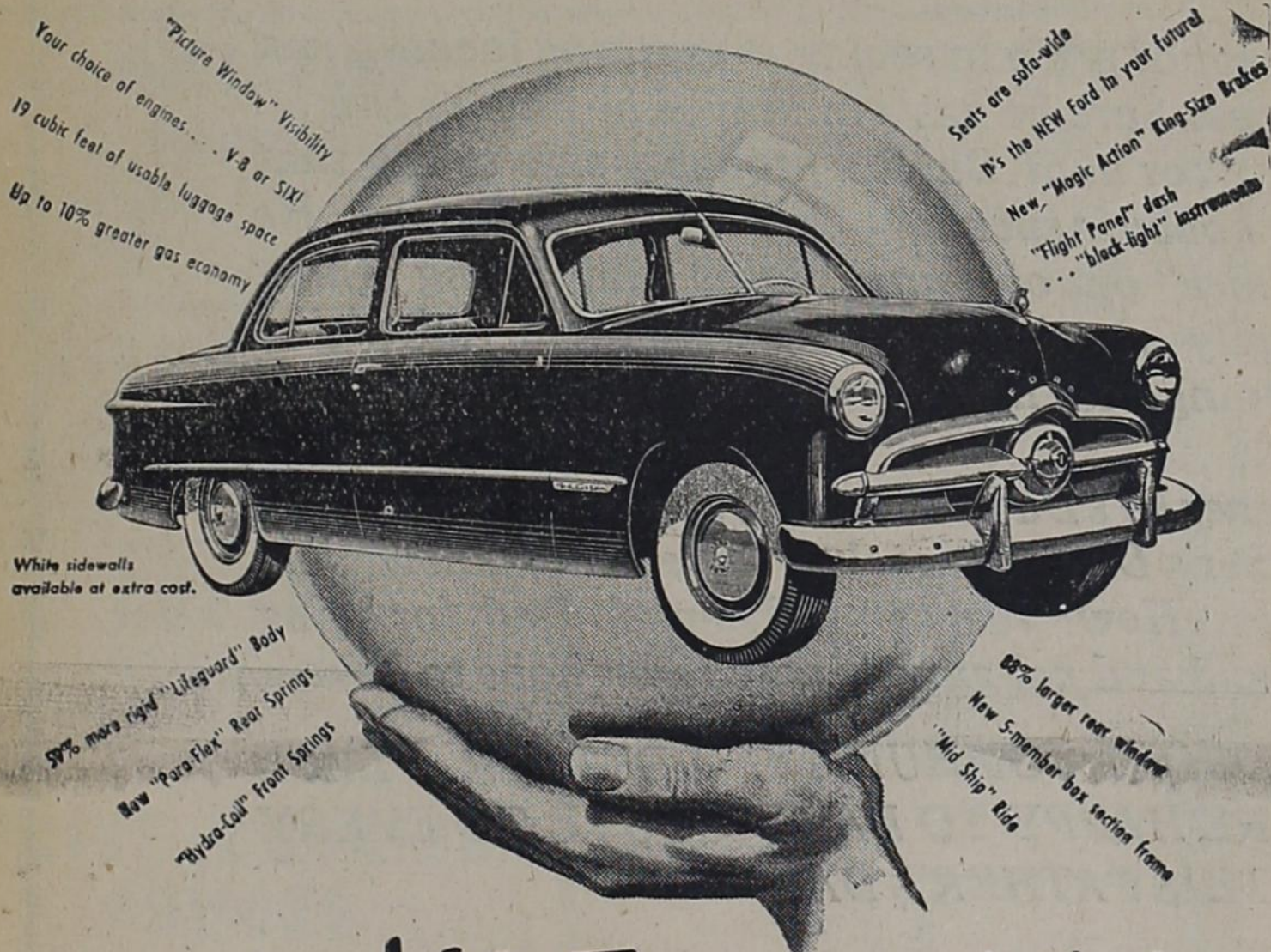

New Fords Have Been Changed, Improved



The revolutionary new Ford four-door sedan for 1949 is lower, wider, roomier and provides nearly 25 per cent more visibility.

The 1949 Ford, which reveals a radical change from traditional Ford styling and engineering, was made today by the Ford Motor Company.

"New standards of beauty, comfort, economy, and performance in the 1949 Ford passenger cars advance them far ahead of others in the low-priced field," J. R. Davis, vice-president and director of sales and advertising, said, "Styling of the new Ford definitely establishes it as the car of the year."

To develop and produce the 1949 Ford passenger cars, Ford Motor Company has expended more than \$37,400,000 in tools, dies, jigs and fixtures.

STYLING — The modern design has been molded along functional lines, resulting in a long, low, sweeping silhouette. The grille is distinctive, the hood massive but shorter and the body so wide the rear fenders have been eliminated. There are clean, unbroken lines from front to rear.

COMFORT — Comfort has been one of the primary objectives in the new Ford. There is more room in the "lounge car" interiors than in many cars with much larger over-all dimensions. Front seat

widths have been increased six inches and the rear seat nearly eight inches. The body has been moved five inches forward with the seats cradled between the axels for a much smoother ride.

A new type of suspension system — hydra coil springs — replaces the traditional transverse springs and the front axle. This system is centered around airplane type shock absorbers.

The drive shaft tunnel has been decreased by adoption of the Hochkiss drive and the hypoid rear axle. These engineering changes also minimize the transmission of road noises into the car.

Engine vibration has been reduced by literally floating the power plant on rubber mounts.

A new heating system available in the new Fords brings year around comfort to driver and passengers. Fresh air is scooped into the car through large intakes just behind the grille.

The system, which has an automatic temperature control, can be used as a fresh air ventilator, a fresh air heater or as a recirculator. Fresh air plus the pressure effect obtained by the car's for-

ward motion reduces fogging and drafts.

ECONOMY — Economy of operation has been increased up to 10 per cent improvement in gasoline mileage for the new six-cylinder engine and the extensively redesigned V-8. Both are offered as power plants in all Ford models. Other engineering features result in better performance and longer engine life.

A new intake manifold achieves better fuel distribution. It is attached to the engine so that it is horizontal to the ground, reducing the tendency of raw gasoline to flow toward the rear cylinders and smoothing engine operation.

The new "equa-flow" cooling system contributes to good performance under extreme conditions by improving general operating efficiency. Water flows in volume the full length of the block. Temperatures in "hot spots" in the six and eight cylinder engines have been decreased as much as 12 degrees.

There are larger water pumps in the V-8.

Improvements in the ignition system also have contributed to increased economy and efficiency. As much as 25 per cent improve-

ment in gasoline economy may be achieved by taking advantage of the overdrive which is available as factory-installed optional equipment.

SAFETY — New standards of safety have been set in the rugged construction of the chassis and body. The box-type frame is of all-welded construction. Although the frame is lighter, there is 59 per cent more rigidity when combined with the body.

Lowering the over-all height by four inches and placing the seats between the axels results in a lower center of gravity, an aid in safe driving.

The windshield has been increased in height and width and the rear window now provides "picture window" visibility for driver and passengers. The rear window is larger than the ordinary windshield. There is as much as 20 square feet of windows in the new cars.

All doors hinge at the front. Inside handles push up instead of down to open the door. Both features combine to preclude accidental opening of the doors.

PERFORMANCE — Increased performance values are one of the highlights of the new cars.

Steering has been greatly improved. The new Ford may be guided by a minimum of effort even under severe wind conditions. Road shocks have been minimized. This is the result of a newly designed linkage in which the pivot point of the tie rods is on the same center line as the wheels.

Engineering changes in the engines, some of them already mentioned, contribute to smoothness of operation. These include the new cooling system, intake manifold, redesigned combustion chambers and improved crankcase ventilation system as well as other features.

The 114 inch wheelbase, convenient for parking and in moving through heavy traffic, has been retained.

The new six develops 95 horsepower, providing better acceleration in passing and heavy traffic. The V-8 develops 100 horsepower.

OTHER FEATURES — Interior styling in colorful and practical. Traditional, neutral-toned automobile fabrics have been discarded for new tweeds, broadcloths and mohairs which retain the ability

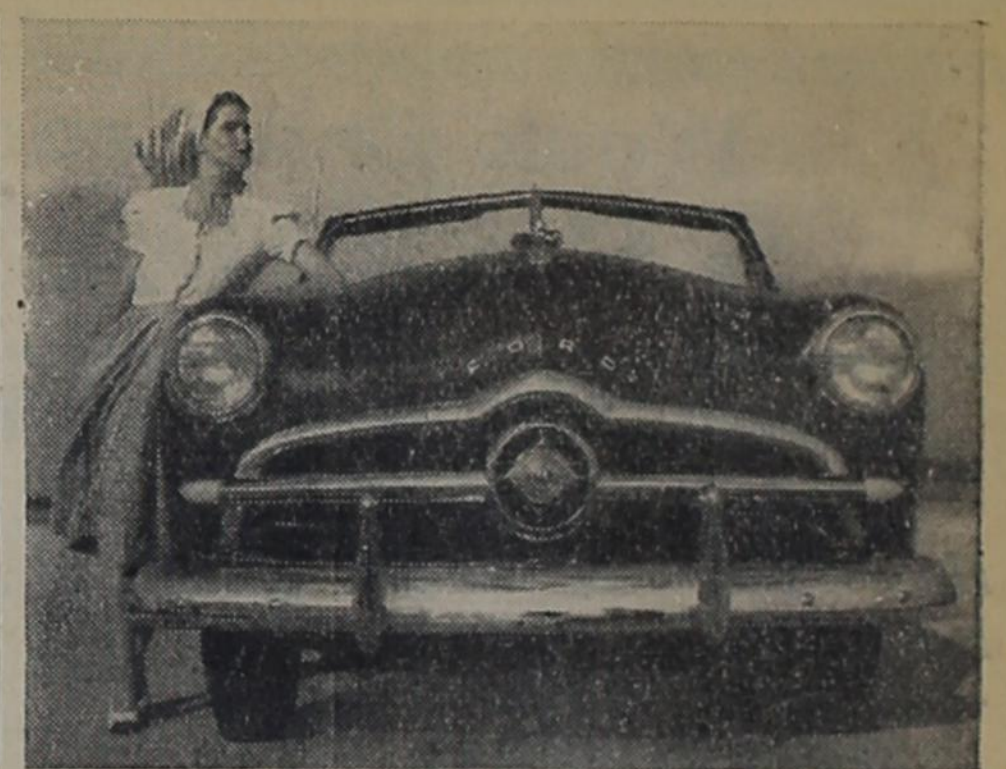
