### SPECIAL SESSION LEGISLATURE LOOMING

AUSTIN, July 30.—An immediate special session of the legislature to wipe out the deficit in the general fund by financing the public schools strictly out of school taxes, as originally contemplated by the Constitution, which would permit the general fund to retain all of its income from the state ad valorem tax, appears a possibility as the result of a plan advanced by Gov. Coke Stevenson to the State Automatic Tax Board.

The board deferred setting the school tax rate until today pending legal investigations as to the constitutionality of the governor's proposal.

Before recessing until today the board fixed the general fund rate at the constitutional maximum of 35c as there was no alternative with a heavy deficit in that account, and the Confederate pension at 2c, by legislative direction which reduced it from 7c.

Under Stevenson's plan the school rate would be fixed at 30c, a 3c reduction, to make a total state tax rate of 67c, compared to the present rate of 75c.

Stevenson revealed that the legality of his plan is being studied by Asst. Atty. Gen. Grover Sellers and Weaver Baker, chairman of the Board of Control, the governor's former law partner.

The governor proposes a special session of the legislature to increase the per capita apportionment from \$25 to \$30 and repeal the rural aid appropriation of \$9,830,990 a year, all of which now comes out of the general fund. The last legislature raised the per capita from \$22.50 to \$25. The additional \$2 apportionment would replace rural aid.

Stevenson, chairman of the tax board, said taxpayers, now better able to pay taxes than in years, would be well served with an 8c state tax reduction and the wiping out of the deficit without a state bond issue to call for more taxes to pay interest and principal. It was the psychological time to do it, he thought.

As to the schools, he said they would get the same amount of money but that the only question is one of being able to apportion it to the poorer rural schools, as is specifically done in the rural aid bill. That is the legal question being investigated, whether the schools can be grouped or classified by counties to permit apportionment, by the state or locality, to fit the needs of the rich districts, the average districts and the impoverished districts.

Stevenson said State Superintendent L. A. Woods does not object to the plan.

### MEMBERS BRITISH WAR CABINET CALLED FROM BEDS AT 1:30 A. M. FOR A SECRET CONFERENCE

LONDON, July 30.—The British war cabinet met in extraordinary session at 1:30 a. m. BST today, for an unannounced purpose but possibly to discuss an Italian peace feeler or to set a deadline for a reply to Allied terms from Marshal Pietro Badoglio.

The meeting, which lasted for two hours, came less than 24 hours after Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, supreme commander in the Mediterranean, broadcast to Italy an offer to arrange an immediate and honorable peace encompassing "mild and beneficent" occupation and the return of Italian prisoners to their homeland.

European dispatches, meantime, told of spreading riots in Italy and the protective arrests of 5000 officials and prominent members of the Fascist party. Swiss dispatches reported that disorders, especially at Milan, were strongly communistic in character and said many demonstrators carried red flags, sang the Internationale and shouted for peace.

Despite lack of official confirmation, there were strong indications that the cabinet session was linked closely to the Italian situation.

If the meeting were not concerned with a formal Italian offer to make peace, informed sources believed, it at least may have considered an initial Italian peace approach, possibly submitted by a third party.

The ministers also may have laid down a formal time limit for dealing with Badoglio, chief of state in the new Italian government, after which all bets would be regarded as off.

The cabinet meeting was convened hurriedly at 10 Downing street with most members being roused from their beds. Prime Minister Churchill presided.

While it is true that cabinet sessions may be summoned almost at any time, the fact that members had to be roused by telephone obviously implied that matters had arisen which required the most urgent consultation.

The length of the meeting also indicated that some discussion and deliberation were necessary. If the Italians actually have approached the Allies, at least several exchanges through third parties would be required before direct contact could be established between Rome and Algiers.

Other possibilities were that the cabinet discussed some military question of an urgent nature involving Germany or communications from belligerents other than Italy, such as Hungary, Rumania or Bulgaria, but general belief was that the satellites would wait for Italy to take the lead in getting out of the war.

Meantime, Radio Moscow was heard broadcasting that German Reichsmarshal Herman W. Goering arrived secretly in Rome, possibly to demand a showdown on Italy's continued presence in the war on the side of the Axis.

Though Radio Rome was silent on Eisenhower's peace offer, it characterized President Roosevelt and Churchill's earlier demands for unconditional surrender as "too harsh."

An Italian frontier dispatch said thousands of Socialists and Communists paraded through the streets of Milan yesterday, chanting the Internationale and waving red flags, despite the military governor's warning that such demonstrations were prohibited and would be put down with arms if necessary.

The crowds first went to the La Scala Opera House, where they cried, "Where's Toscanini? We want him back."

Toscanini, now in exile in the United States, left Italy after Fascists slapped him for refusing to conduct the Fascist hymn Giovinezza in Bologna.

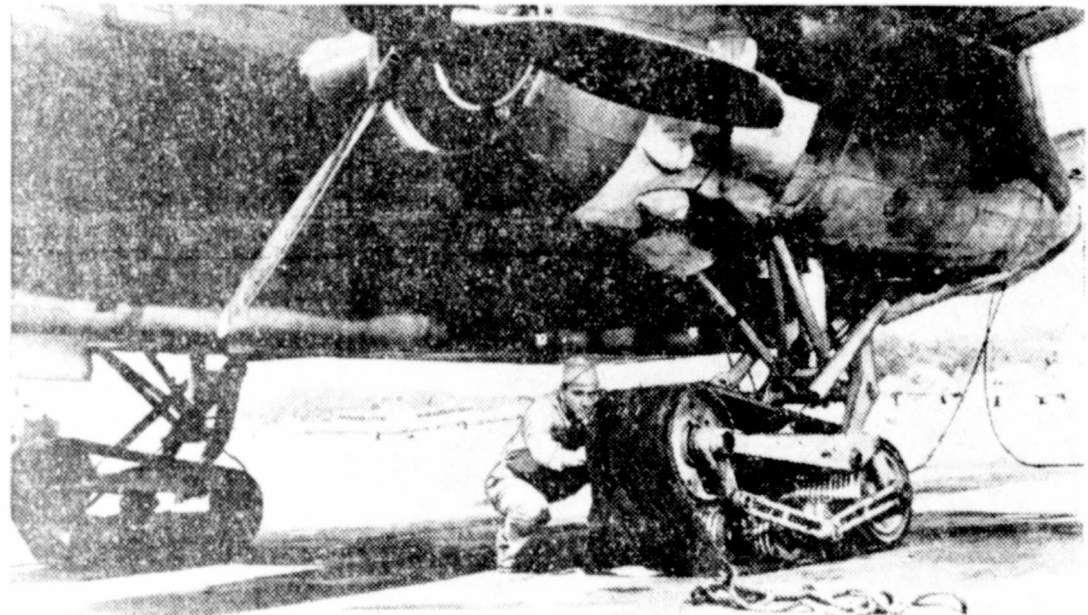

### M'ARTHUR'S MEN ADVANCE; SINK VESSELS

SOUTHWEST PACIFIC, July 30.—The slow, hard fight to smash the death stand of the Japanese garrison at Munda is proceeding satisfactorily, Gen. Douglas MacArthur said today as a communique reported Allied gains on both ends of the Southern Pacific front and the sinking or wrecking of two enemy destroyers and a transport.

Expressing his views through a spokesman, MacArthur said the Japanese had failed to halt the steady progress by American jungle troops who hacked out a new advance of 200 yards on New Georgia Island, methodically destroying 14 enemy pillboxes.

NEW DELHI, July 30.—American and British bombers and fighter planes staged successful attacks on Japanese targets in Central and Western Burma yesterday, blasting bridges, railways, factory installations and shipping without the loss of a single plane.

Bombers of the 10th United States Air Force wrecked the important bridge over the My River, 25 miles west of Mandalay, blasting the east and west spans to the bottom of the river, and severely damaging the center span. Destruction of this bridge will delay traffic between Monywa and

### GERMANS GET FIGHT-TO-TO-DEATH ORDER

MOSCOW, July 30.—Orders to fight to the death have gone out to German tank and infantry forces counter-attacking desperately in a so far futile attempt to halt the three-pronged Russian advance on Orel, front dispatches said today.

The Germans were reported to have brought up fresh battalions from France and Germany itself in a frantic effort to save Orel, keystone of the central and southern fronts, but the Soviet high command announced gains of three to six miles and the capture of over 40 more towns and villages on the city's defense perimeter yesterday.

### BURMA JAPS FEEL MIGHT YANK PLANES

CONTRIBUTES \$40,000.

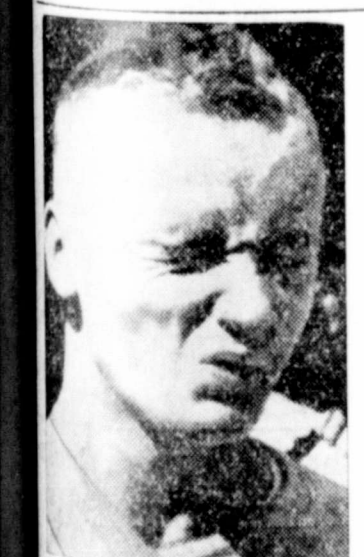
LONDON, July 30.—Pope Pius XII has instructed his apostolic delegate to Britain to inform hierarchies that the Holy See has placed at their disposal \$40,000 for restoration of Roman Catholic churches destroyed in England during the war.

### LOCAL DOCTOR WILL ATTEND MEDICAL MEET

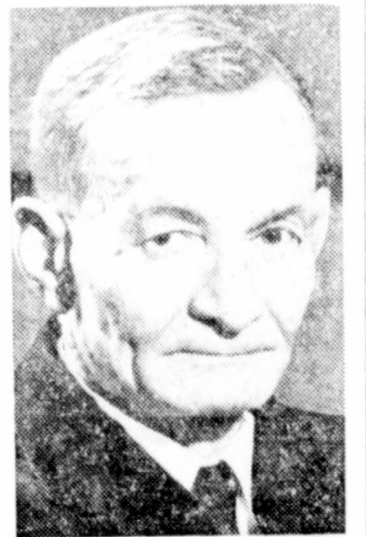

### YANKS AND CANUCKS SQUEEZE AXIS TIGHTER

NORTH AFRICA, July 30.—American and Canadian forces have squeezed the Axis tighter in the northeast corner of Sicily with new advances, it was announced today.

Coincident with a front dispatch reporting indications that the German 15th panzer division is withdrawing before the Americans in North Sicily, a communique said Maj. Gen. George S. Patton's 7th Army had moved forward at several places.

### TOO MUCH CASH.

ST. LOUIS, July 30.—A cash accumulation of more than \$125,000,000 from war revenues today was listed as one of the reasons for rejection of the Missouri Pacific railroad reorganization plan by United States District Judge George H. Moore of St. Louis.

FT. WORTH, July 30.—Young Hoodlums, who rove Fort Worth streets at night attacking pedestrians, were sought by police today in two of three downtown assaults.

### JULY LOSSES UP.

WASHINGTON, July 30.—The number of Japanese ships sunk by American submarines was raised to 210 today as preliminary reports indicated that Allied shipping losses, which reached a record-breaking low last month, would show an increase during July.

### ATTACK FRANCHISE TAX.

AUSTIN, July 30.—Suits have been filed in district court here by eight oil and pipe line companies attacking constitutionality of the franchise tax law. The tax is for \$1 on each \$1,000 of capital stock, and is estimated to produce \$4,000,000 annually.

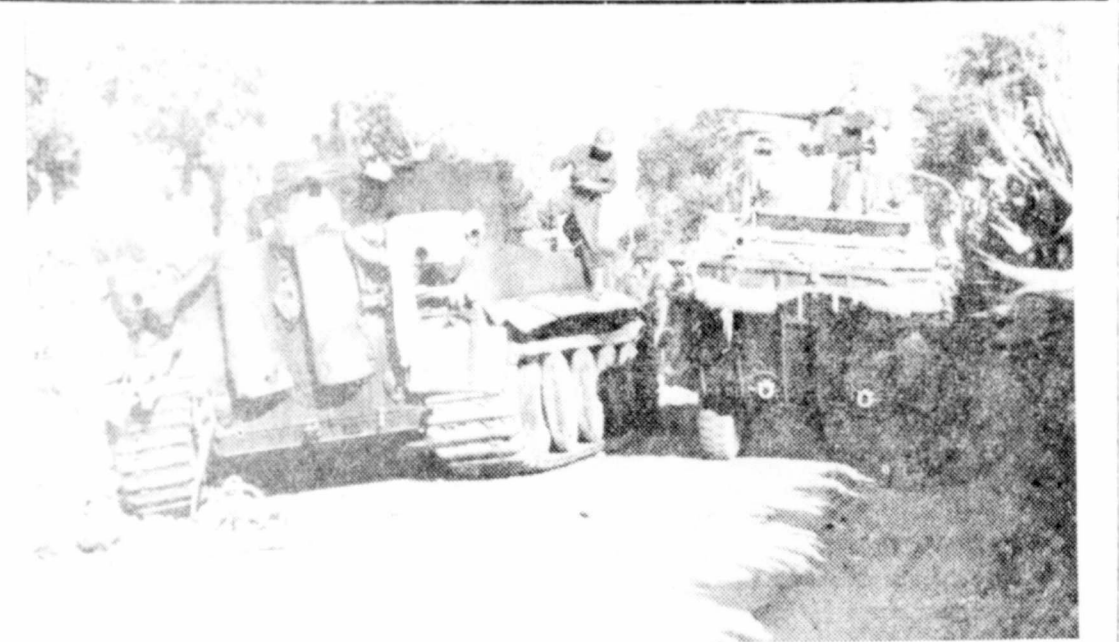

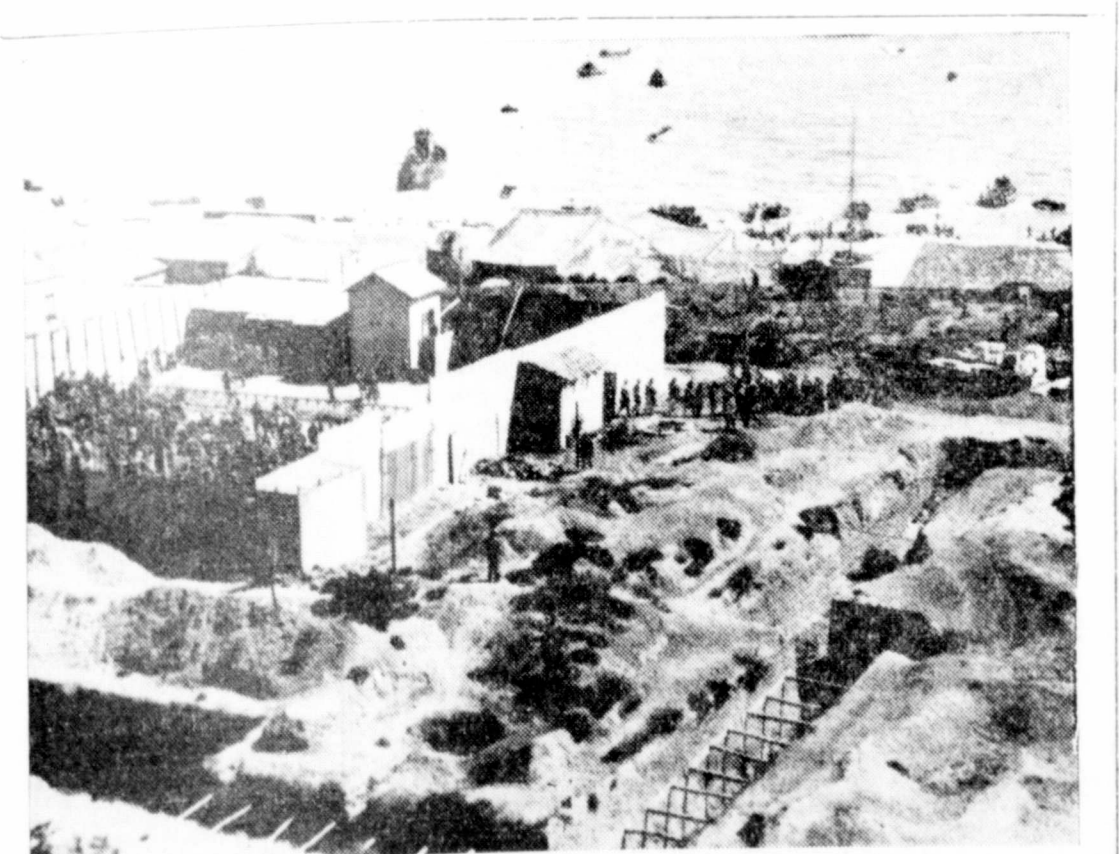
