### PATRIOTS WHO FOUND NAZI DOMINATION UNBEARABLE ARE SLAUGHTERED LIKE ANIMALS

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 31.—The Germans were reported today to have rushed an entire armored division from Norway to Denmark to reinforce Nazi troops who already have killed hundreds of Danish soldiers in battles to subdue isolated garrisons.

### DEPUTY COLLECTORS TO AID TAXPAYER

One out of every three taxpayers will be required to file declarations of their earned income and victory taxes for the year 1943 on or before September 15, 1943. Farmers, considered to be those persons receiving at least 80 percent of their gross income from farming operations (as distinguished from agricultural laborers receiving wages or salaries), must file declarations on or before December 15. In order to assist taxpayers in the preparations of these declarations, deputy collectors will be at the Prairie building, Eastland, on Sept. 1, 2, 3, 4 and 9 through the 15th.

### NAZIS SAY 400 BRITISH MEN CAUGHT, ITALY

LONDON, Aug. 31.—The German radio reported today that about 400 British troops landed Sunday on the toe of Italy in what was described as a probable preliminary to a major invasion, but official London quarters had no comment on the report.

### COVER CROPS WILL PREVENT WIND EROSION

Eastland county farmers will meet soon to plan steps to protect their peanut land from wind erosion after harvesting, says County Agent Floyd Lynch. Meetings have been called for Cisco, Gove, Lamar, Ranger and Eastland to introduce the program and to take farmers' and ranchers' applications for cover crop seed.

### MEN WANTED BY ENGINEERING CORPS

Men between 18 and 50 holding a 1-A or 111-A draft classification may now voluntarily enlist, in lieu of being drafted into the service if found qualified.

### MEAT PLENTIFUL

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 31.—Plenty of steaks — and a beef crisis — are on the way. Grass-fat beef for a steak-hungry nation is beginning to flood the Kansas City market. Receipts Monday were approximately 240 carloads, the largest supply in several years.

### MILITARY TRAINING

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—Chairman May of the house military committee called for compulsory military training in peacetime today with the assertion "Uncle Sam should 'carry a big stick all the time just in case any of the other big stick boys get ideas." The Kentuckian said he would seek legislation to require every able-bodied male between 17 and 21 to take a full year of training, with periodic one-month refresher courses.

### CANT FORGIVE THIS

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—The Tokio radio inadvertently has admitted that Japanese pilots have machine-gunned American airmen parachuting from disabled planes, the OWI reported today.
