During these eleven years the Dimmitt schools have also made advancement. In 1936 the faculty ensisted of 14 members; the school enrollment was barely over 300: and the Dimmitt District had an area of 122 covare miles. Today the local school boasts a faculty of 22 teachers, an enrollment of almost 600, and a district. with an area of 405 square miles.

#### HORNETS STING BOBCATS FRIDAY NIGHT

Friday night, October 11, 1946. the Dimmitt Bobcats held the highly rated Sudan Hornets to a score of 26-7 in the Hornets' stadium. The Hornets had a good line and strong interference for a very speedy backfield. At the first of the game Sudan

In the next play "Bo" Jackson, who has recently been shifted to the back field, ran around the end for the touchdown. He then received a pass for the extra point. After that the two teams battled in the middle of the field until the final whistle.




