Dimmitt schools open Aug. 15

Good news for tax payers

School starts early this year for the DISD, according to superintendent Les Miller.

But that's the last time it will be happening.

All students start classes Aug. 15, according to their regular class time.

"We had a waiver to start school prior to the week of the Aug. 20," he said.

"Next year TEA will not grant any waivers and we won't be able to start school prior to the last Monday of August.

"For us it's good to start early and we can be out before Memorial Day and finish the semester before Christmas, but good or bad, kids have to go to school 180 days.

"But, there's really not a good or bad - we've done it before when we had to end the semester after the Christmas

"This year everything will be like it has in the past. But beginning with the 07-08 school year it won't because the TEA will no longer grant any waivers."

There was good news on the horizon for DISD.

At a special session of the Legislature, teacher raises had been approved, but with no visible funding except for the districts themselves.

However, DISD got good news recently.

"It seems like we'll be able to receive enough additional dollars from the state to pay for the teacher raises that the state passed," Miller said.

"That's a big deal. Normally they pass a raise and don't fund it. This will be the first time they've funded the raises in quite some time."

And there's good news for tax payers, too. The tax rate is dropping 13 cents.

"We'll be setting our tax rate at the next board meeting from \$1.50 to \$1.37," he said.

"The state condensed everyone's tax rate by pumping more money into the educational system and most were able to lower their taxes - for us that's a 13-cent decrease that tax payers will see reflected on their bills."

The next board meeting is Monday, Aug. 14 at 7 p.m.

Cotton price outlook harsh

Drought continues unabated

With the demand for cotton surging even as production dries up around ' the world, and as China continues to absorb a disproportionate share, cotton prices are forecast to rise almost 8 percent this year, before jumping up by more than 14 percent next year.

In a monthly update of its annual supply, demand and pricing forecast, the International Cotton Advisory Council (ICAC) said demand during the current cotton year is forecast to rise by 7.0 percent, to an estimated 25.0 million tons from 23.4 million a year ago.

But cotton production around the world is ex-

pected to drop by 5.7 percent, creating a gap between supply and demand of almost 13% when compared with last year.

China and its textile mills will continue to drive world mill use, with Chinese consumption expected to reach a record 10.5 million tons next year, up about 6.1 percent, or 600,000 tons from last year. At that rate, Chinese textile plants will be using roughly 43 percent of the world's available supply of cotton.

Next year, the cotton growers said, India is expected to become the third largest cotton exporting nation, behind the United States and Uzbekistan.

Indian cotton exports are forecast at over 800,000 tons next year.

Prepare your children for a safe 'back to school'

Yes, it's already that time: Time to start preparing for backto-school. But beyond pencils, notebooks and maybe a new backpack, emergency physicians are urging parents to prepare for potential medical emergencies to ensure a safe school year for their children.

"Being prepared is key for so many things, and this goes for medical emergencies as well," said Dr. Frederick Blum, President of the American College of Emergency Physicians (ACEP). "Your child is in a much better position to prompt medical receive attention if emergency personnel do not have to take time to get parental consent, track down medical records or investigate immunization histories."


Although it hasn't rained in many months in Dallas, storm clouds are gathering over Dallas ISD in the form of the often feared FBI.

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What's the Law

Q. I owe a company money from about ten years ago. I have not heard anything for about five years, but now a debt collector is calling me day and night. He also is calling my sister. I tell him I don't have the money and can't afford to pay, but he will not stop harassing me. What can I do?

A. First, if the debt is that old, there may not be any legal action the debt collector can take. After four years, most debts are barred by what is called the "statute of limitations." This means if a lawsuit is filed, you could have it dismissed.

There is no law. however, that prevents a debt collector from asking you to pay a debt, even if legal collection of the debt is barred. You can stop the debt collector from continuing to harass you in several ways.

First, under federal law, if you send the debt collector written notice demanding he stop all further communication with you, he must stop. He still has the right to sue, but in your case, that alternative is barred by the statute of limitations.

Another way to stop a debt collector is to make it clear that you do not intend to pay, and that his calls are just a waste of time. For example, if you get very upset every time a debt collector calls, the debt collector begins to think that you will pay, to avoid being harassed. Your conduct almost encourages more bad conduct by the debt collector. On the other

hand, if you are polite and calm, and slowly and carefully explain that you recognize that you owe the debt, but cannot afford to pay and believe that it is barred by limitations, the debt collector will soon realize calling is waste of time. Debt collectors make money by collecting money. A debt collector cannot afford to spend a lot of time on the phone with someone they know is no going to pay.

Finally, I should point out that under the law, a debt collector never has the right to harass, threaten, or otherwise abuse you. If that happens, let the debt collector know you know your legal rights and you expect he wills top. If he does not, consider speaking with an attorney or a filing a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission.

Q. The other day, a friend came to see me at work. After he left, my employer asked how I knew him. I said he was an old friend. The next day I was fired. My employer told me he had "problems" in the past with my friend, and did not want me working in the store. Is this legal?

A. As far as the law is concerned, your employer doesn't even need a reason to fire you. Unless you have an employment contract for a set period of time, Texas law treats you as an employee at will. This basically means you may be fired, or quit,

at any time, for any or no reason.

Q. If a guardian is appointed for an incapacitated person, what is the authority of a second person holding a durable power of attorney. Is the power of attorney

automatically revoked? If not, can the new guardian revoke the power of attorney?

A. The appointment of a guardian automatically terminates any grant of authority given under a power of attorney.

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Cotton Report

Contrary to weakness seen in key outside commodity markets, cotton futures on the New York Board of Trade finished at six-week highs as speculative and fund buying was spurred by technicals.

Earlier in the week, seasonally slow activity and a lack of news kept some market participants on the sidelines as many still are waiting for the next supply/ demand report from USDA to provide a clearer market direction.

According to traders, at least some of the indication of the crop decline in the United States will be included in the next supply/demand report from USDA. The August 11 report will include data from out-in-the-field assessments for the first time this season. In the meantime, some analysts have been wondering when the market might start considering the wilting U.S. crop as a friendly fundamental pricing factor.

""One look at USDA's most recent crop condition report shows that if the Cotton Belt were to somehow receive hurricane-type precipitation, given the current drought conditions in most areas, the rain would be a welcomed and yield-improving event,"" a trader said.

USDA's crop report showed an average of 34 percent of the crop in very poor to poor condition versus last week's 32 percent and last year's average of 11 percent. An average of 39 percent of the crop is in good to excellent condition compared to last week's 38 percent and last year's 61 percent.

Meanwhile, USDA reported net export sales of U.S. cotton totaled 50,800 bales of old crop in the week ended July 27, an 18 percent increase from the previous week but 51 percent less than the fourweek average. Major purchases by Mexico, China, Japan, and Guatemala were partially offset cancellations from other countries. Net sales of 63,000 bale of new crop for delivery in 2006-07 were mainly for Mexico and Indonesia.

Export shipments during the week reached a marketing year high at 598,800 bales, up 29 percent from the previous week and 44 percent from the four-week average. Primary destinations included China, Mexico, Turkey, Indonesia.

Spot cotton sales increased this week as online trading by producers in Texas, Oklahoma, and Kansas in the week ended August 3 totaled 2,998 bales compared to the previous week when 1,045 bales were traded. Average prices received by producers in the most recent week ranged from 43.60 to 48.68 cents per pound compared to 49.34 to 51.45 cents per pound the previous week.

On the international front, Brazil will decide by next week whether to ask a legal panel at the World Trade Organization (WTO) for permission to impose up to \$1.0 billion of sanctions on U.S. imports, saying the United States failed to adequately cut cotton subsidies, a senior Brazilian trade official said.

The WTO ruled last year that some governmental payments to U.S. cotton

farmers and exporters were illegal after Brazil complained they were depressing world cotton prices. U.S. and Brazilian trade officials discussed the cotton dispute in Geneva last week. If the WTO finds the United States has not changed its cotton subsidies sufficiently, Brazil could impose \$1.0 billion in import tariffs on U.S.

Making a difference

What can we learn from Gibson outburst

Mel Gibson's recent trials - DUI, resisting arrest, and a belligerent drunken anti-Semitic tirade - is a sad reminder for the Christian community.I don't know the condition of Mr. Gibson's heart. Is he a believer in Christ?

Does he really harbor hateful anti-Semitic views? Is he an actor in real life, i.é. a hypocrite, as well as in film? I don't know. But I do know this: the Christian community should learn to walk carefully around "celebrity Christians." When Mel Gibson produced The Passion of the Christ he became something of a

new-found celebrity darling of many in the Christian community. Church groups, schools, and other Christian leaders vied for Gibson's time and attention or for the ultimate - a photo op. For Gibson and his film company this was a boon to marketing.

These new relationships, vigorous press attention, and a reasonably good quality film helped make The Passion of the Christ a blockbuster, despite official Hollywood's distance and even disdain.But Mel Gibson, as we have painfully witnessed, is just a: man. He will make mistakes. He is capable of taking the wrong path. People holding him too closely as their latest celebrity Christian hero can get burned. The Christian community did this a few years ago with Jane Fonda. She declared her faith in Christ and Christian groups stumbled over each other in an effort to trot her out as the latest trophy validation of just maybe - Christianity was true after all. Cal Thomas warned us back

then. He said the woman is a new believer and to let her alone. Give her time to grow. Unfortunately she has now renounced her Christian faith and is experimenting with other spiritualist interests.

The point is, when are we going to learn? Satan is also at work. Had Mr. Gibson run off with a woman not his wife, Hollywood and the

rest of American culture barely have blinked. We would have pointed out the inconsistency of this action with his recent religious filmmaking, but then we would have moved on.

Immorality is an everyday occurrence in Hollywood and for that matter everywhere else too. But Mr Gibson stepped over a currently sensitive line.

The Executive Director will consider all relevant information pertaining to whether the applicant meets the requirements of the general permit and will issue a written determination as to any final action on the notice of intent for coverage under the general permit.

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Social Security notes Safeguard your SSN

TX In a time when identity fraud is a major concern, Social Security is working hard to protect your Social Security number.

Our efforts are focused on preventing anyone with criminal intent from using false or stolen birth records to get a Social Security number.

A new law, which went into effect last December, requires, for example, specific proofs of the age, identity and citizenship of anyone applying for either a new or replacement Social Security

Also, all documents used as proofs of age, identity or citizenship must be either originals or copies certified by the issuing agency. We cannot accept photocopies or notarized copies of documents.

Even before the most recent law, additional steps had been taken to protect Social Security numbers.

For example, Social Security numbers have been removed from all benefit checks, and now only the last digits of Social Security numbers are used on such mailings as the annual Social Security Statement.

This ensures that if someone should steal your mail, he or she would not also be able to steal your number.But protecting your Social Security number is still a joint effort.

Here are just a few things you can do:

You should keep your Social Security card in a safe place with your other important papers.

Do not carry it with you unless you need to show it to an employer or service provider.

> You should be very careful about sharing your number and card to protect against misuse of your number. Giving your number is voluntary even when you are asked for the number directly.

If requested, you should ask why your number is needed, and how your number will be used.

Cotton moved higher on the week as US crop conditions deteriorated further, exports shot higher and certificated stocks moved lower for the second consecutive week.

The potential for higher prices surfaced in late winter when it became apparent that West Texas had little to no subsoil moisture and long range weather models called for the Texas problems to spread east throughout the cotton belt.

Weather conditions actually deteriorated more than had been expected and, coupled with stronger than forecast U.S. exports, both U.S. and world carry over stocks have been reduced beyond expectations.

These factors, taken together with certificated stocks showing a tendency to decline, the technical picture brightened and speculative funds have been consistent buyers, pushing the market higher.

Yet, the weather meltdown for cotton will carry prices higher during the year. USDA field enumerators were in cotton fields on August 1 and the supply demand report will give us the first objective yield estimates for

Additionally, the market will also get its first look at USDA's acreage abandonment level. Abandonment in Texas will be the key more so than the yield. However, most states are facing declining yields due to this season's heat and drought. In July USDA projected the U.S. crop at 20.5 million bales. Industry estimates have the crop generally at 19.5 million bales. Yet, there are a couple estimates out there that are below 18.0 million bales! However, whether it is this report or one in some ensuing months, I look for U.S. production to be closer to 18.5 million bales. The smaller U.S. crop will result in a reduced world production and a reduction in U.S.

exports. USDA's current U.S. export estimate for 2006-07 is 16.6 million bales, about one million below what the final tally for U.S. exports will be for 2005-06. However, given the drastic decline in the U.S. crop, exports will likely fall within the 15.5 to 16.1 million bale range.

The U.S. will experience a significant drop in carry over stocks during the current year. This will add support to the market throughout the year.

Net export sales for the week ending July 27, the last full week of the 2005-06 marketing were 50,800 bales. Shipments for the week were a marketing year high of 598,800 bales.

With a four day week remaining before the export shipments book is closed for the marketing year, net exports, in statistical 480 pound bales, will likely climb to 17.6 million bales, or 600,000 bales more than the USDA's estimate last month. No doubt, next week's supply demand report will be bullish.


However, that begs the question; will trading during the first four days of the weekfully discount the report?

That is the answer we all wish we knew. Likely however, the market is expecting a U.S. crop of 19.5 million bales.

An estimate of 19.3 million or below would likely push the market above the pre report trading level. Likewise, an estimate above 19.7 million bales would likely pull

Either way, U.S. stocks are moving lower and the longer term outlook for New York futures is higher. It is far too early to price the 2006 crop, unless you did so several months ago-above the 60 cent level. It will return.

Attorney General warns part of W. Texas after floods

Home repair, chairty, flood damaged car ploys are common in the aftermath of storm

AUSTIN - Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott today warned El Pasoans and other West Texas communities to be wary of flyby-night contractors and other scam artists who might try to take advantage of homeowners and other consumers during the ongoing flooding and its aftermath.

"Our thoughts and prayers are with the people of West Texas and the challenges they face as many seek safety for their families and protection of their property," said Attorney General Abbott. "My office will move aggressively against anyone who seeks to make a fast buck by exploiting those who are now suffering and who in the coming days will be picking up the pieces the storms left behind."

Attorney General Abbott praised those who are now helping less fortunate El Pasoans whose homes and businesses are flooded. However, he also pointed to the possibility of scams that, unfortunately, often appear during and shortly after a natural disaster. He offered consumers the following tips:

Home repairs. Be wary of contractors who show up unexpectedly at your door and offer to do roof, drywall and other major repairs, especially if they are not from your community and low-ball their offer saying that they have material left over from a previous job and insist on being paid in cash and up front.

You should first obtain bids in writing from several contractors and review each one carefully. Ask the contractor if they are covered through insurance or a bond, particularly if you hired them for a large project. You should also check with the city to make sure electricians and plumbers with whom you are considering a contract have the necessary license and have obtained the required permits.

Get all terms in writing and do not sign a contract you do not understand or which has spaces left blank. Pay the contractor only as the work progresses, and do not sign a completion certificate until you are satisfied that all repairs were done properly. If the work is substantial, you

might consider having an independent inspector look it over before you settle the bill with the contractor.

Before hiring a contractor, contact city officials, the Better Business Bureau and the Office of the Attorney General to find out if consumers have filed complaints against them in the past.

Charity scams. Be wary of telemarketers, solicitations by mail, or those who show up unexpectedly at your doorstep urging you to make an immediate donation to a charity with which you are not familiar and which supposedly will aid victims of the disaster. A legitimate charity will offer detailed information in writing about how your money will be used and will give you the time you need to make your decision.

Be particularly suspicious of solicitors who are long on emotion but short on detail about how your donation will be put to use. Always make the donation using a check or money order made out to the charity, and be wary of organizations with names that are very similar but not identical to those of a recognized charity.

Flood damaged cars. Often, flood damaged cars are written off as totaled by insurance companies and are destined to be used as scrap. However, scam artists regularly purchase these vehicles, do some engine repairs and refurbish the interior, and offer them for sale without disclosing the serious damage caused when they were submerged. These vehicles can be very dangerous to drive. In the coming months, El Pasoans should be particularly careful when purchasing used cars and should have a trusted mechanic inspect the vehicle before signing a contract and paying any money.
