WASHINGTON, March 3.-Preminary estimates indicate that returns to cotton growers from marketings of the 1943 crop of lint and cotton seed will average about \$62 an acre of cotton harvested. This will be the third highest cash return to growers on record. This level was exceeded only in 1919 when the return averaged \$69 an acre, and in 1942 when they averaged \$63 an acre.
