EYES AND EARS.

Says Paul W. White, director of public affairs for the Columbia Broadcasting System: "The basic difference between newspaper and radio presentation of the news is that we have only a front page—the listeners must accept our judgment as to what is news. They can't turn the pages and see what is inside.

The American people are probably the most news-hungry people on earth. Like the ancient Athenians, they are al ways seeking to learn "some new things." Modern radio broadcasting contributes notably to that end. But the wonderful development of radio so far has been limited, as far as news is concerned.

It can provide the headline news and the "spot news But only when big events are brewing, and people are listening particularly to learn what is occurring at the moment, can radio voices give anything approaching a full presentation. Their news technique confines them to the invisible front page and headlines.

The newspaper, coming a little later, presents the full picture. It is more accurate, more complete, more discriminating, and it gives the passing scene to the eye in permanent form.

JAPAN'S NEW ALLY.

The Japanese can do big things, too. They are now changing the course of China's Yellow River to shorten their defense lines by 500 miles







Navy bombs are equipped with delicate automatic fuses which have little propellers that start whirling when the bomb is drop-ped. After falling about 500 feet it unscrews the mechanism and a plunger falls into firing position ready to explode the bomb when & ships it hits the target.




