ACCIDENT CLAIMS LIFE OF WAR VETERAN



Pfc. John H. Bryan died Thursday, July 18, at Loretta Hospital at Dalhart, Texas, from injuries received in a truck accident which occurred Monday, July 15, about 22 miles northwest of Dalhart. Pfc. Bryan, with his wife, the former Eula Jean Adams, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. J. Bryan, and other relatives, were enroute to the Bryan home 25 miles northwest of Dalhart when the accident occurred. The truck in which the group was riding overturned when the right front wheel ran off. Mrs. Soever, a sister of Pfc. Bryan, was driving the truck and riding with her in the cab were his wife and his mother. Pfc. Bryan was riding in the back of the truck with his father, his brother, David Bryan, and a cousin, Henry Bryan. All occupants of the truck were thrown clear except Pfc. Bryan and his father. The elderly Mr. Bryan only received minor injuries in the accident while his son received internal injuries which proved fatal.

Pfc. Bryan was born at Mangum, Okla., moving to Texas with his parents while still a child. He was married to Miss Eula Jean Adams June 17, 1944, at Clayton, N. M., at which time his home was at Matador. He enlisted in the U. S. Infantry September 19, 1944, and received his training at Camp Wolters, Texas. Pfc. Bryan served in the Pacific war zone where he saw active service in the Philippines, and later was a member of the occupation forces in Japan. He returned to the States June 28, after serving overseas for fifteen months. At the time of the accident he was spending a ninety day furlough visiting relatives, as he had recently re-enlisted for another year's service.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday at 4:00 p. m. from the Dimmitt Church of Christ, with the pastor, Bro. D. C. Lawrence, officiating. Interment was made in the Dimmitt cemetery.

Honorary pallbearers were G. L. Willis and Joe Butler.

Active pallbearers were Roy Bussey, Franklin Smith, W. R. Mears, Gene Hutchinson, Jess Hutchinson, and Jack Hutchinson, all ex-service men with the exception of Jack Hutchinson.

Deceased is survived by his wife, his parents, five sisters and two brothers.

NATIONAL FARM SAFETY WEEK

July 1 to July 27 is National Farm Safety Week. The campaign to stop accidents and fires on the farm is extremely important, for many reasons. First farming has one of the highest accident rates of all occupations. Every farmer performs a wide variety of tasks, most of which involves serious accident hazards. The National Safety Council estimates that more than 16,000 farm people were killed and 1,500,000 injured by accident in 1945. Second, farmers generally are not covered by workers' compensation laws, as are most workers in industry. A serious accident may cause untold hardship to a farm family. Third, accidents can be prevented. The present unnecessary high accident rate on farms can, over a period of time, be very substantially reduced provided each family rid itself of accident hazards.

A PROCLAMATION
By the President of the United States

WHEREAS an increased supply of food is vitally needed to promote peace and happiness in the postwar world; and

WHEREAS farm accidents rob the nation of thousands of lives and millions of dollars worth of food and other property each year; and

WHEREAS experience in previous observances of National Farm Safety Week has clearly shown the necessity and benefits of a coordinated and constant educational farm-safety program:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, HARRY S. TRUMAN, President of the United States of America, do hereby call upon the Nation to observe the week commencing July 21, 1946, as National Farm Safety Week.

And I request all persons and organizations concerned with agriculture and farm life to do everything in their power to discover and publish the facts about farm accidents, and to develop practical safety programs which people everywhere can

into direct action against which daily threaten their safety and happiness. As a start I suggest that the people of the country observe National Farm Safety Week by to eliminate at least one day until their farms are safe. They can possibly make the difference between life and death.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States of America to be affixed.

DONE at the City of Washington this twenty-sixth day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and forty-six, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and seventieth.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negatively interpreting the meaning of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all debts allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and repairing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945, for the purpose of providing for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each county; and the percentage allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Section 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT SUBJECT TO LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATION, ALLOCATION AND DIRECTION ALL NET REVENUES DERIVED FROM THE TAXES, EXCEPT GROSS PRODUCTION AND AD VALOREM TAXES, LEVIED ON MOTOR FUELS AND LUBRICANTS AND MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATION FEES SHALL BE USED FOR THE SOLE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING RIGHTS-OF-WAY FOR AND CONSTRUCTING AND MAINTAINING PUBLIC ROADWAYS; FOR THE ADMINISTRATION OF LAWS PERTAINING TO TRAFFIC AND SAFETY; AND FOR THE PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST ON COUNTY AND ROAD DISTRICT BONDS OR WARRANTS VOTED OR ISSUED PRIOR TO JANUARY 2, 1939, AND DECLARED ELIGIBLE FOR DEBT SERVICE PRIOR TO JANUARY 2, 1945; PROVIDING THAT ONE-FOURTH (1/4) OF SUCH NET REVENUE FROM THE MOTOR FUEL TAX SHALL BE ALLOCATED TO THE AVAILABLE SCHOOL FUND; PROVIDING AND INSURING THAT EACH COUNTY SHALL NEVER DERIVE LESS REVENUE FROM MOTOR REGISTRATION FEES THAN THE MAXIMUM AMOUNTS AND PERCENTAGES OF SUCH FEES ALLOWED TO BE RETAINED BY EACH COUNTY UNDER THE LAWS IN EFFECT JANUARY 1, 1945; NEGATIVELY INTERPRETING THE MEANING OF THIS AMENDMENT AS AUTHORIZING THE PLEDGING OF THE STATE'S CREDIT FOR ANY PURPOSE."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the proclamation of election and the publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State, providing that the amount contributed by the State to such fund shall be equal to the amount contributed by the appointive officers and employees of the State; and providing for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945, for the purpose of providing for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; negatively interpreting the meaning of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows: "The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937." Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1946, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE"; and "AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE." Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state. Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.
