Million Gardens Is National Goal

The goal of three quarters of a million home gardens in Texas, previously announced for 1946, has been upped to a full million by C. R. Heaton, horticulturist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension.

The upward revision points out the need for home production of vegetables at a level equal to that of the war years and reflects the critical world food situation.

The appeal to Texas home gardeners to plant an additional 250,000 gardens came after M. L. Wilson, director of the Federal Extension Service, called upon the Texas Director, Ide P. Trotter, to again put into effect wartime policies of home food production.

Dr. Trotter has instructed all county agricultural and home demonstration agents to make home gardening a major activity. He said recent developments in the world food situation are such that food will be as critical an item, if not more so, than during any year of the war.

Phillipine Veteran Here For Visit

Major Walker is a veteran of the Phillipine campaign and was captured on Bataan. He was among the American prisoners who made the ill-fated death march. Walker suffered the hardships and dangers experienced by so many American soldiers taken prisoner by the Japs. While being transferred from the Phillipines to Formosa the Jap ship, on which he was a prisoner, was sunk by an American submarine and only 250 of the 1600 prisoners survived.

DAN COOK, BACK FROM ARMY SERVICE, ENTERS RACE FOR JUDGE IN 64th DISTRICT

Dan M. Cook of Plainview, this week authorized the News to print the following announcement concerning his candidacy for district judge in the 64th judicial district, subject to the Democratic primary: "I recognize the fact that I am at considerable disadvantage in this campaign because of my inability usual time, because of my four year's absence from the district, during which time many voters have moved into the district and many have attained voting maturity; but I shall see as many of you as time and a '36 model automobile will permit and personally appeal to you for consideration.

These pigs competed for Champion Poland China and Tommy's pig won and competed against the other 4 Breed Champions to win the Grand Championship of the Show. Both of the pigs in the Poland China Class were bred by Frank Huseman, Registered Poland China breeder of Nazareth.

Tommy's pig weighed 223 pounds and sold for \$1.20 per pound to W. P. Martin, breeder and founder of Martin's Milo Maize, bringing \$267.60 plus \$15.00 premium money, and he was presented a \$25.00 loving cup by the Panhandle Poland China Breeders Association.

ATOM BOMBS MAY DO WHAT JAP NAVY COULDN'T!

THEY'LL feel the destructive force of the atomic bomb! Here are seven of the 97 target ships to be tested in Operation "Crossroads," atomic bomb tests scheduled for May and July. The scene will be Bikini Atoll in the Marshall Island group.

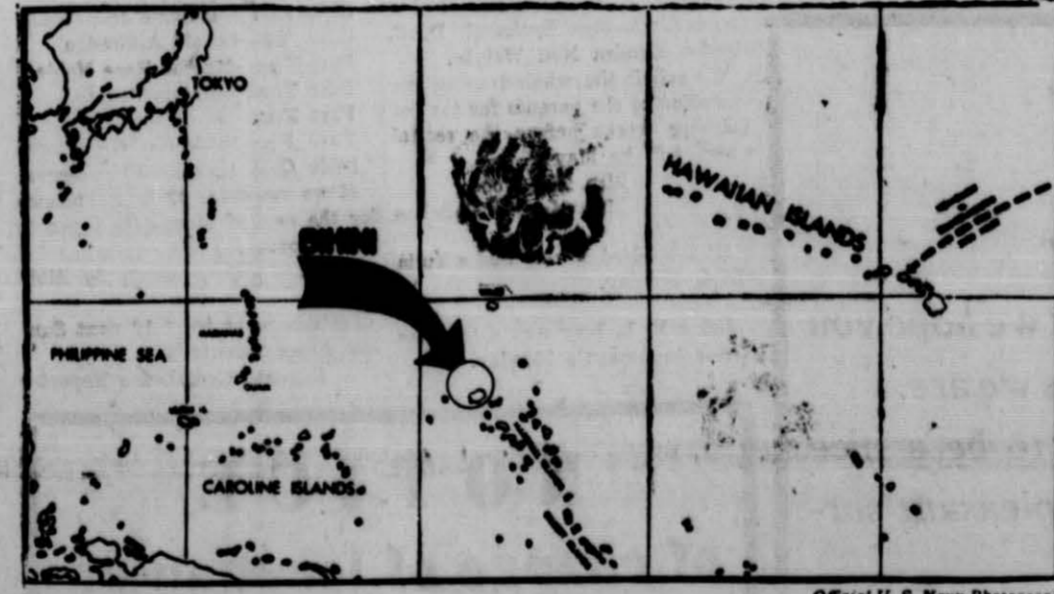
The tests will be conducted by an Army-Navy-Civilian group under the Navy's Vice Admiral W. H. P. Blandy. In early May, an A-bomb will be exploded above the ships, followed by a surface test in early July, and a deep-water explosion later. Total personnel strength for

the operation will reach 37,000, the Navy crews of the operating and target ships constituting the majority. This is the first of a series of layouts on ships of the target unit. Represented here are each of the combatant-type ships to be used in the tests.

The Prince Eugen, second of the Admiral Hipper class of heavy cruisers built by the Germans for use in World War II, fought several important actions in the Atlantic, Baltic Sea, and English Channel, including the engagement in 1941 which resulted in the sinking of the Elsmarck. She also accompanied the German battleships Scharnhorst and Gneisenau in their flight from the English Channel in 1942, escaping to Norway. The vessel was later damaged several times by bombs and torpedoes, but has been out to repair for the coming Bikini test.

Bikini Atoll, Central Pacific, where the tests will be conducted. Bikini is in the perimeter of the Marshall Islands, bitterly contested chain of islands wrested from the Japanese early in the war.

Battle-veteran of the Pacific the Sims-class destroyer USS Arizona has a distinguished record based on participation in the Battle of Midway, Coral Sea, and Guadalcanal. She was damaged at Taron, Guadalcanal, Kuvshinov, Kiska, and Guadalcanal. She was damaged more than 1,000 officers and men from the sinking service. The Arizona was damaged heavily twice during the war, by kamikaze and torpedoes.

Arizona, oldest in the Navy today, is one of two carriers to undergo the tests. The Arizona, sunk by the Japanese, has been in 17 major engagements or air strikes. Guadalcanal to the final blow against the Japanese home islands. She was damaged by the heaviest Kamikaze attack on a steel ship to that date.

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 22 AN ORDINANCE REPEALING ORDINANCES NOS. 8 AND 22 AND ANY OTHER ORDINANCES THAT CONFLICT WITH THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE.

SECTION I

That Ordinances Nos. 8 and 22, and any other ordinances and resolutions that conflict with the terms and conditions of this ordinance are hereby repealed and in lieu thereof a new ordinance governing electrical installations in the City of Dimmitt, Texas, is hereby adopted.

SECTION II

Administration. There is hereby created the office of Electrical Inspector, which office shall be filled by a competent person of good moral character who shall be well versed in the approved methods of electrical installation for the protection of life and property, and shall be capable of passing an examination as a Master Electrician.

SECTION III

License, Fees. (a) DEFINITION OF TERMS: The term "Person" shall mean and include partnership, associations and corporations, however formed. The term "Master Electrician" shall mean one who is an expert in the knowledge of quality of material and workmanship for perfect electrical installations, who holds in full self out as intending to do the actual work of such installations, and who is not in any master transferable, and all such certificates are revocable for sufficient cause shown, upon the filing of written charges under oath to the City Commission whose decision shall be final.

SECTION IV

REQUIREMENTS FOR SERVICE CONNECTIONS. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation engaged in the erection, erecting or altering material, wiring, fixtures or other apparatus to be used for the generation, transmission and utilization of electricity for lights, heat and power, shall at all times have in their employ a licensed Master Electrician or Journeyman Electrician, who shall be duly appointed.

SECTION V

REQUIREMENTS FOR SERVICE CONNECTIONS. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation engaged in the erection, erecting or altering material, wiring, fixtures or other apparatus to be used for the generation, transmission and utilization of electricity for lights, heat and power, shall at all times have in their employ a licensed Master Electrician or Journeyman Electrician, who shall be duly appointed.

SECTION VI

EXEMPTIONS. Nothing in this ordinance shall apply to: (a) TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH COMPANIES: The electrical inspector shall not apply to maintenance and repairs on the premises of a person, firm or corporation who is engaged in the maintenance and repairs of their wires or other equipment used in connection with their business or plant.

SECTION VI. EXEMPTIONS. Nothing in this ordinance shall apply to: (a) TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH COMPANIES: The electrical inspector shall not apply to maintenance and repairs on the premises of a person, firm or corporation who is engaged in the maintenance and repairs of their wires or other equipment used in connection with their business or plant.

SECTION VII. VIOLATIONS AND PENALTIES. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than TEN AND NO MORE THAN FIFTY DOLLARS, nor more than ONE HUNDRED AND NO MORE THAN FIFTY DOLLARS and each day that any person, firm or corporation shall continue to violate or fail to comply with any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be considered a separate offense.

SECTION VIII. APPEAL FROM BOARD. If the candidate feels that he has not been fairly dealt with by the Board, he may appeal to the City Commission. When he has been able to establish to the satisfaction of the City Commission that he should have further re-examination touching on his fitness and qualifications as a Master Electrician or Journeyman Electrician as defined by the Code of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, he shall be permitted to re-examine before the Board.

SECTION IX. REPEALING AND AMENDING. It shall be the duty of the Board of Electrical Examiners to meet as soon after their appointment as possible and organize by selecting one of their members as Chairman. The Electrical Inspector shall act as secretary and shall keep a full record of proceedings of the Board. It shall be the duty of the Board, from time to time as it may deem proper, to submit to the City Commission its written suggestions for the improvement of the electrical ordinances of the City of Dimmitt.
