DIMMITT FIRE DEPARTMENT IS REORGANIZED TUESDAY

The Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Department was reorganized Tues day night when a group of public ited men gathered at the City Hall in answer to a call made by Fire Marshal Glenn Smith. The thirty members enrolled in the Fire Department reelected Smith as their Chief and Earl Hembree was lected Secretary. Following organization procedure the group voted to send Fire Marshall Smith as their representative to College Station for a week's Fireman's Course sponsored by the State Fire Insurance Commission. Arangements were also made for the Department to have fire fighting drill and practo have fire righting drill and practice at least twice each month. The department also voted to sponsor the Plucket Tent Show, which will be in Dimmitt July 18, 19 and 20, in order to raise funds for the or-

organized Fire Department was greatly enhanced last week when the City acquired possession of a 1942 model Fire Truck, complete with the latest fire fighting equipment. The new truck, formerly used at the Hereford Prisoner of War Camp, was purchased from the War Assets Administration for \$2,619.00, which was estimated as one-third of its original cost.

The City Commission is urging the citizenship of the city to eooperate with the Fire Department, which is composed of men who contribute their time, effort, and brave the ever present hazards of fighing fire to protect public property. The public is especially warned against driving over fire hose, and to stay at a safe distance when fire fighting or practice by the department is in progress.
