BRANDED AS LIAR.

WASHINGTON, June 20. — Senator Millard E. Tydings (Dem.) of Maryland accused Drew Pearson, columnist, from the senate floor of attempting blackmail, and of having had affiliations with one of the great gambling rackets in America. The senator's remarks were made in terms of a recent Pearson column, referring to Tydings' visit in the Philippine Islands with the Philippine Commission, as "a tissue of lies from beginning to end."

AIR GROUP RECORD.

WASHINGTON, June 20. — Air Group 84, in a five-month Pacific combat tour, hung up a record of 231 enemy aircraft destroyed and 169,000 tons of enemy shipping sunk or damaged. The Navy said Wednesday the group, now home for rest and reassignment, flew 6,000 combat sorties, including strikes against Japanese home industries and airfields.

SOCKS AND CIGARETS.

ARLINGTON, June 20. — Nylon stockings sold for \$250 in war bonds and cigarets were purchased at \$1600 a carton in a Seventh War Loan rally. Governor Vetoes Free Votes For Soldier Bill

AUSTIN, June 20. — Gov. Coke R. Stevenson today vetoed a bill passed by the 49th legislature giving members of the Armed Forces the right to vote in 1945 and 1946 without payment of the poll tax on the theory the bill violates several sections of the constitution.

WIDE-OPEN DISCUSSION.

The veto question, biggest stumbling block in the work of the San Francisco Conference, has now been settled with the approval of 30 United Nations. That its solution is not entirely satisfactory to all is shown by the fact that two voted against it and fifteen of the countries did not vote at all, but the decision is still a victory for the Charter.

It is easy to see why many smaller countries objected to complete veto power for the Big Five in the Security Council. It has not been so easy to understand why they accepted the apparently slight concession of Russia as enough.

Frederick A. Sterbenz, foreign editor of the Cleveland Press, has a possible explanation. He feels that the importance of Russia's concession lies in its evidence of the tremendous power of world opinion. It was the weight of

that opinion which persuaded the Russians to yield what they considered their right to veto discussions of any security problem by the Council. Now, once a problem reaches the Council, it will be aired. And the world, informed of the danger, can if it wishes bring to bear so mighty a pressure for peace that the aggressor may not dare to go against it.

Thus, the wedge which has seemed so small may yet prove capable of holding the door against future wars.

UNCLE SAM'S NEPHEWS.

Europe before the last war, says Hamilton Fish Armstrong, editor of "Foreign Affairs," tended to regard the United States "as an emigrant uncle who had made a fortune in distant parts and who, like all rich persons, required polite treatment, but who never expected to return to the old country, never needed to be

consulted in the family councils and never would take part in the family feuds.

Much the same view was held between wars by many Americans. They now know that while Uncle Sam is of great importance to his relatives abroad, they in turn are not ne'er-do-well nephews, trying to work their uncle, but are self-respecting property

owners on their own account.

DON'T GIVE UP AT 45!

Where is the man over 45 to find a job? This old question has a new answer: Baseball, if he has any talent for it. Charlie Root, who starred 15 years ago for the Chicago Cubs, is still pitching at 46. He is manager of the Columbus, Ohio, American Association team, and as such puts himself in the box on Sun-

days. So far he has won four games and lost only one, showing that there is life yet in the old arm.

Jim O'Rourke, who played in his 50's for Bridgeport, Conn., was elected not long ago to baseball's Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, N. Y. Unless the war ends quickly, O'Rourke and Root will find their records challenged by others who in different times would find the competition too severe.

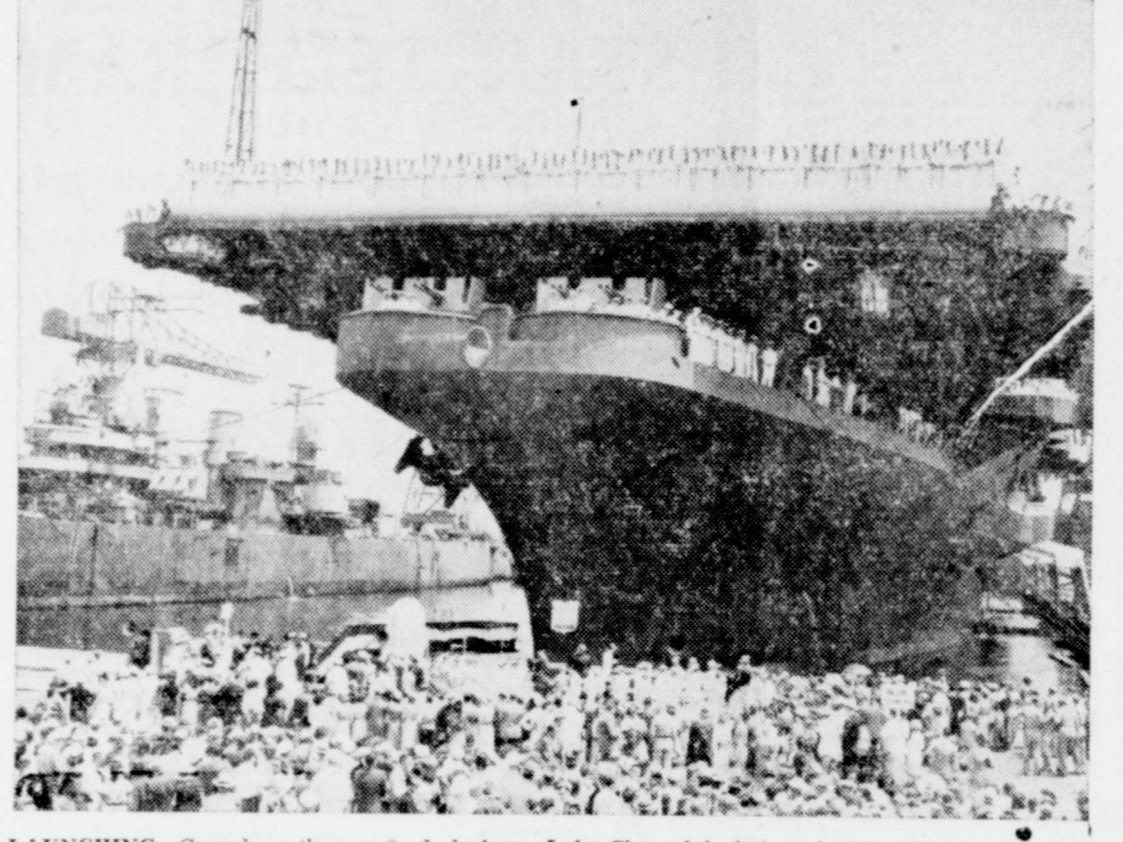
