Mustang Stampede Ruins Bobcats' Bi-District Hopes

It looked for a while Friday night like the Dimmitt Bobcats might win themselves a bi-district championship if they could hold onto their 12-8 lead over the Olton Mustangs. But a 61 yard Olton pass in the last six minutes was good for a touchdown and shoved the Mustangs into a lead the Bobcats could not overcome.

The game ended with the score Dimmitt 12, Olton 15 and Dimmitt's hopes for state playoffs fell out of the saddle for another year. The game was as tight as the

score indicated, although Dimmitt led in most departments. The Bobcats hammered out 17 first downs to Olton's 16 and they also racked up more total yardage than Olton, 327 to 243. Of Dimmitt's total of 305 net yards rushing, workhorse fullback Junior Coffey must have set some sort of record as he ground out 253 of these yards by himself on 34 carries. Coffey scored both Dimmitt touchdowns in the tension-packed game before more than 3,000 spectators, although he was seriously hampered by cramps.

Dimmitt's other backs had a hard time moving against Olton. The fast, cagy Mustangs could handle everything except Coffey's bruising power drives — and he almost made them pay off in a bi-district title.

Olton had their own basher in the form of 190-pounder Robert Priest who picked up a respectable 82 yards in 21 carries — most of which were made when the Mustangs needed them the most.

Paced by Coffey and Mike Good, win, the Bobcat defense was able to hold off any serious Olton scoring threats until the fatal and spectacular pass to tail Fred Riney of Olton put the Mustangs again in the lead.

Grand Jury Hears Record 18 Cases

Mrs. Beverly Ann Pelletier was acquitted of charges of murder Monday by the Castro County Grand Jury. She had been charged in connection with the shooting death on August 4th of her stepfather Clarence Levi Keenom, 34, of Nazareth.

Also no-billed by the Grand Jury, which heard a record 18 charges, was Richard G. Smith, who had been held on a charge of theft when he was unable to return a truck on time.

Also to come before the grand jury was a charge against Daniel Rosas for rape of a minor. He was indicted and bail was set at \$3,000. Felix Rojas was true billed for theft by bailee of a car belonging to J.W. Carmichael on June 25th. His bail was set at \$1,500.

Joe B. Tarpley, presently in jail at Snyder, was indicted on three different charges of forgery in Dimmitt. Bail was set at \$2,000. Demetrio Rodriguez was charged with rape and bail was set at \$3,000. His whereabouts are unknown.

Another man who has left the country was charged with theft for taking a school bus and a trailer house which were mortgaged. He is Daniel L. Walker and his bail was set at \$1,250.

District Court Hears Five Guilty Pleas Tuesday

The District Court heard five pleas of guilty Tuesday.

Hollis Gordon Westerman was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary for driving while intoxicated on the 27th of September. He has served time for the same thing before.

Mitchell Smith Jr., pleaded guilty to giving a \$25 forged check and was sentenced to 3 years. The sentence was probated.

Rudolph Val Verde was given three years in the penitentiary for theft of an automobile from Don Rue on September 2.

Eulor Lee Knight, who reportedly has spent most of his life behind bars, was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary for theft of a car on September 7 from James Slough.

Clearance Cox and Carl Scroggins were charged with theft of sixteen cases of beer from Vincent Pohlmer of Nazareth. Cox pled guilty and received two years in the pen. Scroggins is being held in Plainview on a theft charge.

Short Course In Arc Welding Here Next Week

"A farm welding short course for adult farmers will be held November 28-29-30, December 1 and 5 under the sponsorship of the Dimmitt High School Vocational Agricultural Department, according to Mr. Hilburn, superintendent and Mr. Seale and Jim Dowty, teachers of vocational agriculture.

Mr. Joel Barton, welding specialist with the Vocational Agricultural Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A & M College, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A & M College.

Mr. Barton is a native of Glasscock County, Texas, and was reared on a west Texas ranch. He attended grade school in Sar Angelo and graduated from high school at Big Lake, Texas. He holds a B.S. degree in animal husbandry from Texas A & M. After five years as a pilot in the US Air Force, Mr. Barton served as an agricultural specialist in Texas State hospitals and special schools. In addition to regular classes, he set up farm shops and gave instruction in farm welding and general farm repair.

"Many welding short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Barton and all have met with outstanding success," according to Walter LeBay, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Plainview, Texas. Arrangements for the adult education short course in welding and in other fields are made through Mr. LeBay's office.

The short course at Dimmitt is scheduled to begin November 28 at 7:30 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of 5 will be held November 29, 30 and December 1 and 2. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Barton will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Mr. Seale.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Hilburn, or the teachers of vocational agriculture, Mr. Seale or Mr. Dowty. An entry fee of \$5 will be charged. Farm Welding Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Barton states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled (See Welding, Page 4)



The White Kicler radish is holding—but burdened down with the biggest radish ever grown in these parts. It's still probably the biggest radish ever grown in any part of the state. The radish, which Haydon says, is as solid as any radish. It measures 11 inches long and 11 inches around. Total length of the big plant is 15 inches and it weighs two pounds. This isn't a freak either—it's just one of a lot of big ones grown on the Haydon farm.

Woodrow Killingsworth Attended Convention as Local Delegate

Woodrow Killingsworth, local delegate from attending the Texas State Teachers' Association convention in Dallas, Texas, November 18-20.

5000 delegates and visitors were present.

Dr. Calvin H. Reed of the University of Nevada at Reno, national chairman of parent and family life education, was the National Congress representative. In his talk, according to Mrs. Killingsworth, he stressed the fact that the future will be more difficult and will require a higher degree of competency than living today.

A convention highlight was an address on "What's Right With Families Today" by Dr. Evelyn Mills Duvall of Chicago, noted author, lecturer and family life consultant. She made the following points: Families aren't what they used to be. In many ways they are far better and stronger than ever. They are the hope of the free world, for out of them comes the

Men and women of tomorrow. Instead of scolding, blaming, and "viewing with alarm," let's be honest about our families today, give them credit where credit is due, and help them become strong enough for the tremendous task that is theirs as the central unit of society upon which our future rests.

In her dialogue later with Dr. Reed on "What Kind of Parents Promote Character Development," the following ideas were brought out:

Family life education is an urgent necessity today for all members of the family as they work out new ways of living together. It's harder to make a fine person than it is to make a light biscuit.

Col. John A. Powers of the Space Task Group, Langley Field, Va., was in charge of a program on "Challenges of the Space Age." Highlights included a film on his "Man-in-space program, Project Mercury."

Afterward, a panel composed of Dr. Reed, Mrs. Danforth, Dr. Irvy Carruth, superintendent of Austin Public Schools, and Mrs. Lucille J. Martin of San Antonio, state chairman of education for family living discussed "The family in the Astro-Space Age."

One afternoon was taken up with "Ages and Stages" workshops, directed by Dr. C.H. Dent of the University of Texas and state chairman of workshops. Emphasis was upon basic human needs and characteristics of various age groups with implications for the P.T.A.

Dr. John Keltner of St. Louis, Mo., was moderator of a panel titled, "Let's Listen," composed of pupils from five Austin schools. He also assisted with the workshops, with audience participation, and in a summary of the convention with Mrs. Dent and Reed.

Mrs. Killingsworth stated that she was very appreciative to the Dimmitt Parent Teachers Association for making it possible for her to attend the convention.


