Limitations On E and H Bonds Much Higher

Howard E. Farmer, Chairman of the U.S. Savings Bonds volunteer committee for Callahan County, today arged bond buyers to take advantage of the new higher annual limitations on holdings of E and H Bonds which have been announced by the Treasury Department. The new regulations provide that eligible purchasers may own up to \$20,000 maturity value, in Series E Bonds bought in any one calendar year, and \$30,000 face value, in H Bonds. Previous limits were \$10,000 and \$20,000

Should Change Name On Social Security Card Also

With the month of June approaching -- the most popular month for brides -- R. R. Tuley Miller of Abilene Granville Gibbs | Jr., district manager of social security in Abilene, has an announcement for all the June brides-to-be in his district.

"If you have a social security account number card, be sure to notify your social security office when you change your name. A new card will be issued showing your new name with the same account number. and the social security records will be changed to show your new name.

"There are some 150 million individual accounts in the social security records. Your earnings record is kept according to your name and your social security number, and we want to make sure you get credit for your work," Tuley said.






