Sam Gilberts Are Seriously Burned In Butane Blast

Mr. and Mrs. J. C. (Sam) Gilbert were seriously burned in a butane blast at their home south of Dimmitt early Tuesday morning. The accident occurred about 7:00 o'clock when Mr. Gilbert, standing at the head of the basement stairs, closed a switch to start a pressure pump that furnished water for the home. It is believed that a spark from the ignition system to the pump ignited an accumulation of butane gas in the basement which had leaked during the night through an open jet on a stove. The blast blew the stairway door, and door facing, loose from the wall engulfing Mr. Gilbert, and Mrs. Gilbert who was preparing the morning meal, in flames. Mr. Gilbert sustained severe burns about the head and hands while Mrs. Gilbert was severely burned over a large portion of her body as her clothing was ignited by the blast. They were rushed to the Plains Memorial Hospital for treatment, where Mrs. Gilbert is in a very serious condition. Mr. Gilbert burns, although severe, are responding satisfactorily to treatment.

The two little sons of Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert were fortunately still in bed, and their bedroom door was closed when the blast occurred, consequently they escaped without injury from the accident.

Neighbors summoned to the Gilbert home extinguished the fire that was smoldering in the basement before any appreciable damage was done to the property.

Services were conducted in the Dimmitt First Baptist Church with Elder E. L. Edwards, pastor of the Springlake Primitive Baptist Church, officiating, assisted by Elders Jarrett and Handley. Mr. Burch was a member of the Springlake church. Interment was made in the Dimmitt cemetery under the direction of the Black Funeral Home of Hereford.

Mr. Burch, one of Castro County's oldest pioneers, was born May 23, 1861, in Georgia. He was married to Laura E. Manning May 11, 1882. They came to Texas and settled at Washburn in 1889 and moved to Castro county in 1900, locating on a farm south of Dimmitt and had resided there since that time.

Deceased is survived by his wife, one son, George Burch, two daughters, Mrs. Fannie Shive and Mrs. Mattie Turner, all of Dimmitt. Also surviving are nine grand children and ten great grand children.

Pallbearers were four grand sons and two grand sons-in-law.

Included among the flower girls were four grand daughters and four great grand daughters.

WARNING TO PREVENT AGAINST SUMMER DISEASES GIVEN

This is the season when dysentery, diarrhea and "summer complaint" are most prevalent throughout the State, and Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a warning to parents of young children regarding the prevention of these diseases.

"The chief cause of these intestinal diseases are impure milk, water and food; allowing a child to become overheated; using too much sugar and cream in the diet; and under- or over-feeding," Dr. Cox said. "All foods should be fresh and clean, and left-overs should be properly refrigerated to prevent spoilage."

Dr. Cox said definitely that when a feeding formula for infants is used, it should be prescribed by a physician and then prepared with extreme care, especially in regard to cleanliness and refrigeration. Babies should be fed at regular intervals and on definite schedule. Their stomach and bowels can become easily upset if they are fed haphazardly whenever they happen to be fretful or restless.

The State Health Officer declared that with dysentery, as with many other diseases, the fly is an agent of transmission, and every home should be well-screened and free of flies.

"If diarrhea or dysentery develops, consult a physician at once," Dr. Cox advised. "This so-called 'summer complaint' can become a very serious menace to your baby's health, if not an actual threat to his life."

District Swim Meet Planned For Scouts

According to an announcement by District Scout officials a District Swim meet will be held for the Tule and Dan Beard Districts at the American Legion pool in Plainview on July 31 and August 1-2. The first two days will be devoted to instructions and the actual competition will take place on Aug. 2.

All local scouts who plan to attend the meet are urged to contact their Scoutmaster Maurice Foust, as soon as possible in order that he may notify the District officials of the number that will attend.

Fertilizing Pays Big Dividends

Since potato harvest is under way in the county results of fertilizers are being reported to the County Agent's office.

J. N. Burgin of R. 3, Hereford had a good demonstration stressing the use of legumes planted before potatoes. Mr. Burgin had his potatoes planted on alfalfa ground, blackeye pea ground and ground that did not have legumes planted on it.

In digging his potatoes Mr. Burgin found a larger more uniform potato with a better quality and a yield of approximately one-third more on the alfalfa and blackeye pea land than on the land without legumes planted.

Mr. Burgin did not inoculate the blackeyed peas or turn them under green and he believes he would have realized a greater yield had he done this.

Another good demonstration was made by Lee Renfro with the use of commercial fertilizer. Mr. Renfro used a 10-10-0 mixture at the rate of 200 pounds per acre.

On this land he raised a good uniform potato of good quality. Mr. Renfro left a check plot of two rows which he did not fertilize and these had small vines and only about half the yield as the fertilized rows.

Community Cent'r Building Received

Farm Safety

This has been declared National Farm Safety Week. It was proclaimed in order to bring to the farmers' attention the terrific yearly loss of man power caused by accidents on the farm. As ours is an agricultural community we should be especially interested and do all in our power to prevent needless accidents.

According to American RedCross reports approximately 16,000 lives were lost on American farms last year as a result of needless accidents. But aside from the lives lost countless other thousands were injured. The rate in fact was so bad that it can be best measured in this manner: one farm accident occurred every twenty seconds during the past year. If this rate continues it means that approximately one out of every six farmers in Castro County can expect a needless accident to strike at him during the coming year.

The two items causing the greatest loss of life and serious injury are livestock and farm machinery. A few minutes of care and precaution in handling either may mean the difference between continuing as a farmer or beginning many weeks as a hospital patient. A great deal of our machinery is naturally worn out and needs constant attention. Why not make it a practice to replace worn parts when needed and stop taking chances that it will be all right. The accidents, you know, don't always just happen to the other unlucky fellow.

Boys Ranch

It was recently announced that an article concerning Boys Ranch will appear in the Reader's Digest for August. This is only an additional amount of good publicity already received by this humanitarian organization over the years. Soon the publicity will include stories and accounts of Boys Ranch in Castro County. We do not seek such publicity from a selfish viewpoint, but agree that it will be welcome and of benefit to the whole county.

Our present undertaking to raise a \$20,000 building fund bogged down during the past week. No further contributions have been received. The wheat pile which was collected in Dimmitt netted 443 bushels and has been moved to storage.

We realize that the past few weeks have been difficult and trying ones for the wheat farmer. With the most of the harvest out of the way we trust he will now find time to consider the needs and importance of Boys Ranch in Castro County, and make his contribution either in wheat or cash.

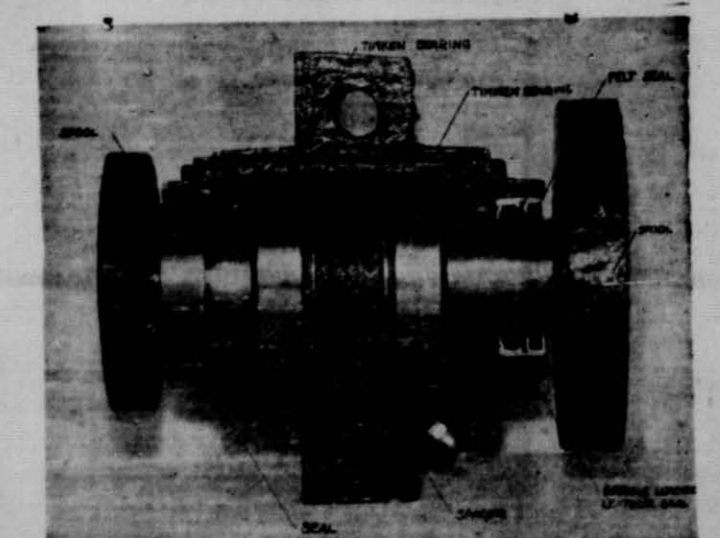
