188 Unruly A. and M. Cadets Learn the Hard Way

Poll Tax Payments Unusually Heavy For an Off Year

At 2 o'clock this afternoon Miss Susan Haynes of the Cisco chamber of commerce had issued 395 poll tax receipts and the number was expected to pass the 400 mark before closing time.

In a conversation with Neil Day, county tax collector, at 3 o'clock this afternoon, he stated that his office had already issued 4,602 voting permits (not including those issued by Cisco chamber of commerce) and that they were still trickling in.

These two sets of figures added gives a total of 4,997, which is considered unusually high for an off year, politically speaking. However, Cisco will elect a mayor and two commissioners in April and there may be a special election having to do with city charter changes before the regular election.

Mrs. Brock, 85, Buried at Ranger at 3 Today

RANGER, Jan. 31. — Mrs. C. R. Brock, 85, sister of District Judge George L. Davenport of Eastland, died yesterday morning in a Ranger hospital.

Daughter of a pioneer family which settled in Eastland in 1892 and moved to Ranger in 1894, Mrs. Brock was the widow of a prominent Ranger businessman who died in San Antonio in 1934. They had lived in Austin in 1918-19, after which they moved to San Antonio. Mrs. Brock returned to Ranger last year.

Services were held at a local funeral parlor at 3 this afternoon, with burial in Ranger Evergreen cemetery. One of the officiating ministers was Rev. J. Leslie Davenport of Gordon, a nephew; the other was Rev. Charles P. Jones of Ranger.

Survivors include three other brothers, Sam and Albert Davenport of Ranger and P. E. Davenport of Snyder; a niece, Miss Leslie Davenport of Ranger, and five grandchildren.

CITY MANAGER PLAN DISCUSSED

In trying to be of service to the community, the Cisco Daily Press is printing articles regarding the proposed city manager plan for the city of Cisco — whether these expressions favor the plan or oppose it. Naturally, the Press wants reasons as to one's opinion, so that it will serve as a basis for forming intelligent ideas pro and con of the proposed charter change.

Nick Miller, The Man's Store — I am highly in favor of the city manager plan. The city is a big business and should have a well trained, full-time, efficient man to supervise and act as executive for this business. I would prefer that he be from out of town and a stranger to any local political influence. I believe an efficient organizer of the city's forces could easily save much more than his salary in the present setup.

J. T. Elliott, former city commissioner — I have always been in favor of a city managership, where there is a centralized authority and buying power. One thing bothered me and that was, will the finances of the city stand the salary, but I am convinced now that his value will be more than counterbalance his salary.

Ronald Rhodes, manager Mott Store — I think the big reasons for a city manager form of government for Cisco is centralized authority and buying, as well as the further fact that he will be giving all his time to his job instead of his best thoughts to some other private business upon which he depends for his income.

Charles Spears, President of First National Bank — Most assuredly I am in favor of a city manager for Cisco or any other town of like size. It is just as sensible to try to depend upon the school trustees to manage Cisco's big school system without a superintendent as to expect local trustees (commissioners) to manage the affairs of the city as a sideline to their own businesses. However, I like the expression council-manager better, since that is really what the idea is. Certainly Cisco needs a full-time manager, just as her schools need a full-time superintendent, which no one doubts.

H. S. Drumwright, former city commissioner — I'm for a city managership of any city as large as Cisco. I think it is a very progressive move. A million dollar concern certainly needs expert supervision and a unity of executive authority. I would want an efficient executive, well trained in his duties and giving his whole time to the job. The extra expense of salary would be offset many times over by the savings of a well organized office and centralized purchasing duties. No other big business concern would think of a supervision that gave only part of its time, while engaged in private endeavors that would require its best efforts in running other private businesses from which it secured its greatest income. I know of no good arguments against such a forward step in economic progress.

E. G. Damron, tire dealer and civic worker — I think Cisco is plenty large to require a coordinated authority on purchasing and other details required by a city, or any other business of like magnitude. A man must be free from local politics and discontent over such matters as taxes and other local disturbances which are sure to arise constantly when dealing with the general public. Of course, we must get the right kind of man to fit into the situation.

COLLEGE STATION, Jan. 31. — All but 12 members of the entire senior cadet class of 200 at Texas A. and M. college were ordered dropped from the corps today as the climax to the stormy three-day protest action against college discipline rules.

Col. Guy F. Meloy, commandant and professor of military science and tactics, ordered the action after the resigned student officers turned down his ultimatum to ask for reinstatement.

The cadets will revert to civilian status at the school and will not receive army reserve commissions upon graduation.

The senior officers and more than 100 non-commissioned officers marched in formation at midnight Tuesday to the home of President Gibb Gilchrist. Awakened by the chants of cadets and the "fight" song played by the corps band, President Gilchrist appeared briefly on the porch of his home. He listened to the protests of the cadets and then accepted the resignations of the senior officers.

Later the resigned officers demanded the resignation of Gilchrist as president of the college. They said his attitude toward them at a conference had been "insulting."

West Point Football Stars Must Stick to Duty

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31. — Secretary of War Robert L. Patterson today turned down the applications of three West Point gridiron stars for extended leaves this fall to play professional football.

Felix Blanchard, Glen Davis and Barney Poole had applied for four months leave in order to cash in on their gridiron ability.

The army said Patterson's decision was final.

WOMEN JURORS

AUSTIN, Jan. 31. — A constitutional amendment proposed to allow women to sit on Texas juries was passed favorably at the first meeting of the senate constitutional amendments committee yesterday. The committee voted to meet at the call of the chairman, Sen. Rogers Kelley of Edinburg.

LIVING COSTS DROP

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31. (U.P.) — The labor department reported today that the rise in the cost of living slowed down between Nov. 15 and Dec. 15, but labor union economists said it would have to drop "considerably" more before wage demands are affected.

Fleming Says Truman Blocked Ten Pct Rental Raise

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31. (U.P.) — Maj. Gen. Philip B. Fleming, director of the office of temporary controls, testified today that he was the official who directed that rents be increased.

Fleming told the senate banking committee that President Truman blocked the 10 per cent boost at the last moment because it would have applied to every landlord in the country, regardless of his financial condition.

Fleming said that last week he directed his deputy director, James W. Follin, to put into effect a general raise in rent ceilings.

When Follin sought Mr. Truman's approval, he was turned down. Fleming thus explained the administrative mix-up which nearly opened the way for raising the country's rent bill 10 per cent.

Fleming said he directed that the increase be authorized because data collected by his agency showed that landlords were in an increasingly unfavorable position. He said he thought that would be the best way to "correct existing hardships with a minimum of administrative burden."

Taber Says Spending Can Be Cut, Budget Balanced

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31. — Chairman John Taber, R., N. Y., of the house appropriations committee said today he hopes to whack government spending in the next five months enough to balance the federal budget for the current fiscal year.

"It will have to be done by cutbacks of about \$1,500,000,000 in proposed expenditures for the rest of the year," he said. "We might also have to reduce deficiency appropriation requests."

Austin in March

AUSTIN, Jan. 31. — Gov. Beauford Jester today announced signing of House Bill 19 of the Texas legislature to provide means to fight cattle hoof and mouth disease.

The governor, speaking at his first press conference, said he will not take a hand in the A. and M. college dispute, that he had adopted no fixed pardon policy, and that he will invite President Truman to visit Austin in March.

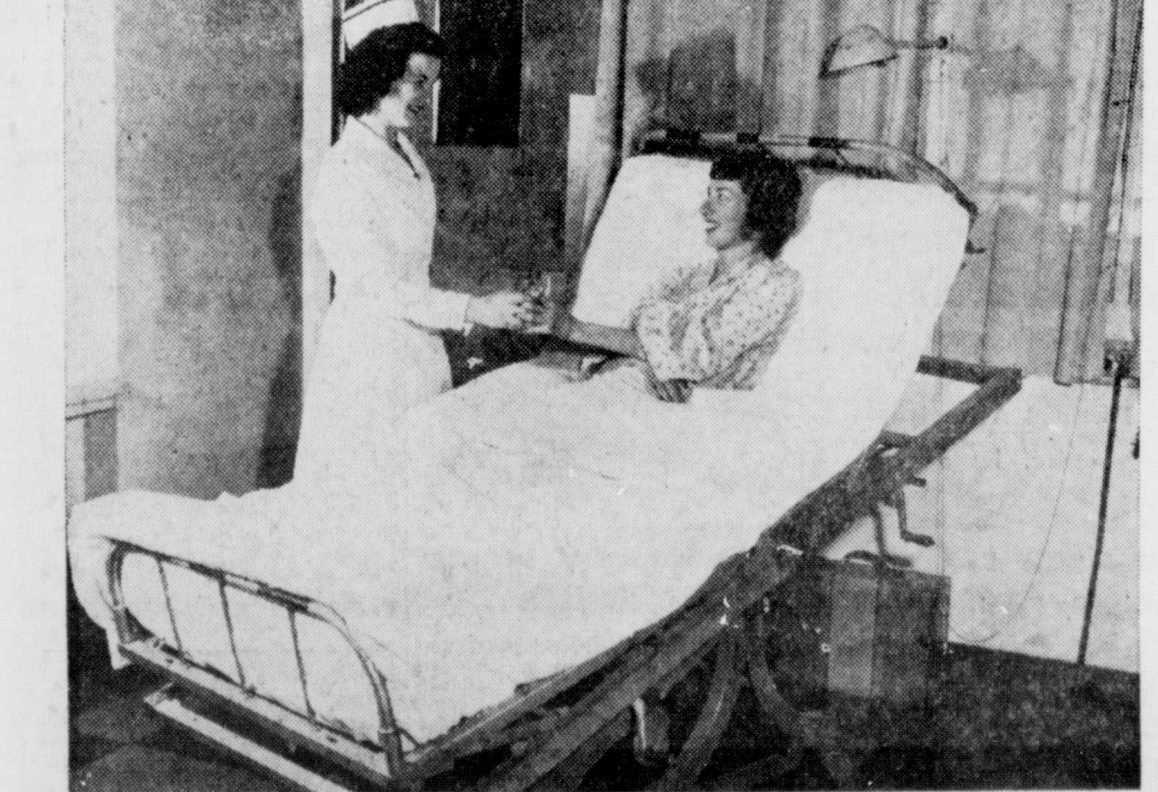
DEATH OF RANCHER

ARABIA TO AMERICA.

White-robed and be-turbaned, the eldest of his kingly father's 40 sons, brother to 40-odd sisters, warthy Emir Saud, Crown Prince of Arabia, called on President Truman. Surrounding the heir-apparent were eight aides, similarly garbed and armed with flashing ladders, pistols and swords. Members of the state department and numerous detectives in staid business suits hovered about, as did, he it said, a couple of officials from an American oil company.

His highness and retinue amidst piles of baggage, moved on to look at New York from the 102nd floor of the Empire State building. That must have seemed quite different from a Bedouin tent. They will tour the country, stopping in Kansas City, Houston, Phoenix, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Salt Lake City, Denver, Chicago and Detroit.

The Crown Prince is one of the few titled Arabians ever to visit his country. He probably is as amazed at us as we are at him. There will be more tourists from the land for America's capital, Washington, has become the favored destination of much of the traveling world, a point to which all eyes turn as those of religious Moslems do to Mecca.

GUARDING THE PRESIDENT.
