TOO MUCH LAND TO SYNDICATE?

Resolution by Wortham and Williams Causes Great Sensation.

Austin, Texas, Jan. 27.—Somewhat of a stir was created in the House this afternoon when a resolution was introduced by Representatives Wortham and Williams, requesting the land commissioner to make an investigation of the charge that the Capitol Syndicate, which built the State House received 1,000,000 acres more of land than its contract with the state called for. The contract was for 1,000,000 acres and the resolution declares that the Capitol Syndicate has already sold 3,000,000 acres and still has 1,000,000 acres left. The resolution was adopted.

The Beacon wishes to commend the action of the Texas Legislature in electing Hon. Morris Sheppard for both the six-year term of United States Senator, and the unexpired term of Senator Bailey. This action will meet with the approval of the Texas people as a whole, and is a decided rebuke to Joseph Weldon Bailey is his last political struggles in which he undertook to appoint his successor. 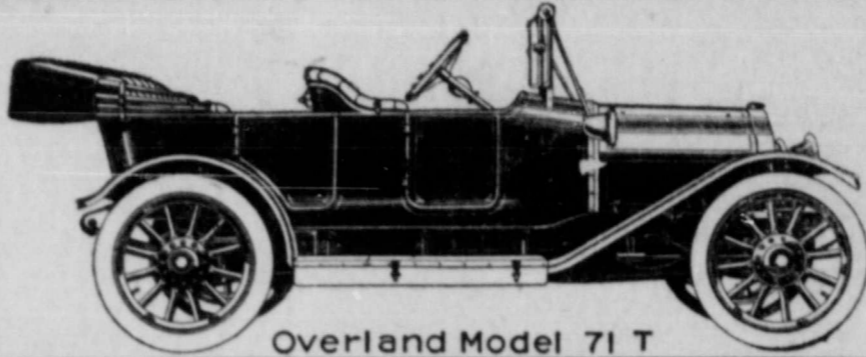

NEW RAILROAD FOR PLAINVIEW

Quanah, Acme & Pacific Propose To Extend Line to Plainview —Decker Here.

It now seems that that the trains of the Quanah, Acme & Pacific railroad which is a part of the Frisco system, will be running into Plainview by September 1 next.

An enthusiastic meeting of about sixty of the representative business men of the town was held at the court house last night to discuss the matter, and lay plans for a huge massmeeting to be held at the Schick opera house next Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Judge D. E. Decker, of Quanah, general attorney of the Q. A. & P., has had correspondence with the railroad committee of the Chamber of Commerce about the road, and Sunday Dr. J. C. Anderson and O. M. Unger went to Quanah to confer with Judge Decker, and brought him back with them Tuesday. Judge Decker had several conferences with the committee and a few other citizens, and made the proposition that the railroad would build into Plainview, and put terminals, etc., here costing \$200,000, if the citizens of Plainview would give a bonus of \$100,000, right-of-way through the county and land for depot and terminals in Plainview. No money is to be paid until trains are running into Plainview.

The meeting last night endorsed the proposition and will begin the work of raising the bonus, etc.

The Quanah Acme & Pacific is now building into Roaring Springs, Motley county, about fifty or sixty miles east of Plainview, and its present destination is Roswell, N. M., where the people have already signed a contract to pay a bonus of \$250,000, and give right-of-way from

the state line, a distance of ninety miles.

Plainview can raise the required bonus, as several years ago it did. The railroad committee of the Chamber of Commerce has a bonus to build into this place. Since then the town has nearly doubled in population and property values. Times are now more prosperous and irrigation water has since been discovered.

634 Poll Tax Receipts Issued.

Up to Wednesday afternoon, out of a total possible 1,300 poll tax receipts to be issued, 634 had been issued in all the precincts of the county, as follows:

Floydada, 101; Starkey, 15; Lockney, 274; Flomot, 16; Baker, 17; Bedar, 26; Mickey, 40; Sunset, 20; Lakeview, 17; Center, 11; Antelope, 10; Allmon, 20; Meteor, 25; Providence, 17; Lone Star, 25.

The collector's office is a busy scene from early morning till evening, and the office force are burning the midnight oil to keep up with the rush of the last few days, which is expected to increase in volume until the last day.

Buildings Collapse At McKinney

McKinney, Texas, Jan. 24.—With a pall of smoke and hanging over the debris of the collapsed department store where yesterday at least eight persons met death, rescue workers today continued to search for victims, although it is believed no more bodies will be found. The disaster has benumbed McKinney, for there is hardly a family that was not connected in some way with those killed yesterday.

The building had been erected thirty-seven years ago and that it simply had reached a point where it could stand the strain no longer is shown by the pulverized bricks and mortar and splintered timbers.

Twelve or fifteen persons were injured, some seriously, but all, it is said, will recover. Hundreds of men kept a saddened vigil all night at the smoldering ruins. Thousands arrived here today from over North Texas to assist workers and view the scene of the catastrophe. The rear portion of the Odd Fellows' building will be dynamited this afternoon to enable searchers to remove debris at that point and learn whether there are any more dead.

The buildings were the three-story Odd Fellow building, occupied by a department store, and an adjoining two-story building occupied by a hardware and implement concern. There was a sale on in the department store at the time the buildings collapsed.

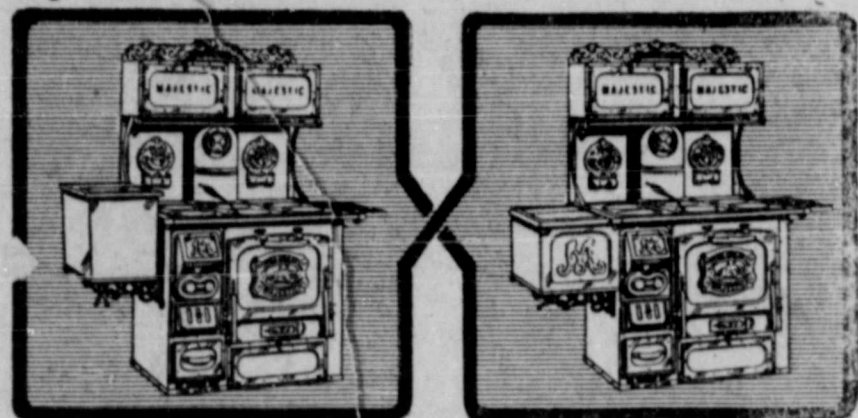

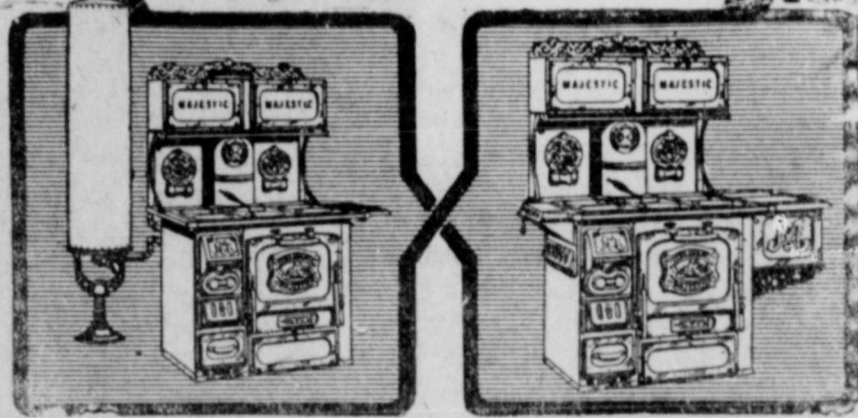

NEWS OF THE STAKED PLAINS

Interesting Happenings in Near-by Counties, Told in Brief Paragraph.

Tell, Childress county, now has a state bank.

The City Drug Store of Dalhart has gone into bankruptcy.

Meningitis is reported at Chillicothe and Odell, in Hardeman county.

According to the times, January 3rd, thirty-three cases of small pox were reported in Wichita Falls.

Instead of moving to Memphis, as was announced, Judge J. M. Presler will enter the practice of law at Amarillo.

In the state corn show held at Greenville, Crosby county won more premiums than any other county competing.

Doc Lovelace of Dimmitt has the contract to poison all the prairie dogs on the big Haskell ranch in Castro county.

Track laying on the Q. A. & P. from Paducah to Roaring Springs begun January 20, and will be rushed to completion.

The report is current that small pox of a virulent type has broke out in the Mexican railroad construction camp at Paducah.

The Glenwood Grocery Company, owned by H. F. Madison and E. L. Patton, has failed at Amarillo.

Entertainment committees are busy shaping plans to entertain delegates to cattlemen's convention to be held in Amarillo March 4, 5 and 6.

The Amarillo Trust Company, capital stock \$250,000, has been granted a permit to do business. Its stockholders live all over the Plains and Panhandle.

The Amarillo Oil and Gas Co. has just struck a large gusher in the Petrolia district, near Wichita Falls, and its stockholders are now seeing visions of great wealth.

G. A. Craven, of near Spur, committed suicide by stabbing himself. He was 24 years of age, and his mind was unbalanced by being thrown from a horse several years ago.—Plainview News.

Wilson and Banking Reform.

President-elect Wilson has had two conferences about banking reform with Representative Carter Glass of Virginia, chairman of the subcommittee of the House Banking and Currency Committee. He has also consulted various economic experts, and he is reading quantities of literature on the subject. "He has pronounced ideas on the question," Mr. Glass is quoted as saying. It is well that the man who is to become the foremost American has turned his big and well trained mind to this, the most important issue before the American public—with the possible exception of tariff revision. It is evident that Mr. Wilson intends that the credit for adequate reform of our poor banking system shall go to the Democratic party.

Two women have been nominated at Waco as members of the School Board of that place, by the federated Mothers Club.

There is a great committee fight now on in Texas Legislature on the bill to do away with the fee system among county officials. The fee system has been tackled by nearly every legislature for the past twenty years, and the fee system still stands.

Dr. B. T. Galloway, chief of the Bureau of Plant Industry, says in his report to Congress that irrigation in the West may prove a failure by reason of the deterioration of the soil by reason of alkali washing down and wearing out the saturation.

A baby was carried by parcel post on rural route No. 5 out of Batavia, Ohio, this week. The child, weighing 10 3-4 pounds and carefully wrapped, was given by its parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Beagle, into the hands of Vernon O. Lytle, the mail carrier. He safely delivered the "parcel" to the baby's grandmother, a mile away. The postage was 15c, and the parcel was insured for \$50.

Representative Smith of the El Paso district, has introduced a bill in Congress, providing for indemnity for all persons injured in Mexico during the late revolutions. If Mexico should be called upon to pay damages for the loss of life and property destroyed in Mexico during the past two years, belonging to Americans and foreigners, it would take her a half century to pay the debt.

Edward B. Moore, commissioner of patents, says that patents are suppressed to stop competition, and offers remedies to correct the evil. Mr. Moore says manufacturers buy up these new patents, and never put them in force, in order that same will not come in competition with their business. Commissioner Moore wants to fix it so that court proceedings can be resorted to to compel these patents to be put in use.

There has been introduced in the Texas Senate a joint resolution, providing for the submission of an initiative and referendum amendment. This amendment is a copy of one adopted by the Wisconsin Legislature in 1911, which, if it should pass both of the Texas Houses, will be submitted to the people in Constitutional amendment form during the coming summer.

Rosenburg—The Rosenberg creamery is nearing completion and expects to be ready for business by spring, when the products of 350 Jersey cows will be utilized.

Nacogdoches—The Southwestern Telegraph & Telephone Co., have acquired the local telephone exchange from E. A. Blount. Many improvements in the system are planned.

Kingsville—Henrietta King, of Kingsville, has an order with the McClure Silo company of Fort Worth for forty-five silos to be delivered at an early date.

Angleton—The contractors have begun work of the excavations for the foundations for concrete buildings to be used for the Prince department store.

Freeport—Freeport Facts is the name of a new weekly paper recently started at Freeport by T. H. Bell, who is also publisher of the Comanche Chief.

Brenham—One of the largest land deals ever made in this section was consummated when the Riverside plantation, near Chappell Hill, consisting of 4,481 acres was sold to a syndicate. The consideration was given at \$1248,921.

Gonzales—It is reported that farm land in the vicinity of the big gas well which was struck about five miles from here has advanced in price from \$25 to \$50 per acre. It is planned to pipe the gas to the city for commercial purposes.

Avalon—The First State Bank of Avalon with a capital stock of \$10,000 will soon open for business, a charter having been applied for. A. W. Miller has been elected president.

Laredo—The Young Men's Booster Club, with 80 members has been organized here.

Record Silo Order Awaits New Company.

An order for forty-five silos, costing \$25,000, is waiting the construction of the McClure Company silo factory. Ground has been broken for the factory just east of the packing houses on the Belt railroad.

The order for the silos comes from Mrs. Henrietta King, owner of the King ranch in Nueces county, and is the largest order ever placed with a silo factory. It will require fifteen cars to transport the material from Fort Worth to the King ranch.

H. L. McKnight, in charge of beef cattle on the King ranch, made the purchase. He formerly was with the A. & M. College and has had a large amount of experience with silos. He says that the King ranch will feed 5,000 head of steers from these silos, which will hold 10,575 tons of silage. Most of the stuff to be fed will be classed as baby beef. McKnight contends that 500 acres of land will produce enough feed stuff to fatten 5,000 steers, while under the old system of garzing it required 100,000 acres to care for the same number.

C. A. Christopher, manager of the McClure Company, is authority for the information that the plant will start off with enough orders to keep it running full capacity for several months. They expect to have the plant running within thirty days.—Star Telegram.

Plaintiff prays for citation by publication, for judgment for the title and possession of said lands against all the defendants, for his cost and for general relief.

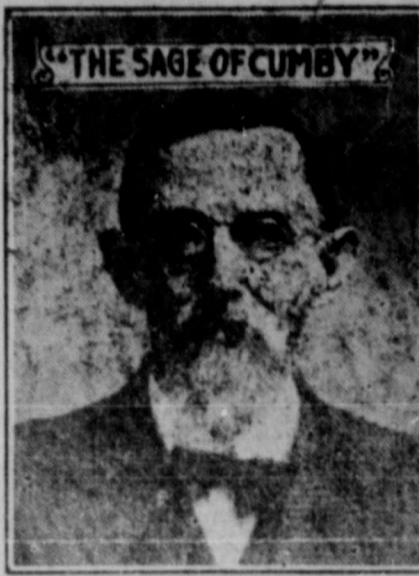

Austin, Texas, Jan. 25.—Hon. R. R. Williams, representing the 34th district in the Thirty-third Legislature, will introduce a bill in the House in favor of four-year term of office for State and County officials.

"Democratic B. B.," as he is familiarly known, has grown gray in the service of his party, and half a century's experience in public life has convinced him that a higher degree of efficiency can be maintained in public service and less business disturbance to the country by a four-year term of office. The expenses of an election, including those of all candidates, are estimated at \$11,000,000, and 36,750 candidates spend from three to six months campaigning, and a four-year term would save this expense biannually.

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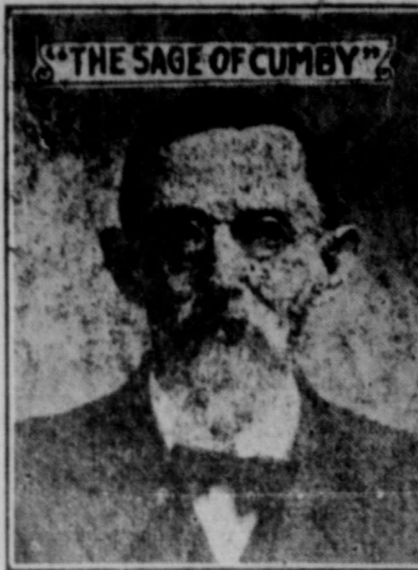
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
