Among other matters attended to was the adoption of the By-Laws and Constitution and perfecting organization. D. C. Lowe was elected Vice-President and an executive Committee Chosen as follows: E. P. Thompson, J. C. Garrison and J. H. Gruver, A Wellfare Committee of five was elected as follows: B. F. Smith, J. B. Dawson, Carl McAdams, S. A. Henry and Grady Brewster. The duty of this Committee shall be to look after the wellfare of the town and country and report and recommend to the Chamber of Commerce such enterprises or improvements as are needed in the town and country, The Pres-! ident and Secretary are ex-officio members of the Committee.

One new member was elected to membership at Monday night's meeting, bringing the total membership up to 25.

The regular meeting nights of the Chamber as provided for in the Constitution will be the 2nd and 4th Monday nights in each Month. At the next meeting, Monday night, December 8th, we want 25 new members. Hand in your name.
