"I think the Irish education system is a lot tougher than our own education system," said Garza. "What we learn here in the first or second grade, the Irish kids learn in Kindergarten," he added.

Garza reported that he had little trouble adjusting to the change from the Texas Panhandle to Ireland, but that it took some time to get accustomed to the changes in food and climate.

'The people of Ireland are very hospitable, and Ireland is green the year round, it's a lovely country. The only social life there though is going to the pubs," Garza reported.

Ferran's home in the northern portion of Ireland is in the center of the strife-torn portion of the country.

"EVERYTHING is torn up where I live and there have been a few bombings and shootings in my home town. I have been stopped and searched and searched by the British army a few times myself," said

"Our problems will probably More about be with us for a long time yet, especially in the north," the young Irishman opined.

Inflation is a big problem in Ireland too according to Ferran. A package of cigarettes is \$1 and meat is \$2.50 per pound.

"GAS IN MY country is about \$1.25 per gallon, and the bicycle is an essential means of transportation. If you want to travel you take a bus or train," he added.

Ferran, on his first visit to America, made a stop in Dalas prior to coming to Dimmitt. He toured Palo Duro Canyon during his stay here and replied "there's nothing anything like that place in Ireland."

Both young seminarians are three years away from ordination to the priesthood, and they report that 24 students are currently attending the Pallottine College.

The Pallottine missionaries work in England, Africa, South America and the United States according to Garza.



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
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
