LOCKNEY MEN ATTEND CAR SHORTAGE HEARING

Lockney and Floyd county was well represented Tuesday at Amarillo at the car shortage hearing held at that place. Those attending from here were S. A. Henry, Burton Thornton and E. M. Randolph, Aiken was represented by Mr. McAvoy, Floydada by W. H. Darrow, county agent, C. Surge, Lee Montague and Frank Butler.

Mr. Henry in conversation with a representative of the Beacon yesterday stated that Floyd county had the largest representation at the hearing of any other one county in the Panhandle, and the most interesting and convincing figures to present. He stated that he feels sure that immediate results will be had by this conference held at Amarillo on

Monday as a get-together of railroad officials and representatives of the Federal Railroad Department. Facts were presented by the delegates from the various Panhandle and Plains counties to convince these people that we need cars to handle the crop of 1919, which is not more than half marketed.

SWINDLERS OF NORFLEET NOW IN FORT WORTH JAIL

Fort Worth Record, Jan. 14.—E. J. Ward and Charles Gerber, facing indictments of theft over \$50 in connection with a \$45,000 oil stock swindle, reached Fort Worth Monday afternoon in the custody of Sheriff Sterling P. Clark and two deputies from this county. Both were placed in the county jail at once.

Both Ward and Gerber fought extradition from California, where they had been arrested in December following a complaint by a man who declared the pair had followed him from Texas to California and attempted to lure him into a game similar to the one described by Frank Norfleet of Hale county, who claims, officers say, obtained \$45,000 from him.

Six letters from other towns have been received requesting description of the two men and stating that similar swindles had been perpetrated in these communities.

Norfleet, the alleged victim, met the two prisoners at the sheriff's office. He positively identified them while they were in confinement in California, officers allege.

NEW BUILDINGS IN LOCKNEY TO START SOON

Lockney is scheduled to have some substantial building activities as soon as spring opens up. Messers E. Guthrie and A. R. Meriwether purchased this week the Bennett lot adjoining the Stewart Drug Co. property on Main Street, and in conversation with Mr. Guthrie Wednesday afternoon the statement was made that they would erect a modern brick building on their newly purchased property as soon as spring came. The building will be occupied by Guthrie & Meriwether for their general offices, together with general offices for the remainder of the building. It is not decided at this time whether the building will be one or two stories.

On this side of Main Street there are two other vacant lots, one belonging to W. C. Watson and the other the Baker estate. It is our information that Mr. Watson will build, and likely the Baker estate will build on their lot also. These buildings will close in the gap on the West side of Main Street.

Other buildings contemplated and decided on for early spring will be a 50 front garage building by Arthur Barker on his lot on West Locust Street, on the old hotel site. This building

Today and tomorrow is Ladies Poll Tax Paying Days. The ladies will find tax collector Harve Bolin and C. L. Anderson with their books at the First National Bank. No men will be allowed around when you go to buy your tax. This arrangement will save the embarrassment of the ladies ago telling business. Pay your poll tax so you can vote in this year's elections.

Bob Henry, who thinks he is in the race for governor, has wired the democratic state committee that "we will meet you at Phillipi." We have looked the state maps over and find "there ain't no such place" in Texas.

Perhaps "Phillipi" is located on one of the tributaries to Salt Creek. Bob will be there alright, and it will be said of him like some other fellows: "I also ran."

Oregon ratified the woman's suffrage amendment Tuesday, it being the twenty-fifth state to do so. Only eleven more states are necessary. Dear, sister, you had better pay your poll tax, for you will be permitted to vote in all elections soon.—Plainview News.

The dear ladies should not overlook the matter of their poll tax payment. You know the candidates will be numerous this summer, and if you expect to be electioneered with you should be prepared to pay your poll tax receipt.

The Senate Investigating Committee of which Senator Fall of New Mexico is Chairman, is holding sessions in San Antonio. Much damaging evidence is being brought before this committee relative to the Carranza government, and its treatment of American citizenship. This accumulative evidence will be laid before the Senate and the President of the United States and it is sincerely hoped that some action will be taken looking to a final solution of this much vexing question.

The Beacon has been asked to suggest editorially to the citizenship of Lockney that they put out shade trees in front of their property during the next twelve months. Arrangements will be made with the City Council to water the trees during the summer months. If every property owner would put out trees of the silver-leaf maple kind in a few years we would have the most beautiful city in the Panhandle. Let us all co-operate, and plant shade tree during February and March, and help to make Lockney a City Beautiful.

The State of Texas has brought suit to recover 50,000 acres of land that was granted the builders of the Capitol in excess of the amount called for in the contract. The price of the Capitol building was 3,000,000 acres of public domain, situated mostly in West Texas. Only one person is alive of the parties to the contract between the State of Texas and Capitol Land Syndicate, in the person of former Land Commissioner, W. C. Walsh of Austin, the remaining members of the government at that time having passed to their reward.

The Soviet Ship Buford has reached its destination with Emma Goldman and Alexander Bergman, and several hundred alien anarchists. On arrival in Finland Emma Goldman turned to the United States as soon as interviewed. She declares she will re-proceed to talk and get herself impossible and save America. This female specimen of Bolshevism was evidently talking through her bonnet. We feel quite sure if she attempts to return to the United States that this government will find a way to deal with her. If the Beacon was called on to decide her case it would suggest a neck-tie party in her honor as soon as she put foot on American soil. She should be contented to remain in Russia and assist in carrying on hell in the country where her doctrine has overthrown all law and order.

Governor H. C. Brough of Arkansas says that the State Department at Washington has notified him that a nation-wide plot to overthrow the American government has been discovered, and for him to organize at once Arkansas State Militia. When these anarchists undertake the job of overthrowing this government they will be given the warmest reception they have ever received. There are a great many disloyal men in this country. They were disloyal all during the war, and they have not discontinued their seditious activities.

Suppose the republicans draft General Pershing for a candidate and the democrats draft Herbert Hoover, it would certainly be unkind to the professional politicians who want the job so badly.—Randall County News.

That would be some race, with the odds in favor of Mr. Hoover. It would not be at all surprising if we did not elect a war hero this year as President. Either Mr. Hoover or Mr. Pershing would serve the country with distinction. Mr. Hoover served the nation during the war so ably and grandly, showing himself to be a business man of wonderful capacity which makes him easily presidential possibility.

The Socialist party of Fort Worth has passed a resolution asking the government to float another bond issue, to be known as Deportation Bonds. The funds thus derived to be used for the deportation of Russian Reds as well as Reds of other Nationalities. The socialists of Fort Worth does themselves credit in thus going on record as opposed to Russian Bolshevism getting a hold in this country. Their position on this question is quite different from that of organized labor, who met a short time ago and protested against the deportation of these alien anarchists. A man can not be for and against this government at one and the same time. If he stands for Bolshevism he is opposed to Americanism. Let Union Labor men everywhere take a stand either for or against the government.

Attention is called to the statistic showing of farm products shipped and yet to be shipped from Floyd county. There has been shipped to date 687 cars of wheat, of this amount Lockney has shipped 308 cars, nearly half of that shipped from the county at large. The estimate amount of wheat being held in this county for future shipment 249 cars. Of the maize crop there has been shipped 102 cars with figures show Floyd county to be the 540 cars awaiting shipment. These leading grain country on the Plains. As to cotton shipment the total estimated cars for this season is placed at 320. The number of bales is not given. If the estimated capacity of these cars for cotton hauling is placed at 50 bales to the car we would have a grand-total of bales of 16,300 as Floyd county's cotton product. The table gives the cotton seed shipment at 103 cars, oats 90 cars, Sudan seed 3 cars, barley 12 and alfalfa hay 5 cars, sorghum seed 12. The grand total of the entire crop of Floyd county for 1919 is placed as follows: Wheat 936 cars, maize 642, cotton 326 cotton seed 138, oats 142, Sudan 5, Millet 9, sorghum 12, barley 14, hay 10. Total cars shipped from Floyd county 1132, awaiting shipment 1465. Grand total 2597 cars. Pretty fine showing for Floyd county. Come to Lockney.

As to the governors race in Texas we have decided to eliminate another candidate altogether as far as the Beacon and its support is concerned. This candidate is Pat M. Neff of Waco. We would have been glad to have supported Mr. Neff except for one plank in his platform, and that is his stand for a graduated land tax. The Beacon classes this graduated land tax as rank socialism, and of course we could not support any man for public office in Texas who was tainted with the least bit of socialism. Mr. Neff wants a graduated tax placed on land in order that the land owners will turn their holdings loose. He would have a tax in Texas based on a man's acreage, and the more acres he owns the greater would be his tax, until it reached a certain given point whereby the tax would equal the price of the value of the land. If a man's land was taxed in this manner, it would be taxed out.

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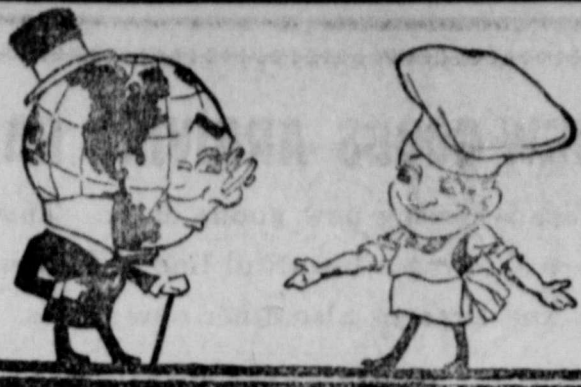

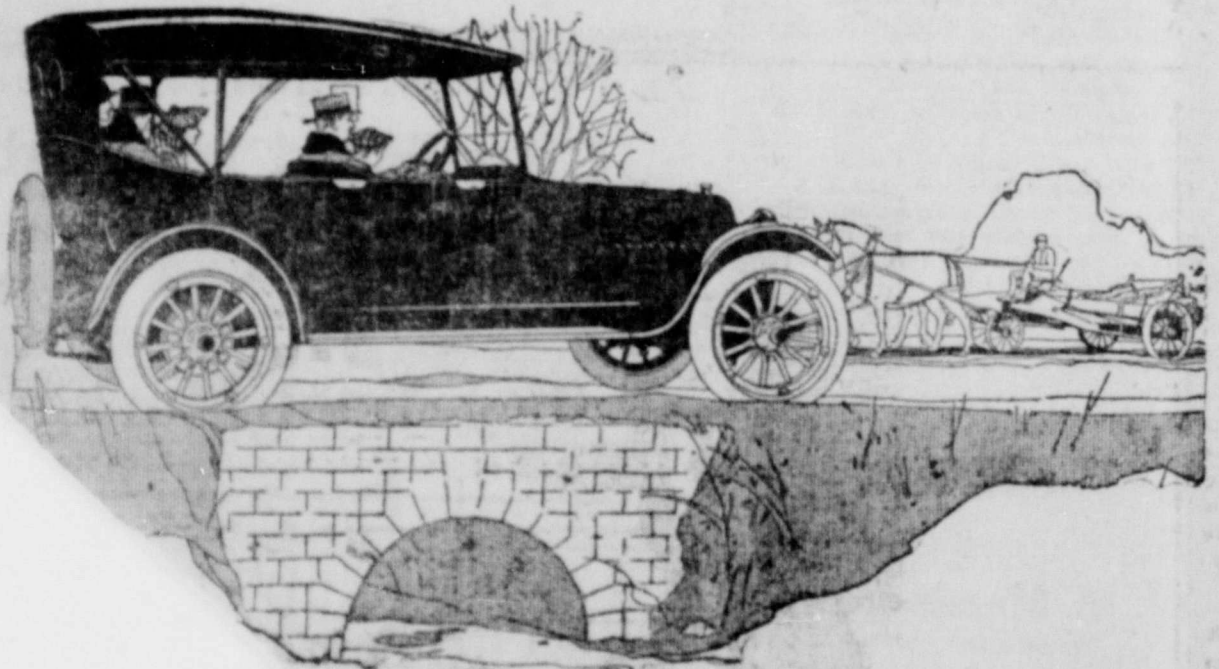

LESS THAN THIRD OF AUTO OWNERS HAVE PAID LICENSE

Less than five hundred of the 1,500 or 2,000 automobiles owned by Floyd county people have been registered in the office of the sheriff and tax collector and their license paid, according to the records in Collector Grigsby's office. Tuesday less than 450 had paid their license fee and gotten the 1920 license tags.

In speaking of the matter Monday Mr. Grigsby, the collector, said that apparently the matter was being neglected by many people who were going to be out some money for their neglect soon. If payment is not made by February 1st a penalty of 25 per cent must be added to the collector on the license fee, and if the car is operated on the highways without license the fine is \$10.

As a matter of fact, the license fee on auto vehicles was due and payable on January 1st, but the penalty is not being put on for a period of thirty days. The penalty goes on after the night of January 31st. "I am sure the neglect is not intentional," Mr. Grigsby said. "And the penalty will not be added just for the pleasure of it, but the instructions we have are to add the penalty, and it will be added if payment is not made before February 1st. Naturally, too, arrests will be made in cases where the autos are operated on the highways without the license tag."

Payments of taxes are daily growing more brisk and the tax collectors office will be an extremely busy place for the remainder of the tax-paying

COUNTY AGENT DARROW ORGANIZING BOYS CLUB

This is a busy season with County Agent, W. H. Darrow, who at present is engaged in organizing Boy's Clubs throughout Floyd county for the work of 1920. He has recently organized clubs at Center, Fairview, Campbell, Lakeview, Floydada, Pleasant Valley, Irick, Muncy, Meteor, Sandhill and Harmony. Bad weather and muddy roads have interfered some what with his organizing work, which will be again taken up as a club organized at every school house in the county.

Mr. Darrow is doing a splendid work in this county, and giving the boys some valuable instructions. Commenting on the work of Mr. Darrow, The Hesperian at Floydada has this to say:

"Stock raising appeals to the greatest number of boys this year, most of them enrolling for pig club work. A great many of them have already secured registered pigs, and many more are looking for good gifts. Improvement in the quality of the hogs of this county can be effected most quickly through the efforts of the pig club boys, both because they serve as a constant source of supply of good breeding animals and because their success is a striking demonstration to the farmers of what good breeding and care will do. The exhibit of fine hogs at the Fairs next fall is expected to be a great advance over last year, because of the great interest taken by boys in hog raising. One of the features of the work this year will be a sheep club provided arrangements can be made soon enough to start each boy off with two bred ewes. The contest would be to see which boy could raise the best pair of lambs at the least cost, counting in labor, feed for ewes and lambs, wool, etc. Bob Smith of Floydada has made a special offer of a prize to the boy that can make the best showing from two of his ewes the offer to hold if enough boys accept the challenge."
