The bodies of about 50,000 of the American dead in France will be returned to the United States while between 20,000 and 25,000 will remain permanently interred over-seas. Secretary Baker has informed Chairman Wadsworth of the Senate Military Committee. The Secretary, who wrote in response to a Senate resolution, estimated the cost of returning the dead and concentrating the bodies remaining in cemeteries over-seas at \$50,000,000.

He stands for President Wilson, the democratic administration, state and national, and is opposed to Joseph Weldon Bailey. Lieutenant Governor Johnson stands for the same things. Then there is another man who wants to be Lieutenant Governor—a Temple man. The democrats of this state seem to have a wide range for their selections this year both for governor and lieutenant governor.

We are in receipt of Volume 1, No. 2 of the Turkey Gobbler, published at Turkey, Hall County, Texas, by David E. Young. The Gobbler is a neat 5 column folio, well edited and printed. We congratulate the progressive people of Turkey in establishing themselves a live newspaper and trust that they will rally to the support of Brother Young and enable him to make his publication permanent and one of the real live newspaper wires of the Panhandle. The Beacon extends best wishes to the Gobbler for a long and prosperous career.

It is said that Bob Henry, who withdrew from the governor's race in behalf of Senator Bailey, is advising the Senator to put on the soft pedal in his criticism of President Wilson and the democratic party. Henry made a trip to Washington to talk these matters over with Bailey, so the report goes. Bailey came back to Texas last Saturday and made a speech at Dallas, which was mild in comparison to his former arraignment of the administration. This is evident that Senator Joe has begun the soft-pedal business. But his conversion is skin deep. He realizes that he hasn't a ghost of a show to be elected governor in his continuous criticism of President Wilson, hence he begins to slow down on his loose talk about democratic affairs nationally. He says he does not care how much the democrats endorse Wilson at San Francisco so long as his measures are endorsed. Just how he imagines the convention could endorse Wilson and himself at the same time is more than we can see. But getting back to Bob Henry. Henry pulled out of the governor's race, and it was suggested in well informed circles that he would make the race for Congress a-

gainst Tom Connally. He now sees by his endorsement of Bailey, and the Senator's bitter attitude towards President Wilson has completely eliminated him as a congressional possibility. Henry has spiked his own guns in advance. He should have first learned what Joe Bailey would stand for before he jumped into this endorsement business.

Joe Bailey is a flunker. Thomason challenged him to submit their candidacies to the people of their home county—Cooke—the loser to quit the race. Bailey flunked. He wired that he did not propose to submit his candidacy to 35,000 people. Evidently Bailey knows Thomason would beat him in Cooke county. Bailey has sinned so often and so grievously that his old neighbors cannot have any further confidence in him.—Plainview News.

It now develops that Mr. Thomason has pledged from a majority of the Cooke county people. Before he entered the race these pledges were secured, which places Mr. Bailey at a disadvantage. The Beacon has no criticism to make of Mr. Bailey for not accepting the Thomason challenge. It is not proper that the people of one county should decide who the governor will be for all the other counties in the State. We believe Mr. Bailey's position in these matters are logical. Doubtless Mr. Thomason will defeat the Ex-Senator in Cook county. We believe he will. But in the meantime we want to see the game played fair. The Beacon is not for Mr. Bailey, but we want to see all the people have a say in these matters. If Mr. Thomason and Mr. Bailey should enter this contest in Cook county, and after its over, along could come Pat Neff and challenge the winner to a contest in McLellan county. Pat Neff is supposed to be strong in his home county. Then Mr. Looney would challenge Mr. Neff in his home county—Hunt, and so on down the line. We do not favor these preferential primaries. Let all the people decide who shall be their governor.

Herbert C. Hoover will make the race for President on either ticket if the platform is based on his ideals. William Jennings Bryan will make the race if the platform is based on his ideals and he is the maker of it. There are others.—Fort Worth Record.

It seems that both Mr. Hoover and Mr. Bryan want to first see what the democratic platform will contain before they decide whether or not they would like to lead the democratic host. This is rather a new departure. Heretofore candidates for president have declared a set of principles, and made the race for the democratic or Republican nomination as the case may be. As it stands with Mr. Bryan and Mr. Hoover especially Mr. Hoover you can't tell whether they are democratic or republican. They are free lances. It is the opinion of the Beacon that the democratic party can get along without either. We would want to know what a man stands for before we elect him President, or rather nominate him. Democratic platforms are not made to suit the notion of any one man. As the Beacon has stated before, we will know more about who will be the nominee when the Republicans get through with fiddling with the peace treaty. Its our prediction that President Woodrow Wilson will lead the party to certain victory if the Republicans persist in making the peace treaty a party issue.

The German government has fallen, and President Frederick Ebert has gone to a place of safety. Dr. Wolfgang, founder of the Faderland party, has assumed supreme direction of affairs. The new government declares that it is not reactionary nor monarchist. Neither the Ex-Kaiser nor the Crown Prince is said to be connected or responsible for the over throw of the German government. This is the old sore on the body politic in Germany shuffling off. They are destined to have many new governments in Europe before the country settles down to a safe and sound democracy. Out of this state of anarchy and intrigue there will eventually emerge in Germany, Russia and other revolutionary torn countries stable governments. Washington's view of the recent uprising in Germany is that it is a test between socialists and military factions. It is said the military leaders have seized upon every pretext to bring about dissatisfaction to the Ebert government, blaming it with the extreme harsh terms as they call it, of the peace terms of the allies.

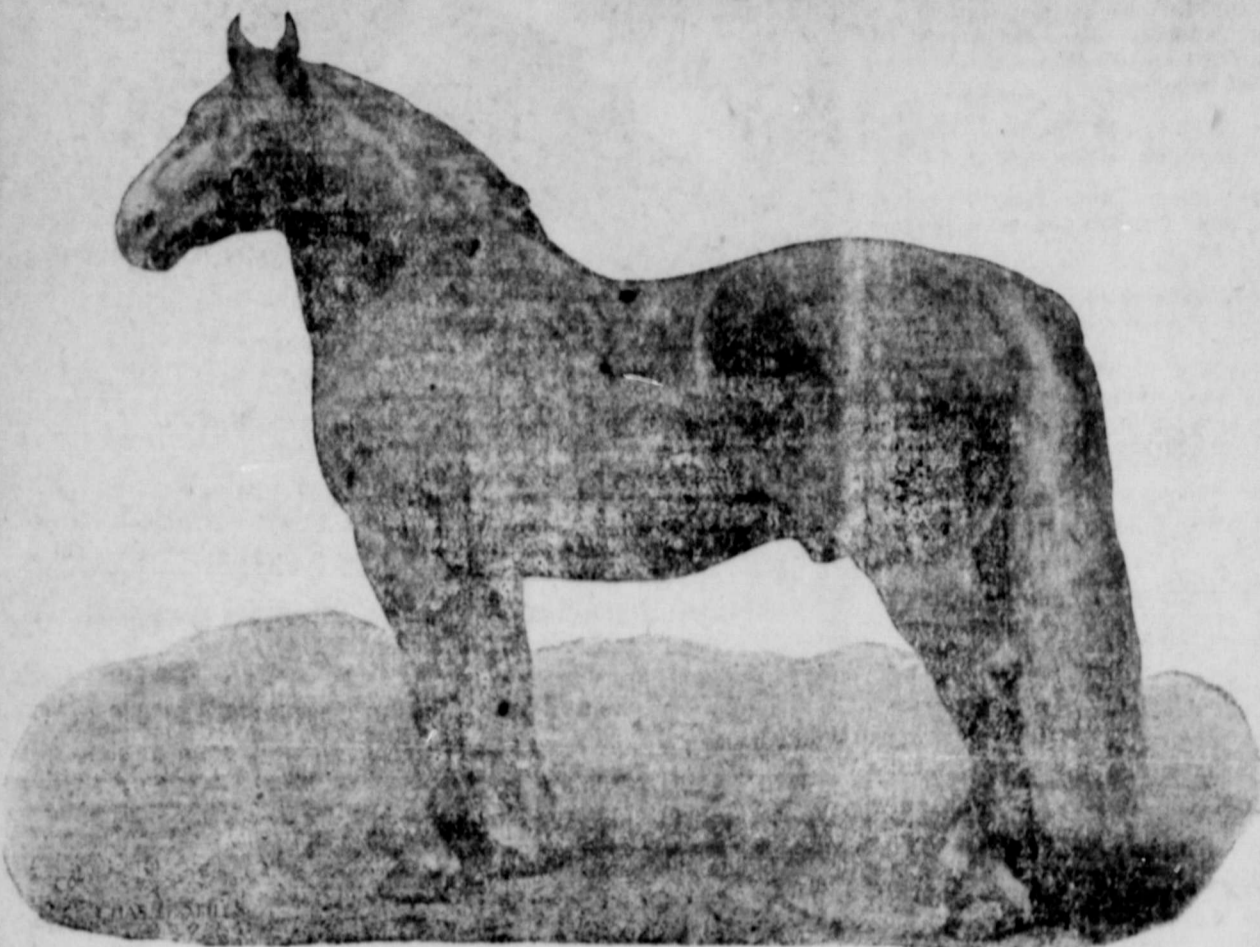
The Lockney Beacon doesn't care if Joe Bailey isn't a citizen of Texas he should be permitted to run for office here just the same. The Beacon thinks the fact should cut no ice and says it was opposed to the disfranchisement of Jim Ferguson. Whether is the Beacon drifting—Snyder Signal.

"Pop" Hardy the Beacon is not drifting, but grounded steadfastly in Americanism and democracy. The Beacon is just as opposed to Bailey's election as the Signal, but we want it done fairly and above board. As to the merits of the claims that the Senator is not a citizen of Texas we are not acquainted, and we have been very little interested in the discussion. We have concluded that Bailey is well enough versed in law to know where he stands in these matters, and the question that interests us most is to see that he does not receive the nomination on a strict liquor issue. The Snyder Signal seems to be exercised lately as to our democracy, but the matter should not worry any one. The Beacon as a rule will always be found lined up for democracy, and on the side of all public questions we think is right. We may not be on the popular side every time. The popular side of an issue never gives us concern.

"Higher rent problem confronts New York," is the heading of a dispatch in Saturday's papers. High rent not only effects New York but every state in the Union. Here in the Panhandle the housing problem is acute. There are more people than there are houses. Added to the scarcity of houses the matter of buying houses and moving them to the country has aggravated the situation. There is not a house in Lockney to rent for love or money. Those that are for rent have advanced in price almost beyond the prohibitive point. A man is offered a fancy price for his rent house by some one in need of a home, and the owner refuses to sell, but takes this new high tide figures for his property to prize the rent. Houses that sold or cost scarcely two thousand dollars for their erection have advanced to the ridiculous price of \$4,500. We need more houses, and a Housing Association to build them. Some one should engage in rent house building in Lockney or building for the market. If a combination of capital could be gotten together and build a few houses and sell them on reasonable payments they could be disposed as fast as they are built.

Bailey saw the writing on the wall. He returned to Texas and has greatly modified his tastes politically. He has seen that his attack on President Wilson was not what he intended. But has Bailey a change of heart? No he is the same today, yesterday and all the time. He has been gunning for the national administration for a number of years. The National Administration stands in the way of his designs—that is to bring whiskey back to this country. Bailey is an anti. He will always be an anti. It is now well established that Bailey's entrance into Texas politics at this time is carrying out a well designed plan of carrying all the states for the anti in the governor's races. A nation wide move is on foot to put whiskey back, or if they fail in this regard to have Congress repeal the Volsted act, and allow the manufacture of light wine and beer. Ask any anti who he is for? He'll tell you. He is for Joe Bailey.

The War Department is authority for the statement that there are 14,000 American soldiers in German territory, who are under the supreme command of General Foch. Commenting on the probability of the allies taking a hand against Germany in case they under take to restore the Hohenzollern family, the war department says: "The American Army of Occupation numbers 85,000 men under the command of Maj. Gen. Henry T. Allen, and there are 6,000 additional troops under Brig. Gen. William H. Sage, sent into German territory to supervise the Silesian plebiscite. The Allied forces are in Germany to "maintain order," a high official of the War Department stated this afternoon, and Marshal Foch and the individual commanders may take any action they see fit when there threatens to be danger. It was believed here that any attempt to restore the Hohenzollerns would be interpreted as a step against the peace and order of Germany and would be followed by action by the Allied forces."

We notice in a Chicago dispatch that a campaign has been launched to make the country tobaccoless in 1925. It seems that all the nuts have not been gathered yet. Extreme follows extreme, and the tobacco fight is another evidence that there is a class of people in this country who propose to force their views on the people whether these views have any merit in them or not. The people have rallied to

and endorsed the banishment of liquor on the grounds that it was destroying our citizenship, wrecking homes and pauperizing our people. This can not be said of tobacco, or the same evil construction placed on the use of tobacco as on that of whiskey. Our prediction is that you can drive the American people just so far, and no further. That the religious fanatics that have undertaken this tobacco crusade will have a real live issue in which they will be told to mind their own business. These nuts would accomplish more towards the present and future morals of the people of they would give more attention to their girls and boys in the matter of joy-riding after dark, their loose and slack talk and conduct in public and private. Let's not undertake to legislate our children into morality, but do some of the teaching at home.

In certain parts of West Texas agitation is rife as to the erection of a West Texas A. & M. College. The matter was sprung a while back by certain commercial interests and there are already several towns in the running for the school. We believe it was Editor Lee Satterwhite of the Panhandle Herald who suggested that the location be incorporated in the bill. Now comes the Colorado Record and suggests that the commercial clubs of West Texas hold a delegated meeting at Sweetwater and decide on a location and adopt a platform, as it were suggesting the location, etc. It seems that this is a case of counting the chickens before they hatch. There is little chance that East, North and Central Texas will allow a West Texas A. & M. College established at this time. They decide all matters pertaining to West Texas and if they can get something in turn they might conclude to establish this school long enough to put over their plans, and then kill it before it is finally located. We remember the fate of the last West Texas A. & M. college bill. West Texas representatives through trades with East Texas and other sections a West Texas A. & M. college was located. After they got most of their Junior Colleges and other schools located they proceeded in special session of the Legislature to kill the West Texas College bill, or rather repeal the law creating same. The only way to revive this issue in the Legislature will be by compromise, but the matter of guarantee of the faithful performance of their promises will be where the rub will come in. We would like to see the school located at some future date and on plans that would be fair and just to all competing towns. To have a location incorporated in the bill creating the school would engender as much politics as through the old committee locating plan. If the school is created we see no reason why its location could not be left to a fair and impartial committee of West Texas business men.

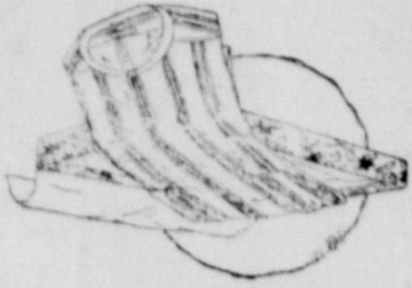

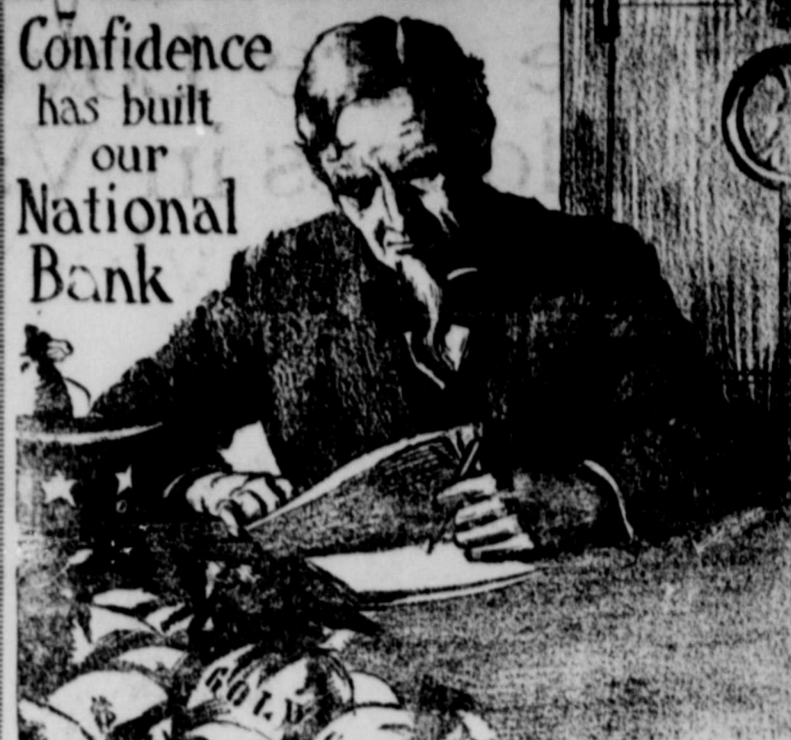

The body was brought into town in the Mounts car to the home of Russel Carroll, a half brother of Mr. Keeler. Funeral services were conducted Tuesday afternoon, March 9, 2:30 o'clock, Rev. J. E. McClurkin officiating.

The unusual tragedy has shocked the entire community and Mr. and Mrs. Keeler and their family are receiving the sincere sympathy of all our people.—Hereford Brand.

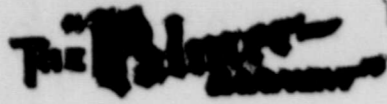

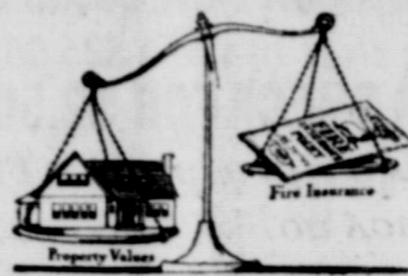
