UNITED WE STAND—DIVIDED WE FALL

The Beacon is in receipt of a letter from George W. Dixon, President of the Houston Press Association, enclosing an article for free publication in the interest of Senator Lynch Davidson of Houston for Lieutenant Governor. In this article Mr. Dixon attacks the record of Lieutenant Governor W. A. Johnson, and among other things charges that Governor Johnson wants to divide Texas, into two parts, and

that he (W. A. Johnson) introduced a resolution in the Legislature for this purpose. Here is what Mr. Dixon says about Governor Johnson's division of Texas:

"Did you know that Johnson wants to divide the State of Texas into two parts, and that he wrote and introduced a resolution in the regular session of the Legislature providing for the splitting of Texas up into two states? His resolution was known as Joint Resolution No. 7. It is now on record in the Senate Journal, Page 199 where all who run may read. He wanted to create the 'State of Jefferson,' by carving it out of Texas territory. This new state was to comprise all of the territory in the 25th, 26th, 27th and 29th Senatorial Districts. In fact Mr. Johnson started this agitation to divide the State shortly after his arrival from Kansas, where he resided for a number of years, having moved from Minnesota to Kansas. What his motives are have never been made clear. Are the sons and daughters of Texas willing to divide our grand old commonwealth with her proud heritage of heroism; with her Alamo, her Goliad and her San Jacinto! Shall we take these from the pages of Texas history and transfer them to the history of the State of Jefferson? Those are questions that every Texan, proud of our history, should ponder well. The question is not to be looked upon lightly. The effort to divide has been made by Johnson, and may be made again by him."

This man Dixon has evidently woke up the wrong passenger when he requests the Beacon to champion the cause of Senator Lynch Davidson on the record of Governor Johnson in the division of Texas. He did not know that the Beacon, along with a large majority of Panhandle and West Texas newspapers are for the division of Texas, and have been championing this matter for several years. We are for division of Texas, West Texas people in general are for division. We are for Johnson for Lieutenant Governor to succeed himself stronger than Mary's breath in an onion patch. West Texas people are for Governor Johnson. You, Mr. Dixon, have raised the wrong issue in the Panhandle and West Texas. You South Texas politicians have ridden us West Texas and Panhandle people politically until we have scores on our political backs. We have known for years that we are only a part of Texas for political purposes. All this sentimental stuff about the Alamo, Goliad and San Jacinto don't get any where with us people in the Panhandle and West Texas. You South Texas politicians have about as much regard for our interest in this section as a cat has for a rat. Therefore after years of efforts to get justice done this section, and after despairing of a fair deal we have decided for a division of the State. We have no apology Mr. Dixon, to make for our demands that we be separated from you South and East Texas folks. We don't care to be in the same state with you any longer. There is not an opportunity to get a square deal politically from you folks. We have for years paid the bulk of taxes to support your institutions, and we have not received a square deal in the matter of redistricting West Texas in the matter of establishing a West Texas A. & M. College, and various other political items we could name.

We really feel sorry that you have made the mistake to write to a West Texas newspaper on the issue of dividing Texas, in your opposition to same. We feel it our duty to proceed herein to salt your man Lynch Davidson down and to announce implicitly to you that we are for Johnson and for a division of Texas. Spring that Alamo stuff some where else except in West Texas as an argument against a division of Texas and West Texas candidate for Lieutenant Governor W. A. Johnson of Memphis. Really, Mr. Dixon, must be far removed from the Press of West Texas and Panhandle that would cause him to make the political blunder he has. Now, we are not a Texas alien either. We have been reared in Texas. We have been a citizen of West Texas for 18 years. We are for West Texas. We love the traditions of Texas, but shall we allow a sentiment to stand in the way of future development of this great section. You South Texas people can retain the name Texas if you want it. We will take the name Jefferson and build a new empire state in this land of abundant resources and opportunities, but now and have always have been in political slavery to the balance of the State. You can retain your glorious sentiment about the Alamo and San Jacinto, and we will start and build traditions of our own.

In conclusion, vote for W. A. Johnson for Lieutenant Governor of Texas to succeed himself, and at the same time remain steadfast in your demands that we be created into a new state of our own, a state larger than two of the Western States, a section richer in resources than Illinois and Nebraska, with the balance of Texas thrown in for good measure.

been reached a permanent solution will be found for the transportation problem so far as the Panhandle-Plains country is concerned. Much credit is given Mr. Frank R. Jamison, Secretary of the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce, along with the untiring efforts of Congressman Marvin Jones. The Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce is doing a great constructive work for this section of the State. When Frank Jamison and Congressman Marvin Jones goes after a proposition they land it.

Rev. Atticus Webb, president of the Anti-Saloon League of Texas claims there are over 1000 whiskey stills working in Texas every day and named one county which he claims has over a hundred. The gentleman is either a ——— or don't know anything about what he is trying to tell. Texas is indeed a large state, but not large enough to support a thousand wildcat whiskey stills. We don't believe there is that much lawlessness in a half dozen states. We hope the rest of the state is still civilized and if it is not, the good people better move to the Panhandle where we are always law abiding.—Miami Chief.

Editor Wagoner evidently does not believe that liquor is distilled in this state and that men with a consuming liquor thirst would not go to the limit of breaking the law. We have no way of determining how accurate this statement of Atticus Webb is, but it is our opinion that there are 1000 and possibly several thousands of men in this State who would distill liquor if they knew how, and could make it without getting caught up with. Distills will decrease as prohibition continues. Men will eventually, or a large portion of them, lose their taste and desire for liquor, and when this desire for fire water leaves them there will not be the demand for distills and bootleggers. We are just passing through the sobering stage of prohibition.

MINIMUM SALARIES FOR WICHITA TEACHERS \$100

Wichita Falls, July 8.—All rural school teachers of Wichita County will be paid a monthly salary of \$100 or more, it was announced today by County School Superintendent Burl Bryant. Some teachers employed in common school districts will receive more than \$100 per month, but school trustees have agreed that no teacher shall be required to teach for a smaller salary. This is the highest price ever paid teachers in rural school districts in this section. Approximately sixty teachers are employed in the country schools, it is announced.

ed direct to his untiring efforts for his people. He is always on the job for his people and he always accomplishes things. Marvin has a wonderful personality, and we find a distinct pleasure to be with him. Speaking of national politics he is optimistic as to the outcome of the democratic ticket, believing that we will elect Governor Cox President with a good showing to get both houses of congress. Marvin Jones will go into some of the doubtful states and make speeches before the contest in November. He is a power on the stump and few are his equal in campaigning. He will do a great work for the national democratic party in doubtful states.

The trouble of our present transportation problems is due largely and in the main to the government itself. When the railroads were returned to their owners a car distributing commission was created, along with enlarged powers to the Interstate Commerce Commission. In this section cars of all lines are pooled and distributed from Washington. Thus we practically have government ownership of roads, or enough power placed in the Interstate Commerce Commission to cripple our entire transportation system. It is a matter of physical impossibility for a government expert to sit in Washington and anticipate the needs of the country at large along transportation lines. The country demanded that the roads be turned back to the people. They did not intend that they should be turned back with strings on them. The people hammered a part of the socialism out of the government when the roads were turned back to the owners, but we did not get all of it out of the government. The people will now demand that this car service distribution be discontinued, and the roads turned back to the owners without strings on them. The further away we get from government meddling with private business concerns the better off we will be. Congressman Marvin Jones fought this car service distribution before last Congress and when the roads were supposed to have been returned to the people. He lost, but will renew his efforts when the next Congress convenes.

The most absorbing question before the Panhandle people at present is the marketing of our grain crops. Through the splendid efforts of the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce and Congressman Marvin Jones a solution has been found temporary at least, for the problem. The Interstate Commerce has ordered sufficient cars to the Panhandle to immediately commence the moving of nine million bushels of this year's wheat, besides cleaning up last year's crop now on hand. This is to be moved within the next ninety days. The first thirty days four million bushels are to be moved. Three million bushels in 60 days and two million bushels are to be moved within 90 days. It is confidently expected that by the time of the 90 day period has

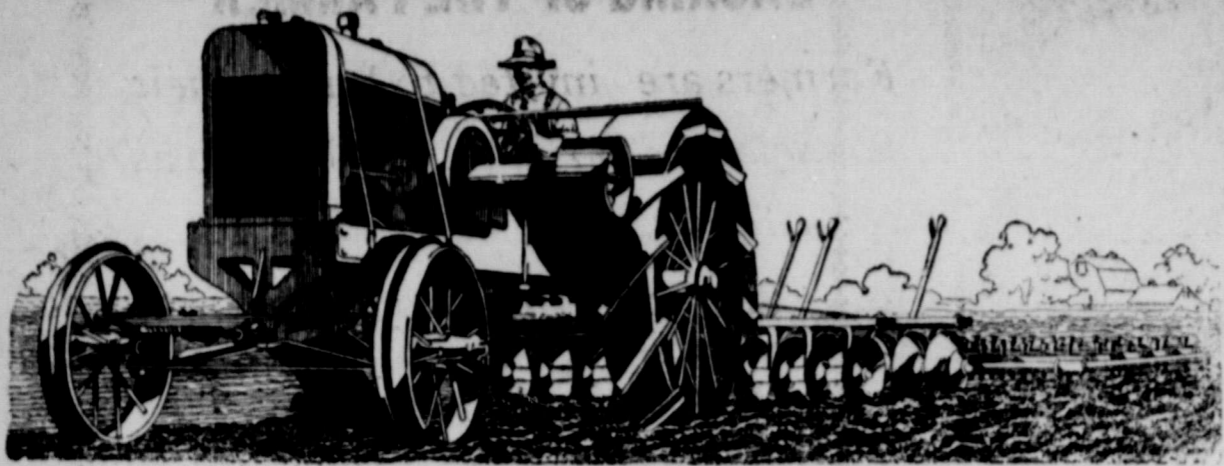

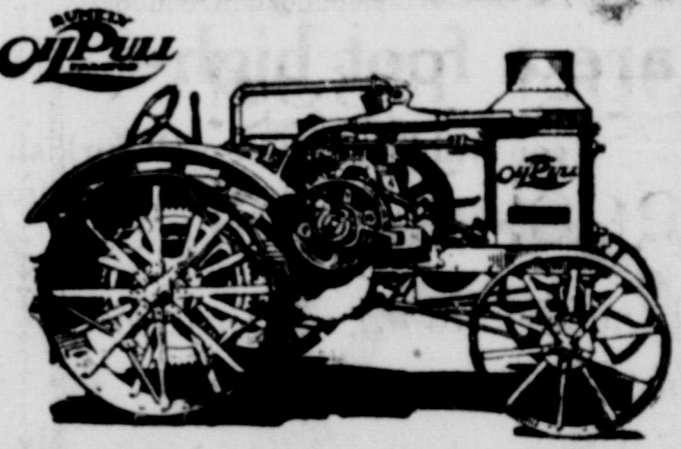

17 WEST TEXAS FAIRS ALREADY SLATED FOR 1929

Stamford, July 7.—The choicest products of field, ranch and mine will be seen at the many county and district fairs which will be held in various towns in West Texas this fall, according to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

The date for the Central West Texas Fair at Abilene has not yet been announced. San Saba will hold its county fair and encampment Aug. 10 to 13. This fair was a financial success last year. The San Angelo fair will be staged Oct. 26 to 30. The Hall County fair will be held Sept. 28 to Oct. 1. A big fair at Clarendon is set for Sept. 2, 3, and 4. The Erath County fair is booked for Sept. 30 to Oct. 2. The fair at Hamilton has been set for Sept. 21 to 25. The Lubbock County fair has announced dates as Sept. 23 to 25. Childress County will stage its big event Sept. 15 to 18. The Northwest Texas Fair at Plainview will be held Sept. 27 to Oct. 1. Other fairs will be held at Paducah, Spur, Sweetwater, Floydada, Haskell, Shamrock and in Swisher County and other places.

At least thirty counties in West Texas will have agricultural exhibits at the Dallas State Fair and combination exhibits at fifteen of the State and interstate fairs of the North in connection with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce national exhibits campaign. The thirty or more counties exhibiting at the State Fair will have their wares culled for a general exhibit to be displayed at Waco Cotton Palace, to compete with the picked products of any other section of the State. THE CONFECTIONER

I. C. C. INSPECTOR BEING SENT HERE, DECLARES MESSAGE

Congressman Marvin Jones has just returned from an extended trip over different sections of the Panhandle gathering information relative to the acute shortage of cars for the shipment of the 1920 crop of grain, and reports that the car shortage seems to be the question of most interest to the Panhandle farmers, declaring that the first words that greet him upon entering a town are "What is going to be done to relieve the car shortage situation?"

Mr. Jones has been firing telegrams to the Interstate Commerce Commission and to the association of railroad officials daily with a view of informing them in detail of the seriousness of the situation in the Panhandle and of securing a definite relief.

He says he intends to continue the work until relief is obtained.

In answer to a telegram sent to Interstate Commerce officials on Monday, Mr. Jones yesterday received a telegram in which it is stated that the car shortage in the Texas Panhandle is receiving "vigorous handling." An inspector is being sent to this territory, it says, and a conference will be held in Washington today with the superintendent of transportation of the Santa Fe, when the entire matter will be gone into carefully with a view of providing the greatest possible relief.

Following his return Mr. Jones announced that crop conditions over the entire Panhandle are flattering.—Amarillo News.

CANDIDATE ARE ASKED TO STATE STAND ON "OPEN SHOP" ISSUE BY BLANTON

Abilene, Texas, July 6.—Declaring that the industrial problem is the most important question now before the State and Nation, representative Thomas L. Blanton, of the Seventeenth District, in an open letter today asked the four gubernatorial candidates to answer a series of questions, including one relative to their attitude on the "open shop" question.

The letter addressed to B. F. Looney, Pat M. Neff, R. E. Thomason and J. W. Bailey, all candidates for nomination for governor in the July primary, declares the issue is "bigger than your personal success politically or of mine" and says the issue is drawn in an effort now being made "to select men who will subject every interest of the people to the selfish interests of labor organizations."

The people of Texas, Mr. Blanton said, are soon to decide whether the state is to be dominated by the "closed shop" which means the exclusive employment of union men only, or whether Texas shall maintain an "open shop" which means every laborer alike shall be permitted to work and earn his livelihood, regardless of whether he belongs to a union or not.

The questions submitted by the congressman are:

1. If elected will you favor an "open shop" throughout Texas?
2. If elected will you favor a law making "picketing" a serious misdemeanor, punishable by a substantial fine and jail penalty?
3. If elected will you favor a law prohibiting all sympathetic strikes?
4. If elected will you favor a law similar to the Kansas statute?

PANHANDLE WILL BE REDISTRICTED SAYS SATTERWHITE

"There seems to be a general agreement on the part of the legislators that the Panhandle of Texas will get a satisfactory redistricting insofar as the congressional and senatorial districts are concerned, declared Lee Satterwhite, representative from the 125th district.

"In my judgement," said Mr. Satterwhite, "the Panhandle senatorial district will be composed of twenty-six counties instead of forty-nine at present. Three districts will probably be made of the present district."

"Of the legislation disposed of, probably the most important is the pink boll worm situation," continued the representative. "Both the federal and state governments are satisfied and there will be no quarantine of the state except in the infected districts."

"The appropriation of \$4,000,000 for educational funds will make an apportionment of \$12.75 per capita," said Mr. Satterwhite, "and the funds for the higher institutions give the West Texas Normal College at Canyon all that was asked for."

"In regard to the governor's race" declared Mr. Satterwhite, it was generally conceded at the legislature that R. E. Thomason, speaker of the house, is the strongest candidate in practically all districts of the state.—Amarillo Tribune

A SERIOUS ACCIDENT

While Mr. B. H. Drerup, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank H. Drerup, who lives seven miles east of Dimmitt, was rounding up cattle on last Tuesday morning, June 29th, at 6 a. m. his horse accidentally slipped and fell, throwing Mr. Drerup to the ground, and seriously hurting his spinal cord. He had no limbs broken nor bruised otherwise.

Mr. Drerup was immediately taken home and placed under the best of care and medical attention. He was in a critical condition until death relieved him at 9:35 p. m. Thursday. He was aged 23 years, 10 months and 19 days at the time of his death.

Funeral services were held at the Holy Family Church at Nazareth Saturday morning, at 8 o'clock, attended by his relatives, neighbors and a great number of friends from far and near. The body was tenderly laid to rest in the cemetery at that place.—Tulsa Herald.

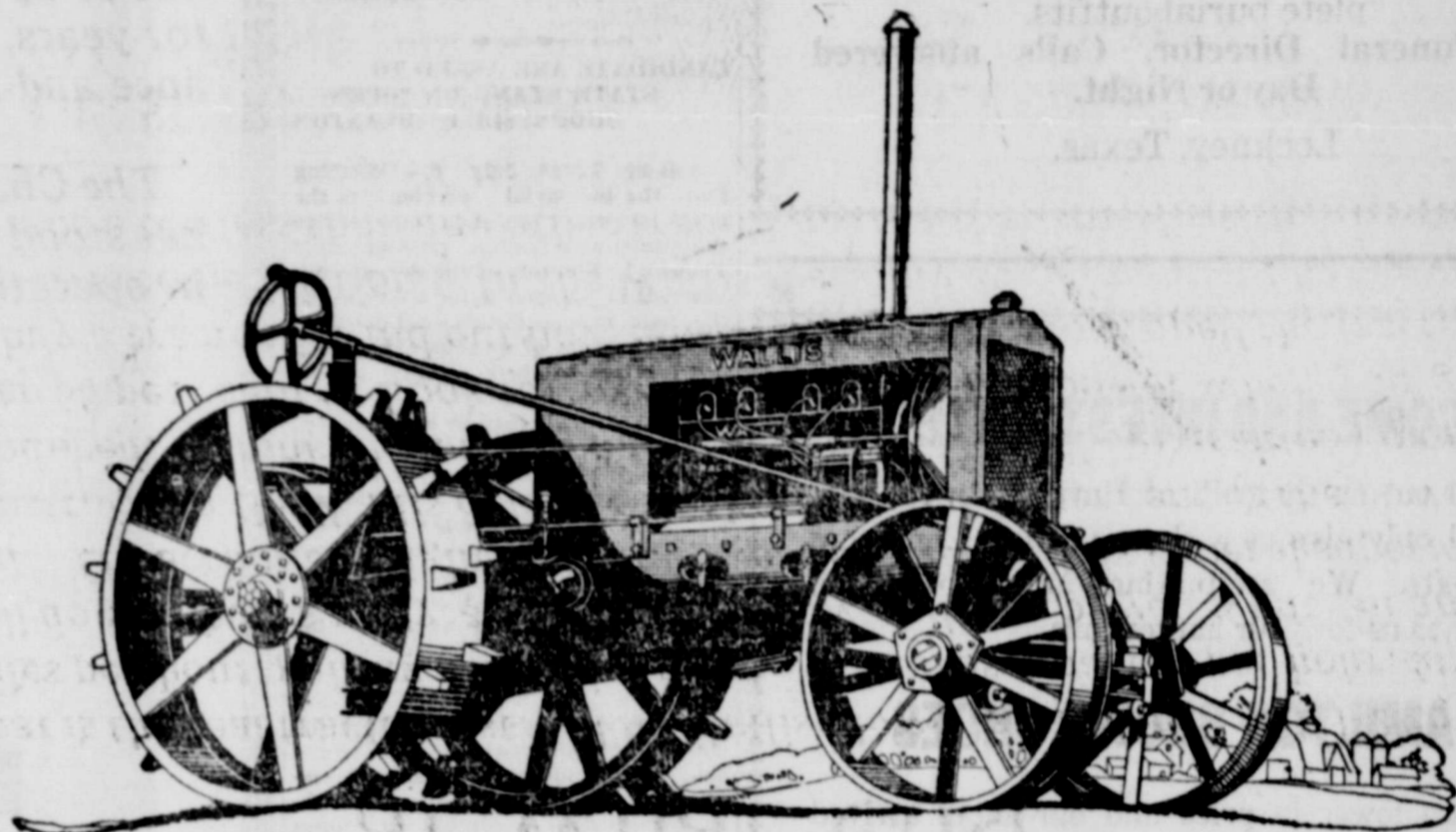
