Stamford, Texas, July 27.—That part of Texas west of Fort Worth and north of the thirtieth parallel will produe it is estimated, approximately 1,ghum grains.

One section averaged thirty bushels a total of 19,200 bushels from the 640

The rest of their farms ranged from fifteen bushels to the acre up. They used combined harvesters in harvesting it.

Early in the season they contracted at least 10,000 bushels of their wheat at \$2.85 a bushel.—Plainview News.


