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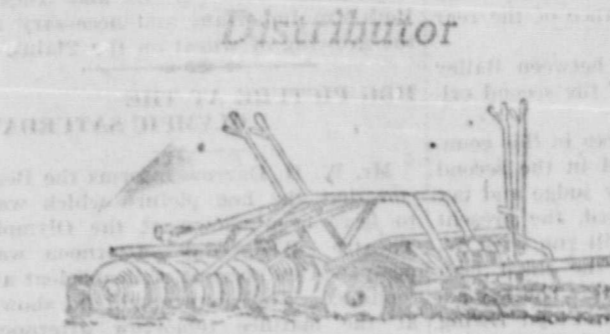
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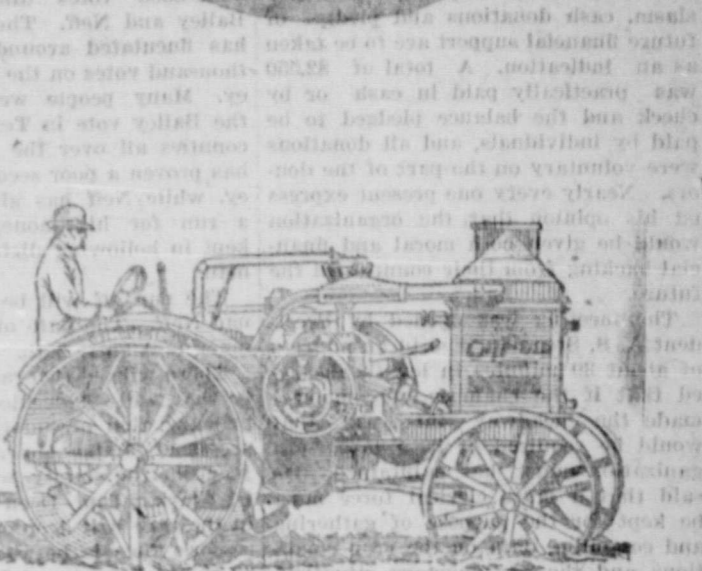

### STATES MAY LOSE REPRESENTATIVES IN HOUSE OF CONGRESS

Washington, July 25.—Unless the membership of the house is increased from 435 to at least 500 to meet the increased population shown by the 1920 census ten states will lose one or more representatives, according to Representative Siegel of New York, chairman of the census committee which will frame the new apportionment bill. Those states are:

Indiana, Iowa and Missouri, which will lose two congressmen each; and Illinois, Kentucky, Main, Maryland, Nebraska, Vermont and Virginia, which will lose one congressman each.

Mr. Siegel explains that if the house membership is retained at its present figure, it will be necessary to increase all districts beyond the 211,000 or major portion thereof now fixed. If this is done, he says the ten states named will lose one or more of the present districts because their populations have not increased in proportion to those of other states.

On the basis of the estimated population of 105,000,000 for the whole country in 1920, an increase of approximately 14,000,000 in ten years, Mr. Siegel says sixty-five or sixty-six new seats in the house must be created if the ten states are to retain their present numerical representation. While precedent warrants this increase, Mr. Siegel declares there is strong opposition to it on the part of the present representatives, while others favor reduction to as few as 300 members.

Mr. Siegel expects the work of framing the new apportionment bill in accord with the new population to begin with the reconvening of congress in December and he anticipates that the measure will be passed early in 1921.

Every decade since 1790, the house membership has been enlarged to keep pace with the growing population. Now the house floor is crowded when all members are present; seats nearly fill the chamber; the old individual desks have been discarded and an increase in membership probably will have to be achieved by narrowing the width of the seats.

Ten years ago the house membership was increased from 301 to 435 on the basis of a population of 91,972,293, and the only exception to such a procedure occurred in 1840 when ten congressmen were knocked out by the appointment of the membership being fixed at 232 after having been 242 for ten years. The last apportionment kept the numerical strength of all states decreasing, leading to the present condition of increasing but even then several congressional districts fell short of the maximum basis of 211,000 people.

### VILLAS ARRIVAL AT SABINE CAUSE FIGHT WITH FEDERAL

Ensign Press, Texas, July 25.—Arrival of Pancho Villa's army at Sabina this morning was immediately followed by a battle between the government forces, numbering about twenty-five men according to information reaching here, and the rebels, numbering 300 to 500 men.

Villa, who, advisers say, came to Sabina to negotiate by telegraph with the de la Huerta government on terms for surrender of himself and his men, will start on another warpath if his terms for giving himself up are not accepted. It is reported here. Refugees are coming to Piedras Negras from the Sabina district, fearing trouble as a result of Villa's presence it is understood.

A report reaching Eagle Pass tonight says Villa has taken Carl Fitzgerald, an American, president of the Sabina brewery and is holding him for ransom.

Provisional President de la Huerta, it is said, has ordered government forces not to mobilize, pending outcome of the conference with Villa.

Reports reaching here say Villa is in full control of Sabina, and, following the encounter with government forces of about twenty-five troops all of which are believed to have been killed, sent word to the government garrison that he must not be hindered if further trouble was to be avoided.

All railroad and other communication service is said to be under Villa's control at Sabina.

Accounts of his activities reaching here say that if his terms for surrender are not accepted, the bandit leader has promised to renew warfare on a larger scale immediately.

St. Johns, N. F., July 25.—Marconi officials at Signal Hill wireless telephone station announced this afternoon that they heard quite clearly phonograph selections rendered aboard the steamer Victorian, more than 800 miles away.

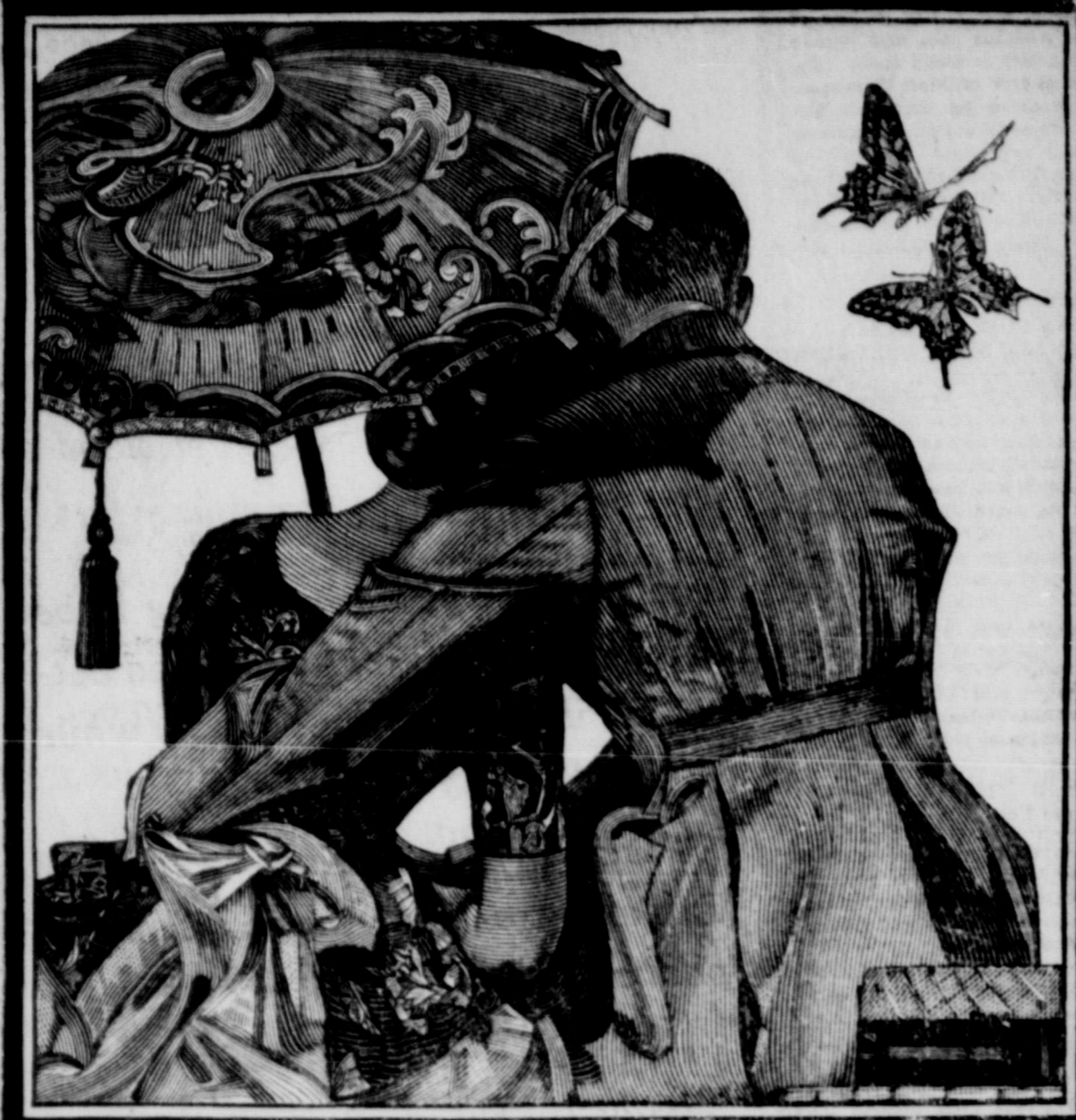

### PLAINVIEW ITEMS

Mrs. Martin's brother and sister, Hon. John Marshall and Mrs. H. P. Abney of Sherman, and Mrs. Marshall were here at the funeral.

Monday night of last week the Mauldin grocery store in Petersburg was entered by burglars and robbed of \$75 cash and some goods. So far no arrests have been made. Possibly the robbers were a part of the band of thieves that seems to be working in this section, as a number of stores have been burglarized lately.

Scott of the Texas Utilities Co. took the pieces to Amarillo Saturday in a car, to have the iron foundry make a new piece. Twenty-one casks of ice were shipped in Sunday from Amarillo for use at the cold drink establishments, several other institutions that depend on ice. There is an ice famine all over Northwest Texas just now, and many towns are having a hard time getting supplies.

We have been asked what effect the new census will have on the separation of the offices of county and district clerk and of sheriff and tax collector. A leading lawyer of the town informs us that the federal census controls and when a county shows more than eight thousand population the offices of county and district clerk are automatically separated, and when the population shows to be ten thousand the sheriff and tax collector's offices are also separated. The legislation at one time passed a law declaring that the population should be figured on a basis of five to each vote polled for governor in the prior state election, but the supreme court in the case of Brooks vs. Delaney et al. 100 Texas Supreme court reporter, 86, held this law invalid, and further held that only the census should rule in the matter.

# HOW MUCH GAS ACROSS CONTINENT

*Automobile Industry is Keenly Interested in 3,300 Mile Economy Contest—25 Drivers—Eleven States.*

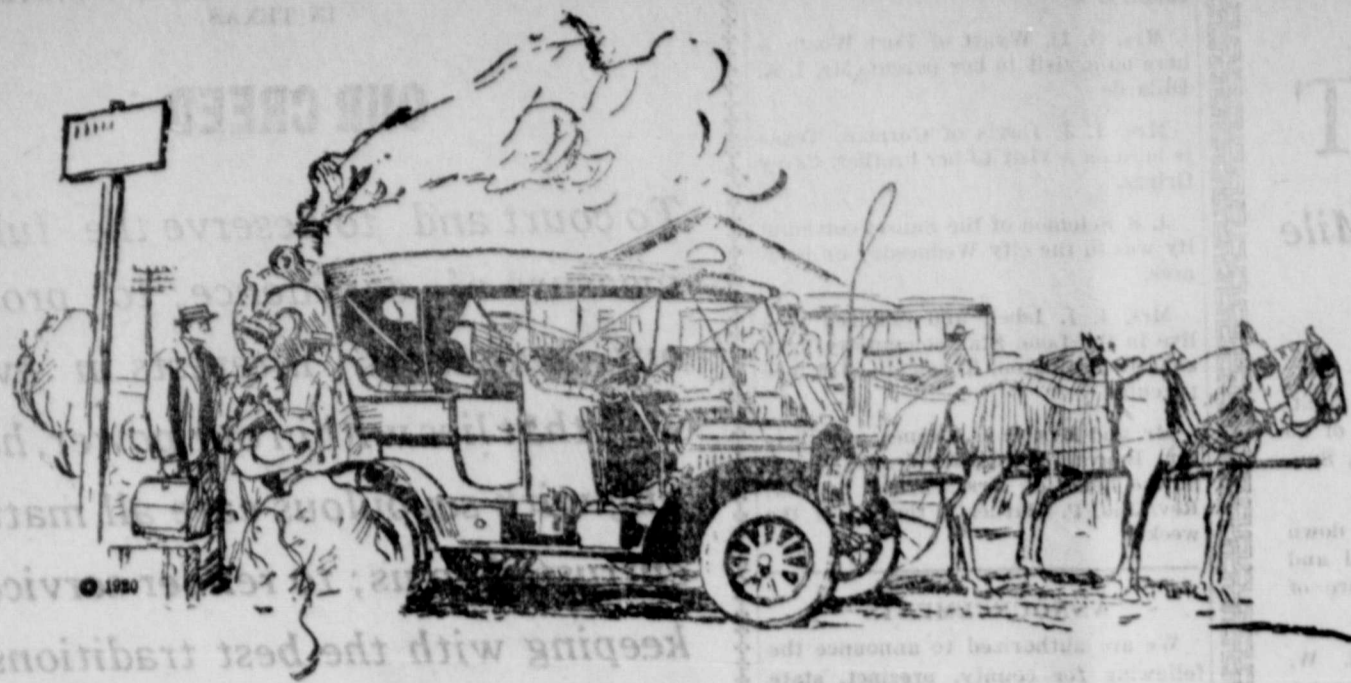

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1920; at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment of Section 4, Article XI of the Constitution increasing the total tax rate that may be levied by towns and cities having a population of five thousand or less from one-fourth of one per cent to not exceeding one and one-half per cent of any one year."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. That the sum of Five Thousand Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

RELATING TO THE MANNER OF COMPENSATION OF PUBLIC OFFICIALS.  
House Joint Resolution No. 7.

A joint resolution of the Legislature of the State of Texas, proposing an amendment to the constitution of the State by adding to Article XI thereof a new Section, to be known as Section 60; providing for the compensation of public officials.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That there is hereby added to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, a new section to be known as Section 60 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, which shall read as follows:

Section 60: Compensation of Public Officials: All State, district, county and precinct officers within this State shall receive a compensation for their services a salary, the amount of

which, the terms and methods of payment and the fund out of which such payments shall be made, shall be ascertained, declared and fixed by the Legislature from time to time; provided that the Legislature may make such exceptions as it may deem advisable.

This section shall supersede all other provisions of this constitution fixing and declaring the compensation of officers by salary, fees or otherwise and all provisions for salaries or other compensation for public officials, executive, legislative or judicial.

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to cause to be issued his necessary proclamation for an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1920, at which election this amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State for adoption or rejection and shall make the publication required by the constitution and laws of the State. Said election shall be held under and in accordance with the General Election Laws of the State and the ballots of said election shall have printed or written thereon in plain letters, the following words:

"Official Ballot" "For the amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding thereto Section 60, providing for compensation of public officials?" "Against the amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding thereto Section 60, providing for compensation of public officials."

Those voters who favor such amendment shall erase by marking a line through the words "Against the amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing compensation for public officials."

Those who oppose such amendment shall erase by marking a line through them, the words "For the amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing compensation for public officials." And the result of the election shall be published and declared according to the majority of the votes cast in such election.

Sec. 3. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purpose of paying the necessary expenses of the proclamation and publication of this amendment and the election to be held hereunder.

### RELATING TO TAXATION BY SCHOOL DISTRICTS.

#### Senate Joint Resolution No. 17

Proposing an amendment to Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by exempting independent and common school districts from the limitation of a total tax of one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation for any one year, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution be so amended as hereafter to read as follows: (Creating a new Section 3.)

Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of one (\$1.00) dollar on every inhabitant of this state, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem state tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the

use of children attending the public free schools of this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the state and the legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general or special law without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation; and all such school districts, whether created by general or special law may embrace parts of two or more counties. And the legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such district are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties. And the legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts here before formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common

school districts created by general or special law.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1920, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words "For the Amendment to Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the limitation upon the amount of school district tax of one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation shall not apply to independent or common school districts created by general or special law," and all those opposed to said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots "Against the Amendment to Section 3 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the limitation upon the amount of school district tax of one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation shall not apply to independent or common school districts created by general or special law."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. That the sum of Five Thousand and (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the ex-

pense of such publication and election.

AUTHORIZING ONE AND ONE-HALF PER CENT AD VALOREM TAX BY CITIES AND TOWNS OF FIVE THOUSAND OR LESS POPULATION.

#### Senate Joint Resolution No. 12

Proposing an amendment to Section 4 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by increasing the total tax rate that may be levied by cities and towns having a population of five thousand or less than one-fourth of one per cent to not exceeding one and one-half per cent, and making appropriation thereof.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 4, Article XI of the Constitution be so amended as hereafter to read as follows:

Section 4. Cities and towns having a population of five thousand or less may be chartered alone by general law. They may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law, but no tax for any purpose shall ever be lawful for any one year which shall exceed one and one-half per cent of the taxable property of such city; and all taxes shall be collectible only in current money, and all licenses and occupation taxes levied, and all fines, forfeitures and penalties accruing to said cities and towns shall be collectible

**MUST BRAND T. B. CATTLE**

By a recent order of the New York commissioner of agriculture, all practicing veterinarians in that State are required to brand cattle found by them to be affected with tuberculosis. The order specifies that the brand shall be the letter "T" not less than 2 nor more than 3 inches high and on the left jaw. The new regulation, which became effective in March, was issued by Commissioner Charles S. Wilson under authority of the agricultural law. The order applies to all bovine animals within the limits of the State. Veterinary experts of the United States Department of Agriculture consider it will be of great value to live stock breeders of New York and an important step for any State to take in the progress of tuberculosis eradication. Reactors are permanently marked by the branding process and in cases where they are not slaughtered the possibility of their being disposed of or losing their identity is greatly lessened, if not entirely eliminated.—The Cattleman.

**HOWAT SAYS MORE MINERS TO STRIKE**

Pittsburg Kans., July 26.—In stating that between 1500 and 2000 miners in District 14, United Mine Workers of America, have quit their jobs as a protest to fines levied for observing a five day week, it was predicted tonight by Alexander Howat, president of the district, that the number would reach six thousand by the middle of the week.

According to Mr. Howat many miners will drift into other lines of work, and some will go to other fields. The present situation was cited by Mr. Howat as one in which Governor Allen should enforce the industrial court law.

Governor Allen, Attorney General Hopkins and the industrial court members are invited down here," he said, "to see if they can get the men to return to work."

George Richardson commissioner of the Interstate Coal Operators' association, tonight made public a telegram from W. L. A. Johnson, representative

of the operators at a conference with John Lewis, international president of the United Mine Workers, stating that President Lewis had decided that the miners in observing the weekly holiday, were doing so in violation of the law and would be notified to return to work.

### 1920 CENSUS GIVES HALE COUNTY A TOTAL POPULATION OF 10,104

Washington D. C., July 19.—Official figures given out by Census Bureau this afternoon place the population of Hale county, Texas, at 10,104. This is an increase over the 1910 population of 2,538 or thirty-three and five tenths per cent.

The official announcement that the population of Hale county is over ten thousand persons automatically causes the separation of the office of sheriff and tax collector and the office of county clerk and district clerk.

When the candidates for the two offices were informed of the announcement by the United Press to the Herald nothing short of a sensation was created. As it is only three days until the Democratic primaries it is almost impossible for them to make any changes in their plans. The official ballots have been printed and it is too late to change them, even if it was known what changes were necessary. Most of the candidates stated that they would simply take the policy of "watchful waiting" until after the election Saturday.

Attorney H. C. Randolph stated that he had experienced a parallel circumstance in Coleman county some years ago although at that time the primaries were not held. He feels sure that the man receiving a plurality of votes Saturday will be legally permitted to take his choice of the two offices for which he has been campaigning. He will then resign the other office automatically and some means will be taken to fill it. Judge Randolph thinks that the matter should be taken up with the attorney general of the state at once for a ruling.—Plainview Herald.

The car will travel day and night continuously until at the end of the journey it noses its way down Market street in San Francisco. Eleven states will be spanned. Throughout the journey a careful and constantly checked tally will be kept of the oil and gasoline used to determine a national measure of economy and stamina for the lightweight motor car.—Amarillo Daily Tribune.

**PEOPLE MUST REMAIN ON FARM TO INCREASE SUPPLY**  
Dallas, July 25.—Something must be done to keep people on the farm and to enable them to make more than a bare living or there will be a real short age of food, Congressman Hatton W. Summers declared here recently in an address before the Dallas Advertising League.  
"And I doubt whether we will get the necessary reconstruction legislation before we have eaten up the narrow margin of food surplus," he warned.  
Mr. Summers said that at the time of the revolutionary war, 4 per cent of the inhabitants of the United States lived in towns. This had grown to 18 per cent at the time of the civil war and has now reached 50 per cent, he said. "I want to warn you city builders," he added, "you are taking the stones from the foundation and building them into a fragile but gilded superstructure."  
Right back of the high cost of living is the question of where enough food is going to be found, he declared. If the farmer is successful with his crop, then he must sell to the highest bidder, Mr. Summers pointed out, as the financial interests which back up industry have failed to work out a system for financing the farm so the farmer or himself shall profit. There must be equality of opportunity to secure equilibrium of population and the farmer boy will have to be able to get as much net profit as he can get any other place if he is expected to stay on the farm. Mr. Summers insisted that democracy in government cannot be preserved unless there is democracy in business opportunity.

**LACK OF HARMONY TO MAKE DOWNFALL NEW ORGANIZATION**  
Temple, July 25.—Lack of harmony unity and knowledge of national affairs will mark the downfall of the newly created Farmer-Labor party as a permanent national body, according to former Governor James E. Ferguson. Parley P. Christensen, Farmer-Labor candidate for President is a type that "would please the rank and file of the country, however," Mr. Ferguson added. "He is a broad-minded man and knows national affairs," the former governor said.  
Mr. Ferguson, who is presidential candidate of the American party of Texas, attended some of the meetings which resulted in formation of the new political party to Chicago. With several other Texas delegates he finally refused to affiliate with the party.

## DECLARES FARMERS CAN BUILD OWN COTTON GIN

Stamford, Texas, July 25.—"If every farmer in each West Texas county would contribute a bale of cotton toward securing a fund for a cotton mill each county in most of West Texas would have a large cotton factory in a short time," declared T. M. Cato, one of the leading cotton farmers of Jones county in a West Texas Chamber of Commerce representative.

John H. Cato, let us say that 1900 bales of cotton, of 500 lbs. each, 700,000 lbs. of cotton were given to fund for a cotton mill in each county. If 25 cents a pound is paid for cotton, for it really would mean a fund of \$175,000.00. If this fund were accepted to bring about this construction, the "cotton-bale plan" I am sure would meet with the ready response of the farmers of Jones county.

One of the largest cotton mills in the United States is in operation for a number of years at Fort Worth. It was built by the Panhandle Cotton Mill Co. and the plant is now owned by the Fort Worth Cotton Mill Co. The plant is a very modern one and has a capacity of 100,000 bales of cotton annually.

## TWO FATALLY BURNED AND \$150,000 LOSS AT VERNON

Vernon, Texas, July 24.—Fire, which started from the explosion of gasoline in a tailor shop here just before noon today, destroyed two one-story buildings and one two-story building, seriously burned four men and caused a property damage estimated from \$100,000 to \$125,000.

The injured men are Reed Smith, proprietor of the tailor shop, where the fire originated; Tom Sanderson and Charles Hansard, employees in the shop and M. E. Edwards, of Electric, who rushed into the building as the explosion occurred.

The recovery of Edwards and Sanderson is considered doubtful, and it is feared that Hansard will be blind as a result of his burns.

R. V. Parr, former County Tax collector, was seriously injured when a team of horses, frightened by the explosion, ran over him in the street.

W. A. Moffat, employe in the insurance office of C. K. McCollum, in the Wagoner National Bank building, crossed the alley from the burned buildings, was slightly burned when the initial explosion threw a flame through the window near which he was walking.

It was feared that the fire would spread to the department stores in the block fronting on Main Street, but it was held in check and confined to the buildings adjoining the alley in which the blaze originated.

The buildings were located on Pence Street, just west of the Herring National Bank and were owned by J. H. Cato.

Quantities of gas were in the buildings.

Fixed at 62 cents

The educational system of Texas has been raised to a higher standard from bottom to top and the school teachers have been given a substantial increase in pay. The splendid condition of the State's Treasury has never been equalled before in the history of Texas."

## L. C. C. ASKED TO HANDLE BIG CROPS IN TEXAS

Amarillo, July 21.—Unless farmers in the Panhandle district are able to secure the co-operation of the Interstate Commerce Commission and railroad heads in obtaining from 12,000 to 15,000 cars which will be necessary to move the wheat crop, farmers will sustain heavy losses during the next few weeks according to the Panhandle Plains Chamber of Commerce.

Harvest hands are now in the fields and present indications are that the 1920 crop will be almost as great as the crop of last year, of which \$3,000,000 worth is still in the country farmers being unable to obtain cars to carry their wheat to market, the statement said.

Relief has been promised, and should the promises be carried out, the Panhandle section of Texas will, within the next ninety days, ship more than 20,000,000 bushels of wheat.

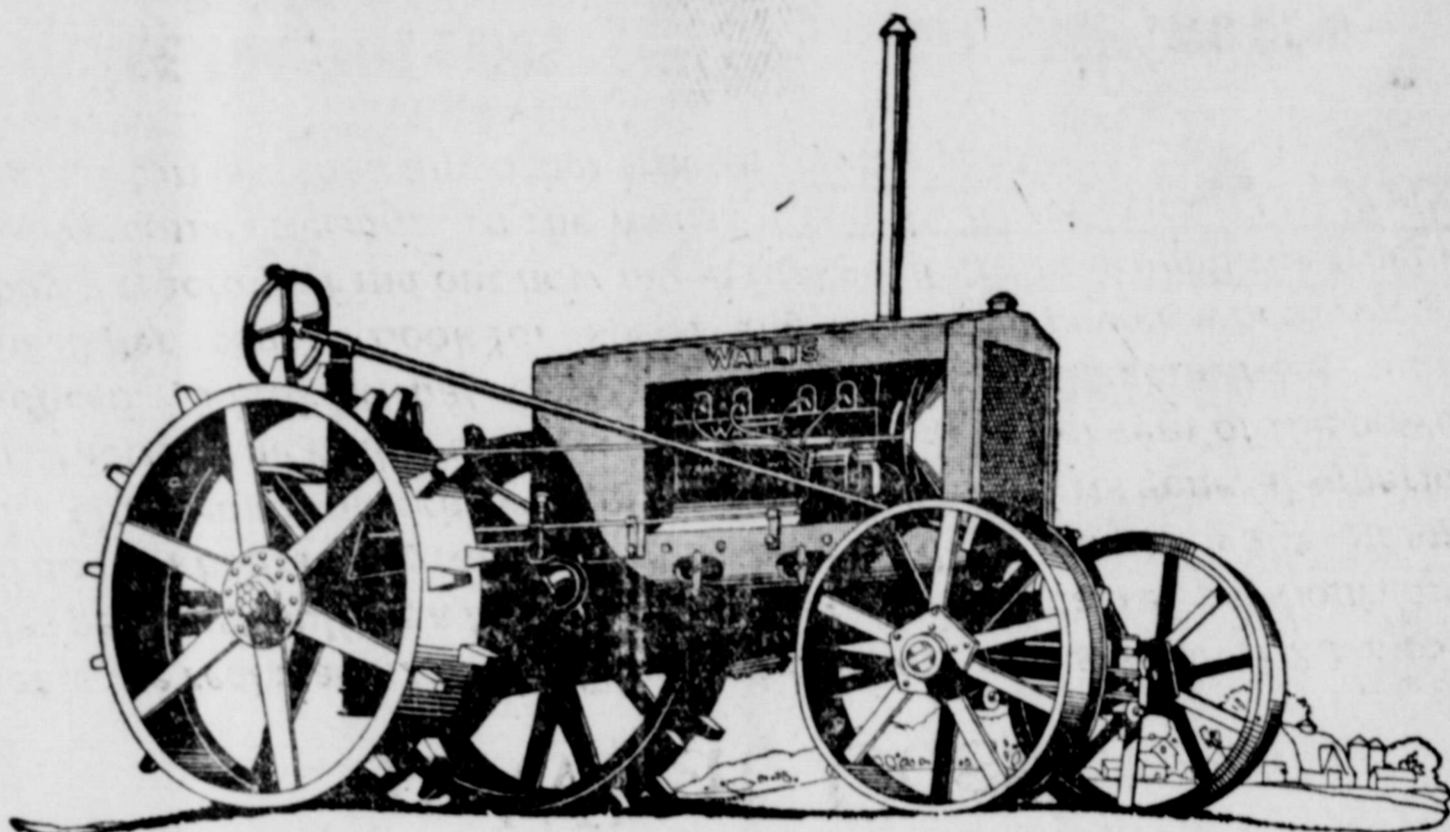
