Louisiana Governor has asked Texas to join that state in closing down the gins for thirty days and keep cotton off the market in order to bring the price back. Governor Hobby, replying says that to adopt the course of closing down the gins would mean more loss to the farmers than they would gain in the advance in price, hence he declined to make the recommendation. The president of Texas Farmers' Union concurs in the position taken by Governor Hobby, and says: "Such a move might be all right in Louisiana, where I understand crops are largely gathered, but in Texas where we have more than a million and a half bales of cotton still in the field, it would simply result in the loss of an enormous lot of this cotton, and financial ruin to the farmers who produce it."

### ORGANIZATION OF COTTON EXPORT CORPORATION IS VERY NECESSARY

Dallas, Texas, Oct. 29.—The organization of a Cotton Export Corporation to handle low grade cotton and deal directly with the consumers in Europe is the economic hope of the South, according to Joe Sparks, assistant treasurer of the Democratic National Committee, who is in Texas for several days. Mr. Sparks comes to Texas in the interest of the Democratic party and also to confer with bankers, farmers and business men concerning the organization of the American Products Export and Import Corporation.

"The American Products Export and Import Corporation has been organized under the state laws of South Carolina," according to Mr. Sparks, "with a capital stock of ten million dollars. The corporation is headed by R. I. Manning, for four years governor of South Carolina. It is planned to extend this corporation throughout the Southern states. The leading bankers, farmers and business men in each state will have representation on the board of directors. The books of subscription for the Cotton Export Corporation were opened last week in South Carolina to date the farmers, business men and other citizens of that state have subscribed nearly one million dollars in stock.

"When the corporation was first proposed in South Carolina the tentative plan of organization was submitted to William Gibbs McAdoo, former secretary of the treasury. Mr. McAdoo at once recognized the great merit of the proposition and immediately gave it his absolute approval. He was so impressed with the plan that he offered services free in the organization of the corporation. At the present time Mr. McAdoo is in the field speaking for the national committee. As soon as he returns to New York he will be asked to come south and take the leadership in this great economic movement. Mr. McAdoo will be asked by the Export Corporation to make at least four speeches in the South to arouse the farmers and business men to the necessity of an export corporation to meet the present situation. He will probably speak in Columbia, Atlanta, New Orleans and Dallas.

"The chief purpose," said Mr. Sparks "of the corporation is to create a direct market from the producer to the consumer. There was never a time in the history of the world for laying the foundation for a corporation of this nature so opportune. A large portion of the spinners of Europe are idle because they have not the funds with which to purchase cotton. Therefore, Europe, one of the largest consumers of low grade cotton, is now and has been for several years out of the market. A representative of one of the European governments has stated that it was the desire of his government to trade directly with the producer and that if the cotton producer will furnish the opportunity whereby they might secure the needed cotton at this time his country would never forget the kindness and he was positive it would mean the beginning of a permanent arrangement whereby cotton could be sold direct from the producer to his mills.

"There is at the present time a large amount of low grade cotton held and unsold in the cotton belt and there is unprecedented difference in prices for the respective grades. This difference or slack in the prices should be materially reduced as soon as the low grade cotton begins to move to Europe. The American Cotton Export Corporation should be the medium for moving this cotton.

"The capital stock of the South Carolina Corporation is to be divided into shares of \$1 each in value. This par value of ten dollars was arrived at so as to prevent subscribers in cotton and Liberty bonds from having to pay any great sum of money into the treasury, in order to make up an over multiple of stock. The subscriptions and stock are payable in cash, Liberty bonds at market value or cotton at its market value. No stock will be offered for sale, of course, in any state until all requirements of law have been complied with. Strong appeal will be made to all business men and all bankers. The prosperity of the entire population is dependent upon the financial condition of the cotton farmers of the South.

Several cotton export corporations are being formed at various points in the south. It is the purpose of Mr. Sparks to co-ordinate all of these corporations under one head and to ask Mr. McAdoo to take the lead in the creation of one great all-Southern cotton export corporation. Citizens of Texas desiring full detailed information concerning the plans of this corporation should address the home office of the corporation at Columbus, S. C.

### MURDER MAY HAVE BEEN COMMITTED IN RANGER HOTEL FIRE

Ranger, Oct. 29.—Murder and arson was committed in the Pine street fire in Ranger, wherein a blind fiddler lost his life and property damaged of \$400,000 sustained, is a belief supported by evidence just discovered.

A letter written from a Texas point to a Baptist minister here states that the writer has been told by an eye-witness to the deed that the Prince Rupert hotel, where the fire started, was set afire.

The writer of the letter states that he is a clerk in the Baptist church, 58 years old, a business man and that the knowledge he has of the crime that has been committed is weighing on his conscience. The writer gives the names of all the parties concerned in the alleged confession. He states that he wishes to hide nothing that would interfere with justice.

### SANTA FE ANNOUNCES CHANGES IN OFFICIALS IN PANHANDLE DIVISION

Amarillo, Oct. 29.—A number of changes have been made among Santa Fe officials as announced from the general manager's office, which will become effective Nov. 1.

J. B. Briscoe, for a number of years trainmaster for the Pecos division, will become assistant superintendent of the Plains division with headquarters at Amarillo.

C. S. Cravens, transportation inspector at Wellington, succeeds Mr. Briscoe as trainmaster of the Pecos division.

H. R. McKee, trainmaster of the New Mexico division with headquarters at Las Vegas, has been made assistant superintendent of the western division with headquarters at Dodge City, Kan.

W. C. Ashcraft, trainmaster of the Colorado division takes Mr. McKee's place on the New Mexico division.

J. E. Agee, trainmaster of the River division at La Junta, succeeds Mr. Ashcraft on the Colorado division and R. E. Gish, transportation inspector, succeeds Mr. Agee on the River division.

J. F. Fletcher, master mechanic, has been made superintendent of shops at La Junta, Colo.

### 1,600 BALES OF BOLLY COTTON SENT TO EUROPE

More than 1,600 bales of West Texas low grade cotton has been turned over by the growers for shipment to Europe by George Finberg, cotton factor of Abilene, under the so-called Finberg plan, adopted recently by the directors of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

This information was brought to Ft. Worth by W. T. Wheeler, assistant manager of the West Texas Chamber, who will be in the city for the next day or so.

The plan of Finberg is to make an initial shipment of perhaps 15,000 bales to three European ports, there to be sold to the best advantage, or, if the market is unsatisfactory, to be stored until it improves. The farmer deposits \$20 with the nearest bank to cover expenses, the cotton is shipped to the nearest compress and then sent to Galveston for concentration. The farmer gets back his \$20 out of the sale of the cotton and is out a commission of 5 per cent to the Finberg house for handling.

It is pointed out that the bolly cotton is unsalable in this country, so that Europe is the only place where it can be disposed of. It is estimated that there are 65,000 bales of this class in West Texas. Fort Worth Star Telegram.

### CLOSING OF COTTON GINS PLAN RAPPED

For Worth, Oct. 29.—In a statement issued here this morning, President Lyday of the Texas Farmers Union denounced the request of Governor A. Riker of Louisiana that all cotton gins

close this month in order to raise the price of the staple.

"Such a policy would mean the financial ruin of Texas farmers," said Lyday. "We still have a million and half bales of cotton to gather, while most of the Louisiana crop has been picked. I understand.

### WANT "JAG" MILLS PUT OUT OF BUSINESS

The increasing drunkenness over the Panhandle, which is more especially marked in Amarillo and points down the Decker, according to reports which reach Floydada, is causing the newspapers of those sections to wake up and ask questions of their officials. Persons who reside in Floyd county and realize that the bootlegger can be put out of business and kept 95 per cent out of business, will also wonder why the officers "up the line" cannot have as good success as here.

Recently the Amarillo Daily Tribune said:

Booze lovers are getting liquor in Amarillo fairly freely. Examination of the Police Court blotter discloses that men are frequently fined for being drunk. Young men of the city are getting alcohol somewhere. Why does the police department merely assess a nominal fine against the drunk? Is it not the duty of the officers of the law to run down the worse offender, the man who is selling the alcohol? Police have bigger duties than the mere arrest of speeders, vagrants, drunks and corner cutters.

And the Hall County Herald at Memphis would like to have the source of their drunks traced down. It says: "Some whiskey stills have been found in Collinsworth county and destroyed. Judging by the drunkenness here occasionally one would think that Hall county and even Memphis is not entirely clear of these gin mills. It might be well for our officers to do a little detective work and trace the source of supply of some of the drunks. There is no reason to believe that Hall county booze fighters is any more above the rest than a similar character from Collinsworth or Childress county."

The fact that the larger cities are overrun with bootleggers and that the police courts have their regular morning session with the boys who have imbibed too much, is no reason why West Texas, where all the sentiments is against whiskey, cannot keep the booze peddler off its highways.

If Amarillo and Wellington and Memphis let the bootleggers get by while assessing a fine against the man who buys who makes no profit and gets nothing out of it but the "jag" it may be taken for granted that it will become increasingly harder for the other officers of the Panhandle to enforce the Prohibition laws.—Floydada Hesperian.

### FABULOUS WEALTH AT BOTTOM OF SEA

"Out of sight, out of mind." How true this old adage is! How many people ever give a thought now to the vast amount of treasure and property lost in the war, and which might be recovered? Says London Ideas: "We all know that millions of tons

of shipping were sunk, and those connected with the sea will realize that the major portion lies "in soundings," the wily Hun, always systematic, lying in wait, according to plan, were large numbers of ships were bound to converge—entrances to the English and Bristol Channels, etc.

Without taking into account the val-

ue of the hulls—and think of what it costs to build a ship now—the majority are full of raw material and much other cargo that is not liable to deteriorate by sea water.

Many salvage companies have been formed recently, but even now the projects are in their infancy, considering the vast opportunities and the great wealth awaiting those who venture. This is partly due to the absence of a reliable diving equipment for depths over 23 fathoms (438 feet).

Numerous "marine harvests" lie at such a depth and less, but many El Dorados are at greater depths, and no diver can work at more than 23 fathoms for more than twenty minutes, for the pressure and strain on him are tremendous.

A great advance has been made in the use of collapsible pontoons, and it is possible that the Lusitania will be raised by their use eventually. There are various types and sizes but essentially a salvage pontoon is a strong rubber and canvas bag, air and water-tight.

Wire or chain slings are passed at equal distances, if possible, under the sunken hull, the amount of buoyance to lift the ship is calculate, and to the ends of the slings the deflated pontoons are secured.

The attendant vessels compressor is then brought into play and the pontoons are pumped full of air, the pressure being carefully equalized and compressed and the wreck eventually rises to waterlevel and is towed in.

At first sight this would appear to a layman to be easy money, but there are many difficulties and disappointments in salvage work.

The vessel might be lying on her side, or in a capsized position (the majority of torpedoed vessels are in such positions); strong currents have to be expected, and a short day of unfavorable weather frequently wrecks the patient toil of weeks, often when the success of the operation is in sight.

The history of the *Tobermory* galloon, will be familiar to most readers, and the wreck is in a comparatively sheltered spot.

Often, some of the enterprises have to be abandoned, owing to insurmountable difficulties, and at other times they end most profitably.

Not long ago a large steamer was located off the northwest coast of Scotland, and after a good deal of doubt concerning the feasibility of raising her, operations were started.

The usual methods were impossible, but with a battery of pontoons shackled to the only accessible part—the stern of the vessel—she was raised in to a slanting position and towed into shallow water, where the handling was easier.

From venture, the success of which was considered remote, a handsome profit was made by the enterprising sal-

vors in a surprisingly short time.

Many months ago a large sailing vessel, the *Andrian*, was salvaged from a reef off Cape Horn. She was found so little damaged about the hull that she was able to make the long voyage home when supplied with the necessary spars and sails, without any other aid. She had remained in that inhospitable region for over twenty years.

The English Channel is simply paved with rich prizes, and the salvage company with the most life and courage will secure these pots of gold.

It is a case of Always at it wins the day.

It will be realized that the most important part—after locating the wreck is to get the slings securely passed, ready for the pontoons, and for this it is absolutely necessary that a diver should be on the spot to make a satisfactory job, and to definitely know how the slings and pontoons are placed.

Grappings, irons and the like, which might be thought of use, are unsatisfactory, and for all practical purposes, useless.

At first thought, a diving suit to resist pressure, and allow the diver to work under nearly normal atmospheric conditions for depths greater than twenty fathoms, seems an easy proposition, but remember the joints and other movable parts.

One inventor claims to have a suit in which a diver can work in comfort at ninety fathoms, but the writer has not heard of any conspicuous successes to date.

A fortunate awaits anyone inventing a satisfactory diving dress for depths of to, say, one hundred fathoms, and now is the time. The need is urgent. But, of course to invent such a diving dress is not so easy as it looks. Try it and see.

### TEXAS UTILITIES CO. IMPROVING PLANT

Lubbock, Oct. 31.—The Texas Utilities company at this point has just received more than \$10,000 worth of new and modern ice manufacturing machinery which is now being installed in connection with their present local light, power and ice plant. During the last few years this company has built up its wholesale ice trade throughout the entire South Plains section, and the new machinery is intended to double the present capacity of their plant and afford them sufficient output to handle the ever increasing demand occasioned by the rapid settlement of the entire South Plains section.

Efforts are being made to establish a cold storage plant in connection with the local factory, in order to handle the needs of this section in the way of curing for produce for retail consumption and storage of produce gathered by dealers over the South Plains.

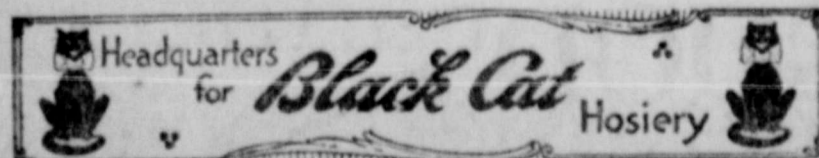

### HOW OUR PRESIDENTS ARE ELECTED

Speaking of the manner of how our Presidents are elected in America, Tom Flinty of the Dallas News staff, gives some very interesting facts and observations as follows:

"Under the Constitution of the United States, each State is entitled to 'appoint' a number of Presidential electors equaling the number of its representatives in both branches of Congress. Thus, as Texas has two United States Senators and eighteen Representatives, it is entitled to name twenty electors. Every State may appoint its electors in such manner as it may by law provide. For many years the law of every State has provided that its electors shall be chosen by vote of the people, and Congress has designated the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November in every four years as the day for such choosing.

Accordingly the people in every State will, on next Tuesday, vote for Presidential electors, rather than for candidates for President and Vice President. In each State the candidates for electors in the allowed number who receive the highest number of votes will be elected. Electors must be residents of the State from which chosen and shall not be members of either branch of Congress. On the second Monday in January following the election, the electors in each state will assemble at the capital thereof and vote for President and Vice President. These electors, assembled by States, and not in a single group, constituting what is known as 'the electoral college.' They have been so designated by law since 1833, but that term had been previously applied to them informally. The vote of each elector is recorded. Thus it is that in pivotal States the electoral vote sometimes is split. This was true of West Virginia in 1916, when Wilson received seven electoral votes and Hughes one. Usually the people vote straight tickets, but there was sufficient scratching and voting of mixed tickets in West Virginia to elect one Republican."

### FLOYDADA NEWS ITEMS

One of the largest crops of pumpkins, squash and cushaws in the history of Floyd county, was raised this year, many farmers having some fine samples of these fall and winter eating varieties of fine products.

F. M. Price, who lives in the north-east suburbs of Floydada, was one of the successful growers of squashes and cushaws. He had about one-fourth of an acre planted to them on which grew some eight or ten wagon loads. One variety, a winter squash, known as the Pike's Peak squash was particularly prolific.

The granary on the farm of W. M. Board in Carr's Chapel community, burst Tuesday night of last week during an electrical display and spilled about half its contents on the ground, the presumption being that the lightning caused the wrecking of the building.

Only two persons in Floyd county, both of them men, took advantage of the recently passed law extending the time under Texas laws, when poll taxes might be paid in order to vote in this year's general election.

Friends in Floydada of G. D. French for a number of years a resident of this place, but since last winter a resident of the City of Dallas, will regret to learn of his demise at his home there last Friday morning.

C. E. Bauck, who spent last summer in Floyd county, while engaged in the harvest, and who was arrested in early September by Sheriff J. A. Grigsby on a charge of forgery, was sentenced in District court in Floydada last week to two years in the state penitentiary. Bauck worked for Cross & Sons near Lockney and about the time he left forged a \$42 check on them. The forgery was not known for two or three weeks. When the matter was given to Sheriff Grigsby he located the man at Stamford and got the confession from Bauck before his arrest.

The fire got after Olin Fry's sudan grass several weeks ago when his barn burned, finished its work last week when the Farmers Elevator at Lockney was burned, and now there is no more of the crop left. Mr. Fry built a new barn on his farm and while the threshing was turning out his sudan he was storing it there. He had about 2,000 pounds in the barn when it burned. Following the fire he hauled the rest of the crop, about 1,000 pounds to market. And it was still in the elevator.

### WANT "JAG" MILLS PUT OUT OF BUSINESS

The increasing drunkenness over the Panhandle, which is more especially marked in Amarillo and points down the Denver, according to reports which reach Floydada, is causing the newspapers of those sections to wake up and ask questions of their officials. Persons who reside in Floyd county and realize that the bootlegger can be put out of business and kept 95 per cent out of business, will also wonder why the officers "up the line" cannot have as good success as here.

Recently the Amarillo Daily Tribune said:

Booze lovers are getting liquor in Amarillo fairly freely. Examination of the Police Court blotter discloses that men are frequently fined for being drunk. Young men of the city are getting alcohol somewhere. Why does the police department merely assess a nominal fine against the drunk? Is it not the duty of the officers of the law to run down the worse offender, the man who is selling the alcohol? Police have bigger duties than the mere arrest of speeders, vagrants, drunks and corner cutters.

And the Hall County Herald at Memphis would like to have the source of their drunks traced down. It says:

Some whiskey stills have been found in Collinsworth county and destroyed. Judging by the drunkenness here occasionally one would think that Hall county and even Memphis is not entirely clear of these gin mills. It might be well for our officers to do a little detective work and trace the source of supply of some of the drunks. There is no reason to believe that Hall county booze fighters is any more above the art than a similar character from Collinsworth or Childress county.

The fact that the larger cities are overrun with bootleggers and that the police courts have their regular morning session with the boys who have indulged too much, is no reason why West Texas, where all the sentiments is against whiskey, cannot keep the booze peddler off its highways.

If Amarillo and Wellington and Memphis let the bootleggers get by while assessing a fine against the man who buys who makes no profit and gets nothing out of it but the "jag" it may be taken for granted that it will become increasingly harder for the other officers of the Panhandle to enforce the Prohibition laws. —Floydada Hesperian.

### FINE VEAL HIDE NOW WORTH 42c—HIDES 2c LB.

The hide of a choice 250 pound calf sold in Canyon this morning for 42 cents. The same hide one year ago would have been worth \$6.30. The calf was fat, and the hide the most desirable on the market.

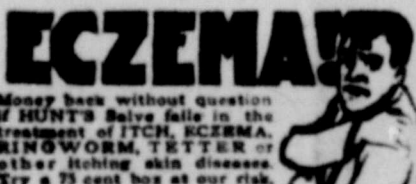
