## Farm Management Meeting To Be Held January 13

The second in a series of Farm Management meetings will be held Monday afternoon at 2 p.m. January 13 in the Assembly room of the courthouse.

Jim Murphrey, Area Farm Management Specialist, with the Extension Service will be present to discuss "Setting Up and Keeping Farm Accounts", also "Methods of Evaluation and Analyzing your Farm Accounts". "A Study of Variable and Fixed Costs" will also be discussed by Mr. Murphrey. Dr. W. F. Bennett, Agronomist with the Western Ammonia Corporation, will help with this discussion of variable costs using fertilizers as an example.

Charles Hotel, County Agent, said the first meeting of this series was well attended and urges everyone to take advantage of this meeting. The meeting will be approximately two hours in length.

## New Service Department In Operation

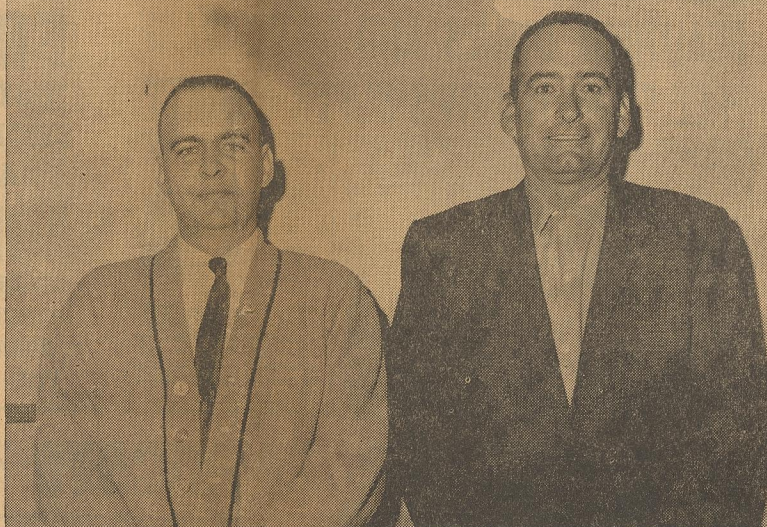

## Mother Of Mrs. Latimer Passes Away Sunday

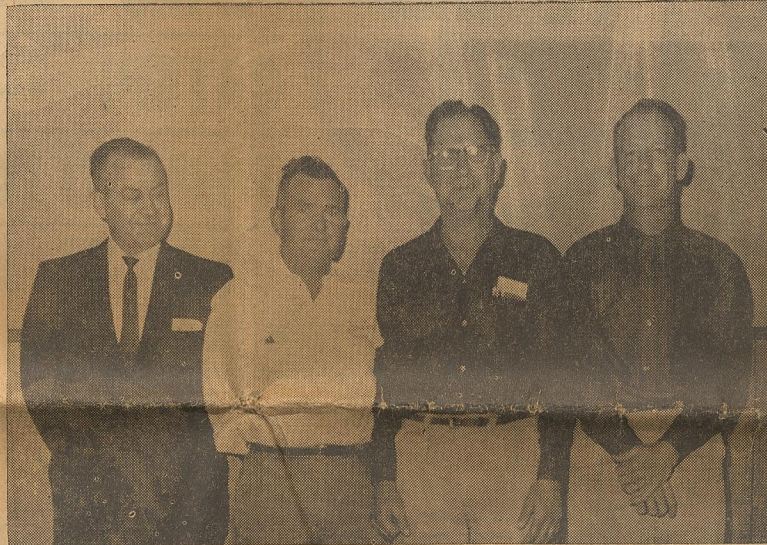

## Mills Reelected To SCD Board Of Supervisors

Wade Mills of Hart was reelected to another 5-year term as Supervisor from Zone 5 of the Running Water Soil Conservation District at an election held in the Farmers State Bank at Hart on December 30, 1963. This is the second time for Mills to be elected to this position.

During his first term as a member of the Board of Supervisors of the Running Water Soil Conservation District, he has served two full terms as Chairman of the Board, one year as Vice Chairman. He was selected as one of the five Outstanding Supervisors in the State of Texas in 1962.

In addition to his work as a member of the Board of Supervisors, Mills has also done an outstanding job of soil and water conservation on his farms in the Hart area. His farms have become show places of conservation and there are few weeks pass that someone in the Running Water Soil Conservation District does not stop by and see what Mills is doing in the way of Soil and Water Conservation.

Other members serving on the Board of Supervisors are Fred Axe, Ernest Brockman, Irvin Ott and M. L. McFarland.

## Annual Election Set January 14

The ballot for the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District's Annual Election will have an added question for the voters consideration on January 14.

The unusual question on the ballot will be for and against the annexation of more than 800 square miles of Swisher County to the District. The area proposed for annexation includes all of Swisher County except the Palo Duro Canyon area on the Eastern boundary.

At the same time that people living within the bounds of the District are deciding this question, the people of Swisher County will also be voting for and against the annexation question.

On the 1964 ballot, the resident voters of Castro County will be voting for two County Committeemen positions being held now by C. W. Anthony and George Bradford. The names on the ballot for Commissioner's Precinct number 2 are Earl Lust and Frank Wise; for Committeeman At-Large are Ray Riley and Tommy Stanton.

The 1963 Committee for Castro County made up of C. W. Anthony, George Bradford, Lester Dowell, Lester Gladden and H. E. Henley has issued 152 permits from January 1, 1963 to November, 1963. During this time, 125 wells have been drilled. The committeemen serve three year terms and the Directors two-year terms.

The polling places in Castro County are Hardware Company, Nazareth, Joe Birkenfeld election judge; County Courthouse, Dimmitt, Jim Elder, election judge; Easter Community Center, Easter; Mrs. S. L. Garrison, election judge; American Legion, Hall, Hart, Percy Hart, election judge.

For those who will be out of town on January 14, they can vote absentee at the County Clerk's office until January 10.

## Electric Arc Short Course Planned Here

An electric arc welding short course will be conducted in the Dimmitt High School Vo-Ag Building during the week of January 13, according to Paul Hilburn, Superintendent of Schools. Joe Morgan, Sales Representative of Marquette Manufacturing Company, Amarillo, will be the instructor of the short course which will be sponsored by the Dimmitt Vo-Ag Department in cooperation with the Plains Welding Supply Company of Plainview.

The starting time for each of the five nights of the short course will be 7 p.m. sharp and will end promptly at 10 p.m., according to Mr. Morgan. "This will keep the wives off my back!" he exclaimed.

Maximum enrollment will be limited to twenty men because of the limited number of welding outlets in the shop. Also, a fee of \$3.00 will be charged to help defray the cost of welding supplies. Enrollment will be determined on a "first pay basis."

Those men who are interested in taking the short course should contact Mr. Hilburn or Elroy Otte, Vo-Ag Teacher. All phases of electric arc welding will be covered.

Nazareth held a six point lead at the end of the first quarter. They increased the lead to 17-9 in the half. Scoring was 31-18 going into the last eight minutes.

Marvin Hoelting was high point player with 14. Denis Gerber scored in the double figures to aid the Swifts. Jimmy Hoelting grabbed 11 rebounds to lead the Swifts defensively. Julius Birkenfeld had 10 rebounds for a good average.

The Swifts' season record is 7-3. All three losses have been to 1-A schools. The Swifts next home game will be with Price College, St. Mary's of Amarillo at 6:30 p.m., Tuesday.

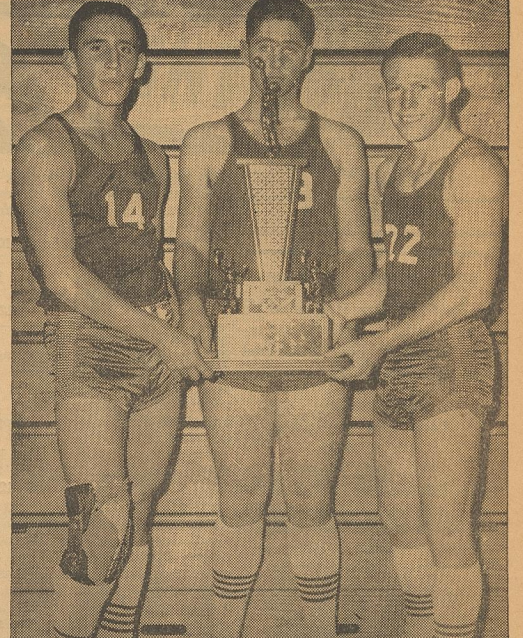

In naming Taylor as recipient of the "Oscar" of the livestock industry, the Record Stockman cited the Texas rancher for his years of leadership in state and national organizations; his dedicated work toward the improvement and the marketing of livestock; his perseverance in the promotion of beef; his earnestness in providing opportunities for young people; his faith in the land and in the cattle industry; and his devoted leadership in community and civic affairs.

Jay Taylor was born Jan. 24, 1902, on the Suggs Ranch in Montague County, Tex. His father, the late James Taylor, was a wagon boss for the Suggs spread. The Taylor family later moved to Walters, Okla., where Jay received his early education and grew to manhood. Here, on the Taylors' Oklahoma stock farm, which is still owned by the family, Jay worked with his father in developing a registered Shorthorn herd of cattle.

He later went to work in the oil fields to earn money for college and enrolled at the University of Oklahoma to study Petroleum engineering. During this time, he went to work for the far-flung Haliburton enterprises, a firm of which he was later to become general manager and executive vice president. He moved to Amarillo

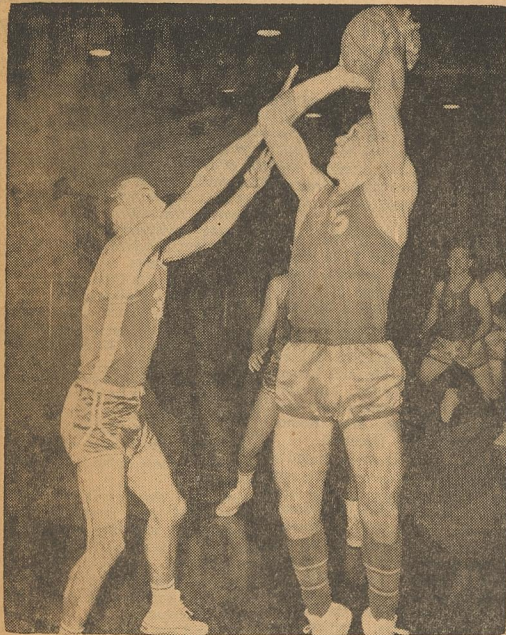

### Research Started On Beef Carcass

Beef carcass research at Texas A&M University encompasses the identification of desirable carcass characteristics from the standpoint of quality, palatability and cutability.

"Cutability" is the measure of the edible meat which a carcass will yield, explains Frank A. Orts, Extension Service meats specialist.

Research at Texas A&M is designed to identify sires responsible for the production of carcasses which will yield at least 48 percent of the carcass weight in boneless closely trimmed chuck, rib, round, loin and rump.

Identification of these superior cattle will assure the homemaker of a steak or roast which is lean, yet very tender and tasty, Orts explains.

Quality and palatability characteristics being investigated are ten-

dermess, color of lean and marbling. Research also is being conducted at all the major livestock shows of the state to determine the estimated cutability of all high-placing steers. This information is being made available to county Extension agents in an attempt to provide a yardstick for use in selecting steers for shows of the future.

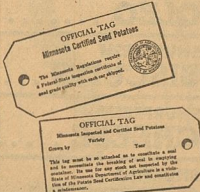
