Amarillo, Feb. 14.-extension of homeseeker's rates to the Panhancle, so as to include Southwestern States and Texas points, in the territory from which these rates are now effective, is being sought by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the Board of City Devel-

The Texas and Pacific has granted these rates from Fort Worth to West Texas points, and similar action has been asked of the Fort Worth and Denver, Santa Fe and Rock Island. At present these rates are in effect from Northern States on the first and third Tuesdays of each month, and railway officers here report a considerable movement because of them.

WANT HOME DEMONSTRA-TION AGENT IN FLOYD

The question of a Home Demonstration agent for Floyd county was brought before the Commissioners' court again this week, when on Tues day a delegation of women from Ploydada, Lockney and Lakeview, ac companied by Prof. Geo. R. Orms, of A. M. College, and Miss Mamie Hayden, District Home Demonstration agent, presented additional petitions for the home demonstration work in Floyd county and gave oral arguments for such an action on the part of the court.

The delegations were received in the county court room. Prof. Orms detailed to some length in a 20-minute talk some of the ways a Home Demonstration agent could be worth while to a county, and Miss Hayden addressed the court briefly. Floyd county women who addressed the court in favor of the Home Demon-McAdams, C. L. Cowart, Stapleton and Walker of Lockney; Mrs. W. T. Barlan of Lakeview; Mesames L. V. Smith, C. J. Menefee of Floydada. Some thirty persons were in the dele gation that called on the court. J. D. Christian of McCoy, W. B. Jordan of Center, and W. D. Newell, of Newland, made short talks favoring the beginning of the Home Demonstration service in Floyd county, as did J. H. Green of Floydada, and G. M. Bullard of Fairview.

At a session of the court some weeks ago the court voted not to employ a Home Demonstration Agent this year, and an order to this effect was spread on the minutes of the court. It was the request of the dele gation that this order be rescinded and the way thus opened for the possible employment of the agent.





CONCRETE SATISFIES AS ROAD MATERIAL

Stone and Cement Makes Long Wearing Highway.

Concrete roads, properly made with good Portland cement, offer considerable choic of basic mater-For District Attorney, 64th Judicial tals, according to the local market, and a satisfactory long wearing road when completed. For suburban and rural roads concrete is an ideal road material. Concrete consists of a mixture of water, cement sand, and gravel or stone of many varieties. Engineers call the sand part the "fine aggregate," and the pebbles or rocks the "coarse aggregate." Given clean aggregates and good cement and the road when finished will be durable, dustless, easily maintained, and smooth.

> The two disadvantages, cracking and breaking at the edges, can both be overcome. Cracking, a result of emperture changes, and stress does little or no harm if the crack is promptly filled. Proper shoulders at the edge of the road eleminate the dangerous depression cause by the carlier neglect of this part of the road building, before it was understood how water and weather wear away the edge-protecting earth.

The two general types of concrete pavement are known as one-course and two-course pavement. The former consists of one course of concrete, all of which is mixed in the same proportion and composed of the same kind of materials, while the latter consists of two courses, usually mixed in different proportions and containing different kinds of aggregate. The one-course pavement is much simpler to construct than the two-course type.

In the two-course type of construction local coarse aggregate of average or low wearing qualities is use in the lower course and imported aggregate with high resistance to wear is used in the top course. If the only materials locally available for use as aggregate are of inferior quality, it is more economical to use them for aggregate in the lower course of a two-course pavement and imported aggregate for the wearing course than to employ a TALKS ABOUT THE JAPS one-course pavement and import all the aggregate.
