### POULTRY SPECIALIST WILL VISIT FLOYD COUNTY

On the morning of the 29th, at 10 o'clock, he will meet with the Providence Girl's 44 Club and boys of that community at the school house. Then in the afternoon at 2:30, Mr. Glazner will meet with the Providence Women's Home Demonstration Club at the home of Mrs. E. C. Phillips. Women and men from adjoining communities who are interested in poultry should not miss this meeting.

On the afternoon of the 30th, Mr. Glazner will meet with the Fairview Women's Home Demonstration Club at 2:30 in the home of Mrs. Mayfield.

### BOYS CLUB CALVES BRED IN FLOYD CO., TOP OKLA. MARKET

A carload of steers purchased from Fred Bourland of Floyd County and Fed out by the vocational class of the Davis Oklahoma High School topped the Oklahoma City market at \$11.50 per hundredweight April 14th. This price is reported as being the peak price paid for Oklahoma fed cattle since November 1920 which indicates the quality and finish put on the Texas calves by these club boys. There were 25 head of deboned Herefords averaging 899 pounds sold at the top figure and the cattle were

the outstanding feature of the day at stockyards. A ration of hay and oat straw made these steers look like "butter balls". Nineteen boys from 15 to 17 years old took care of the calves under the direction of Prof. Oursler of the school and County Agent Lewis.

The Davis Chamber of Commerce and a local stockman-farmer encouraged and financed the transaction which was profitable to the boys as well as educational to them. It was an excellent and practical demonstration of what can be done by feeding our cattle for market when stuff of breeding and quality such as the Bourland calves is given a well balanced fattening ration.

**SCHOLASTIC POPULATION OF COUNTY INCREASES**

The total school population of Floyd County according to the figures in the office of the County Superintendent is 3,440 whites, 9 negroes and 5 Mexicans. Every district showed a gain with the exception of three which showed a slight decrease and three which just held their own. The Floydada Independent School District has 727 enrolled with a gain of 29 over 1924. The Lockney Independent School District had an enrollment of 456 with a gain of 13 over last year's enrollment.

The totals for 1925 by districts is as follows: Irick 114; Pleasant Valley 71; Muncy 38; Pleasant Hill 58; Fairview 100; Starkey 90; Aiken 119; Sunset 72; Sand Hill 88; Harmony 62; Lakeview 137; Fairmount 41; Center 70; Lone Star 88; Cedar 81; McCoy 87; Roseland 78; Mayview 48; Baker 104; Antelope 80; Providence 67; Blanco 26; Allmon 95; Liberty 72; Prairie Chapel 116; Campbell 73; Ramsey 54; Hill crest 22; Goodnight 65; Mountain View 17; Newland 29; The total rural scholastic population is 2271 as against 1960 in 1924. The colored scholastic population is in District No. 22, Blanco with one; in District No. 25 Prairie Chapel with one; and with 7 in the Floydada Independent School District. The Mexican scholastic population totals 5 in District No. 29, Goodnight.

These figures are subject to correction and at present the Office of the County Superintendent is at work compiling a consolidated census roll for the county and will possibly find some discrepancies.

### FIRST STATE BANK CONVERTS TO NATIONAL

The First State Bank of Floydada has received advice from the Comptroller of Currency at Washington, D. C., advising that their application for a national banking charter under the name of The Floyd County National Bank of Floydada, has been granted.

Details of the conversation from a charter under the State Banking system to that of the National System have been completed by the bank and with the filing of conversation papers within a very short time the bank will cease to operate under its state charter and will go under the national system.

The First State Bank was organized under the State Banking Laws in 1909. Since that time it has played a large part in the development of the county, and has been an outstanding financial institution in this section. At this time it is in excellent condition, having one of the strongest ratios of cash reserve of any of the banks in this territory.

No change in the board of directors officials or stockholders will be affected in the change from the state to the national charter. -Floydada Hesperian.

### HIGHER POSTAGE RATES ON ALL BUT FIRST-CLASS MAIL

All mail matter leaving the Fort Worth postoffice Thursday, except first-class matter, bore stamps of a higher rate than previously or else will be returned to the sender, according to Postmaster Moore.

Postal cards printed by the Government may still be sent out for 1 cent. But private cards require 2 cents postage.

Third class matter now requires 1-2 cents for each two ounces instead of 1 cent.

Special delivery mail will be carried for the extra 10-cent fee up to two pounds. Up to ten pounds will cost 15 cents and over 10 pounds 20 cents. Merchandise requiring special handling may be treated as first class matter by use of a 25-cent special handling stamp.

Publishers' rates for mailing newspapers and periodicals remain the same. But private mailing rates are increased from 1 cent for each four ounces for any weight, to 2 cents for each 2 ounces up to eight ounces.

Every package in fourth class matter requires a 2-cent service charge, except those mailed on rural routes. The old zone rates apply.

Money order rates have been increased from 5 cents to 22 cents, which includes the minimum amount sendable, up to \$100.

Insurance on third and fourth class matter has been increased from 5 cents on matter up to \$5 to 25 cents on \$100. Return receipts will be issued for 3 cents as well as on registered packages. The registered mail fee has been increased from 10 cents to 15 cents to 20 cents, according to value of the package.

Rates on C. O. D., third and fourth class matter are 12 cents up to \$10 and up to 25 cents on \$50 to \$100. -Fort Worth Star Telegram.

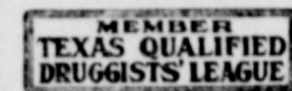

S. W. Meharg who has just finished taking the scholastic census for this year advises that the total number is now 1703. In 1920 the population of Plainview according to the government was 3950. With this same proportion running true, Plainview now has a population of 5100, conservatively estimated.

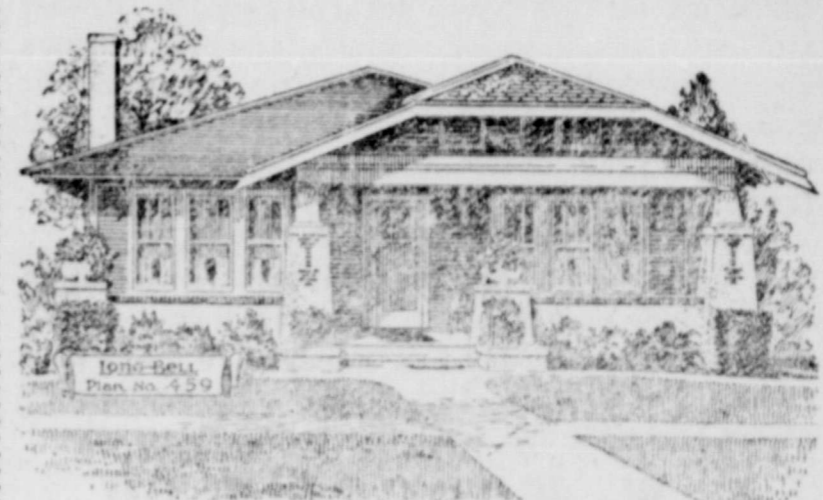

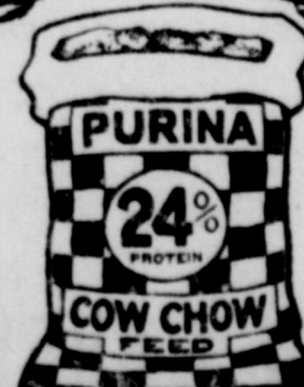

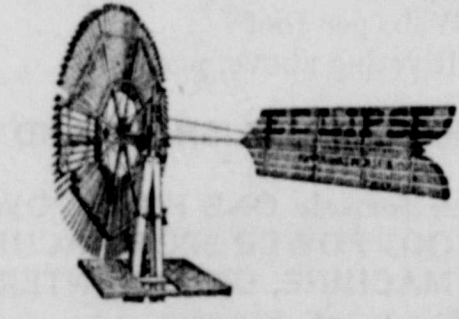
