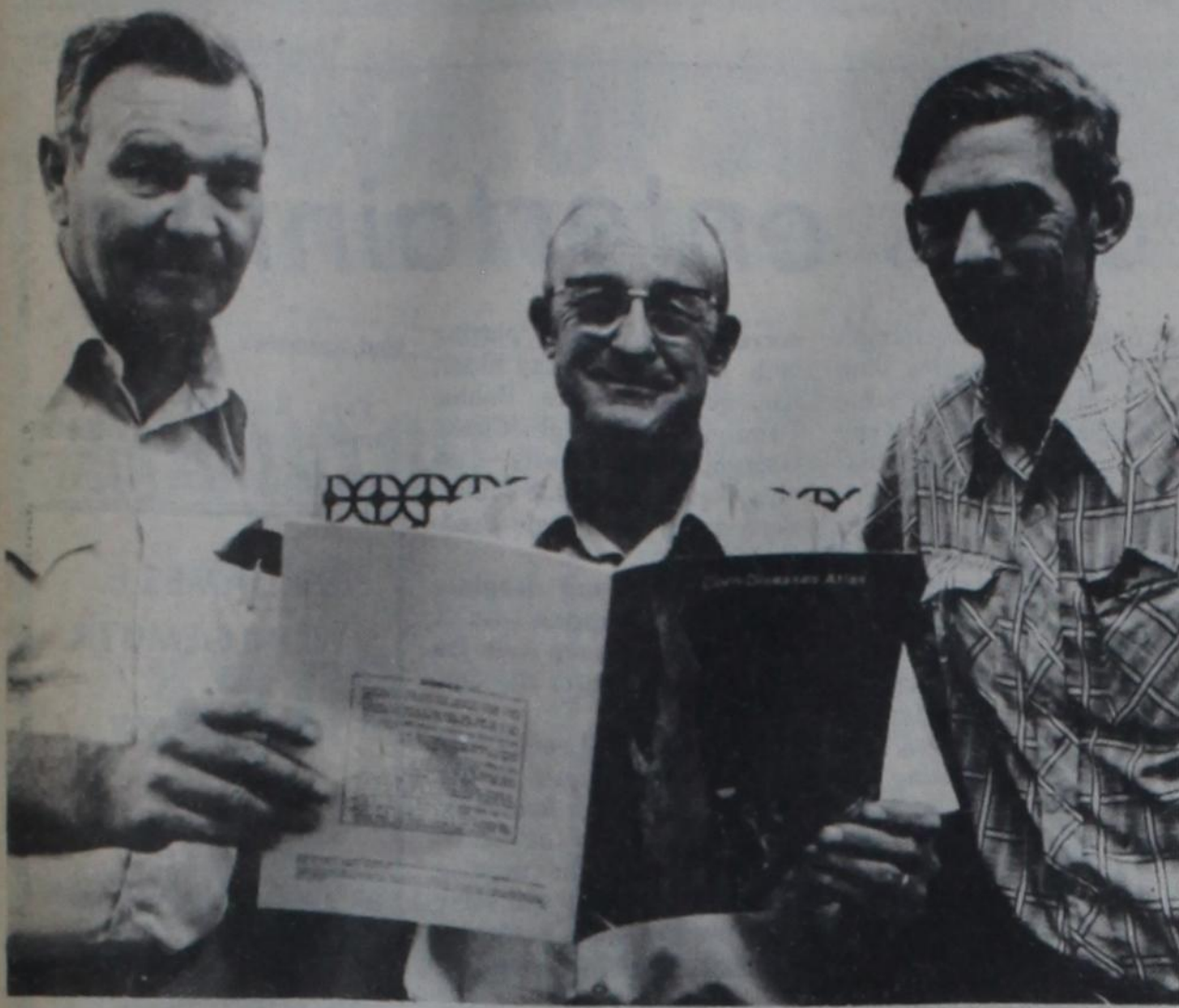

## Corn producers now have own trouble-shooting book

"Why can't we have a booklet for corn growers, the same as wheat and milo growers have, so we can tell what kind of problems we're dealing with?" Carl King asked a half-dozen other men sitting in the shade of George Sides's corn field two years ago.

"You know, that would really be good, to have a book that shows all the diseases and how to deal with them," Charles Hottel answered.

As it turned out, they were wondering out loud in front of the right people. Also in the

group were Dr. C. Wendell Horne, Extension plant pathologist and project leader in plant sciences; Dr. Robert Berry, area Extension plant pathologist; Bob Gray of the Texas Dept. of Agriculture; and Barry Love and Glenn Odom, officers of the Texas Corn Growers Association. They were taking a break during a field demonstration of corn smut on the Sides farm.

Now, \$5,000 and a lot of hard work later, that conversation has resulted in the publication of "Corn Diseases Atlas," a full-color booklet that's likely to become one of the main reference books for

corn producers not only in Texas, but throughout the US.

Drs. Horne and Berry researched and edited the atlas. In addition to drawing on their own knowledge, they gathered information from nine reference works, and collected color slides from all over the nation.

Fifteen seed companies and the nation's largest chemical corporation chipped in to underwrite the project's \$5,000 publication cost. The Extension Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, TCGA and individual corn producers also cooperated.

The result is a complete atlas that describes all major corn diseases found in the Southwest, and illustrates them with sharp, professional-quality color pictures. The atlas is printed on a heavy, coated book paper that can be dropped in an irrigation ditch without permanent damage.

The atlas describes and illustrates seed rots and seedling disease, common rust, southern rust, sorghum downy mildew, crazy top downy mildew, southern corn leaf blight, northern corn leaf blight, maize dwarf mosaic virus, maize chlorotic dwarf virus, wheat streak virus, rayado fino virus, sugarcane mosaic virus, maize mosaic virus, head smut, common smut, corn stunt, charcoal rot, brown spot, stalk rots, ear and kernel rots, toxin-producing fungi and plant parasitic nematodes.

The Extension Service printed 25,000 copies of the new atlas. Five hundred of them are now on hand at the county agent's office, available free to any corn producer who wants one.

## Spray war aimed at mosquitoes

Spraying to kill mosquitoes in Dimmitt and the outlying areas will begin for the summer season about 8:30 or 8:45 p.m. today (Thursday), City Manager Garnett Holland announced Tuesday.

Since recent showers the insect pests have become quite annoying, Holland said, so the City of Dimmitt will schedule operation of the spray equipment at intervals over an area of 2,600 acres.

Announcements are being broadcast to warn the public to take any necessary precautions for protection from the spray, the city manager added, and warnings have been sent to local beekeepers who wish to move the bees out of range of the spray.

## Simpson seeks judge's post

M. L. Simpson Jr. announced this week that he will be a write-in candidate for county judge in the November general election.

A dairyman and farmer who lives north of Dimmitt, Simpson has also turned a photography hobby into a business as a freelance photographer in recent years. He was born in this county and graduated from high school in Dimmitt.

After earning a BS degree from West Texas State University, Simpson served four years in the Pacific as a lieutenant in the US Navy during World War II.

His wife is the former Polly Sanders and the couple has eight children. Simpson, a Democrat, is a member of the Presbyterian Church, the Castro County Farm Bureau and Associated Milk Producers.

"I have considered running for this office for several years," the candidate said, "and decided lately to do so, at the urging of family members and friends."

"If elected I would be especially interested in dealing with youth. Through the County Court and working with law enforcement officers and school officials, it would be a chance to help troubled children."

"My business experience would qualify me, I believe, for the very important duties of the county judge in conducting the county's business," Simpson said, "and experience handling men as a Navy officer and association with my children and their friends have shown me that I can deal satisfactorily with people of different ages; that is another principal qualification for this office."

## Youth 'job fair' planned

A summer youth employment program for economically disadvantaged youth between 14 and 21 years of age will begin in Castro County June 12, preceded by a labor market orientation and Job Fair June 5, the Panhandle Community Action Agency announces.

This program is under the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act of 1973, and offers the eligible youth jobs for eight weeks during the summer. They will work approximately 40 hours a week.

The labor market orientation will be held at the County Expo Building beginning at 9 a.m. June 5, a two-hour session to assist the youth in applying for a job and keeping one that he finds.

The job fair will begin at 2:30 for youth not selected in the CETA program, to help them locate summer jobs by bringing together employers who need temporary summer help and young workers who want the jobs.

Castro County Judge Weldon Bradley has endorsed the job fair plan, which has the purpose of locating jobs for students out of school for the summer.

Success of the program will depend largely on the number of businessmen who call in job orders or attend the job

fair, according to Billie Maddox at Castro County Community Action. Job orders may be telephoned to her, 647-3244, or to Emilio Sandoval at Dimmitt High School, 647-3105. Either can give information about the program.

The News will publish free job-wanted ads for any high school or college students who can't find summer jobs or who don't qualify for the CETA program. Any student wanting to take advantage of the free ad offer should call 647-3123. The ad should include job skills or preference if any, age, name, and phone number or address.

## Wreck victim is dismissed

Michael Ray Patterson, 14, was dismissed from Amarillo's Northwest Texas Hospital Tuesday after being hospitalized for a week with injuries he received in a car-motorcycle accident.

The youth received a compound leg fracture when his cycle collided May 16 with a car driven by his father, Mike Patterson. The accident occurred on Southwest Seventh Street, when the youth drove his motorcycle onto the street from the alley between Maple and Cleveland, and into the path of his father's south-bound car.

## Crops, rails damaged by hard rain and hail

Hail that damaged young cotton in the Hart vicinity, accompanied by a deluge of rain that was reported to have washed out a section of FW&D Railway track west of that city, fell in a severe thundershower late Friday afternoon.

Other parts of Castro County received scattered showers Friday and Saturday, when the measurement at KDHN radio station just north of Dimmitt totaled .30 of an inch in two showers.

Two and a half inches of moisture fell in about an hour and a half at Hart, according to Dwayne Brown at Farmers Grain. Hail fell in the city, to the northeast and about 10 miles east, but only a short distance south.

Just coming up, cotton was damaged so badly that replanting is necessary in the area hit by hail. Corn was reported "looking pretty ragged, but it will grow off all right."

Base of the railroad track was washed out at a point just west of Hart and in another spot near the H&S vegetable packing sheds, according to Gary Hufhines, FW&D agent in Dimmitt.

No track was damaged and work crews repaired the roadbed promptly, but no trains ran Saturday. Service was resumed on schedule Monday, Hufhines said.

Only a small spattering of B-B size hail fell at Nazareth with good rains that amounted to 1.50 inches over the weekend, the Agri Industries office there reported. From 2 to 2.50 inches fell about six miles south of Nazareth with no hail.

At Sunnyside the moisture total was .90 and it tapered off to .75 at the L. B. Bowden

section to 10th Street, half a width at a time.

Normal traffic will resume as the asphalt and stabilized base is applied to each street. After all phases of the construction are brought to this stage, workers will go back over the new streets and top them with 1½ inches of asphalt and concrete.

Although the contract allows Diel 160 working days, "We hope we can complete it sometime this fall, weather [See CITY BRACES, Page 13]

When they reach the intersection, they'll turn south and excavate the east half of US 385 two blocks to Belsher Street to complete the first phase.

Before the project is completed, 2.23 miles of highway—much of it in the downtown business district—will have been torn out and completely rebuilt.

Downtown business owners are bracing themselves for the rebuilding program and hoping their customers won't desert them during the construction period.

The construction company and the Texas Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation have vowed they'll "do the very best we can" to see that business interruptions are kept to a minimum during the project.

Workmen will tear out only half-widths of the highways at a time, working in sections. Two-way traffic and curbside parking will continue on the other half of the street.

As the street is excavated, follow-up crews will install 5½ inches of base material, then 4½ inches of asphalt and stabilized base.

"There will be a time when we have some businesses shut off, while we're excavating below the curb," Project Engineer Rhea Bradley said. "We'll try to keep it to a minimum. As we get the base material back in, we can provide temporary ramps into any driveway if we need to. Then when we get the asphalt stabilized base back in, we'll be back up to the flow line—the lip of the gutter—and you won't be inconvenienced any more."

After completing this routine along the Phase-1 section, workers will start Phase 2 on North Highway 385 at the railroad crossing. They'll rebuild the east half of the highway to the stoplight, then will turn east and rebuild the other half of East Highway 86 back to their original starting point.

In Phase 3, workers will rebuild the west half of US 385 from the north railroad crossing to Belsher Street.

The final two stages will be on West Bedford (86), from the Broadway-Bedford inter-

## Absentee voting is beginning

Absentee voting began Wednesday morning for the runoff primaries of June 3 in both political parties, and the absentee ballots may be cast at the Castro County Clerk's office.

Two local offices have runoff candidates in the Democratic party.

Oleta Raper and Jo Nita Smith led a field of five candidates in first primary voting May 6 in the race for Castro County treasurer.

Richard Hunter and Alfons (Al) Maurer are opposed for the county commissioner's post in Precinct 4, where there were also five aspirants in the first primary.

Completing the Democratic ticket is a runoff contest for the state office of railroad commissioner, to serve an unexpired term. John H. Poerner and Jerry Sadler are the two who survived first primary voting.

The Republican party has no county runoff candidates, but voters will choose between George Bush Jr. of Midland and Jim Reese of Odessa as the GOP nominee for the 19th District Congressional seat being vacated by the retirement of Democrat George Mahon of Lubbock.

The winner of that vote will face Kent Hance of Lubbock, the Democrat who won his party's nomination in the first primary.

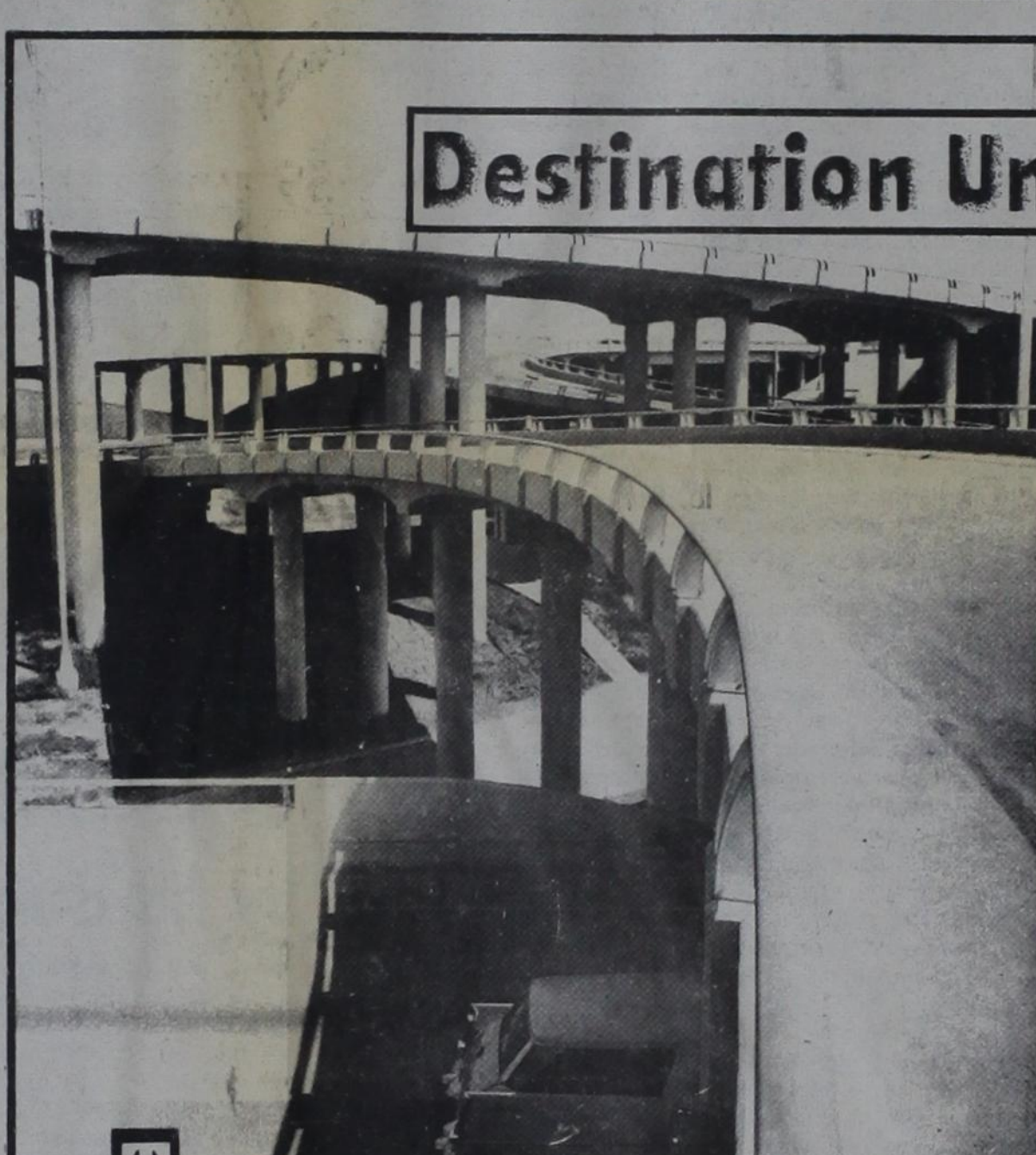

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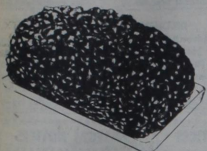

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

There has been a dramatic shift in the way consumers spend their money. It is because inflation in the prices of necessities such as housing and food has forced us to decide just what is important to us in material things.

The increase in the general level of prices keeps jacking us up into higher tax brackets so the decision must be made — just what are the important things which we need? Our spending patterns are changing. American consumers are cutting back on purchases of nonessential items such as cosmetics, cars and vacations. Instead we are substituting lower-quality products for higher-quality ones, such as hamburger for steak.

Another development is the "buy now-pay later" philosophy as a hedge against inflation. Big ticket items such as homes and appliances can be financed with easily available consumer financing and paid off over a period of time with "inflating" dollars. We know that whatever it is, it will cost more in years to come.

The "buy now-pay later" spree by consumers has been a real prop under the economy for the last three years. But economists now worry that the consumers cannot continue at this rate as a constant hedge against inflation. Somewhere along the line they fear that the consumer will start cutting back on purchases in order to build savings in case there is an economic slowdown. Such cutbacks would slow down the economy at a much faster rate than normal.

There is one bright spot in the consumer starts cutting back sharply on the current buying spree. A drop in big-ticket spending would be a boon to the entertainment and fast-food industries because consumers would have more to spend on these types of pleasures.

**County in top ten vegetable producers**

Harvest of potatoes and onions put Castro County into ninth place among the state's top 10 vegetable producers in 1977, according to Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown.

Castro farmers harvested 1,700 acres of potatoes, 1,300 of onions and 4,100 overall in production for the fresh market.

The county also produced substantial amounts of carrots and lettuce.

The state's potato crop for 1977 was valued at \$26.3 million. Onions were worth nearly \$55 million to producers.

Nationally Texas was third in the total vegetables produced for fresh market and fifth in all vegetables produced.

Hidalgo county out-ranked all others with 45,500 acres of harvested vegetables. Other leaders were Starr, Frio, Deaf Smith, Duval, Cameron, Uvalde, Zavala and La Salle.

**Yield notices sent farmers from ASCS**

Form ASCS-476, Notice of Established Yields, for wheat, corn, grain sorghum, barley, oats and cotton were mailed to farm operators May 24, according to the Castro County ASCS office.

Producers have 15 days from the date of this notice to appeal yields, which must be in writing to the Castro County ASC Committee.

Community and county committees have reviewed yields on each farm and have set preliminary yields for 1978 for all crops except cotton. "This was a difficult task and time consuming," County Executive Director Charley Hill said. "We think the committees are to be commended for their dedication and a job well done."

"We appreciate your patience concerning the lateness of yields. Also, to those of you who are waiting for farms to either be divided or combined, we extend our apologies and hope to have them completed in the near future," Hill said.

"Watch for these notices. If you have any questions, please come in and check with us," the director added.

**Views on conservation asked at open meeting**

"Public views on the future of the conservation, protection and enhancement of Texas' soil, water and related natural resources will be sought at a meeting to be held in the Exposition Building in Dimmitt at 8 p.m. June 8," Earl Harkins, chairman of the Running Water Soil and Water Conservation District, said.

The meeting is in response to President Carter's signing of the Resources Conservation Act last November which requires an appraisal and evaluation of the state and nations' soil and water conservation program.

The RCA act directs the Secretary of Agriculture to develop a national soil and water conservation program in cooperation with the public, local soil and water conservation districts, the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, and the Soil Conservation Service.

"This program will establish new directions for future soil and water conservation efforts in Texas based on current soil, water and related resource appraisals.

"One point I want to make clear is that districts in their 40-year history have always assisted landowners with voluntary conservation programs on their farms and ranches. We do not advocate any other approach since farm and ranch land is privately owned, the interests and welfare of the owners must be served and programs must be acceptable to them," Harkins added.

The RCA act requires gathering data to appraise the condition and quality of Texas, and the nations' soil and water resources by 1979.

The act also outlines a 5-year plan for the US Department of Agriculture's conservation assistance to districts and requires an evaluation of the effectiveness and progress of ongoing programs. Reports will be made to the public and congress.

"Our first meeting will primarily deal with discussions on soil and water resources in the district and how to conserve them," Harkins said.

"The public will also have the opportunity to learn more about the RCA act and the mission, relationship and responsibilities of the district and Soil Conservation Service.

"I want to emphasize that a grass roots, bottom-up approach is the key to this act. Our district and Soil Conservation Service will need to identify specific resource concerns and associated problems, if any, in addition to determining the extent and severity of these problems. We urge anyone with an interest in natural resource conservation to attend and air their views," Harkins concluded.

**Tests for postal jobs to be given at Nazareth**

Postmaster Katherine M. Acker of Nazareth has announced that the clerk-carrier examination will be opened to the public May 30 at 8 a.m. and will close to the public at 5 p.m. June 5.

She urged that all those interested apply to take the job-related test that can lead to Postal Service employment. "We have not opened our register in quite some time and it is out of date. Many of the names on the register are people who have moved or for some reason are no longer available to take postal jobs," the postmaster said.

"We will not be hiring great numbers of people in the coming months," the postmaster said. "Probably one vacancy will occur in the next two years that will be filled by hiring from our updated register. We need a list of qualified people who will be willing to accept employment, and we want to offer people in the local community the chance to compete for these openings by taking the exams."

The postmaster said the Postal Service established the policy two years ago of extending eligibility indefinitely for those on the job register because little hiring was being done.

"On Oct. 8, those who have been on the job register for more than two years will lose their eligibility. They will have to reapply to compete for a standing on the new register," she said.

Postmaster Acker explained those wishing to take the exam could be contacting the postmaster in person at the post office in Nazareth, during the open period.

Starting salaries for Post Office clerk, part-time flexible, PS-3 is \$6.40 per hour with steps taking the rate up to \$7.50 per hour over an eight-year period. Twelve steps with time between steps from 26 to 52 weeks.

### Outdoor cooking tips

By MRS. IRENE KEATING

School is out now, so summer's here. As the days get longer and warmer, our thoughts turn to cooking and eating outdoors. Here are some pointers and recipes to help you.

- 1) Plan your meal around the meat to be cooked.
- 2) Remember that outdoor appetites call for extra servings, so allow more food than for indoor meals.
- 3) Plan outdoor meals as carefully as other meals by the basic four food groups.
- 4) Serve grilled meat with a cooked vegetable, crisp relishes or salad, bread, dessert and a beverage.
- 5) Use charcoal or a hardwood like hickory for fuel. Avoid the use of wood that will give food an objectionable odor or flavor.
- 6) A fire is ready when the charcoal is covered with gray ash or when the flames of a hardwood fire have died down. A good bed of coals cooks food evenly.
- 7) As your meat cooks, control flames from coals by sprinkling with water.
- 8) A successful outdoor meal should be simple and easy to prepare.

### BARBECUED CHICKEN

Place broiler halves on grill with inside of the broiler down. Baste broiler with barbecue sauce. Turn broiler, using tongs, in about 5 to 7

### minutes. Baste with sauce. Turn frequently and baste with the sauce after each two turnings. Do not allow skin to blister and do not puncture the skin as moisture in the broiler will escape. Broiler is ready to serve when the drumstick and thigh separate easily at the joint.

### BARBECUE SAUCE

1 teaspoon sugar  
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard  
2 teaspoons salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
2 T. Worcestershire sauce  
2 cups tomato juice  
1/2 c. lemon juice or vinegar  
1/4 c. butter, margarine or cooking oil.  
Mix sugar, mustard, salt and pepper in a saucepan. Add remaining ingredients. Heat to boiling. Will yield about 3 cups.

Roast marshmallows on a green stick over live coals. Place on graham cracker. Top with part of a thin chocolate bar and another graham cracker.

Total weight loss of 19 pounds, 4 ounces was registered for the week by the 23 members who weighed-in for the meeting.

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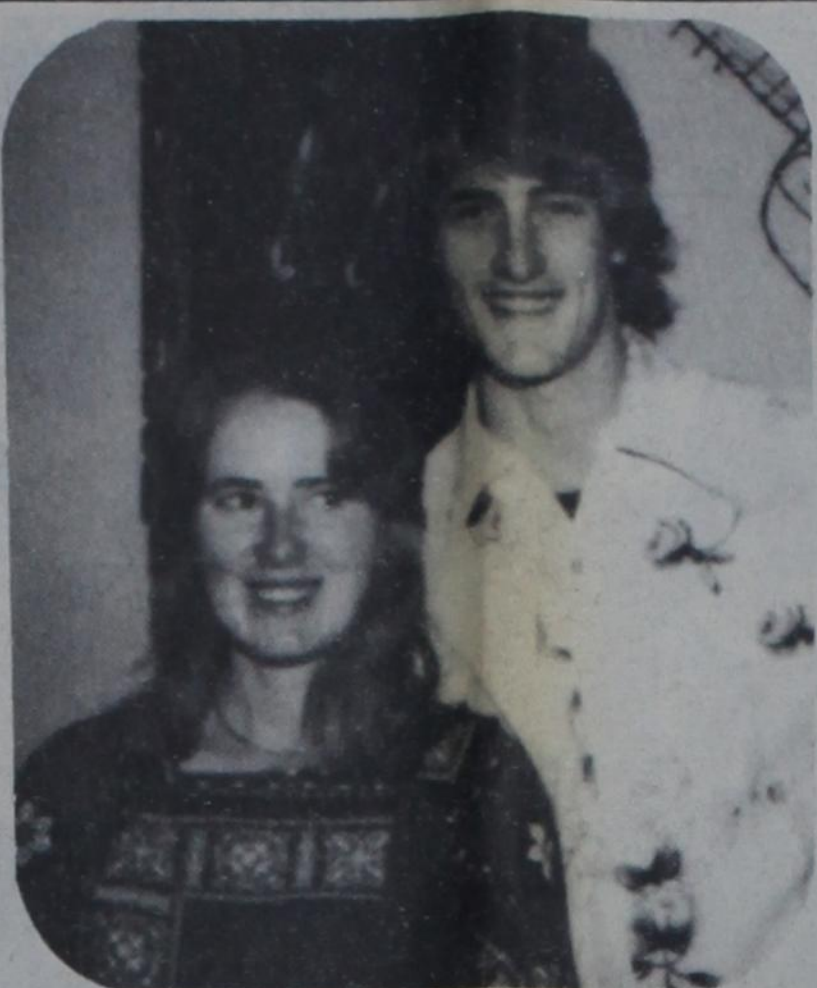

All children are invited to attend the school and be at the carnival. Parents may be there also to pre-register the youngsters. The church is located at 1201 Western Circle Drive.

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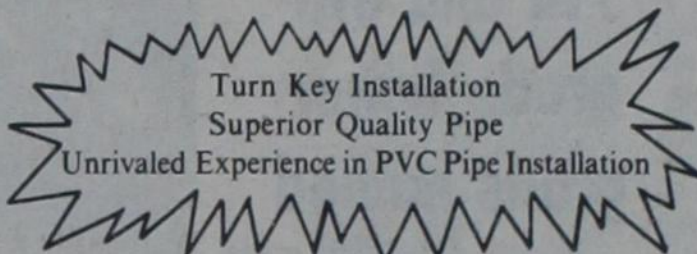
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## Handley rites set Thursday at Lockney

## Library meeting room regulations adopted

The Rhoads Memorial Library Board has announced regulations for use of the Hazel Merritt Room by community organizations other than commercial, denominational or partisan groups.

The meeting room at the library, now used by a number of organizations, has been named for the late Hazel Merritt, who was a strong supporter of the library and instrumental in its growth. The board has dedicated the room "to the encouragement of cultural, esthetic and intellectual values of all Castro County citizens."

It is open for activities designed to further these goals. Library programs and activities have first priority, and meetings of public interest, open to the public, will be given priority in scheduling. Requests for use of the room must be made to the librarian.

Community organizations are invited to use the room for meetings in keeping with the goals, subject to the following regulations:

No organizations other than the library-oriented groups, the Library Board, Dimmitt Book Club, and The Friends of the Library, may meet regularly in the room without special permission from the Librarian.

Any library-oriented group desiring to meet regularly in the room must make requests for use of the room at the beginning of each year.

No admission may be charged without special permission. Such permission will be granted to groups pre-

senting programs or exhibits of such quality or nature that necessary expenses must be met by reasonable admission charged. The room may not be reserved by commercial or denominational groups.

However, local business and professional people are invited to use the room for any program or exhibit in keeping with library goals that they wish to underwrite as a community service.

Paintings or other art objects exhibited in the room may display price tags, and the business transactions may be made in the room. The library staff will assume no responsibility in this. Book Fairs or other financial activities whose proceeds go directly to the library services may be held in the room at the discretion of the librarian.

Bi-partisan or non-partisan political meetings may be held in the room.

All groups using the room must first check with the librarian and the meeting room calendar. The "meeting room use" form must be completed and signed.

The room is available for use during library hours. Any non-library oriented group using the room after library hours must pay a minimum of \$10 in advance.

Any group using the room must designate one responsible person who will cooperate with the designated library staff member in supervising tidying, cleaning and restoring the room to original order, turning off lights and locking the building.

permitting." District Highway Engineer George C. Wall Jr. said. "If we can't get the final topping on before the cold weather, we'll go ahead and stripe the stabilized base—it will still be a good street."

The concrete islands will be removed from the median of North 385, but none of the streets will be widened.

After the project is completed, the city and state plan to design continuous left-turn lanes on East and West Bedford and North Broadway for intersections that aren't controlled by traffic lights. This design will require the elimination of curbside parking on these streets except in the downtown business district.

# City splits court bids

In a special meeting Wednesday morning, the Dimmitt City Commission voted to split the tennis-courts project, awarding contracts to both Dimmitt Ready Mix and Henderson Foundations.

Each firm will build a double tennis court and 12-foot fence, one to be located across the street from the old junior high building and the second to be built near Dimmitt High School.

The total cost of each double court will be \$23,200.

The council voted Wednesday to award each firm a contract on one double court and set the cost at half of the lowest bid.

Construction on the courts is expected to begin June 15, with an expected completion date of Aug. 1.

# Dimmitt postmaster announces job exams

To bring its register of possible employees up to date, an examination for Postal Service clerk-carrier jobs will be given here, open to those who apply between 8 a.m. May 30 and 5 p.m. June 5, Postmaster William F. Sava announces.

"I don't want to give the impression that the Dimmitt post office will hire a large number of people in the coming months," Sava said, "but we need a register of qualified people who would be willing to accept employment, and we want to offer people here a chance to compete for openings by taking this job-related test which can lead to Postal Service employment."

Sava said he foresees around four vacancies to probably occur in the next two years.

He explained that the current register is out of date, with many names of people no longer living in Dimmitt or not interested in employment now. Also, those who have been on the list more than two years will lose their eligibility next October, he said, and will have to reapply.

Applications from those wishing to take the test may be made to Sava, by mail or in person at the post office here, during the open dates.

Starting salary for clerk-carrier jobs in the Dimmitt post office, part-time flexible, is \$6.90 per hour with steps taking the rate up to \$8.19 per hour over an eight-year period. There are 12 steps with a maximum time of 52 weeks and a minimum of 26 weeks between steps.

Beginning salary for full-time clerk-carrier employees is \$13,916 per year with steps to \$16,501 over the eight-year period. New employees are part-time workers paid at the hourly rates, which are almost equivalent to the annual salaries but do not include pay for nine holidays that full-time employees get.

**County confronts \$93,000 problem**

The County Commissioners' Court Monday wrestled with jail-improvements requirements, discussed whether to protest the latest proposed rate increase of South-

western Public Service Company, and approved the signing of a water-use contract for Precinct 3.

In a special meeting last week with their architect, the commission was informed of needed changes in the county jail in order for it to conform with the new Texas Jail Standards.

Commissioners voted to go ahead with the project, and discussed various ways it might be financed. Total estimated costs are approximately \$93,000. County Auditor Harold Beck suggested that federal money might be available for at least part of the expense.

At the Revenue Sharing Funds hearing Monday afternoon, no one came to discuss any items with the commission so the tentative use of the funds will remain as designated until the final budget hearing in June.

Of the \$89,000 estimated available, \$22,500 is designated for public safety, \$1,800 for environmental protection, \$17,780 for public transportation, \$10,100 for public health, \$17,400 for recreation, \$10,800 for libraries and \$8,320 for social services for the poor and aged.

The contract for Precinct 3 involves the use of a water well owned by Maverick Industries. The well is located near the precinct's county barn. The agreement includes a \$1,000 hook-up charge and a \$10 per month fee on the first 20,000 gallons of water used.

**Short course planned for beef producers**

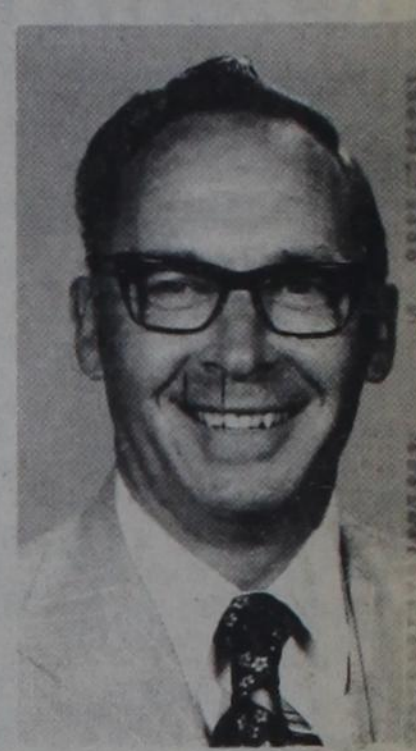

Dr. Krehbiel has announced that the short course will deal with production of beef at a lower cost and ways to produce the kind of beef the homemaker wants to buy.

He says it will include such topics as cattle reproduction and pregnancy diagnosis, selecting bulls and replacement heifers, calf crop percentages and supplemental winter feeding. The course can be changed to meet wishes and interests of those enrolled, the instructor said.

He believes the field of beef cattle production must take a close look at production efficiency in order to be a profit-making business.

Rising land prices, feed costs and taxes on one hand and more competition for the consumer's dollar at the meat counter on the other, force the beef producer to make every effort to raise more beef at the lowest cost, he says.
