Infertile incubator eggs can be used for bakers' purposes in the home, but under no circumstances should they ever be offered for sale or for ship ment.

Another important reason why such eggs should not be marketed as fresh eggs is the fact that they are liable to be seized by food inspectors as being misbranded. Such eggs play navoe with the storage stock, and we are in hopes that no farmer or poultry raiser will be guilty of such a dishonest prac tice.




THE cow is the most economical food factory in the animal kingdom. The hen, the hog, the beef steer, and the sheep cannot compete with her, ac cording to the Blue Valley Creamery Institute, basing their estimate upon the percentage of digestible protein produced by each from an acre of hand

Digestible animal proteins are the high quality protein of the human diet the institute points out. These proteins are the determining factor in the trend of greatest economy of food production. With the annual increase in population the animal protein supply must be increased accordingly if future millions are to be properly nourished. To provide for this increasing need will be the work of the cow, the sow, and the hen, the three farm animals ex-

Don't Fail to Read

TWENTY cents out of every food dollar is spent for dairy products. Milk or milk products are used in almost every dish included in the daily meal, according to the Bine Valley Creamery Institute

Latest statistics prepared by the bureau of dairying of the Department of Agriculture show that 45.5 per cent of the American milk production, or almost one hundred billion pounds, is used directly in the form of milk. It is estimated that every man, woman and child consumes on an average of 50 gallons of milk each year. This is an increase of eight gallons over the 1917 per capita consumption figures.

The nation is eating more butter as well as drinking more milk. Per capita consumption of butter averages around 16.5 pounds, walle in 1918 the average was but 14.6 pounds. More than one-fourth of the yearly milk supply is made into butter, 23.6 per cent of this is turned out as a commercial product.

Americans are not big cheese eaters. The average consumption is less than 3.7 pounds per capita. Only 3.7 per cent of the annual milk production is made in cheese. Condensed milk consumption has more than doubled since 1920 when the average consumption was six pounds per capita. Today the average consumption is 12.69 per capita.

Condensed milk plants last year absorbed 3.5 per cent of the milk produced. Ice cream takes about the same amount. Calves drink around 4.2 per cent. Less than 2 per cent of the year's milk supply is used for such miscellaneous products as powsered milk and cream, maited and conned milk and milk chocolate. It is estimated that around 3 per cent is wasted or lost.

Trap Nest Is Accurate Test of Hen's Ability The trap nest is the most necurate test of a ben's ability to lay eggs, but It is not practicable for those who live on farms, with all the other work they must do. Therefore, poultry specialists have been studying the general characteristics of laying hens, so that we might have a set of almost exact rules for telling the layers from the loafers. It has been proven over and over that these rules work correctly and no farm woman need longer feed hens that will not pay for their feed bill and give a profit. We must also remember that these lazy hens, which have been loafing all summer, fall and winter, will be laying their few eggs next spring at hatching time, and if their eggs are set, we will have another flock of loafers.

The hens that begin to molt in July should be sent to market. There is one exception to this, the hen that has hatched and brooded a flock of chicks, for she will usually go through a partial molt before she begins laying again. August 15 and September 15 is the best time to cull, but it will pay to go over your flock from time to time through the summer and cull out. Seil those that have stopped laying. There are usually a number of hens in every flock whose general appearance indicates they have low vitality, little vigor and will never be profitable egg producers. A great percentage of these low vitality birds are late hatched pullets of the previous season.

Carrots, cabbage and sprouted oats help make strong chicks.

Good hatches are obtained only when the laying stock has been selected for vigor and made to exercise. . . .

Fresh eggs are the best for hatching purposes. If it is regarded necessary to keep hatching eggs they should be stored in a temperature of 60 degrees or lower. . . .

Cull all undeveloped pullets and old hens from the flock,

Early hatched pullets will molt early in the fall and be ready for laying next winter at a season when egg production is low and prices high.

It has been shown that young chicks are most susceptible to infestation of roundworms until about 12 weeks of age. With severe infestation death may occur in two weeks. In mild infestations chicks live, but growth is slower and resistance to disease less


