### NOT VERY ENCOURAGING

At the meeting of the Chamber of Commerce on Monday, Judge Nelson and Commissioners Shurbet, Hanna, Wood and Payne were present and the road proposition was discussed pertaining to the bad lakes and mud holes to the west and southwest of Lockney, and as to whether or not the farmers in those vicinities and the people of Lockney could get any or expect any relief from the commissioners court.

Wm. McGehee stated the object of the committee that was appointed by the Chamber of Commerce to confer with the Commissioners Court and Judge Nelson responded giving an outline of the Commissioners Court's position, telling of the tax value, tax rate and apportionment to each precinct in the County, also of special orders or agreements between the commissioners in reference to the distribution of the funds of the road and bridge budget in the county.

First, the tax valuation, according

to Nelson, is about \$10,000,000, and the road and bridge tax total 30c on the \$100 valuation, or about \$30,000 per annum in tax money paid into the road and bridge fund by the tax payers of Floyd County. Equally divided between the four precincts of the county this would mean \$7,500 to each precinct, but as it is divided according to percentage that each precinct pays in as taxes, which is the right way to divide this fund, as by this kind of a division the people who pay the taxes are supposed to get the benefit of the taxation according to their valuation. It means that the Floydada precinct gets the largest amount of the division which we estimate amounts to between \$9,000 and \$10,000 per year, the Lockney precinct gets according to our estimate between \$8,000 and \$9,000, and the other two precincts get the balance of the \$30,000 divided between them.

This would mean that the Lockney precinct has between \$8,000 and \$9,000 to spend on the roads each year, besides according to our understanding, there is about \$5,000 or more comes back to the county from the auto tax each year, if we are informed correctly, taking this information from Judge Nelson's statement before the Chamber of Commerce of last Monday. In other words, Mr. Shurbet, commissioner of the Lockney precinct, is supposed to have according to the above estimate \$10,000 per year to put on the roads of the Lockney precinct. Then part of these bad places are in the Floydada precinct, as the Floydada precinct borders on the south of the Lockney precinct and is supposed to be worked and paid out of the commissioner fund of the Floydada precinct.

According to Mr. Shurbet there is about \$500 of this fund left that has not been paid out this year or at some previous time, and the other \$9,500 or whatever the correct amount may be, has been expended and still the roads in various parts of the Lockney precinct have not been worked and the lakes and mud holes are impassable. Now, if the money has been spent on the roads, and we don't question the honesty and integrity of our commissioner or any of the members of the commissioners court, we would like to have a statement for

publication, showing when, where and how the money has been spent, and what roads have received the benefit from the expenditures. We are certain that no money to amount to anything has been spent on the roads to the southwest and south of the Lockney-Plainview road in the Lockney precinct, and if these roads have received work worth mentioning their present conditions will not verify the facts. These roads are now and have been in very bad condition in all wet weather for the past two years, and this is not the first time that the lakes and mud holes in this section have been in very bad shape, as heretofore the Chamber of Commerce, upon the recommendations of the farmers who live in this section has asked the commissioner of the Lockney precinct to see what could be done about fixing certain lakes to the south of Lockney, and the result was that we got no permanent relief.

It may be that at times, of which we have no knowledge, that some efforts have been made in emergencies to do some work in this section of the country, but we do know that if any work has been done in the past, it was not of a permanent nature and the money expended has been wasted, and there are no road or lake crossings to show for it today in many of the places. We see no sense in wasting the people's road tax money on lake or mud hole crossings by simply piling a few loads of dirt in them in wet weather, only as an emergency, and of course at the present time the emergency deserves some action, but the time to fix these lakes and mud holes is in dry weather, and they should be graded high enough and broad enough that when the long wet spells come that the water won't run over them or penetrate through them. One commissioner insinuated at the meeting that this was hardly possible, but we know better than that, for we know of other lakes in an adjoining county, where the soil is the same practically as the soil of Floyd county, where they had allowed the lakes to become as bad as any lake crossing in Floyd county, but when they really tried to fix the lake crossings they did so, and one lake in particular on the Plainview-Lubbock road of the very worst kind was fixed more than four years ago and today the road across this lake is as good as any piece of road between the two towns in any kind of weather. We, therefore, believe it is a waste of money to throw dirt into a wet lake. Why not mark these bad lakes and mud holes and when the weather is dry build them up so that they will be in good shape when the rain falls, and stop the wasteful extravagance of throwing the tax money into the mud and mire during the wet weather.

Many days this summer and fall we have noticed the road workers of the Lockney precinct at work on the highway across the county. We consider they had no business on this job, as we consider this the state's job, and that whether they were getting pay from the state or not that they should not have been working on the highway. When the state assumed control of the highway, we understood, that it would release all of the men and machinery of Floyd county, and the Lockney precinct for work on our lateral or country roads, and that our men and machinery would be busy fixing up the country roads leading over our county, other than the highway, but according to Mr. Shurbet's own statement he is expecting \$2,000 or thereabouts from the state for work that has been done on the highway, yet we have needed these men and machinery to do work on our country roads to keep them from getting in the shape they are now in.

According to our understanding of what was said by members of the commissioners court at the Monday meeting, it is strictly up to Lockney and Mr. Shurbet as far as the fixing of the roads are concerned, and that we can not hope for much, if any re-

lief from the commissioners court. However, it was stated that there was such a thing as funds for emergencies, as was in the case of a bridge on Roberts Creek, but there was no expression on the part of the commissioners court that would lead this writer to believe that we could expect any relief in the matter of fixing the lakes and mud holes for the benefit of the farmers who trade and wish to trade in Lockney and with the Lockney merchants. And as we see it, the whole thing in a nut shell is, that the Lockney Chamber of Commerce, through its committee, must go with Mr. Shurbet and arrange with the various farmers for passage around the lakes and mud holes, and let the travel make roads around the bad places.

We are of the opinion that if we get any relief at the present time it means that we are going to make up a subscription list among the merchants and business men of Lockney and either give it to Mr. Shurbet to work with, or hire some one else to do the work.

It is of as much interest to the farmers as the town people to get these roads fixed, and we would suggest that the farmers join with the business men in an effort to get the roads fixed for the present time, and then do all they can to see that the roads be permanently fixed when the weather puts them in shape for them to be properly worked.

### ANOTHER RANGLE IN THE AIR.

There is much talk going on through the columns of the newspapers about an extra session of the legislature, and it is being discussed as to just what will happen should the legislators take it upon themselves to assemble without being called together by the governor. It seems from the items being published that the governor is not very favorable to an extra session of the legislature at this time, and that one item that will come before the body, should they meet, will be the highway rucus that has been going on for some time. We have not changed our opinion that the tax payers are paying a lot of money to the highway department from which they are receiving no returns, and we still believe that every dollar paid out for auto tax should be used in the county where the tax is paid, and that a law should be passed that not one cent of the auto money could be used for any other purpose other than putting the roads of the county in first class shape and maintaining (Continued on page 3.)

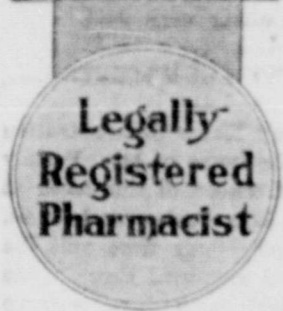

them thereafter. Floyd county with the total auto tax paid in this county in connection with the present road tax would have more than \$60,000 per year to build and maintain her roads, and if used in a legitimate manner by the commissioners court, within a few years we could have one of the best systems of roads in the entire state, but under the present system of giving the state highway commission from \$25,000 to \$30,000 per year, we get very little return from our auto tax money. At the present it possibly does not cost the state more than \$5,000 or \$6,000 a year to maintain the highway across Floyd county, which means that about

\$20,000 or more of our auto tax money goes to build the roads of some other section or goes to pay salaries to people who are grafting off of the highway department of the state. We are strickly in favor of the abolishment of the state highway department, and the turning over of all road money to the counties in which the taxes are paid to be expended on the roads of these counties. Possibly a large per cent of our tax money goes to officials, clerks, etc., that are doing very little in return for the money they are being paid, and if the legislature would investigate the department without sidestepping on account of political matters, the people of Floyd county, which means that about

are in favor of abolishing this department, as every such department of the state officialdom is continually causing investigations, and as a general rule the legislature doesn't do but very little more than draw their pay and go home. Texas needs a general cleanup down Austin way, and a lot of bureaus, commissions and departments should be abolished and consolidated with other departments, and the expense of government cut to a minimum.

With this issue of the Beacon the present editor has been on the job for two years. It is our intention at all times to deal with the public to the best of our ability, giving each and every one value received for every dollar that is dropped into our coffers, and telling the world, as well as the home people of the wonderful advantages of living in this immediate location. We believe in Lockney and the Lockney country. If we did not believe in this town and country we would move to a town and country we could believe in. When we cease to care for our home town and country, or become disgruntled at the people as a whole, we will then pass the buck to the other fellow and move on.

We consider that we have made good so far in the newspaper business in Lockney for the fact that our subscription list has had a steady growth since the first day we began running the paper and our business has grown as we have equipped our plant to meet the demands of the trade. We now have a printing plant that will compare favorably with any plant in any town twice the size of Lockney in West Texas, and every month we are adding new equipment to our plant.

We believe that the merchants of Lockney have been satisfied with our efforts for they have expressed their appreciation of our printing, prices and service on many occasions, and the fact that we have no competitors in this field has caused us to at all times make the very best price possible on every job of work and handle it in the quickest and most satisfactory manner we possibly could to please our customer and at the same time making a living wage out of it.

We wish to express our appreciation for the many favors that have been extended to us, and for the business given us, and it is our desire to serve the people even better in the coming years than we have been able to in the last two years. 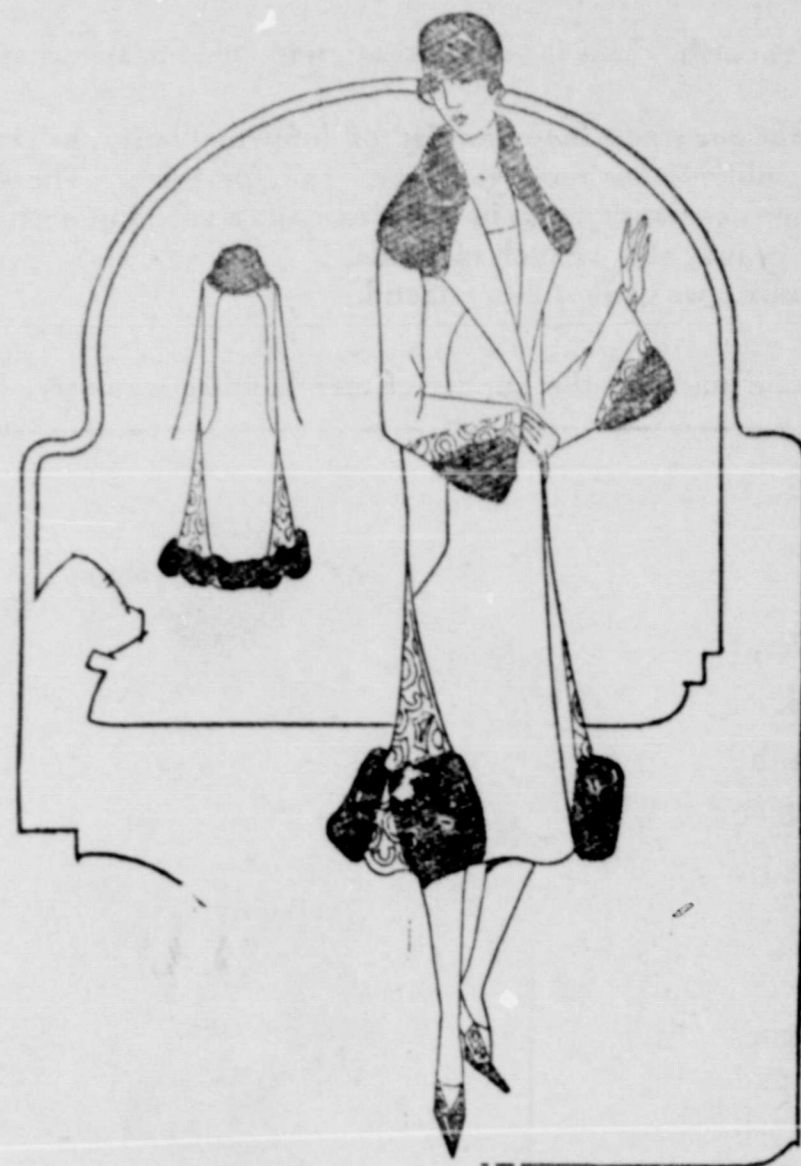
**CLOVIS SELLS LIGHT PLANT TO UTILITIES COMPANY**

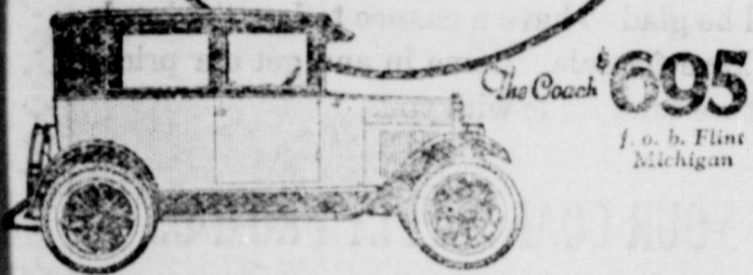

## MANY CITIES HAVE PRIVATELY OWNED POWER PLANTS

The following clipping is from the Kansas City Star of July 27th and tells how municipally owned power plants are being transferred to privately owned plants to the advantage of all interested parties:

"Topeka, Kansas, July 27.—(A. P.)—Seven large power and light companies now own 95 per cent of the electric properties in Kansas. This was made known here today by J. E. Worsley, chief engineer for the Public Service Commission.

"The Kansas Gas Electric Company, with headquarters in Wichita, is the largest of the seven. The value of its holdings, Mr. Worsley estimated conservatively, is \$15,000,000.

"The other six companies, in the order of their size, are the United Power and Light Corporation of Abilene, with property valued at \$8,000,000; the Kansas Public Service Company, Topeka, \$6,000,000; Kansas Electric Power Company, Concordia, \$2,500,000; Kansas Utilities Company, Fort Scott, \$1,000,000, and Kansas City Power and Light Company of Kansas City, whose property valuations in Kansas have not been fixed definitely.

"Consolidation of electric properties has been pronounced in the last few years, Mr. Worsley declared.

"There is no big trust gobbling up the plants," he declared. "Nobody is squeezing out the little fellow in the power business. There is one cause behind the widespread consolidation. It is the fact that large plants produce power at less cost than small ones and transmission lines can carry the current long distance. Consolidation is for the best under such circumstances."

Municipal Power Plants which were built extensively throughout Kansas a quarter of a century ago, have worn out, and the cities realized they could get electricity at less cost over transmission lines from large plants than by generating it in their own plants. Some Kansas towns have not only given their plants to the large utilities corporations, but have paid them bonuses to induce them to accept the worn out equipment."
