THE SCHOOL SITUATION

(The purpose of this article is to enlighten the people of the new Lockney Independent School District as to the facts concerning the consolidation and the benefits that will be derived from the consolidation. The editor of this paper will print any question asked and answer it in a fair and impartial manner. A series of articles will be printed dealing with the school problems one to appear each week in this column.)

NO REASON FOR NEW HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

At this time there is no reason for building a high school building, as some are prone to think. It has been noted by those who are opposing the consolidation that Lockney will burden them with bonds to erect a new high school building at once. This is wrong as Lockney has no need for another high school building at this time. Two years ago, before the twelve room annex was added to the present tian College as a school building, and building, Lockney used the old Christ several of the lower grades were cared for in this building. If the present building becomes over crowded the building is still available, and and a small amount of repairs can be made to care for six or more grades. Every person in the entire district will have a say as to the building of more school houses, as all buildings must be provided for by bond issues, and bond issues must be voted upon. There will be no cause for alarm as to the erection of the new buildings until the schools become so badly crowded that the people of the whole district make a demand upon the trustees for more buildings. The matter of housing the school in Lockney can be easily taken care of at the present time, and for some time in the future with very little, if any extra expense and it is not the purpose of Lockney to take any action toward the erection of buildings any where in the near future. The present board of trustees will only be in office five months longer, when a new set of trustees will be elected by the district at large and the future school program will be in the hands of this board of trustees, and any building that becomes necessary will be handled by them. The trustees will be elected by voters of the entire district, and it will be the duty of the citizens of the district to elect men to carry on the work, that will look out for the best interests of the entire district. The new board should be composed of men from all parts of the district, there should be a trustee elected from the Muncy and Ramsey districts, one from the Erick and Pleasant Valley districts, one from the Aiken district, one from the Prairie Chapel district and one from the Roseland district; this would scatter the trustees all over the district and give the people of every community equal representation on the board. The consolidation of these districts to one independent district is the greatest forward movement ever launched in Floyd county, the possibilities for greater educational facilities are unlimited, and it means to the children of the district an opportunity to get a first class education at home, something that they have been denied heretofore. Lockney children have had this chance for several years, but children of the outside districts have not had the opportunity, unless they are transferred into the Lockney district, or went to some other independent district. Last year there were forty-four children in the Lockney high school from adjoining districts, and they were taken care of, at the end of the year a check up showed that only eleven of these children paid their tuition; thirty-three had attended the school a full session without paying one thin dime for tuition to the school, yet they were each supposed to pay \$7.50 per month. The failure of these thirty three students to pay their tuition caused an expense to the school of \$2,227.50 in loss of tuition that had to be added to the tax payers account in the old Lockney school district, yet if all of them had paid the \$7.50 per month that would have paid less than two-thirds of the expense incurred by the forty-four being allowed to attend school here. It costs the school at least \$15.00 per month for every child that is transferred

into the district, for the school must add more teachers, provide more room and more incidentals are necessary to carry on the work. There are fifty-four students in high school this year from outside districts, to say nothing of those in the grammar grades, and if they were not in the school the school could dispense of the services of at least two teachers, would have two extra rooms, and would save the incidentals that are necessary to provide for the learning of these pupils and health and comfort. The high school authorities did not make a roar about the fact that there was \$2,227.50 lost on the children who failed to pay last year, nor the extra expense they were put to care for them—they figured that each child should have a fair chance to get an education, and that the laws were supposed to guarantee them a free public school education, and they did not mistreat the children nor send them home for non-payment of tuition, or the inability of their parents to pay the tuition, instead they gave them their best in an educational way, just like they are giving the children who are in the school from outside districts this year. It is the duty of all communities to provide for their schools and it is nothing but right for each resident to do his part toward providing for schools. If your children are above the school age, if any of them have an education, somebody helped to pay for that education outside of your family. Schools are community affairs, no person pays the full price of his child's education, therefore, every person should be willing to help educate the children, for there are so many children that could never get an education if their parents had to pay the full bill.

In reference to the bonded indebtedness of the old Lockney school district, we will say for the information of those who do not know, only 20c out of each dollar paid on taxes in this district is necessary to pay the interest and create a sinking fund for the bonded indebtedness, the other 80c on the dollar going for maintenance of the school. The school lacks many thousands of dollars of reaching its limit in bonded indebtedness, and is in better shape financially this year than it has been for many years. The school is now, and has been for some time, operating on a cash basis, and each year the rendition shows that the valuation is being cut down by the boards of equalization.

SLEET SNOW AND SUNSHINE TODAY

FIRST SNOW OF SEASON FALLS EARLY THIS MORNING—WATHER CLOUDY

The first snow of the season fell over the Lockney country just before day break this morning. Sleet and snow fell for two hours, but just about day break the clouds began to break and the rest of the day has been cloudy, with the sun breaking through the clouds at different intervals. The wet weather is hindering the farmers in the gathering of their crops, and while the precipitation this week has been light, the ground is so full of water that the least shower makes the roads bad and the fields so muddy that very little travel or work can be done.

The amount of moisture in the ground is sufficient to carry the wheat crop through until spring, however there is much wheat land yet to be planted, as the farmers who did not plant their wheat early, are having a hard time now of finding it dry enough for planting wheat.

Many fields of feed stuffs are going to suffer heavy damage unless the rain let up, and we have some dry warm weather in which to save them. The bad fall conditions have caused a depression in business all over the Plains country, and have made collections very bad for the business men and bankers, as the farmers have not been able to gather their crops.

The largest cotton crop ever raised in this section is white in the fields at this time, and in hundreds of cases a bale or more is being made to the acre, however, the cotton is mostly still in the fields, and with wet weather, shortage of pickers, other crops on hand to be gathered, wheat to be planted, it may be that many bales of this cotton will never be put on the market.

Every farmer should save all of the cotton crop he possibly can, for it is better to save the crop already made than to plow it under, and plant another cotton crop next year. However, we fear, on account of conditions of weather, low price of cotton and scarcity of labor, there will be much of the crop go to waste.

MRS. MARY M. BYRD DEAD

Mrs. Mary M. Byrd, age 86 years, 9 months and 24 days, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. George W. Tierce, west of Lockney, Friday, October 29th, at 9 p. m. The cause of her death was complication brought on by receiving a fall a few days ago, when one of her hips was broke, however, she had been in bad health since last March. She was the wife of J. C. Byrd, who died here twelve years ago.

Mrs. Byrd was a pioneer of the Lockney country, having moved to the Plains in 1891, and is well known to all the old settlers of this section of the country.

She is survived by five children, two sons and three daughters. They are W. J. Byrd of Wichita Falls, L. M. Byrd of Millsap, Texas, Mrs. N. A. Baxter, Mrs. J. S. Baxter of Fort Worth, and Mrs. George W. Tierce of Lockney. L. M. Byrd of Millsap, Mrs. N. A. Baxter and Mrs. J. S. Baxter were here to attend the funeral of their mother.

Funeral services were conducted at the College Auditorium in Lockney, at 3:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon, by Elder C. R. Graves, and interment was in Lockney cemetery, under the direction of Grady R. Crager, Funeral Director.

This association will try to encourage better equipment and better breeding of poultry in Floyd County.

The association has been very much hindered in its work for the last two months on account of the bad weather, but we hope to see more of the poultry raisers of the county and get them lined up with the association. We also need some work from the juniors of this county.

MOODY IS ELECTED OVER REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE BY GOOD MAJORITY

Less than 150 votes, out of a possible seven hundred or more in this box, was polled.

Rankin, Lone Star; Commissioner Precinct No. 3, Walter Wood, Cedar; Commissioner, Precinct No. 4, W. W. Payne, Floydada; Justice of Peace, Precinct No. 2 and 3, J. H. Byington, Lockney; Constable, Precinct No. 2 and 3, Leonard Brewster, Lockney; Public Weigher, Precincts No. 2 and 3, Clyde Bennett, County Chairman, Democratic Committee, J. N. Stalbird, Lockney.

A LETTER FROM AIKEN

A mass meeting of the citizens of the Aiken School district was held in the school auditorium on Wednesday night, October 27th., for the purpose of discussing the injustice done us by the people of Lockney when they asked the special called session of the 39th Legislature to create the Lockney Independent School District, by consolidating the old Lockney district and the several rural districts, surrounding it. And at the same time to get all the information possible as to the best method of undoing the wrong that had been done.

A good number of our leading citizens expressed themselves in the matter and were much displeased.

We feel that we have much to lose and nothing to gain by being made a part of the Lockney Independent District.

Since we have gone to the trouble and expense of building up a good four teacher school, which run the full nine months last year, teaching nine grades of work in such a manner that it is accepted at par by the high schools around us. We do not care to have Lockney step in and raise our own property valuation for taxes and cut our school down to seven grades of work.

The fact that Lockney put this over on the rural districts in such an undemocratic manner is enough within itself to create dissatisfaction.

We do not understand how some people can raise such a howl for pure democracy, when the other fellow is in question and then be a party to a deed like this.

THE SCHOOL SITUATION

(Continued from Page 1)

The purpose of the consolidation was not a question of the adjoining districts being brought in to pull the Lockney school out of a hole, but the consolidation was affected for the purpose of future development of the country. Under the present condition this part of Floyd county was at a standstill in school matters, true there were good buildings in the communities, but the educational facilities were limited. There was no chance for the children to get a high school education in this part of the county only through the Lockney High School, and under the present system the Lockney school could not afford to take care of them.

As to the passing of the bill before the legislature is was not undemocratic. A great deal has been said pro and con about leaving the matter to a vote. This could not be done by law. The Lockney Independent School District was created in 1902 by an act of the legislature, and this act provided that this district could never be changed in any way only by an act of the Texas legislature. You could have called all the elections you wanted to, voted on it every day in the week, carried the proposition without an opposing vote, and still it would have been of no effect, because the creation of the district was by a legislative act, therefore, it must be changed by an act of the legislature, or else ever remain as it was. The

reason for it passing at the special session of the legislature was because in last Tuesday's election there was an amendment to the constitution which took the matter of consolidation of common school districts out of the hands of the legislature and placed them in the hands of the county board of trustees, the independent districts remaining under state control, (the amendment carried two to one all over the state), meaning that no common school district could be consolidated with an independent district in the future, and visa versa, which meant that when this law went into effect the case was closed forever. The last chance was the special session, six hundred school districts in the state must change at that session or they never would change, the Lockney committee arrived in Austin less than a week before the close of the session, with no map, no bill to offer, nor no plan of action. They were told what could be done, but that it must be done in three days, or else they would be forced to go on neglecting the proper education of the children in the western part of Floyd county for all time. The committee

had at heart the best interests of the entire section, there were no personal axes to grind, no one community stood out in the foremost part before them, and they acted perfectly democratic in the premises, doing the most good for the most people without regard for any individual whatsoever. It did not mean dollars and cents to them, it did not mean personal gain, but it did mean all in all to the children of the district, and especially the children of the common school districts, and all that is asked of those who do not agree with us at this time is that they enlighten themselves about the matter and weigh the benefits to be derived from the consolidation against the present situation.

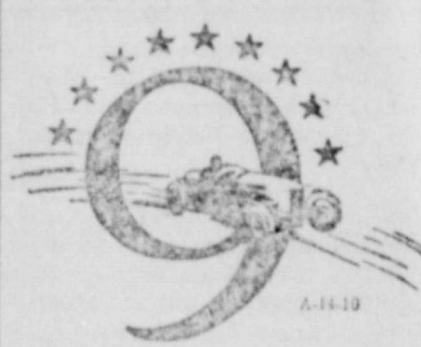

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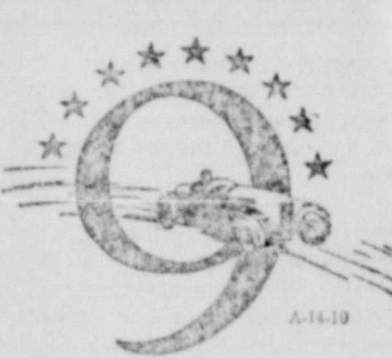
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
