

the Legislature the power to assess and collect taxes seperately for the state and county governments. There fore if the legislature made enormous appropriations for something, they would have power to place taxes on everything and anything they saw fit and in most any way. For instance after taking all industrial taxes away from the counties, asses ing an income tax, etc., they failed to raise enough money to take care of the various appropriations that they had made, they could go as far as they pleased and place a stamp tax on all kinds of interest bearing papers, deeds, bills of sale, legal documents, drugs, luxuries, and even if necessary place a special tax upon the farmer and factory production of the state. Their power in this matter would be so much that they could even force a tax on everything that was raised or made in the State, and everything that the laborer or farmer of the state could produce. On the other hand, the county revenue would have to be raised solely from taxes upon real estate and the rate would have to be heavily increased. As we interpret the tax amendment, it would mean that the powers of the legislature would be extended to where they could confiscate the lands and products of the people, if they so desired. It would not be safe for the people to give such power to a govern ing body, for this is pure autocrasy, and will tend to drive the people into slavery and peonage.

We have no objection to the governor being paid an adequate salary, nor the legislators having pay for their work. We believe that the officials of the state should be paid salaries instead of fees. The amendment to be voted on stipulates the governor's and the legislator's saary, and leaves the determining of the county officials salaries to the legislature or some board the legislature might create. This would be taking a long chance on the part of the people, if the amendment should carry. Every adminstration in state affairs that has passed has created a stink of some sort in the unearthing of graft and misappropriated funds in the administration that proceeded it, and there will be grafters at work in the state government administrations that are to come, and if the right was left to the legislature or some board created by the legislature to specify the salary that each state and county official was to receive, why would there not be many means of the legislature or the board that handled the naming of the salaries whereby the taxpayers could be robed and graft used. In past administrations how many times has it come to light that certain hirelings by the various officials have been paid an enormous salary, with an understanding that a part of the salary was to be turned to the person or persons that made it possible for the employe to receive the salary. These kind of transactions were very forcibly brought to light in the past governor's campaign, where it was claimed that Jim had made deal's with various employes of the state, and had received a large per cent of such salar-



Floyd County is being represented in the 1927 "Master Farmer Contest' by K. Sammann of Lockney, Texas, and R. B. Gary of Floydada, Texas.

These men who were selected by the local committee, are in competition with the best farmers from counties in every section of Texas for the coveted honor of being selected as a

The Master Farmer contest, which is being conducted by the Progressive Farmer in co-operation with the Extension Service of Texas A & M College, has for its purpose the premotion of safe farming by selecting the fifteen best examples of safe farming each year and holding these tions from which they come. A mas ter farmer is not only a tiller of the soil and a skilful herdsmen but he must measure up to an equally strict made on the basis of a score card, which has been carefully figured out to fit Texas conditions. The scoring falls under six main heads as follows (1) Operation and organization of farm (2) Business methods and ability; (3) Appearance an upkeep of farm and home; (4) Adequacy of farm home plant; (5) home life; (6)

These divisions are further divided in order to get an accurate and detailed score on every phase of the farm operation.

Eugene Butler, Editor of the Progressive Farmer, states that master farmers are really deserving of this title for an analysis of their farms has revealed much evidence of the mastery that these men have attained in their profession. The attention that has been focused on them has stimulated them to even more masterly improvements have been reported by a large majority of these men since this honor has been bestowed on them. We feel that the time and expense necessary to conduct this con test is more than justified by the influence that it has on permanent agriculture in Texas.

The winners in last year's contest were J. C. McComic, Gregg County; Fred Lowe, Hale County; T. F. Nabors, Howard county; T. D. Porcher, El Paso county; A. G. Ilse, Medina county; K. A. Holskamp, Kerr county; Fritz Fuchs, Lubbock, A. C. Wurzbach, Medina county; E. D. Altemus Galveston County; J. H. Brison, Camp county; J. C. Furgerson, Kleburg county; and C. M. Carraway, Commanche county. The average size of the farms operated by these men was 395 acres, 242 of which were in cultivation. Their farms were well equiped, which is shown by the fact that their average total investment amounted to 63,514. This appears to be rather a high investment, but the significant fact is that these farm ers were making their farms pay an average dividend of almost 10 per cont over a period of years. In every Trase these master farmers had paid for their farms from the earnings thereof. The superior equipment found on these farms came also from the revenue grained from the products of the soil under the skillful management of the owners.

+ Eleven of these master farmers had 39 per cent of their land in cotton and 61 per cent in feed, which was consumed by the livestock at home. Livestock played a prominent part in the properity of these farms for we find high grade and registered animals on all of them and they average 8 dairy cows, 192 standard bred hens, 3 pure bred sows and 41 sheep per farm. They all used highproducing strains of purebred seeds and their crop rotation was so planned as to get maximum yields from the soil.


