> 1. The purchased must fill out an invoice, at the time of the purchase, giving amount, price, purpose, etc., The regular price is paid for the gas. forms will be supplied by dealers and filling stations.

2. Before the 25th of the month following the month of purchase, the ouyer most opport to the Comptroller the number of gallons bought and the amount of refunds expected. aims reported later than the 25th of he following month will not be honor-

On receiving the report, the omptroller's Department will mail ne claimant an affidavit-account form n which will be recorded information as to the amount and use of gasoline ourchased. This information must be sworn to before a notary public, and led with the Comptroller not later than two months from the date of purchase. This document must be acompanied with a filing fee of \$1.00, which must be paid each time that a claim is filed. These fees will be used to enforce the law.

4. The claim will be investigated, and if considered valid, a State warant will be issued for the refund. This warrent must be cashed within

30 days. 5. No refund shall be made where gasoline is used later than six months from purchase.
