The shooting took place in front of the Sanitarium.

Campbell, about 19 years of age, and a student of the Floy dada High School, was killed instantly. Three shots were fired, all three taking effect in Campbell's body. A six-shooter was used. Events leading up to the shooting were unknown to Sheriff Randerson. Mr. Readhimer is in custody of the sheriff.




