Mrs. Wiley as matron of honor was dressed in white and carried a bouquet of pink roses, Mr. Wiley acted as best man to Mr. Nickson.



Because of the additional income offered , Protein is of particular interest to wheat growers during season of short crops and low prices By intelligent selling on the protein basis, a greater profit may be realized. Wheat testing below sixty pounds per bushel may bring a price equal to or above the price paid for wheat testing above sixty pounds.

It is not to be understood that it is always profitable to sell when the protein premium is the highest. It may be that there will be no premium for high protein wheat when the market is at its peak. However, if wheat is being sold while there is a premium, the seller should be able to take advantage of this condition. 


